Local TAAS Results Are Released

The 1993-94 TAAS results for Friona ISD have been released by the Texas Education Agency. All students in grades 3-8 and tenth grade take the exams each spring.

Sixty-eight per cent of all Friona ISD students passed all three parts of the test. This was the highest score of all schools in District 2-AAA.

Friona also had the highest per cent of students pass the reading portion of the test. Seventy-eight per cent of all Friona students passed the reading portion of the test.

On the math portion of the tests, only Tulia ISD had a higher per cent of students passing the test. In Friona, 61.2 per cent passed the test compared to 64.8 per cent in Tulia.

On the writing portion, 78 per cent of all students passed the test compared to 88.3 per cent of students from Tulia.

County Included In Farm Tours

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and County Agriculture Committees will be sponsoring the Llano Estacado Farm Tour on Friday, July 29. This year's tour will involve four area counties: Parmer, Bailey, Castro and Lamb.

Registration will get underway at 8:30 a.m. at the Lazbuddie School Cafeteria in Lazbuddie. Coffee and doughnuts will be provided during registration. Program topics and presentations will feature: "Corn Disease Management" by Dr. Cloyce Coffman, Extension agronomist, College Station; "Chemigation Safety" by Dr. Rose Mary Seymour, Extension agriculture engineer, Lubbock; and James Esty, Texas Department of Agriculture from Littlefield, will discuss "Worker Protection Standards."

Lunch and an Agriculture Awards Program will follow the morning sessions. The catered meal will be sponsored by the Texas Corn Producers Board. County producers will be recognized for their interest and participation in result demonstration work.

Four stops to view ongoing field demonstrations will begin at 1 p.m. Four stops have been scheduled. Buses will be available to provide transportation between stops.

Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

65 Yrs. Ago--July 5, 1929

Building operations on the Turner theatre building and on the Maurer store building which has been at a standstill for several days were renewed the latter part of last week. The cessation in the work was occasioned by a lack of materials which have been ordered but failed to arrive on time to keep the work going.

Reports revealed from different parts of the Friona territory indicated that the average yield for this year's wheat crop is twenty bushels per acre. On Wednesday, the price locally was 92 cents.

60 Yrs. Ago--July 6, 1934

On Monday morning of this week, the two Star routes leading from Friona to Lazbuddie and Brown's Corner, respectively, changed hands. Everett Harry and J. A. Mincher, the former carriers, released their jobs to Clarence and Lewis Baxter, the two low bidders in the bidding contest held last spring.

Friona High School will add a vocational agriculture class to its course of study for the coming term. A special instructor was named for the branch.

55 Yrs. Ago--July 7, 1939

Twenty-one cases have been listed on the docket of the Parmer County district court, which will open its first session in the local court house on Monday morning, July 10, at nine o'clock, it was learned this week from County Clerk E. V. Rushing.

50 Yrs. Ago--July 7, 1944

Mrs. Ocoee Warden, elementary supervisor of the Friona Schools, has been selected as president of the Graduate Club of the West Texas State College.

40 Yrs. Ago--July 2, 1954

Tragedy struck swiftly and surely on Highway 60 in Parmer County yesterday to snuff out the lives of three members of the best known families in the county. Dead from a car-truck collision halfway between Bovina and Farwell were Mrs. G. D. Anderson, Jr., 32; a little son, John Hillard, age four; and Mrs. A. G. White, 54, all of Bovina.

