FAIR FOR NOLAN COUNTY ASSURED

Farm Bureau Carries Out Former Announced Policy by Making Fair Appropriation.

MUCH INTEREST DISPLAYED

Boys' and Girls' Clubs, B. C. D., Women's Organizations Pledge Help To Farm Body.

A Nolan County fall fair is assured for Sweetwater next month that will feature an extensive agriculture, manufacturers' and merchants' exhibits, it was stated at a meeting of the Nolan County Farm Bureau here Saturday. The meeting was called by President H. E. Lewellen of Hylton and carried out the announced policy of the spring meeting by making an appropriation to assist in defraying the expenses of the fair and exhibition.

During the meeting, farmers expressed their ability to put on a first class farm and agricultural exhibit, and co-operation and exhibits for the fair have been promised by county Hereford, poultry, sheep and goat, and hog breeders. A dairy exhibit is also probable, and the county agent, and county demonstration agent, have announced that the various boys and girls clubs over the county would place exhibits. Efforts will be made to have the annual Sorosis Club Flower Show in connection with the other exhibits.

John McCurdy of the Board of City Development told the meeting that the city was greatly in favor of the fair and promised the co-operation of the B. C. D. Practically all the Women's Clubs of Sweetwater and Nolan County are working for the fair, it was stated, many of them already having committees appointed and actively engaged in preparations.

A meeting of delegate-members of the various organizations interested in the project will be held at the B. C. D., office Monday afternoon and an executive committee will be appointed out of this group. This committee will probably set the date for the fair, it was announced, and work out other necessary plans.

BLOODWORTH TO FIGHT OUSTING

Klanwoman, National Committee Member, Won't Quit After State Convention Asks Her To.

DENIES ALL CHARGES

Denies She is Not in Sympathy With "River Bottom Government" In Letter to Chairman.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Sept. 6.—Mrs. J. F. Bloodworth, Democratic national committee woman from Texas, called upon at the recent state convention to resign her post "as being out of harmony with the state and national party" reiterated her refusal to comply with the request in a letter to E. A. Berry, chairman of the State Executive Committee, made public today.

Mrs. Bloodworth charged that the decision of the convention was the result of "hysteria" and declared that she was "duly elected in the state convention at Waco."

"I deny all charges made against me at the convention and that I am in sympathy with 'river bottom government,'" Mrs. Bloodworth said.

WELCOME AIRMEN AT BOSTON PORT

After Flight is Delayed by Fog, Three Army Planes Descend in Tumult of Greeting.

RESUME FLIGHT MONDAY

Lt. Smith, Commander, Lights First—Change Pontoons For Landing Gear as Flyers Rest.

AIR PORT, BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 6.—Into a tumult of welcome, America's round the world flyers descended at Boston at 2:02 p. m. today.

They flew down the coast from Mere Point, Me., where their home-ward flight was arrested by fog late Friday, but was continued today at 12:04.

The airmen were sighted from the port, where immense crowds had gathered at 2 o'clock, and two minutes later, they were overhead. They had made the journey from Mere Point, near Brunswick, Me., in two hours.

Lt. Smith, the flight commander, was the first to land, his plane coming down to the surface at 2:09. A minute later, the plane piloted by Lt. Wade touched the water, and Lt. Nelson landed a few seconds afterward.

Resting in Boston hospitality, the flyers may not hop off for Mineola Field, N. Y., until Monday. Although no final decision had been made as to the postponement of the jump, word was passed out that the replacing of pontoons with landing gear and making of final repairs was taking more time than was at first thought, and that flight Sunday was impracticable.

NEW SECRETARY

Jeff Strickland, San Antonio, Named Secretary of State to Succeed S. L. Staples.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 6.—Governor Neff has appointed Jeff J. Strickland of San Antonio as Secretary of State to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of S. L. Staples. The appointment is effective September 10.

The new Secretary of State is a former state senator, having represented the 13th district, in the 36th Legislature, and before that time a member of the House from Anderson County.

Names Texas Princess.

NOLAN COUNTY INVITED

Mitchell County Asks For Exhibit at Fair September 25.

C. C. Cooper, secretary of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce and Mitchell County Fair, was in Sweetwater recently and extended an invitation to Nolan County to send an exhibit to the Mitchell County Fair, September 25th.

