WHEN I LIVED on the farm east of Lariat in southern Parmer County, we, like most other folks, made only one trip "to town" each week.

(Remember, the "My Turn" writer mentioned this habit a few weeks ago, referring to us country folks as "less fortunate," or something like that).

Anyway, the highlight of our week was that trip to town. My younger brother and myself would sit in the back seat, and wonder (perhaps even out loud) whether the weekly trip would be into Muleshoe when we got to the Highway 84 intersection, or to Clovis, N.M.

True, it was closer to Muleshoe, only about 12 miles down the highway, while it was a few miles further to Clovis, 18 miles or so.

However, the choices were much better if our folks chose Clovis, N.M. You see, Muleshoe had only the two indoor theatres (only one to begin with), the Valley and the Palace, but Clovis was a three movie-house town--the State, Lyceum and Mesa.

That really gave you a better choice when your main item of entertainment every Saturday afternoon was the "picture show." You might be able to choose between Hopalong Cassidy and Roy Rogers (what a choice!)--on the same day.

We even thought Clovis had the best deal, because we can recall when you could buy a child's ticket to the movie in Clovis for only nine cents, while the children's ticket at Muleshoe was 12 cents.

If our visit was to Muleshoe, which it was most likely to be, you could purchase your movie ticket, and still have 13 cents left over for popcorn and cokes, if your allowance happened to be 25 cents. Don't laugh--this wasn't all that far removed from the Depression age, and money was still handed out rather sparingly.

So, you could take your remaining 13 cents and buy yourself a bag of popcorn and a coke, leaving three more cents for bubble gum or candy. Or, you might save the remainder for a visit to the drugstore following the movie, and then have to make a choice of one of the action-packed comic books they had on display.

The drugstore owner must have been pretty easy-going, because most of us Saturday customers, farm boys and city slickers alike, liked to "set up shop" in front of the comic book display, and take our time while making our selection.

Truth be known, we most probably read--or at least scanned--all of the ones we were having to choose between, before we finally settled on the one we would "own" for awhile.

Yes, we've kicked ourselves more than once because we let our Granny throw out all of those comic books, which are bought and sold by collectors for high dollars today. We'd have had a small fortune if we'd only have been smart and saved them.

We might have even opted for a dip, or a double-dip of drugstore ice cream. Can you remember how good that ice cream tasted? Or for that matter, how good it smelled in those drug stores?

If you can, then you don't have to worry about the draft. Someone just reminded me that we don't even have the draft anymore.

MARY JOYCE Barnett brought us a copy of the Dallas Morning News from March which has a very interesting entry on the state's weather map, neatly printed up in color, with the predicted temperatures for that day.

Up in the Panhandle area, the only city or town listed is "Rhea--pop. 98," near the state line.

Distribution starts at 7:30 a.m. in Bovina and 8 a.m. in Friona. Senior citizens are allowed to be served first.