35 Yrs. Ago--July 2, 1959

A wheat fire at 12:15 p.m. Sunday on the Dalton Caffey farm four miles west and three miles south of Friona destroyed approximately five acres of wheat and a 1958 International 1 1/2 ton truck. Friona's Volunteer Fire Department answered the call and damage was estimated to both wheat and truck in the amount

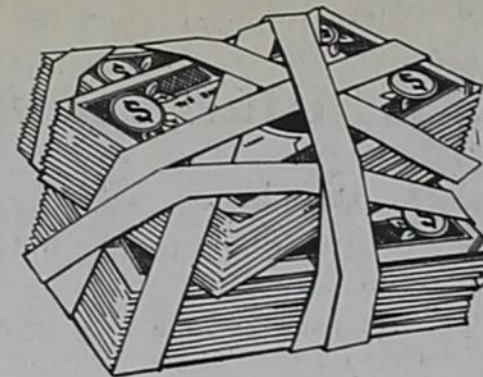

Happy Homemaker

Fresh, canned, frozen and pickled vegetables have long been important items in the diets of all members of Roy and Eva Miller's family.

Since Roy's retirement from farming, he has grown gardens of gigantic proportion and during the producing season the couple's children and grandchildren have spent a lot of happy hours together eating and storing food for later use.

This week we're borrowing vegetable recipes from the Miller-Roysden Cookbook-Generology.

How about pickles for a starter?

DILL PICKLES-DELICIOUS

Eva G. Roysden
Donna Miller Mears

Pickling cucumbers
3-4 garlic buds
Slices of bell pepper
2-3 small hot peppers
Fresh dill
3-4 small onions
Grape leaves

5 cups water
3/4 cup rock salt or pickling salt
1 cup cider vinegar

Pack fresh select cucumbers in sterile jars each with garlic, peppers, dill, onions and grape leaves. Pour boiling liquid over cucumbers and seal. Let set in dark storage place 2 months.

ICICLE PICKLES

Eva G. Roysden Miller
Select large choice yellow cucumbers. Peel and remove seeds. Cut into finger length sticks. For seven pounds of sticks, use:
2 tablespoons whole mustard seed
8 cups white vinegar (4-6% acidity)
1 tablespoon celery seed
1 cup sugar

Soak cucumbers in 2 gallons of water and 2 cups slaked lime in enamel pan or crockery jar for 12 hours or overnight.

Wash 3 times in clear water and soak in ice water for 3 hours.

Combine rest of ingredients and bring to a slow boil until sugar is dissolved. Add cucumbers and soak overnight. Use a large pan and cook covered for 35 minutes. Fill sterilized jars and pour syrup over pickles leaving 1/2 inch head space. (Pickles can be colored red or green if desired.)

Cap jars. Process five minutes in boiling water (covered). Store in dark place.

(Hint: I've substituted yellow squash for mature cucumbers in a recipe I have for Red Cinnamon Pickles and no one who ever tasted them could tell the difference.)

CRISP BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

Mary Lou Glass
4 quarts thinly sliced cucumbers
4 large onions, thinly sliced
1/2 cup salt
2 quarts cracked ice
5 cups sugar
5 cups cider vinegar
1 teaspoon turmeric

1 scant tablespoon celery seed
2 tablespoons mustard seed
1 scant tablespoon ginger

Combine cucumbers and onions: sprinkle with salt and cracked ice. Cover with weighted lid and let stand for three hours. Drain thoroughly. Rinse well with cold water. Place in large kettle. Add remaining ingredients. Bring almost to a boil, stirring frequently. Do not boil. Pack in hot sterilized jars and seal with hot lids. Yields 8 points. Water bath for fifteen minutes.

OKRA PICKLES

Eva G. Roysden Miller
6 cups cider vinegar
2 cups water
1 cup salt
1 or 2 garlic buds

Pack okra in sterile jars and cover with hot liquid and seal. Let stand about 2 months before opening.

Question: Does anyone happen to know why recipes sometimes read "let set" and other times we read "let stand"? If you happen to know the answer, please clue me in.

