Barrows will begin showing at 11 a.m. with Jerry McLemore in charge of judging all entries.

Steer judging will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday morning with Ken Cook again serving as judge for both steers and heifers.

Showmanship winners will be selected from each division: lambs, barrows and beef with junior and senior showmen competing against their own age groups.

The premium auction sale will be held Saturday afternoon beginning at 5 p.m. This will be the first time the auction has been held on Saturday.

## Businesses Protest 'Anti-Truck' Actions

About 50 people attended the regular meeting of the Friona City Council on Monday evening, January 9.

Main item of discussion was brought about by business owners and truckers who felt they were being discriminated against, or harassed, by the city's truck parking rules.

Carl McInroe, owner/operator of Headquarters Restaurant on West Highway 60, was the main business spokesman.

The city had installed a fence on the west side of McInroe's property, which prohibited trucks from pulling over the curb on Austin street, while entering or leaving the restaurant's parking lot.

McInroe pointed out how dependent his business was on truck traffic, and how much revenue is pumped into the city's businesses by truckers.

"There was one trucker in particular who told me recently that he spent \$192 recently in roughly two and one-half days in Friona. This included two nights in a

motel, several meals, and fuel purchased from Kendrick Oil. He offered to get his receipts if we needed them. This is just one instance of the business done by truckers and truck drivers," McInroe said.

After considerable discussion of McInroe's problem, and questions by the members of the City Council, the group agreed to remove the fence adjoining McInroe's property, and to allow him to remove a 40-foot section of curb to help the trucks get in and out of the parking lot.

On Tuesday morning, city workmen took up the fence in question.

"I was very pleased with the way I was received. We tried to present our position without getting into a shouting match, and the council was very accommodating. One of them called me the next day and apologized for the inconvenience," McInroe said on Thursday.

Other spokesmen and business representatives on Monday spoke to what they considered "harrasment" to truckers by City Patrolmen in ticketing truckers who stop to patronize businesses along Highway 60.

It is illegal to park along the highway, as well as to pull off on one of the residential streets, and this poses a problem to such stores as Allsup's, and the various other business places along the highway.

\*The Board conducted the annual review of the Superintendent's contract. Superintendent Hal Ratcliff received a contract extension which will run through the 1997-98 school year.

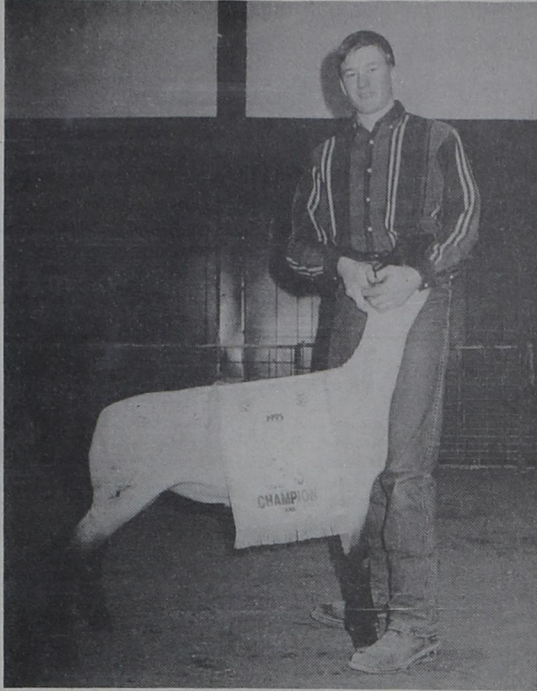
\*Superintendent reports showed enrollment at 1249 on December 21, 1994 and ADA for the third six weeks was 1173.91.

## SPS Files Notice Of Intent For Borger Cogeneration Facility

Southwestern Public Service Company today announced plans for a new cogeneration facility that will allow area electric customers to continue to receive low-cost, reliable electricity.

SPS has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas a Notice of Intent to build a new cogeneration in Borger, Texas. The plant would be built adjacent to the Phillips Petroleum Company complex in Borger.

