Week Of Rain Boosts Farmers

Farmers across the area have received a big boost from a week of rains in the area, to the extent that many have been able to turn off their irrigation engines, which had been running non-stop in some cases.

The current rainy spell started last Friday, when .51 inch was recorded in the official Friona gauge. Another .04 inch was added on Saturday night, then a whopping .92 inch of rain on Monday evening, when it rained throughout the night.

Tuesday night's shower added .15 inch to the total, and Wednesday's came to .57 inch, for a total of 2.19 for the week's period.

The rain has been fairly general for a change, covering most of the county's dryland or weak-water area.

No hail damage was reported in the immediate Friona area, although during the first rain of the current spell an area near Rhea and north of Pleasant Hill experienced some damaging hail. The hail cloud seemed to start north of Pleasant Hill and ended up in Clovis, N.M.

Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers said that farmers apparently received from two to three inches of rain through Wednesday evening. "We've had some good rains, and they should help the crop yields considerably. The rains of this week will 'make' some of the crops, and it will go a long way toward finishing the irrigated crops (need for moisture)."

Smiley said the recent rains should pretty well "lay by" the area's corn crop, adding to its yield, and should also greatly benefit the milo, sugar beets and cotton.

"All of the rain around Friona has been real good, but there was an area in the Rhea community where they got a strip of bad hail. Floyd Schueller had a circle of corn that was battered pretty hard, and Gene Schueller had a field that was battered," Smiley said.

Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 2, 1929

The largest wheat harvest the Friona country has ever experienced is now practically over with the exception of perhaps a few scattered fields. An inquiry revealed that 470 cars of wheat had been shipped from Friona on Tuesday, with an average load of 1550 bushels.

Within the next few weeks, Friona can boast of one of the largest and most up-to-date picture show houses in this part of the state and our local produce merchant, H. P. Eberling, will have sole control of the business.

60 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 10, 1934

It appears that no one knows for a certainty whether or not Federal Highway 60, which is also State Highway 33, will be hard surfaced across Parmer County or even any part of, and should this be definitely known, no one knows when it will be done. One of the hopeful facts is that the portion of State No. 7 that crosses Bailey County is receiving considerable attention and state Highway Engineer Guy R. Johnston of Lubbock, has written to Mayor Reeve, sending him a copy of a resolution and asking that it be adopted by the city and incorporated in its records.

55 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 11, 1939

On Thursday night of last week as Miss Rachel Terry, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Rosa Terry, and her brother, John, were enroute

to visit friends in East Texas, they met with a serious mishap on the highway between Paducah and Childress. A careless driver ran into her car and it turned over, landing in the bar pit at the side of the highway. None of the passengers were seriously injured, but the mother received a few cuts and bruises about her face.

50 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 4, 1944

Citizens of the Lakeview School District, southeast of town, have made consolidation with the Friona Independent School District, and a petition has been filed calling for an election in both districts to establish the fact as to whether or not the consolidation may be made.

New restrictions on farm building, announced this week, reflected the continued seriousness of the lumber supply situation and promised considerable tightening of building regulations for farmers. The County AAA Committee must act on all applications for farm building materials and certificates approved by the committee can then be submitted to dealers.

40 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 5, 1954

Superintendent Dalton Caffey announced this week that the Friona schools will re-open September 1, which leaves less than four weeks for vacation time.

The Friona School building under construction is considerably ahead of schedule, according to Dalton Caffey, superintendent. The contract was originally let for 180 days completion period, but if no material or labor shortages occur, it should be completed in 150-160 days. Brick-laying will be finished sometime next week.