SWEET PICKLES

Amanda Mason Miller
2 cups lime
7 pounds cucumbers-sliced crosswise

Mix two cups of lime and two gallons of water. Soak cucumbers for 24 hours, stirring occasionally. Soak in crockery or enamel ware. Remove from lime water and rinse three times in cool water. Soak 3 additional hours in ice water. Remove carefully to drain. Make syrup:

2 quarts vinegar
1 tablespoon salt
8 cups sugar
Green coloring

Stir until salt and sugar are dissolved. Pour over cucumbers. Let set 5-6 hours or overnight. Add pickling spices to taste. Boil mixture for 35 minutes. Fill sterilized jars with slices and pour syrup over cucumbers, leaving 1/8 inch head space. Seal jars.

Sorry folks! Seems that I've used up all the space allotted to us this week. Maybe next week we will feature other vegetables.

Immunization Clinics Set

The monthly immunization clinics, sponsored by the Texas Department of Health, are scheduled for July. These clinics offer vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The TDH charges a fee to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged is based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

A clinic has been set at the Texas Department of Human Services Office, 114 West Seventh Street, Friona, Wednesday, July 20, from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3 p.m.

A clinic will be held at the Bovina Medical Clinic, 509 Avenue I on Monday, July 11 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.; and in Hereford at the Texas Department of Health, 205 West Fourth Street, on Thursday, July 14, Thursday, July 21 and Thursday, July 28 from 7-11:30 a.m. and 1-5:45 p.m.



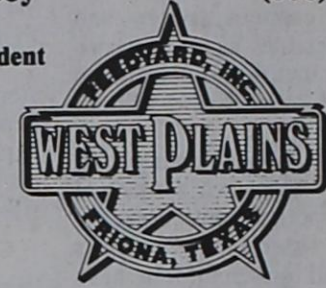

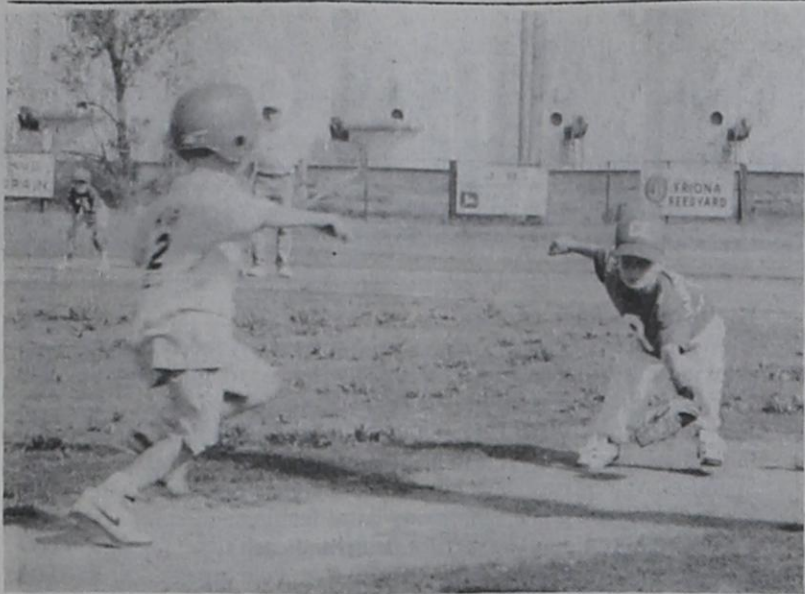

Vivian will be remembered as operator of Bi-Wize Drug's cafe/snack bar for Ralph Roden.

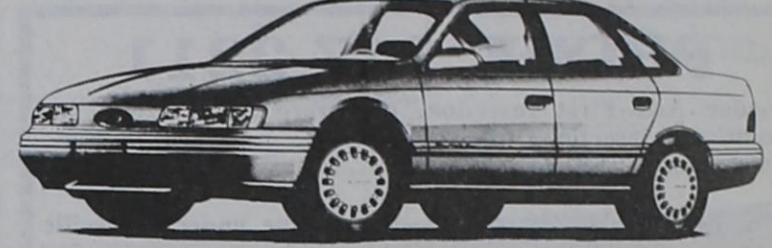
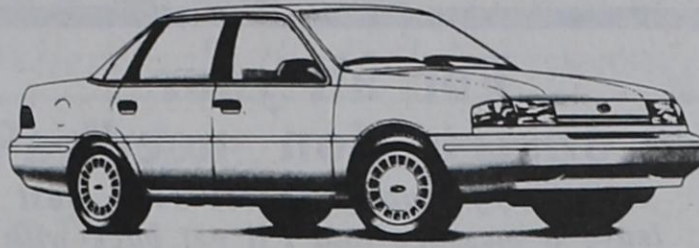