Midland, Howard and other counties adjacent to Mitchell will be represented and an invitation to Scurry and other counties will also be extended.

Mr. Cooper says that it is estimated Mitchell County will produce around 30,000 bales this year as compared with 31,000 in 1923. The crop is not in as good shape as last year but the acreage has been increased largely.

DAVIS EXPLAINS FARMER RELIEF

Co-Operation of Europe and U. S. Opening World Markets For Produce, Surest Road.

RIDICULES DAWES PLAN

Industry Already Over—Investigated Nominee Says—Coolidge Proposal Gets Criticism.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 6.—The surest road to the return of agricultural prosperity, John W. Davis, Democratic presidential nominee, pointed out tonight in a specific program promising definite relief to distressed farmers, is direct co-operation of the United States with Europe in restoring stability which will re-open the world markets to surplus American farm products.

Speaking to 7,000 men and women in the city auditorium here, in the heart of the agricultural west, Davis quoted Charles G. Dawes, Republican vice presidential nominee, to sustain his contention that the price of farm products was fixed by the surplus sold in world markets.

He ridiculed Dawes' proposal for an agricultural investigating committee, declaring that the industry was over investigated and that the patient was in a fair way to die before the doctors have finished diagnosis.

The Democratic nominee then turned his attack on Coolidge for his proposal to limit the agricultural production by stopping irrigation and drainage projects. If that plan was adopted, he said, a multitude of farmers would be forced to quit farming and let their fields lie idle.

MORE COTTON IN ADMIT KILLING

Cotton Season Developing With Season Total at 205 and Week's Total at 147 Bales.

The Nolan County cotton season is rapidly developing with a great increase the past week of the number of bales brought to Sweetwater. A total of 205 bales had been weighed at the local cotton yards up to 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and it was thought, that this total would be increased by at least 5 bales before dark.

Only 58 of the season's 205 bales had been brought to Sweetwater last Saturday, showing that 147 bales have been brought in this week. The last three days of the week have shown the heaviest receipts, Thursday's quota being 46 bales, 43 on Friday and 45 Saturday. Cotton men report, however, that the season is not in full swing yet. It was stated that the cotton season would be going at full blast by September 15th.

Several bales of cotton have been ginned this season that are not in the cotton yards, it is reported, and it is believed these bales, which were mostly sold through the Farmers Bureau, would considerably increase the season's total.

The average price paid for cotton here Saturday was reported to be around 23 3/4 cents. Cotton pickers are rather scarce, it is reported by cotton men, and many are having to be imported. They are being paid \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hundred, it is stated. Cotton this year is reported to be of good quality, most of it grading good middling.

REPUBLICANS IN ACTIVE CAMPAIGN

Will Wage Greatest Fight in State Party History For Dr. Butte And Entire Ticket.

NOMINEE SENDS ACCEPTANCE

Has Wirelless Acceptance, Creager Says—Klan Apparently Ignored As Issue.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 6.—The most active campaign ever conducted by the Republicans of Texas will be waged for Dr. George C. Butte, nominee for Governor, and the entire state ticket, Republican leaders who remained over from the state executive committee meeting Friday said today.

The Klan will be ignored as an issue, it is indicated by expressions from R. B. Creager, national committeeman and state party leader. No formal statement was issued here, but Creager denied that the state party had made or would make "any character of trade or combination with any group of class."

He did not mention the Klan by name. "Fergusonism" will be the main issue of the campaign, according to Col. W. E. Talbot, state committeeman from this district.

"The Republican nominee is not running against Mrs. Ferguson, but against Jim Ferguson himself," Talbot said.

MORE COTTON IN ADMIT KILLING

Brothers Confess to Slaying Young Farmer, Burning Body, Hiding Bones in Swamp.

DILLON, S. C., Sept. 6.—Tracy and Lewis Powers, brothers, were jailed here today on a charge of murder following a confession that they shot and killed Earle Harrell, 18, Dillon County farmer.

Harrell disappeared August 22. His charred bones were found in a swamp near here a few days later.

According to officers, the accused men killed the young farmer because of alleged relations with Mrs. Tracy Powers. After the killing the body was put in Power's tobacco shed, which was burned down. The bones were then removed to a nearby swamp.

