


After Berra's wife told him she had taken their son to see Dr. Zhivago: "What the hell is wrong with him now?"

came to .57 inch, for a total of 2.19 for the week's period.

The rain has been fairly general for a change, covering most of the county's dryland or weak-water area.

No hail damage was reported in the immediate Friona area, although during the first rain of the current spell an area near Rhea and north of Pleasant Hill experienced some damaging hail. The hail cloud seemed to start north of Pleasant Hill and ended up in Clovis, N.M.

Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers said that farmers apparently received from two to three inches of rain through Wednesday evening. "We've had some good rains, and they should help the crop yields considerably. The rains of this week will "make" some of the crops, and it will go a long way toward finishing the irrigated crops (need for moisture)."

Smiley said the recent rains should pretty well "lay by" the area's corn crop, adding to its yield, and should also greatly benefit the milo, sugar beets and cotton.

"All of the rain around Friona has been real good, but there was an area in the Rhea community where they got a strip of bad hail. Floyd Schueler had a circle of corn that was battered pretty hard, and Gene Schueler had a field that was battered," Smiley said.

Don Huckabee of West Friona

Allen said the hail affected about a two-mile streak, and the damage

could be 50 per cent where it hailed. "The rain was really needed, and has been well-spaced. Up north and northwest of us they didn't get quite as much, but in all other directions, the rains were beneficial," Allen added.

The Hub area received somewhat less rain than the rest of the area. O.L. (Mac) McMurtrey at Hub Grain said that he had measured 1.25 inches during the past week, and that the rain was "pretty spotted" in the Hub area. "Oh, there were farmers who have reported up to two inches, but others got a lot less," McMurtrey said.

"It is sure helping, especially on the irrigated crops. Many of the irrigation wells are still running, but this (the rain) has helped the farmers catch up.

McMurtrey indicated that the crops in the Hub area were looking good. Some of the crops are late, due to being re-planted, but they are coming along real well.