Load Funds Can Be A Bargain

When it comes to investing in mutual funds, one of the choices investors must make is whether to select a "load fund" or a "no-load fund." To make the right decision, it's important to understand the differences between the two types of funds.

A load mutual fund charges an up-front sales fee, or load, when you buy it. A portion of the sales charge goes to the broker/dealer who represents the fund. For that fee, the broker/dealer explains the fund and is obligated to see that it meets your objectives. The load further obligates the broker/dealer to continue servicing your account for as long as you own the fund.

No-load funds, on the other hand, charge no up-front sales fee. This can be an enticing feature for many investors. When comparing mutual fund costs, however, it is not only important to consider the up-front costs of buying the fund, but also to understand the fund's ongoing annual expenses.

For example, rather than paying registered investment representatives to offer their shares and service your account, no-load funds offer their shares through ongoing advertising. One example of this was the 1993 *Forbes* Mutual Fund edition, in which about 83 per cent of the mutual fund advertisements were bought by no-load funds. The cost of all that advertising is paid by the no-load fund before any of the earnings get to you.

To illustrate this, let's look at a \$100,000 investment in two hypothetical funds, each compounding at the same 12 per cent gross annual return (Table 1). Fund A is a load fund with a 3.5 per cent up-front charge and annual expenses of 0.6 per cent. Fund B is a no-load fund with no up-front charge and annual expenses of 1.8 per cent.

The load fund charges \$3,500 up front. However, because of lower ongoing expenses, the value of the load fund surpasses that of the no-load fund in four short years. After 20 years, Fund A is \$138,407 ahead of Fund B. *Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine* summed up this example in an article that stated, "Front end loads are a pittance when spread over many years."

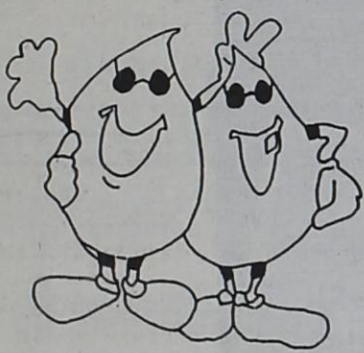
The debate over load and no-load funds will undoubtedly continue with valid arguments on both sides. As with any investment, however, it's up to you to make an informed decision before you write you check.

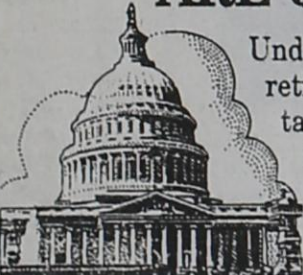

YOUR EYES

Throwaway Lenses



Just a few years ago, the very idea of lenses that you'd wear once and throw away seemed positively far-fetched. How has the reality caught up with the fantasy?

Quite well. The basic advantage of the throwaway lenses is that each pair is fresh and sterile when you insert it in your eyes. There is no need for cleaning and disinfecting the lenses and, very important, long-term bacteriological deposits never get a chance to build up on the lenses, thus reducing the chance of infection. The new lenses fit well, and the prescription is easily duplicated with each new pack.

The disposable contact lenses can usually be worn continually for a week before they are thrown away. Where wearers had trouble with the new lenses at first, it usually happened because they tried to stretch the wearing period to two or three weeks.

Important: disposable contact lenses must be professionally prescribed and fitted, and regular re-examinations are recommended.