Blaylock Against "Ma."

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 6.—Mayor Louis Blaylock of Dallas will not support Mrs. Miriam Ferguson for governor, he said upon his return here from a vacation today. Blaylock said that he did not consider the former Governor a Democrat, and could not support the woman nominee on that account.

WAXAHACHIE, Texas, Sept. 6.—Noble McCormack, 22, Texas Power and Light Co., employe here, was alive tonight despite the fact that he came in contact with an 11,000 volt high power line near here today.

McCormack was stunned and burned about the body. He is expected to recover.

COOLIDGE WARNS AGAINST CHANGES

Denounces Proposals to Limit Power of Supreme Court or Change Constitution.

WOULD DESTROY LIBERTY

President Displays Unusual Vehemence in Plea For Liberty Under Constitutional Government.

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 6.—With a vehemence rarely noted in his speeches, President Coolidge in an address at the Lafayette Day ceremonies today denounced all proposals to limit the powers of the Supreme Court or alter the constitution and summoned American citizens to fight them to the last ditch.

"A deliberate and determined effort is being made to break down the guarantees of our fundamental law," he said. "It has for its purpose the confiscation of property, and the destruction of liberty. At present, the chief obstacle to this effort, besides the people, is the Supreme Court of the United States."

"In this contest," the President shouted, "there is only one place for a real American to stand. That is on the side of ordered liberty under constitutional government. The question is whether America will allow herself to be degraded into a communistic and socialistic state, or whether she will remain American. Those who want to continue the high estate of citizenship will resist all efforts to encroach on the power of the courts."

FIRPO TO FIGHT

Wild Bull Appears and Makes Bond After Hearing is Set For Sept. 15—Battles Thursday.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 6.—Louis Angel Firpo will be free to fight Harry Wills, negro heavy weight, the night of September 11.

The big Argentine boxer, today appeared before Immigration Commissioner Curran, accompanied by his attorney and Juan Homes, Tex Rickard's South American representative, and his hearing was set for September 15.

Firpo is charged with violating the immigration act in connection with the visit during 1923 of Senorita Blanca Lordes Picart, alleged to have been friendly with the fighter. The Wild Bull was released on bond of \$1,000, deposited in Liberty Bonds.

HOME BURNS

Fire Destroys Expensive Farm House Near Blackwell Saturday.

Fire of unknown origin destroyed at noon Saturday the ranch home of J. T. Hamilton, 4 miles southwest of Blackwell, according to information received late Saturday in Sweetwater. The fire is thought to have started in a closet or pantry, it was stated, and the flames were beyond control before help could be summoned to extinguish the blaze. Only a small quantity of household furnishings was saved.

The value of the house and contents was estimated at \$8,000 to \$9,000, with \$4,000 in insurance.

Recovers From Snake Bite.

Wesley Edwards, 8 years old, has been taken back to his home south of Sweetwater from a local hotel where he stayed while physicians treated injuries received when he was bitten by a rattlesnake early in the week. He is reported to be greatly improved.

RECEIVE BIDS ON PAVING FOR CITY

Commission Reads Seven Bids, Holds Two For Consideration—Over 25 Representatives Present.

MAYOR INVITES INSPECTION

Interested Citizens Asked to Look at Record of Meeting—Order Walks on Crane Street.

After a lengthy morning session which was attended by over 25 representatives of paving, material and construction companies during which 7 bids were opened and read, and a private session in the afternoon, the City Commission adjourned late Friday having rejected 5 of the 7 bids and kept two for further consideration and investigation. The bids that will be considered were those entered by the Plains Paving Co., of Wichita Falls, with branch offices in Abilene and Colorado, and representatives here from Coleman and Coombs; and the West Texas Construction Co., of Fort Worth, represented at the meeting by Ed Yales.

The seven companies entering bids were Texas Paving Co., J. H. Meyers, Plains Paving Co., West Texas Construction Co., Smith Bros., General Construction Co., and H. K. McCollum. The J. H. Meyers bid was informal and not entered according to specifications and was not considered.

The Plains Paving Co., bids, one of the two not rejected, were for the Willite process paving, while the other bid, made by the West Texas Construction Co., was for Bitholithic work. Mayor Boothe stated that all action in regards to either bid would be deferred until further consideration.

