IT HAS BEEN SAID that most Americans are "nervous as a cat" during the time that congress is in session. If you need a good example of why they're nervous, just read on.

Last week, the United States Congress was on the verge of passing legislation that would have had tremendous humanitarian impact, and opened the door for funds to be used to help in President Bush's War on Drugs.

But in the end, our senators and representatives showed their true colors, and underscored the fact that they're really not interested in saving taxpayers' money, especially if it means trimming one iota of their own personal "perks."

In its original legislation, congress was persuaded that in order to have money to aid periodic mailing of newsletters to the congressmen's constituents.

The mailing of the newsletters, which is done at no cost to the congress, costs an estimated \$650 million per year in taxpayers' money--more than \$3.00 for every America.