The natural-gas-fueled facility will produce 200 megawatts of electricity and up to 970,000 pounds of steam per hour. Cogeneration facilities, by definition, produce both electricity and steam, which are used for different purposes in this case, the electricity would be used by SPS in its electrical grid, while the steam and some of the electricity would be used by Phillips in its plant processes throughout the complex. The cogeneration facility would be owned and operated by SPS.

Assuming all regulatory

approvals are secured, SPS could begin construction in early 1997, with commercial operation commencing in mid-1998. The plant is estimated to cost \$121 million. SPS subsidiary Utility Engineering Corporation will provide engineering and construction management. SPS vice president of marketing Gary Gibson said that working with an industrial customer such as Phillips on this cogeneration project will strengthen the economic base of the region.

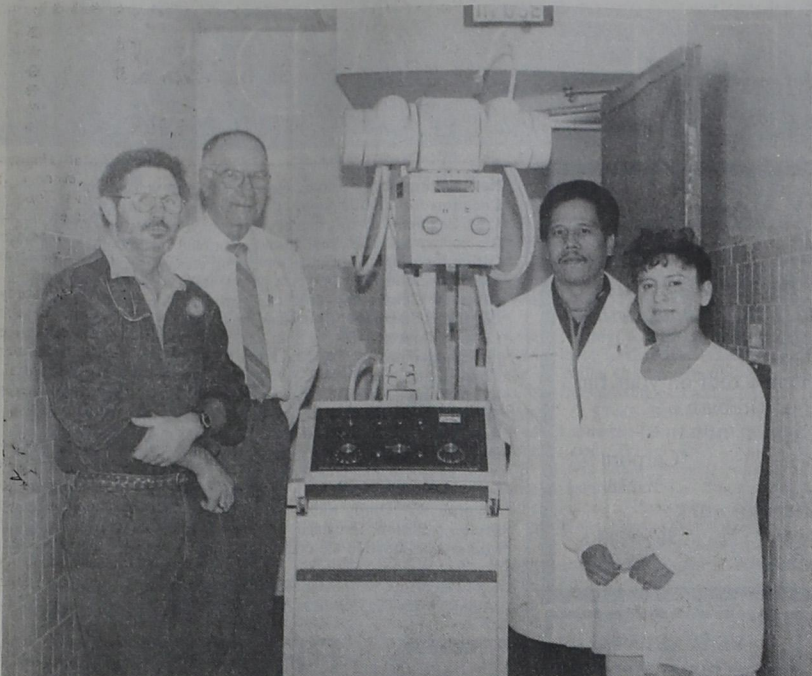
"We've seen significant customer growth," Gibson said. "Building this cogeneration facility will allow us to most economically meet our customers' needs."

In a December 1994 rate survey from the Public Utility Commission of Texas, SPS had the lowest residential electric rates in the state for customers using 500 kilowatt hours a month. "Good planning of generation facilities has allowed SPS to offer low rates for

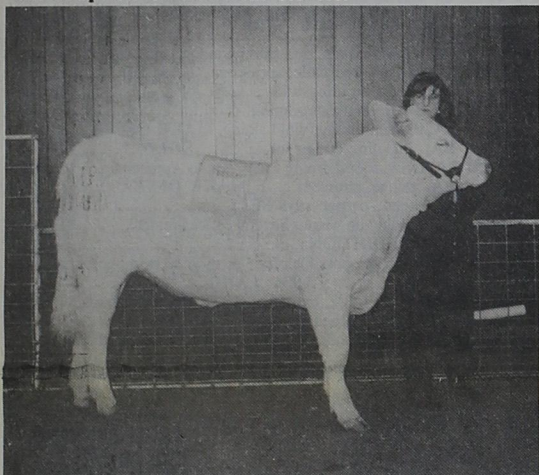
years," Gibson said. "By working with Phillips, we feel we can continue that record."

SPS's filing includes a second turbine, as well. SPS is proposing to begin operating a 100-MW combustion turbine at an existing SPS plant site, yet to be determined, in 1999.

Southwestern Public Service Company is a regional electric utility that primarily provides electric service to a population of about one million people in a 52,000-square-mile area comprising eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas. Through its Utility Engineering Corporation and Quixx Corporation subsidiaries, the company also provides engineering, design and construction management services to a variety of industries and is involved in a number of non-utility power generation projects. Corporate headquarters is in Amarillo, Texas.

speed limit. He thinks that decision needs to be reserved to the states.