J. G. Reagan and F. W. Chappell of the Elrod Engineering Co., city engineers, were in session with the commission Friday.

The different bids offered varied in process and prices, but the complete record of the bids was taken, and Mayor Boothe stated that any citizen of Sweetwater interested in the paving program was invited to look at the records and figures on file at the City Hall.

In the afternoon session, the commission ordered 4-foot sidewalks laid on each side of Crane street from 3rd street to the High School building.

DESPERATE FIGHT SAVES SHANGHAI

Woo Fung Forts, Only Barrier Between Attackers and City, Saved by Defending Troops.

CASUALTIES ARE HEAVY

General Chi Places Price of \$50,000 on Head of General Lu, Leading Counter Attacks.

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 6.—The Woo Fung forts, barriers between Shanghai and the attacking forces of General Chi, were saved tonight by desperate counter attacks of the troops of General Lu.

The Chekiang army was driven back two miles across the river Lieu by the Lu men. Aided by re-enforcements thrown constantly into the battle, Lu's army tonight was consolidating around Liuho.

Nearly 6,000 defense troops were treated for wounds in local Red Cross stations. It is claimed that the casualties of the Chi forces were heavier.

Airplanes, machine guns, and heavy artillery were engaged in the fighting today. The attackers made a determined assault on the Woo Fung forts. General Chi has put a price of \$50,000 on General Lu's head.

"UNOFFICIAL" STABILIZATION

The reparations program worked out by the unofficial committee of experts, and now agreed upon at the Reparations Conference, owes its great success to the fact that all the work done was unofficial and non-political.

For months a committee of the most able American financiers and practical business men labored in Europe to work out a program to restore European stability, but disconnected from the government of the United States.

International co-operation and application of business principles had to be employed because there were divisions of opinion in both political parties and powerful factions opposed to any participation by our country officially in European affairs.

The reparations program had to be worked out on financial and economic lines with a plan so wise, clear, strong and practical that it could afterwards be put into operation and carried through over a period of years by an administration that might be in power in any of the countries directly interested.

It so happens that men very prominent in the Republican and Democratic organizations participated in this unofficial, non-governmental expert committee and the agreement reached during the international conference is entitled to the support of public opinion in all political parties to bring about the desired economic results.

The biggest men in our country, regardless of party, are agreed that reconstruction of the economic life of Europe on sound business principles is indispensable to our own well-being and prosperity.

Take the simple fact that Europe bought 80 per cent of our farm exports, making a market for the surplus products of our farm, making business for our ships, railroads and factories—and then realize that that market was destroyed by the war.

After the armistice, four years were spent in fighting over political theories, largely over names like the League of Nations and the World Court, but always arousing partisan

political strife and prejudice and racial antagonism.

The recent London conferences that have reached an agreement on the reparations plan were not conducted on political lines—the new labor premier of England presiding. American statesmen participating without injecting politics; Germany and France for once burying the hatchet and all subscribing to the final agreement—the greatest step toward international peace along business lines that has ever been taken.

Much remains to be done to carry the reparations plan into full effect. Berlin and Paris advices show a strong desire to work for peace and friendship between the people of the world. France and England were about as far apart as France and Germany and the first steps are taken for the evacuation of the Ruhr. "Peace hath her victories no less renowned than war."

SCHOOL

Monday marks the end of vacation days for Sweetwater school students and teachers. Registration and classification will be held on the opening day, and in a short while, the regular order of classes and activities will settle down for the routine of the next nine months.

School will start here on time, and without any formal opening. Business is the policy of the new administration. The lack of such a policy has retarded the schools of the city in past years.

Most things that start on time are successful. While a cold and over efficient manner of handling executive duties does not produce harmony, we believe that the present corps of executives and teachers in the Sweetwater schools is not only efficient but exceedingly human, and that the entire city is expecting an unusually successful school year. Co-operation between teachers, citizens, and pupils will assure it.

Discussing training our school trustees, a departure in education heretofore unthought of, Phebe K. Warner in the Fort Worth Record, says that the trustee, in reality the father of the public school, is not required to read and write, does not have to be a tax payer, does not have to be a patron of the institution he controls, does not have to be as much as a sixth grade citizen, does not have to have a first, second, or third grade certificate, and does not have

to attend institutes to learn new methods and new courses of study.