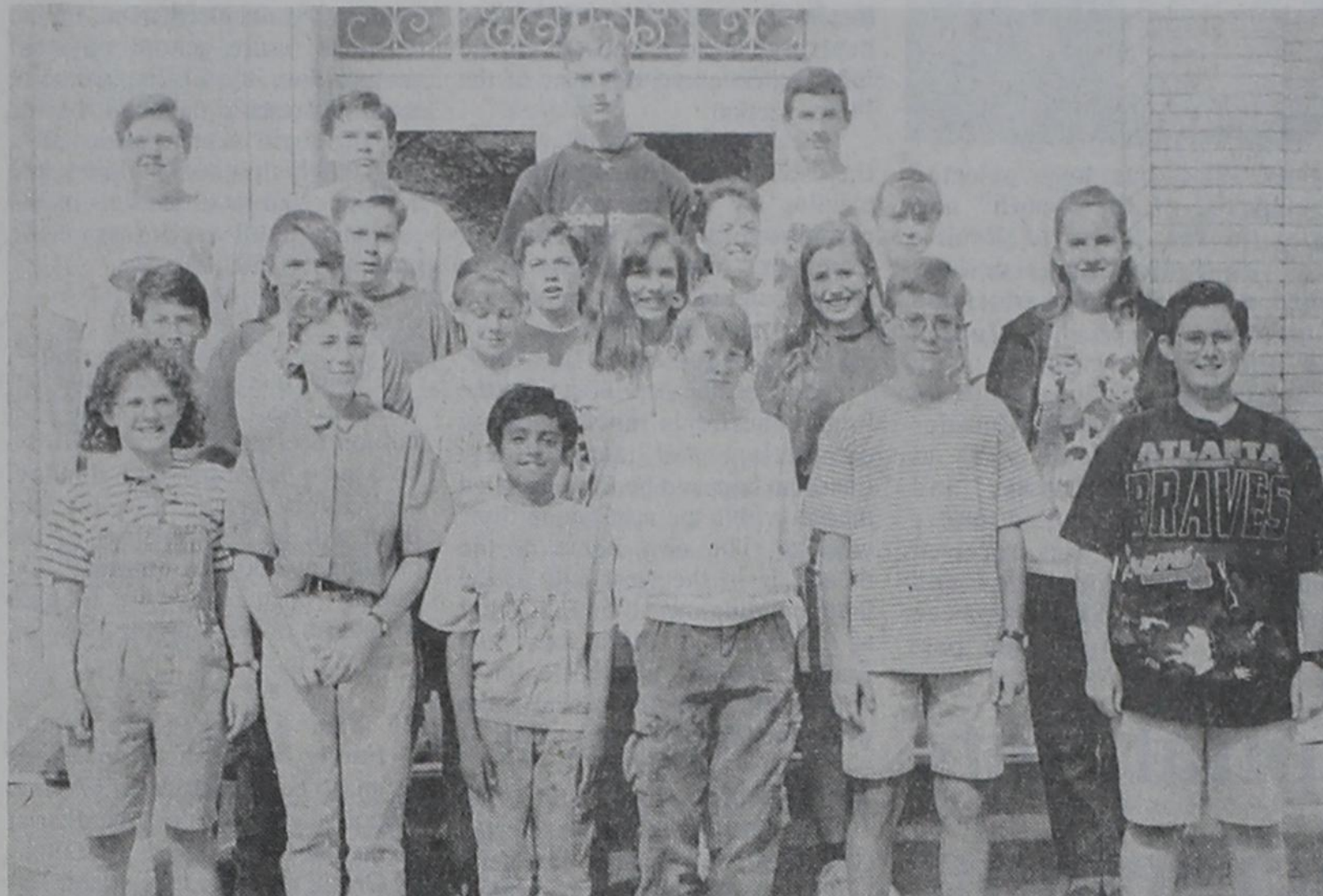
Circus Is Coming To Friona

Local Hospital Sets Cancer Screening

On Wednesday, May 18, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the

mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines for having mammograms are: 1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month; 2. Have a physical examination every year; 3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age: 40--one baseline mammogram; 40-49--a mammogram every one to two years; and 50 and over--yearly mammograms.

The old fiddlers' contest given at the school auditorium Friday evening by the emergency fund committee of the Chamber of Commerce was a success as to jolity, sociability and revenue.

55 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 14, 1939

Work on the new home for the Regal Theatre is rapidly nearing completion, and manager Ray Landrum hopes to be fully installed therein within the next two or three weeks. The new home of the theatre is in the west half of the large building owned by F.S. Truitt at the corner of Sixth street and Euclid Avenue, and will almost double the capacity of the room where the theatre is now located.

40 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 15, 1954

Dan Ethridge has been elected Chamber of Commerce president, with Glenn Reeve as vice president and Mack Bainum as secretary.

The county commissioner's court announces the hiring of Miss Corine Stinson as County Home Demonstration Agent, County Agricultural Agent, Joe Jones, has called a meeting of all cotton producers for April 21 in Bovina to discuss the allocation of cotton acres.

and his animal was bought by Friona State Bank for \$125.46.

A certificate was presented to Arvilla Elmore for raising the most money during the local March of Dimes drive. A total of \$1332.30 was raised by the local drive.

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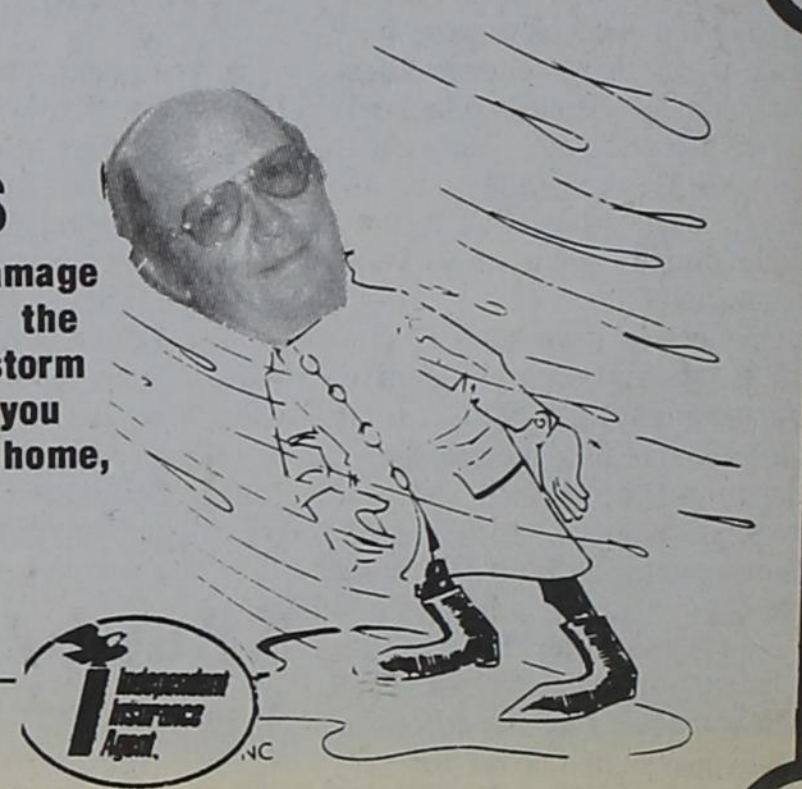
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Horse Club Met Here March 24