On Social Security, Combust said he felt that the future of Social Security should be safe. "What we need to do is to recognize Social Security and make sure that no one is allowed to spend it for other reasons."

On health care, Combust felt that the issue would resurface, but that a program should be based on incentives rather than mandates. "The Clintons wanted government to solve the problem rather than the people."

On the possibility of dissolving one or more cabinet positions, the congressman said this was not out of the question. "Some of the

agencies definitely need to be revamped; perhaps combined with others."

On the subject of defense, the congressman said that we possibly need to reverse the trend of cutting expenses. "We need to have the money to train our recruits, and to provide an adequate defense," he concluded.

Combust said that the attitude of the new House of Representatives was much different than in the past. He pointed out that the House had already cut the number of its committees, and sub-committees, banned proxy voting, and brought members of congress under the laws that affect everyone else.

48th Annual Parmer Co. Jr. Livestock Show Set

The 48th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 19-21 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

Youngsters from the Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie communities will be competing in the county-wide event.

Judging will be held all day Friday and Saturday morning, with the premium auction sale to begin at 5 p.m. on Saturday, January 21.

Weigh-in and classification of all animals will be held from 1-5 p.m., Thursday, January 19. Steers and lambs will be classified beginning at 5 p.m.

The lamb show will kick off the judging Friday at 8 a.m., followed by the barrows at 11 a.m.

Steer judging will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday morning, with the heifer show immediately afterward.

Judges for the County Show will be Ken Cook for steers, heifers and lambs; and Jerry McLemore, barrows.

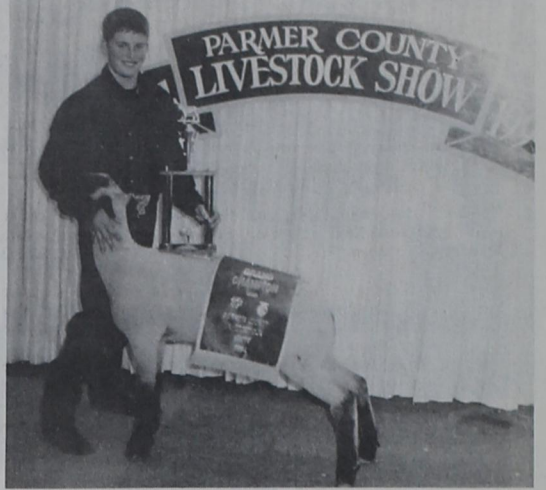

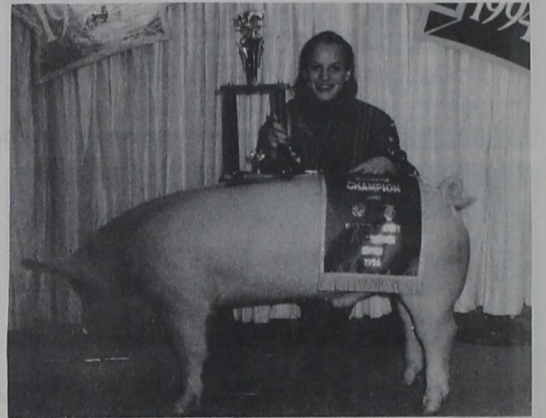

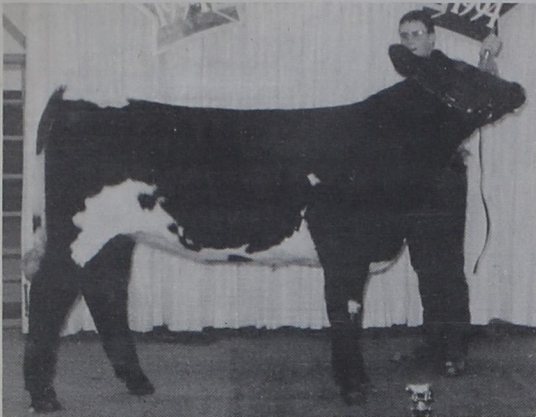

## Elms: Toughest Variety For Life In Tx. Panhandle

Like them or not, you can't deny that the most useful shade tree for generations in the Texas Panhandle has been the elm. Look for shade in any park, courthouse lawn, country home and nearly every city street in the Panhandle, and you'll find elm trees.