Mrs. Warner says:

There is not one single qualification required of any man to be a school trustee. Anybody, just anybody, that will accept the job is eligible. Every year we are demanding more and more of the teacher in our effort to build up a higher standard for our public schools, but there is never a word said about building up the standard of the school trustee. And right there is one of the weakest points in our public school system.

Whether your school stands still or progresses with the years depends first of all on your school trustees. The best teachers in the State can not make the most of your school if it is under the control of a school board that has had no training for their business.

NOMINATE BUTTE

In the nomination of Dr. George C. Butte, dean of the Law School, University of Texas, the Republicans are making a strong play for any stray votes that may come their way from the ranks of the Democrats. He is perhaps one of the most outstanding men in the G. O. P. party and one whose University connections will help to swell his vote in the contest for governor against the Democratic nominee, Mrs. M. A. Ferguson.

It therefore behooves loyal Democrats to be on their guard and go to the polls in November lest there be a political upset in a year when Democratic chances for success nationally never seemed brighter. This is no time for loyal Democrats to stray from the fold because their candidate

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did not happen to win in the primary elections.

While there has been precedent—no later than two years ago—for bolting the party, it is predicted that any bolt this year will get just as far as has been previously the case. But that does not excuse anybody from failing to vote in November. With the possibility of the normal Republican vote of around 100,000 being swelled by dissatisfied politicians there is no room for lack of precaution on the part of loyal Democrats.

RIO VALLEY IMMENSE

Few Realize River Covers Longer Distance Than N. Y. to Chicago.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Sept. 6.—Even though the Rio Grande River forms the boundary line between the United States and Mexico from a point a few miles west of El Paso to the mouth of the river emptying into the Gulf of Mexico below Brownsville, few people realize the distance meas-

ured by the river is equal to that between New York and Chicago.

Nor do but comparatively few people know that within that distance 270,000 acres of valley land is in cultivation.

There are a dozen small cities in the stretch of 906 miles which separated El Paso from Brownsville and is called the Rio Grande Valley.

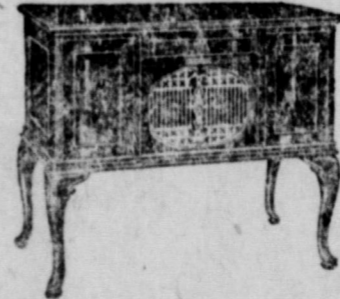

TEACHERS MEET SELECT CHRYSLER

Get Final Instructions For Opening of School Monday — Boundaries, Credits Explained.

Meeting with the superintendent at the High School Saturday morning, all teachers for the ensuing session of school were given final instructions for the opening of school next Monday morning. Complete organization and methods for enrolling were perfected. Principals and teachers were given explicit instructions regarding the districts and checking up of pupils for location, text books, and classification.

All pupils under the seventh grade will report to the wards in their districts. Seventh grade pupils will report to the high school.

All pupils living west of Oak Street and North of the T-P tracks will report to the West Ward. All pupils south of the T-P tracks, west of Lamar street and south of Fourth street, will report to the South Ward. All others will report to the East Ward.

Unders will be allowed to attend school if they will reach their seventh birthday before the first of January. All pupils who will not be seven before the first day of September will have to pay tuition for the entire session.

In the High School pupils who have three credits will be classified "second year," seven credits classified "third year," eleven credits "fourth year," regardless of subjects taken or the pupil's opinion as to where he wants to be classified. No pupil who lacks more than five units of credit will be classified as a senior, or "fourth year" student. All graduates in May will have to have completed 16 credits, fifteen of them affiliated, music, athletics, literary societies, and expression not counted.

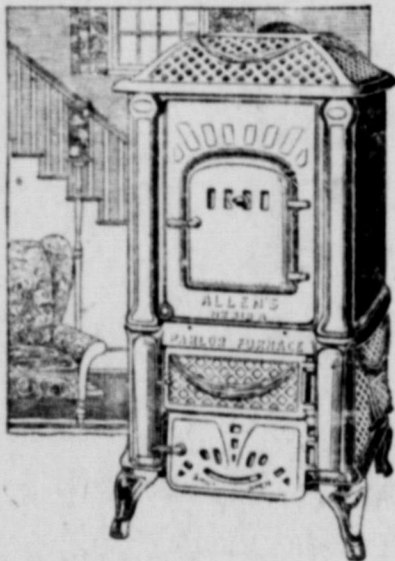

WAS SAINT BALD?