HAWAIIAN SNOW BALLS

- By Wanda Hart
- 1/2 cup butter
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 egg yolks, well beaten
 - 1-#2 can crushed pineapple (drained until almost dry)
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts

3 egg whites, stiffly beaten
1 cup whipping cream, whipped
1 can coconut
48 medium-size vanilla wafers

Cream butter and sugar. Add well beaten egg yolks. Mix in well drained pineapple and the nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Refrigerate for at least 2 hours. Spread generously between 3 vanilla wafers, making a stack. Refrigerate overnight or at least 2-4 hours. Ice the sides of each stack with whipped cream and roll gently in the coconut. Cover the top with whipped cream and top with the coconut. Chill overnight or at least 2-4 hours before serving.

CRISPIE NIFTIES

- 1 package dates, chopped fine
 - 1 stick oleo, melted
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1-1/2 cups sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 4 cups Rice Krispies
 - 1 cup chopped nuts
 - Shredded coconut

Cook first five ingredients over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thick. Cool a few minutes. Add Rice Krispies and nuts. When cool enough to handle, roll into small balls and roll in coconut or powdered sugar.

BISCOCHITOS COOKIES

- 6 cups flour
 - 3 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 3 teaspoons anise seed
 - 2 cups Crisco or butter
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 6 tablespoons sweet wine
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon cinnamon

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream sugar and Crisco until creamy. Add eggs and anise seed, cream again until fluffy. Mix with first mixture. Add wine (enough to hold dough together). Roll out about 1/4 inch thick. Cut in fancy shapes. Dip tops in cinnamon and sugar mixture. Place on cookie sheet and bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes or until light brown.

SUGAR COOKIES

- By Johnnie Walters
- 1 cup shortening
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 3 eggs
 - 1-1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 3-1/2 cups sifted flour
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening and sugar well. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Gradually blend in flour, baking powder and salt which have been sifted together. Chill the dough at least 3 hours or overnight. Roll dough out on lightly floured board to 1/8-1/4 inch thickness. Cut in desired shapes. Sprinkle with sugar. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 375 degrees for 8-

10 minutes. Yields 6 dozen. This recipe may be put through the press but do not chill the dough.

ROCKY ROAD DELIGHTS

- 1-12 ounce package milk chocolate morsels
 - 1-14 ounce can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1-10 1/2 ounce package miniature marshmallows
- In top of double boiler, over boiling water, melt morsels with sweetened condensed milk and butter. Remove from heat. In large bowl, combine nuts and marshmallows. Fold in chocolate mixture. 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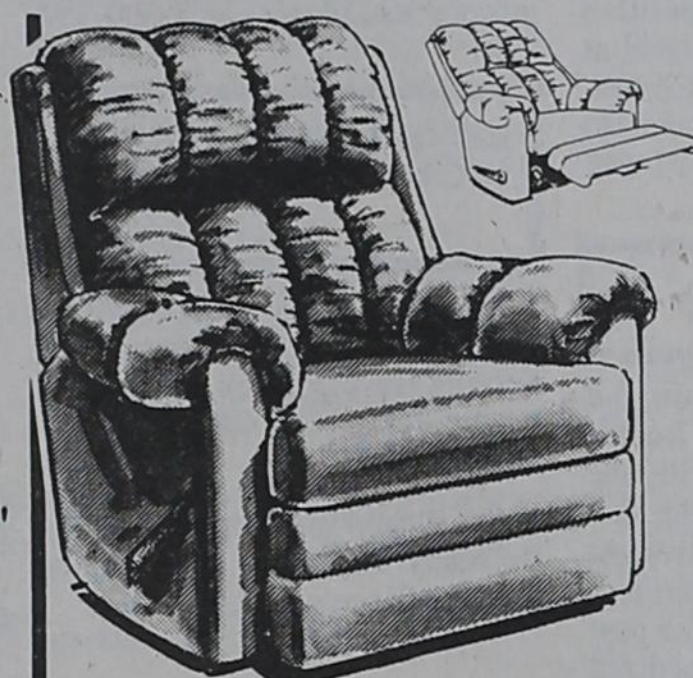