There's a good reason for that, and that is their hardiness and ability to adapt to all the extreme weather conditions we have in this area. They can survive with little or no care, and there simply are not many other species that can do that.

Elm trees were planted when the towns sprang up. They drop seeds in the spring that blow around and sprout seedlings everywhere.

They grow quickly, then we adopt them as our favorite shade tree until they sucker out, drop seeds everywhere and spout other seedlings, get into the highline wires, attract too many birds, get into the sewer system and break off limbs during ice storms.

Then we cut them all the way back to the bare trunk expecting them to grow back, which most of them do, and the cycle repeats until we finally cut them up for firewood and then have much difficulty splitting the wood.

The reason we have so many elms is that we can abuse them and get away with it. To be honest, the elms survive when the oaks, ash, maples, pecans and others die because we neglected to water them, or the weeds and grass choked them out or some animals or livestock injured them.

The Siberian Elm is the variety we have around here. They are not Chinese Elms. The Siberian Elm produces mature seeds in the late spring which are scattered by the wind.

The leaves are 3/4 to 2 inches long and 1/2 to 1 inch wide. They reach heights of 40 to 60 feet. They are not very disease-resistant but are extremely hardy and drought-resistant.

The Chinese Elm, also called Lacebark Elm, is a more desirable tree. It grows 40 to 50 feet in height, with leaves 3/4 to 2 inches

long and 3/8 to 3/4 inches wide. The bark is grey-brown and flaky with age giving it a lacy appearance.

These elms are highly disease-resistant and drought-hardy. The seeds mature in the fall which helps distinguish it from the Siberian Elm.

The American Elm is the largest of the elms, reaching heights of 80 to 100 feet. The leaves are also much larger, from four to six inches long and one to three inches wide. They have a deeply furrowed bark which is grey to grey-black.

These elms are also very adaptable and hardy but are very susceptible to Dutch Elm Disease, which has taken its toll on this species.

The Texas Cedar Elm has gained some popularity on the South Plains and in Central and South Texas but is not proven on

the High Plains. It is very disease-resistant and hardy with growth characteristics similar to the Siberian Elm.

They are not as fast growing as the other elms. The leaves are similar to the Lacebark, but are duller in color.

Since elms do so well around here, they deserve a place in our parks, homes and windbreaks. To avoid diseases and insect problems, the Lacebark Elm is the variety that should be planted here.

Like any tree, they would serve your needs better with a little better care. We must face the facts: elm trees are the best shade trees around, and do pretty well in windbreaks.

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District can get Lacebark Elm seedlings for you as well as five-gallon potted elms. For more information, call 247-2220 or come by the district office in Friona.

## FM Roads To Get Boost From Texas Commission

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock on Thursday commended the Texas Transportation Commission for approving an additional \$50 million saved in cost-efficiency measures for critically-needed maintenance on Texas' farm-to-market roads.

"This money will continue to help improve the safety of millions of Texans who rely on rural roads to get to school, to work and home again," Bullock said. "I can't think of a way it could be put to better use."

The Department of Transportation made the funds available by adopting further efficiency measures in its budget, including delaying the purchase of high-cost construction equipment and reducing vehicle maintenance costs.

The \$50 million the Transportation Commission approved yesterday is in addition to \$57.6 million approved in July for the maintenance of farm-to-market roads, bringing the total money

targeted for farm-to-market road maintenance to \$253.6 million for fiscal year 1995.

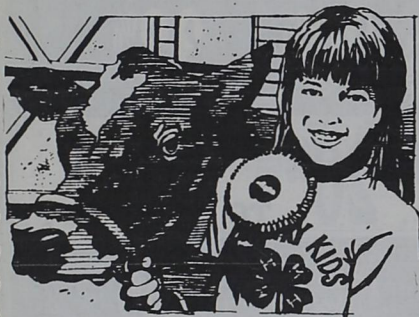
Bullock appointed an interim legislative committee last summer to study what the state should spend on rural roads and infrastructure, the needs of counties and the equitable distribution of state funds.