Antiquarians Argue Over Peter's Pate.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 6.—Was St. Peter really bald?

Christian art since the Fifth Century has consistently depicted the Apostle as bald-headed with a thin fringe of hair on the back of his head. Raphael's picture "The Disciple" is a familiar, if comparatively modern example.

But now the antiquarians are wondering if Christian art hasn't been, on the whole, unjust to the fiery disciple, at least in the matter of pulchritude, since a very ancient silver image of St. Peter has been found near Constantinople showing him with an abundant crop of curly hair.

Some authorities take this silver image very seriously. They believe that it is a late example of the work of the Gnostics sect somewhere around the second century; as they were very fond of images and apparently took great pains to make them true to the tradition handed down in the early Church, the fact that a Knostic image reveals the Saint with a grand mop of hair carries weight. On the other hand, if the silver image in question is merely the work of an early Christian craftsman who admired curly hair and gave it to his favorite disciple, there is nothing more to be said in the matter.

But European antiquarians, now discussing the latest find in their journals, admit that it raises for them a very serious question.

FIND OL' SWIMMIN' HOLE

Pool Made Famous By Riley Located At Last.

GREENFIELD, Ind., Sept. 6.—The "Ol' Swimmin' Hole," made famous by James Whitcomb Riley, has been located at last.

Appropriation of \$10,000 by the city council to buy the land along Brandywine creek, where Riley went swim-

ming as a boy, started a controversy that lasted for weeks.

Old settlers disagreed among themselves as to the location of the pool referred to by Riley. Some said it was north of the old National road, and others were just as sure it was south.

Others declared emphatically that a change in the creek bed had turned the old hole into a sandbar.

Finally, after repeated consultations it was agreed that the swimming pool was a few hundred yards north of the National road, and preparations are being made for opening the park.

WOMAN RANCHER

Mrs. Pettus, American, Takes Over Property of Sister, Mrs. Evans, Slain by Mexicans.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—While placing confidence in the Mexican government, officials here admitted that this government's responsibility has increased with the arrival in Mexico of Mrs. W. J. Pettus, an American citizen, to take charge of

the disputed property near Puebla where her sister Mrs. Rosalie Evans, a British subject, was recently slain. No action has been taken by the Administration, it is understood.

Sharp distinction is drawn here between Mrs. Pettus' safety and her sible property rights. Her life, if endangered will be protected by the Mexican Government, it is believed. As for property fights in the case which caused Great Britain to withdraw its diplomatic representatives from Mexico, the State Department today had no information that Mrs. Pettus had actually inherited the Evans property in whole or in part. Presumably the will has not yet been probated. The Department has no files on the legal aspects of the case, which Great Britain has conducted for ten years.

Must Cease Opposition.

The government will not support Mrs. Pettus, if she continues her sister's fight against expropriation of the estate, unless there is violation of the recent Warren-Payne agreement recognizing expropriation of land for town sites and small holdings as provided in the famous Article 27 of the Mexican constitution of 1917. This agreement with the United States fixes a maximum of roughly 4,000 acres expropriateable in

each estate. Article 27 stipulates compensation in 20-year bonds, for lands expropriated by the National Agrarian Commission, based on the assessed value plus 10 per cent. But like all Mexican government securities these bonds have a low market value.

Only if native workers take parts of the estate without authorization by the Agrarian Commission can the United States recognize the case, it is said here.

PERSHING'S PAY CONTINUES

"Black Jack," After Retirement, Will Get \$13,500.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—John J. Pershing is giving up a pretty good job when he retires this month as General of the Armies of the United States; but the pay check is to come in just the same.

For the majority of folks, Pershing's monthly pay check, which amounts to nearly \$2,000, would stand off the wolf for quite a while. Pershing's pay is \$13,500 a year. Besides that, he gets allowances of \$6,500 for quarters and \$1,500 for heat and light.