10 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 12, 1984

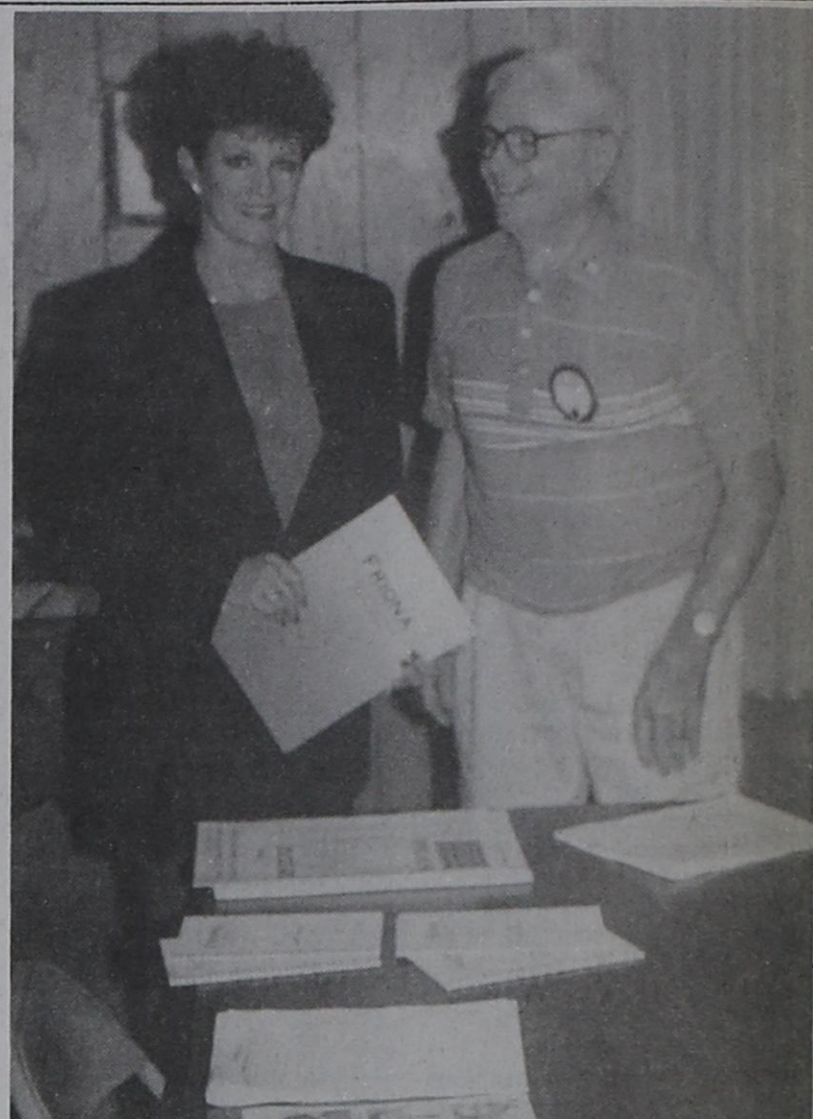

Ex-Resident's Services Held In Oklahoma

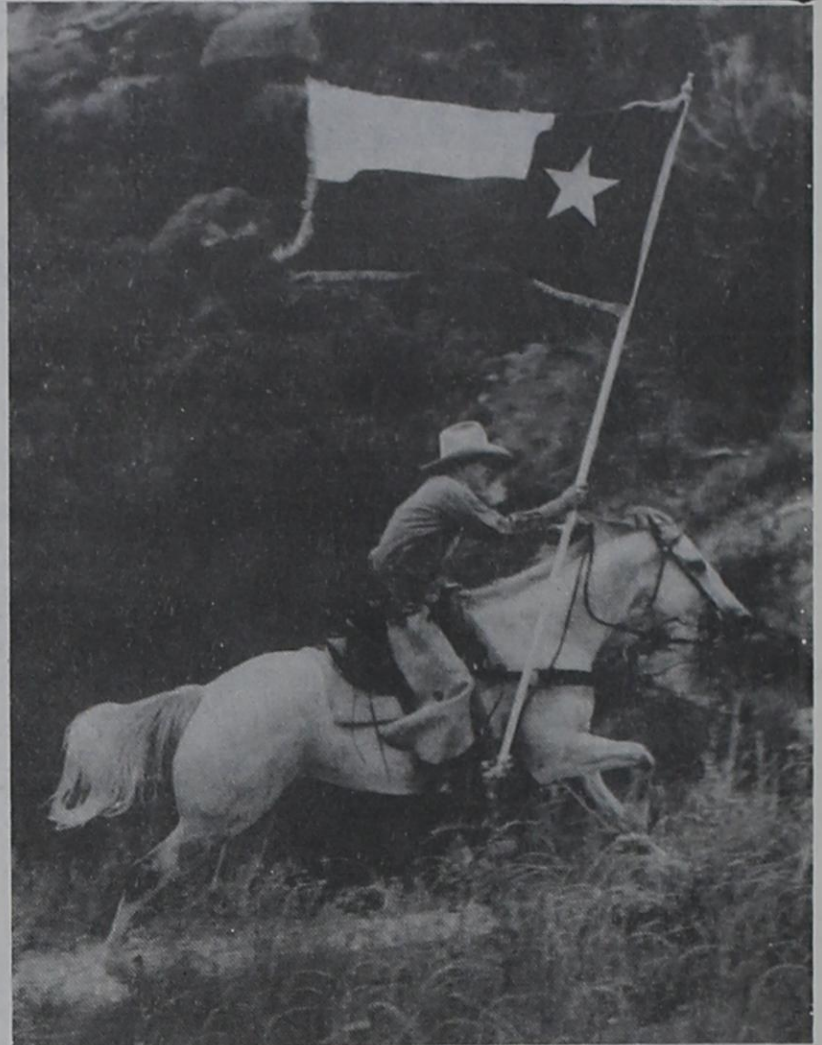
C. R. Brandon, 73, of Kingston, Oklahoma died Monday, August 1, 11:45 p.m. at Kingston, Oklahoma.