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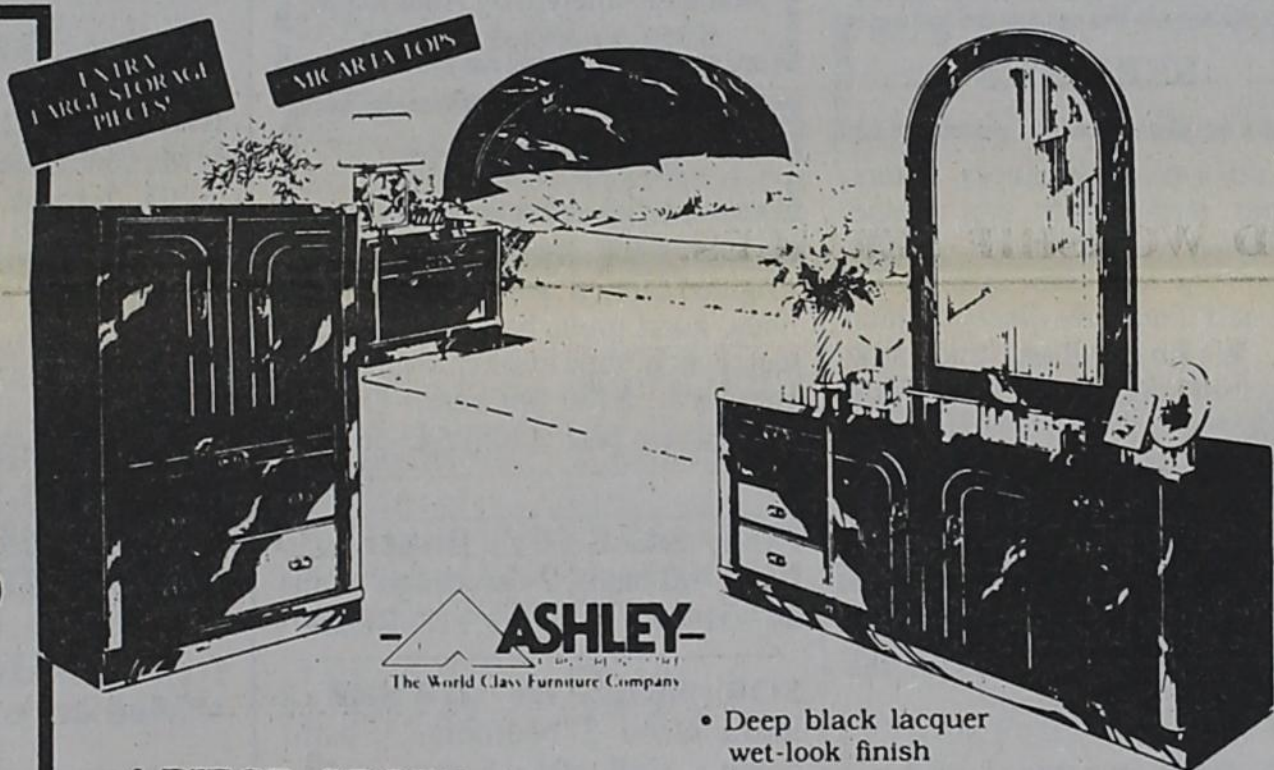



Signup Period Underway For Wheat, Feed Grain & Cotton

Signup for the 1994 Wheat, Feed Grain, and Cotton farm programs began March 1 and will end April 29, according to Curt Miller, county executive director of the ASCS.

Provisions of the 1994 farm program are as follows:

Wheat, 0% ACR, \$4/bu. target price, \$2.58/bu. loan rate, \$.85/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.425/bu. advance rate.

Oats, 0% ACR, \$1.45/bu. target price, \$.97/bu. loan rate, \$.0/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.0/bu. advance rate.

Barley, 0% ACR, \$2.36/bu. target price, \$1.54/bu. loan rate, \$.52/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.26/bu. advance rate.

Corn, 0% ACR, \$2.75/bu. target price, \$1.89/bu. loan rate, \$.40/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.20/bu. advance rate.

Grain Sorghum, 0% ACR, \$2.61/bu. target price, \$1.80/bu. loan rate, \$.46/bu. deficiency pay rate, and \$.0645/bu. advance rate.

Upland Cotton, 11% ACR, \$.729/lb. target price, \$.50/lb. loan rate, \$.129/lb. deficiency pay rate, and \$.0645/lb. advance rate.

County loan rates will be announced at a late date.

Normal Flex Acres (NFA) will again be 15% of the crop acre base, and Optional Flex Acres (OFA) will be 10% of the crop acreage

base again.

For wheat and feed grains, the 0/85 option will replace the 0/92 option if CU for payment is designated.

For cotton, the 50/85 option will replace the 50/92 option if CU for payment is designated. 50% of the cotton maximum payment acreage MUST be planted. NO WAIVER HAS BEEN GRANTED FOR 1994.

In 1994 producers will have the option of withdrawing from the farm program up to the final reporting date for the crop. For wheat and other small grains this date is May 16 and for corn, sorghum, and cotton the date will be July 15, 1994.