Usually army officers are retired on two-thirds pay, but "Black Jack" will keep on drawing the full \$13,500, his compensation having been fixed by special Act of Congress. His allowances, however, will stop.

Pershing's pay is three times that George Washington received, almost twice the compensation of Gen. Grant, and much more than Sherman and Sheridan drew. Those four, with Pershing, are the only full generals in American history, except two who were temporarily given the rank during the World War.

As Lieutenant-General, George Washington received \$250 a month, plus \$50 for horse feed and \$240 for rations, bringing up the monthly to \$540.

Grant's active pay was \$400 a month, plus \$300 for fuel and quarters, \$460 for rations, and \$50 for forage. Sherman drew the same amount. Sherman and Grant were given full retirement pay—\$13,500 a year. Sheridan while a full general, was paid at the rate of \$15,000 a year.

GIRL SUCCESSFUL

Outsmarts Smartest of Smart Oil Operators.

By NEA Service.
WICHITA, Kas., Sept. 6.—Pauline L. Holland outsmarts the smartest oil operators in the mid-west and brought fortune to herself and Greenwood County.

Six years ago the oil fraternity moved derricks out of Greenwood. After a succession of dry holes, the big companies packed their equipment and marked Greenwood County to be avoided.

But there was one woman who believed in Greenwood.

Educated, refined and energetic, she has blocked more acreage and got more tests drilled than any man in the field.

Miss Holland has assembled 14 blocks and got a test drilled on all but one. Every test was drilled to the contract depth without a squabble, and every farmer who joined in the block was satisfied.

Not every test proved a producer, but a majority of them found oil and made money for the operators and the farmers who joined in the block.

Her latest feat was in assembling a block in Russell County, after some of the best lease hounds playing the game had failed. She not only blocked the acreage to a depth of 3500 feet. The structure on this block was examined by a number of leading geologists in the mid-continent field and pronounced good.

Her greatest feat as an oil woman, however, happened when the big companies left Greenwood County and not a test was drilled in the entire territory.

She assembled a block of acreage, and interested John Grieves. The well came in as an edge well with a big showing. It created a small sensation. The big companies, on the strength of this showing, sent geologists to Greenwood county, and in less than a year and a half a dozen other tests had come in for producers.

The tide turned back to Greenwood and today the county is running ahead of Butler, for years the banner county of Kansas in oil production.

Miss Holland is a graduate mining engineer. For several years she was with the Anaconda Copper Co. of Montana. She came to Kansas seven years ago to buy production for a Colorado company. The price of production, she thought, was too high so she started drilling in the shallow fields of Montgomery, Elk and Chautauqua counties.

She drilled in 88 tests in these fields and never got a duster. Later she entered the blocking game and has made a biggest success in the way of completing blocks and getting tests of any person playing the entire field.

AN INCREASE IN ACCIDENTS

For 1923 in Industrial Work Total Estimated at 3 Million

From Architecture and Building.

A 20 per cent increase in industrial accidents in the United States in 1923 is estimated by the national safety council from statistics collected from states, insurance agencies and industrial concerns.

Industrial accidents reported by only nine states—Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Delaware, Washington, Oregon and Pennsylvania—totalled more than 1-2 million, an increase of approximately 100,000 over the previous period, with 4,112 fatal accidents in the periods reported for in eight of the states as against 3,726 for the year preceding. The total for the year's estimated at 3 million accidents of which twenty-three thousand were fatal and 115,000 caused permanent disability.

The total cost is estimated at more than 1 billion dollars. Increased production, many new employes and a letdown in safety interest by both employes and employers are held as factors in the 1923 experience.

In the face of the general increase many steel plants, public utilities, mines, railroads, motor car and general manufacturing concerns made excellent safety records last year.

Free Air

Car owners will fuss more over a lot of little things that do not amount to a row of pins, and forget all about one of the most important parts of the car—the tires. Somehow they fail to keep them properly inflated.

I realize that soft tires make riding a bit easier. But if you keep them soft, do not blame the tire makers if they go to smash long before they should. Tires are constructed to carry a certain amount of air. When a tire is under-inflated the side walls will bend sharply with each turn of the wheel. This

bending produces heat, which softens the rubber between the layers of fabric. These layers then separate and begin to chafe and rub against each other. After a while the layer next to the tube breaks. This pinches the tube, and you are in for a slow leak or a blow-out.