The recent reunion of the descendants of the late Charles and Amelia Metz Schlenker, pioneer residents of the Rhea Community who moved to Parmer County from Iowa in 1906, which was held at the Union Congregational Church in Friona recently attracted 115 members of the family and twenty-one friends.

States represented were Utah, South Carolina, Iowa, California, Pennsylvania, New Mexico, Arkansas, Arizona and Texas.

Of the four surviving children, three of them currently live in Parmer County. Florence Dorsey lives in Friona. Louisa Wilson lives on a farm about seven miles west of town. Helen Potts lives in the Rhea Community and J. R. (Chick) Schlenker lives in Portales, New Mexico.

Festivities began with a covered dish supper at the church Tuesday, July 12 and continued through Friday, July 15.

The final event on the agenda was an auction, which was conducted by Larry Potts, son of Cordie and Helen Potts and a grandson of the Charles Schlenkers. Various items were sold to the highest bidder.

Had there been a conventional sale bill, it would have listed the following items: large assortment of hand made items including sock monkeys, crocheted lap robes, tee-shirts from everywhere, including one with the autograph of Garth Brooks.

Also wild rice and maple syrup from Minnesota, wreaths, paintings, knitted mufflers, crocheted dolls, crocheted rugs, vases and pots that were turned on a potter's wheel and many other odds and ends. (Think the farm sale bill would have listed this last category as: "large group of miscellaneous items - too numerous to mention.")

One highlight of the auction was a group of watercolors painted by Amelia Schlenker Rankin of Claremont, California which depicted memories of her growing up years in Parmer County and her family, the Floyd Schlenkers, with a story written about each painting.

Another item which always creates a lot of interest is fudge - chocolate and peanut butter - made by Tom Hartwell of Dalhart. This year's offering amounted to twenty-four pounds.

Tom grew up in the Bovina area and is the son of the late Mabelle Schlenker Hartwell.

Other activities which brought young and old in touch with one another included eating three meals a day together; (The meals were catered by Pete's, a well known barbecue place in Albuquerque); a swimming party, dunking board, movies, volleyball games, and a bulletin board with bits of family history and current news.

Of special interest to the younger member of the family was a dinosaur trampoline room.

Following the business meeting Kendall Schlenker of Albuquerque presided over an informal visitation period, which included tributes to members of the family who have died since the 1992 reunion. They were Ralph Wilson and Mabelle Hartwell, both of Friona and

Charles Willard Schlenker, who lived in California.

Since the family's arrival in the Rhea Community, five generations of Schlenkers have attended school in Friona. At the present time seven members are still attending. They are Abbey and Joni Johnson, Blaire and Hayes Jones, Ryan and Ty Potts and Jennifer Kendrick.