May 16, 1994 is the final date to certify small grains (wheat, rye, barley, oats, triticale), regardless of their use (harvest, ACR cover, CU cover, etc.). If you do not already have an appointment PLEASE call (481-3311) and make an appointment as soon as possible. This is also the final date to certify to zero planted acreage if the farm has a base for that commodity.

Producers are encouraged to sign up for measurement service which will be offered on small grains until May 16, 1994. Penalties for incorrect certifications can be very costly. These penalties can be avoided by letting ASCS

measure your acreage. Regardless of the use of the small grain, it is suggested that you take advantage of this low cost service if you are unsure of any acreage. Measuring service rates are \$20 per farm, plus .03 cents per acre for each acre over 25. If you haven't done so, PLEASE call and make an appointment. Remember, there is no tolerance on measurement service.

ACR and CU for PAY acres may be grazed and/or hayed until May 31, 1994. No haying or grazing will be permitted on these acres from June 1, 1994 through October 31, 1994.

The insurance closing date for corn, cotton, grain sorghum, hybrid sorghum seed, potatoes, soybeans, sugar beets, and sunflowers in Parmer County is April 15, 1994.

Deliberate burning of any annual crop residue, on a farm participating in ACP, is considered an unauthorized action unless waived by the County Committee.

The County Committee may, with the concurrence of the District Director, approve the burning of an annual crop residue under the following conditions: (1) Consideration should be given to the soil and water conservation benefits in all cases. (2) Approval should not be given on the same acreage in consecutive years. (3) To permit double cropping. (4) To control diseases, weeds, grasses, and/or insects. (5) To permit harvest of blown-down corn. (6) The waiver must be approved before the residue is burned.

This only applies to the year in which a cost share payment has been made under the Agriculture Conservation Program (pipeline assistance etc.).

The purpose of failed acreage credit is to provide planted acre credit for a crop that has failed due to a natural disaster or other condition beyond the producer's control. The producer is eligible to receive payment for the failed acres. If a crop fails due to a natural disaster, the producer must file an ASCS-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) within 15 days after the date the abnormal condition occurred or was obvious, and before physical evidence of the crop is destroyed. This office must inspect the failed crop prior to being destroyed.

If you farm under a joint venture (husband/wife or otherwise) you must carry the joint venture name on all your farming interest loan documents, settlement sheets,

weight tickets, crop insurance documents, and local bills-fuel, fertilizer, seed, etc. It is very important that these requirements be met.

Everyone is subject to a payment limitation spot check. End of Year Reviews are conducted by our State Office and it is very important that you conduct your farming operation as you have indicated on the payment limitation forms filed during signup. If you do have changes, the COC must have a timely, written notification of this change. For example a share change, ownership change, involvement in another farming interest, settling of an estate, forming a corporation, etc.

The five month national weighted average price for corn was \$2.47 per bu. (target price \$2.75) and for grain sorghum \$2.36 per bu. (target price \$2.61). The final deficiency payment rate for corn was \$.28 per bu. and for sorghum \$.25 per bu. The advance payments for corn were \$.36 per bu. and for grain sorghum \$.35 per bu. The result is an overpayment of \$.08 per bu. on corn and \$.10 per bu. on grain sorghum on acreages for harvest.

Participants in the 1993 corn and grain sorghum program who used the 0/92 provisions are guaranteed a minimum payment rate of 72 cents per bushel for corn and 70 cents per bushel for grain sorghum, which were the estimated final deficiency payment rates for these crops for 1993.

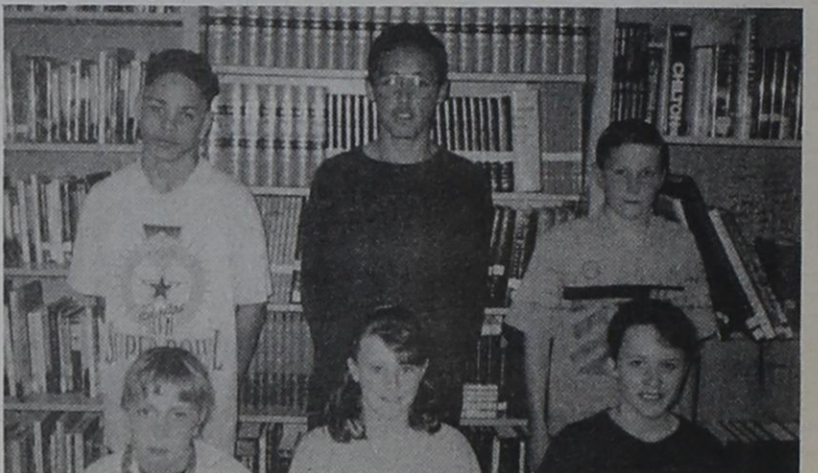
When the final deficiency rate is less than the advance, any repayment required is due at the end of the marketing year for the crop. Therefore, producers will not be requested to make the refund of the overpayment until October 1994.