The same condition holds true of clincher tires, with one additional trouble; that is, rim cutting.

The matter of proper air pressure in tires seems to bother lots of folks. Ask us what the right pressure should be for your particular needs, and follow our advice.

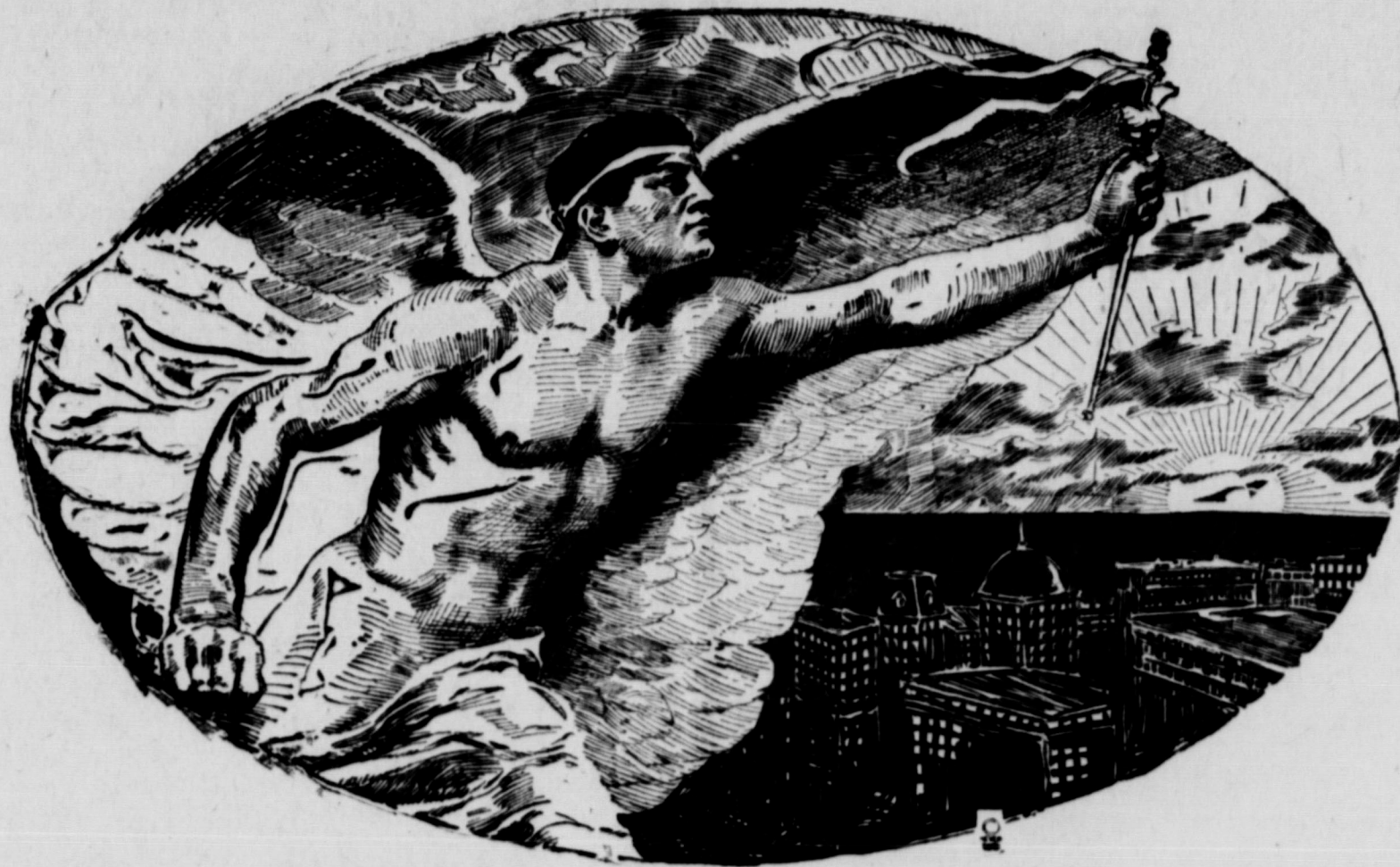