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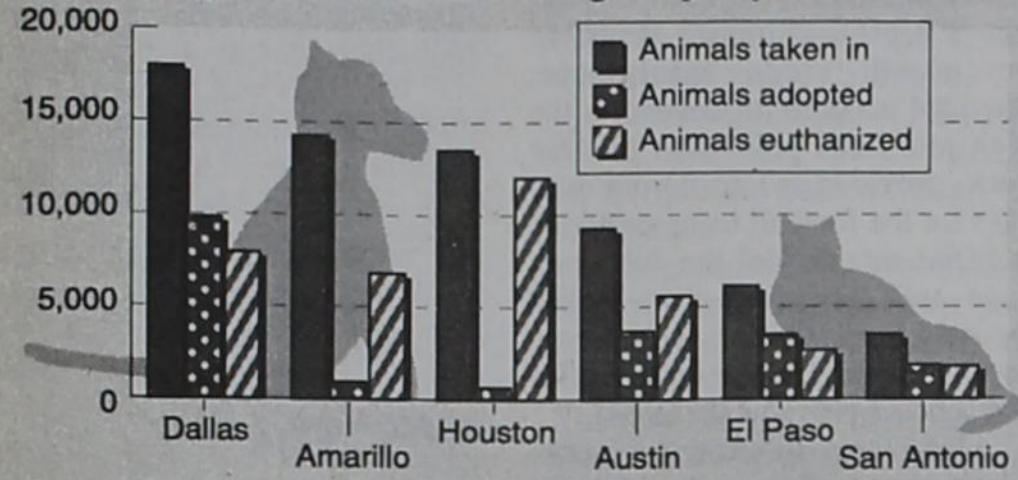

Happy Homemaker

Our first recipe this week, "Golden Potato Soup," was submitted for the Schlenker Family Favorite Recipes by Connie Schlenker Johnson, daughter of Carl and Velma Schueler Schlenker and a teacher in the local school system.

She and her husband, Joe Bob Johnson, and daughters, Mendy, Abby and Joni, live on a farm northeast of town. Connie's maternal grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schueler, were pioneer residents of the Rhea community.

GOLDEN POTATO SOUP

- 5 cups chopped potatoes
- 1 cup carrot slices
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- 4 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese, cubed

Combine first six ingredients. Cover and simmer until mushy. Remove from heat and mash. Add milk until you get desired consistency.

Put flour and a little milk in a shaker and shake until well blended. Add to soup mixture. Cook on medium heat until thickened watching carefully. Add Velveeta and stir until it is melted.

DUNE BURGERS

Spread two slices bread with salad dressing. Place sliced tomatoes on one slice bread and sprinkle lightly with instant onions.

Place one layer of bologna between 2 layers of American cheese. Top with second slice of bread. Butter on outside and grill on both sides in fry pan until lightly brown and cheese melts.

SWISS TUNA GRILL

- Nan Burns
- 1-6 1/2 or 7 ounce can tuna, drained
- 1/2 cup shredded process Swiss cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- Dash of pepper

Combine ingredients and make into 8 rye bread sandwiches. Spread butter on outsides and grill approximately 3 minutes per side or until mixture is heated.

BEA'S HOT MUSTARD SAUCE

- Bula Schlenker Hopkins
- Mix and refrigerate overnight four ounces Coleman's mustard and 1 cup cider vinegar.
- Mix in double boiler: 2 beaten eggs and 1 cup sugar.
- Add mustard mixture and cook over hot water until slightly thick, stirring or beating frequently.

STUFFED MUSHROOM APPETIZERS

- Patsy Schlenker Neely
- 12 large mushrooms
- 1/2 cup stuffing (recipe below)
- 1/4 lb. sweet Italian sausage
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh parsley
- 2 tablespoons bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons butter

- Remove mushroom stems, but save.
- Recipe for stuffing: Chop mushroom stems finely. Put in skillet with 1 tablespoon butter and 1 tablespoon oil. Add juice of 1/2 lemon, salt and pepper. Cook until moisture has evaporated, stirring constantly.
- When stuffing has cooled, add sausage and parsley and mix well. Stuff mushroom caps. Mix crumbs

and cheese. Sprinkle over mushrooms. Dot each with butter. Put on greased dish and bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes.