The marketing year for program commodities will be for wheat, barley and oats, June 1-May 31; for upland cotton, August 1-July 31; for corn and grain sorghum, September 1-August 31.

The final planting dates for cotton will be May 31, for corn May 15, and for grain sorghum June 30.

Sen. Gramm Honored By Group

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has been awarded the Taxpayers' Friend Award by the 250,000 member National Taxpayers Union for his outstanding voting record on reducing federal spending and deficits during the 103rd session of Congress.

Gramm also qualified for a grade of "A" in the organization's 1993 Congressional Spending Study. The senator had one of the best scores in the U.S. Senate, reflecting his consistent vote to balance the federal budget and reduce tax burdens by limiting and reducing spending.

"Many members of Congress talk about balancing the budget and controlling spending. But Sen. Phil Gramm's outstanding score in our rating of Congress shows that he backed up those words with votes," said David Keating, NTU executive vice president. "If every member of Congress cast spending votes as carefully as he did, we would have a balanced budget, lower taxes and a healthier economy."

In the study, NTU analyzed every roll call vote taken during the first session of the 103rd Congress and selected all votes that could affect the amount of federal spending. A total of 271 House and 206 Senate votes were selected, including votes cast on appropriations bills, authorization bills, budget target resolutions, major tax bills, amendments and certain procedural votes.

Gramm has won the Taxpayers' Friend Award nine times.

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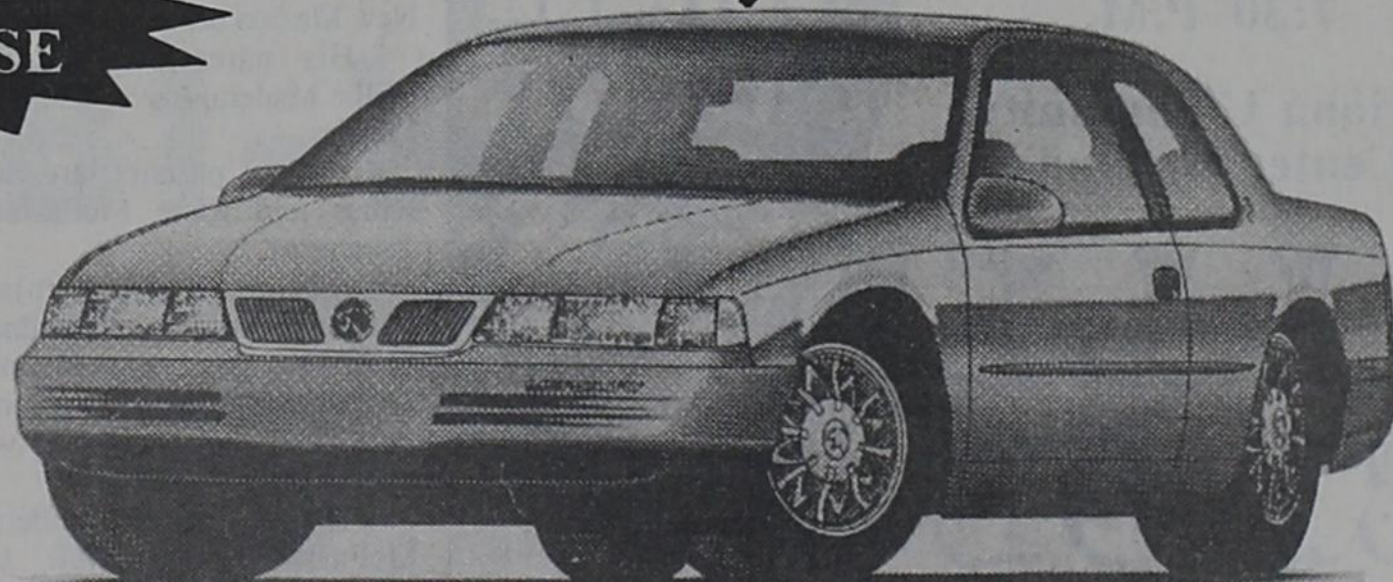
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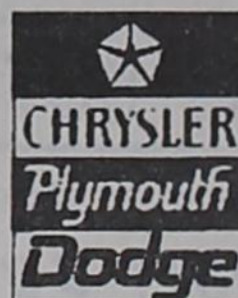
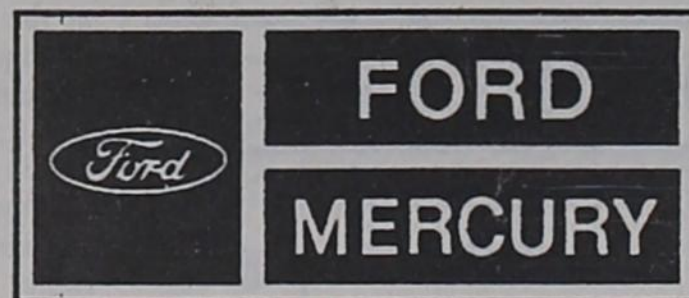

Often when Texas Panhandle residents are pointing out the peculiarities of local residents, the subject of waving comes up.

It has been my observation that the farther north one drives the fewer persons he meets who returns his wave.

The following paragraphs were borrowed from "Just Ramblin," a column which appears each week in the *Paducah Post*, a publication which has been serving Cottle and King counties for 84 years.

The column is written by Jimmie C. Taylor, publisher and editor.

JUST RAMBLIN
"Waving is an important part of country etiquette...so says Earlyne Jameson, who writes Whiteflat (and Flomot) news for our paper, the *Valley Tribune* and also for the *Matorador Tribune*. She won't mind if we use her wonderful column on "Country Greetings," and modify it some for our area.

"When a cloud of dust comes down a rural road in (Cottle or King) county, you wave. Waving is an important part of country etiquette. The farther you are from town, the more important the wave. However, waving styles vary with each individual.

"1. A person keeps both hands on the steering wheel and extends an index finger so that it's pointing at the driver of the oncoming car. If it is accompanied by a stern facial expression, you might believe it is the 'Uncle Sam Wants You' wave and you should report to the nearest recruiting station.

"2. The driver keeps both hands on steering wheel and raises the

index and middle fingers of the left hand. This appears to be a modified 'V' for a peace sign, or could be considered the 'Cub Scout' wave.

"3. In warm weather, a person may poke an arm out of his pickup window to wave. We wouldn't advise this in our winter weather, or you won't have enough fingers left to do the 'Uncle Sam'.

"There are days when driving over the rural roads to agricultural locations, the residents are thinking of all the farming and ranching work ahead of them. This is when they are inclined to nod their heads. The first is a single down/up nod. This is used when there is plenty of time to acknowledge an oncoming driver. When it's almost too late, there is a quick raising of the head, which you can make more effective by raising your eyebrows simultaneously.

"Most commuters prefer the 'Wiper' wave. It is achieved by moving your entire hand in a broad gesture reminiscent of the sweep of a windshield wiper. The 'Cheerleader' wave is used a lot by women drivers. This is a random and uninhibited fluttering of the entire hand.

"When driving on the highway or rural roads in this area, it is advisable that the thumb remains firmly on the wheel at all times. When meeting pickups with stock trailers, tractors with plows and every type of truck, anything less than a firm grip could send you toward an oncoming vehicle.

"If you see a car hurtle past without a wave, call the sheriff. Anyone in this area that won't wave is up to no good."