FRUIT KABOB

- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 egg yolks stiffly beaten
- 1/3 cup water

Mix above ingredients and boil 1 minute. Remove from stove and add 3 tablespoons pineapple juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 1/8 teaspoon salt.

Spear pineapple, bananas, apples, oranges, grapes and strawberries cut in bite size pieces. Use above sauce for dip.

BACON PINWHEELS

- Jan Welch Bogard
- 1 can crescent rolls
- Sliced bacon

Separate and roll dough into squares and roll flat. Place strips of bacon on dough lengthwise, side by side. Roll up tightly—jelly roll fashion. Chill several hours or overnight.

Slice thin and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes.

Good for snacks or breakfast. After baking, pinwheels may be frozen for later use.

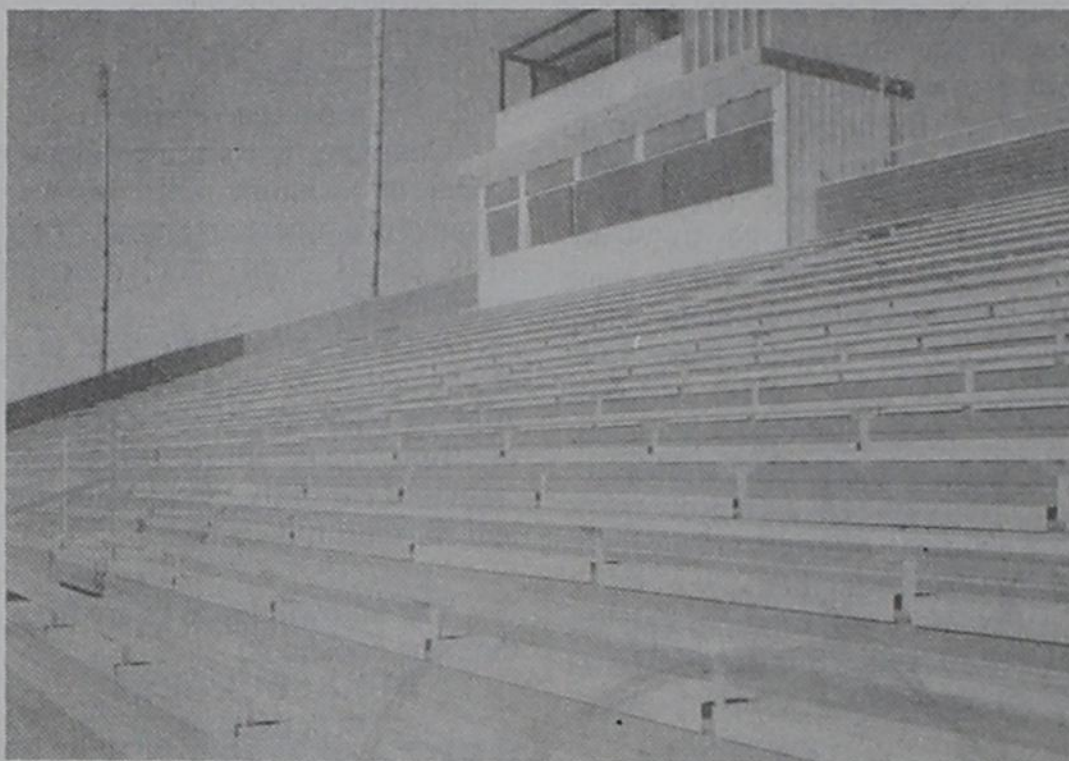

What "Legally Blind" Means

A person doesn't have to be totally blind to be considered "legally blind." The designation indicates severely limited vision that cannot be corrected better than 20/200.

Certification as legally blind entitles the individual to state and/or federal assistance for vision services that make the most of the remaining ability to see. Unfortunately, some people with restricted vision have difficulty accepting the designation and so miss out on valuable treatment and benefits.

There's a lot of help available: hand-held magnifiers and prisms plus telescopic lenses or microscopic segments for regular lenses. These aids improve visual acuity so that many legally blind people can read and take care of themselves.

The optometrist is an eye professional who can certify the condition, prescribe and provide the needed low-vision aids and also provide support to help the patient adjust.