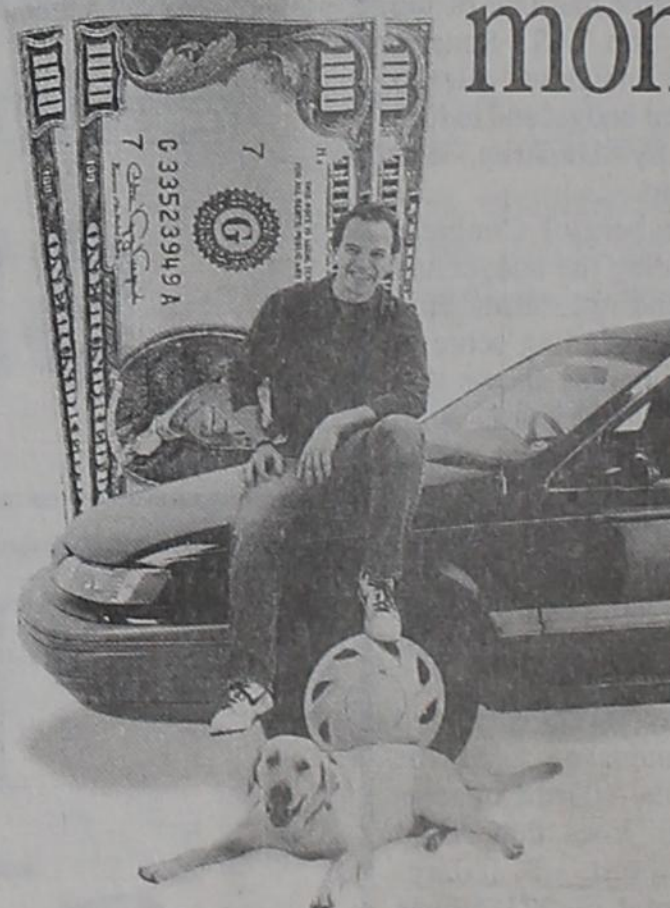

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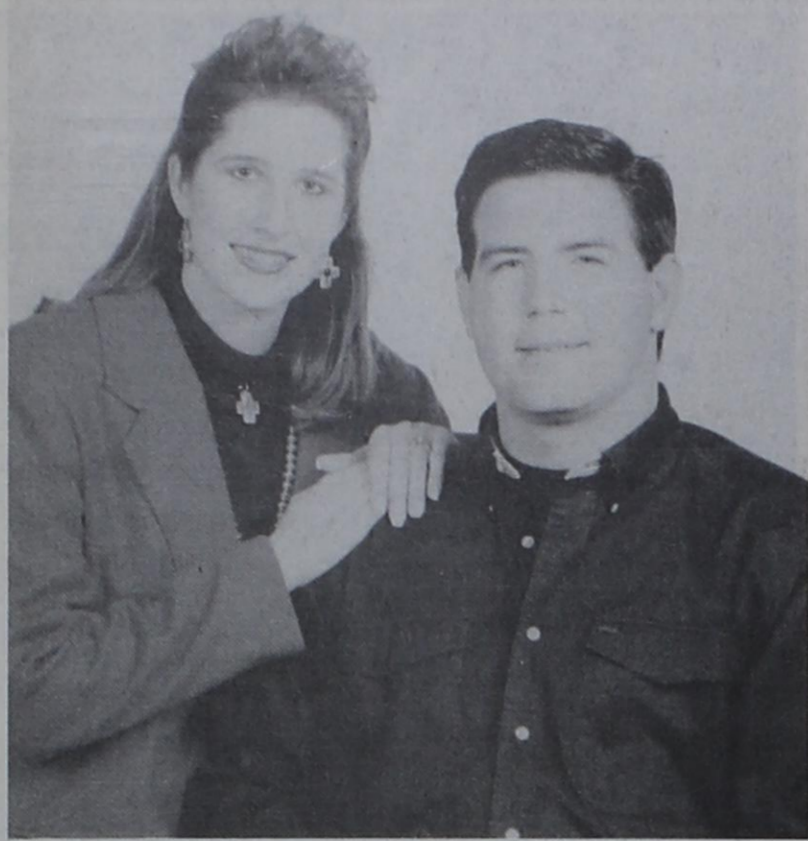

Evaluating International Bonds and Bond Funds

When interest rates began to decline in the United States, some investors looked to foreign bonds for higher income, and the strategy paid off—for a while.

In 1986, U.S. owners of foreign bonds realized a total return of more than 20 per cent from interest payments and price changes. The following year, that dropped to 13.79 per cent, and in 1988, total return declined to just 5 per cent. However, money managers continue to encourage diversification into overseas bonds, because it generally pays off over the long term.

The short-term volatility of foreign bonds can be attributed to currency risk. For example, during the first quarter of 1993, Japanese bonds rewarded U.S. investors with a 16.64 per cent total return, but Japanese investors received only 2.72 per cent.

This happened because, during that period, the Japanese yen jumped 12 per cent in relation to the value of the dollar. Had the dollar's value risen instead during that time, U.S. investors would have suffered. Currency exchange is unpredictable in the short term. However, analysts agree that diversifying into overseas bonds generally pays off in the long term.

There are two ways to invest in overseas bonds: purchase them directly through a U.S. broker, or

invest through mutual funds.

Investors who purchase bonds directly seldom realize any price change until the bonds are sold or mature. If the interest remains stable, price fluctuation may never be a problem. However, if the country's economic conditions radically change, the bonds could become illiquid.

Purchasing mutual funds that invest in foreign bonds generally offers less risk and better diversification than buying individual bonds. However, such mutual funds are not without disadvantages.

In 1990, world bond funds outperformed all other bond funds, with an average return of 11.64 per cent. Two years later, these same funds were the worst performers, with total return of 2.21 per cent. The European currency risk was directly responsible for the erratic swing.

The best opportunities for potential profits in foreign bonds exist in countries anticipating low inflation and low or negative economic growth. Although low inflation may not always be easy to predict, it avoids the volatility of currency swings.

Foreign corporate and government bonds can be a good way to diversify your portfolio. However, they can be affected by foreign economic conditions and the value of the dollar. Understand the mechanics and risk before you invest in foreign bonds or a world bond fund.

Safer Swimming

The chlorine in swimming pools protects against bacteria—but it's mighty uncomfortable for the eyes. That's why so many swimmers opt for the protection of goggles. And if you wear contact lenses while swimming, the investment may save your lenses as well as your eyes.

Be sure to try on the goggles before you buy. Look for a tight seal and a comfortable fit. Some models fit around the outside of the eye socket and others within it; it's vital to discover which is better for you. If you choose a model with a nose piece, be sure it doesn't pinch. Polyvinyl gaskets offer the tightest seal; double straps are usually more comfortable than single ones. Prices range from \$5 to about \$100 (for the best prescription-lens goggles). The goggles last a long time, though, so it pays to buy good ones.




Once you become accustomed to swimming with goggles, you may choose to wear them for swimming in lakes and ocean water, which also contain eye irritants. Choose clear lenses for pools, tinted for outdoors.