The rural road system in Texas includes 40,000 miles of state farm-to-market roads.

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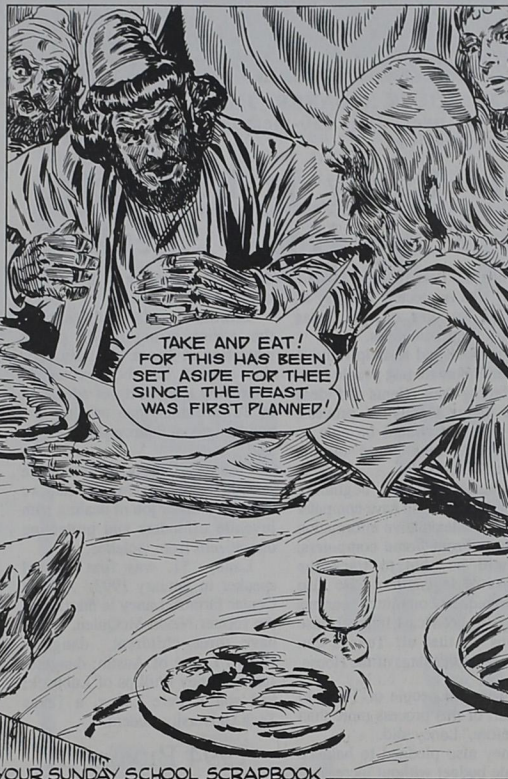

### Pete Laney Is Re-Elected As Texas House Speaker

James E. "Pete" Laney, D-Hale Center, was re-elected Tuesday as the 71st Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Laney pledged to help remove any barriers preventing people from contributing their talents and ideas to the Texas legislative process. "Every person should be able to make their voice heard in this chamber," Laney said.

He also noted that beginning today any citizen can have computer access to the legislative information systems. From home computers, they will be able to track the progress of legislation. He also plans to request committee hearings on ways to broadcast future House sessions so that all Texans can watch the proceedings of the House.

"I want the people of Texas to be a part of this process more than ever before," Laney said.

Laney also pledged to balance the state budget without increasing state taxes. "We are fortunate to have a strong economy generating state revenues," Laney said. "But the growing demands of education, criminal justice and federally mandated programs will require

difficult decisions on all areas of the budget."

Lawmakers also will reassess the entire structure of public education in Texas. "I truly hope this session can be devoted to improving the quality of education in Texas rather than creating yet another school finance plan," Laney said.

He also called for changes in the juvenile justice system. He said we must do a better job of dealing with juvenile offenders and protecting our citizens from violence.

Laney, 51, was first elected speaker in January 1993. A Hale Center farmer, Laney is married to the former Nelda McQuien. They have three children: daughter KaLyn Laney of Austin; daughter Jamey Laney Phillips of Lubbock; and son J. Pete Laney, a Texas Tech University student.

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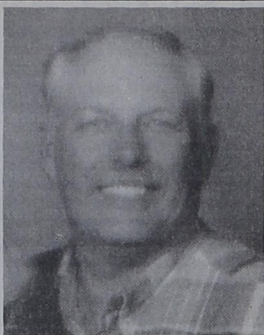
### Modern Study Club Members Met January 3

## YOUR EYES

### Gas-Permeable Lenses

Many would-be contact lens wearers who get inadequate correction with ordinary lenses or who may be uncomfortable in ordinary hard

contacts, are finding a perfect fit in lenses made of a plastic that permits oxygen to penetrate and reach the eyes. This increased oxygen prevents swelling of the cornea and "spectacle blue" when the lenses are removed.

The main advantage of gas-permeable hard contacts over ordinary soft ones is that they can offer clearer, more stable vision even to those with a high degree of astigmatism. Though it may take a little longer for some people to adapt to them, the visual improvement usually makes the change worthwhile.

Some gas-permeable lenses have a slippery surface that cuts down on irritation because the eyelid can more easily slide over them. The surface also resists the build-up of protein deposits, a common problem with soft lenses.

### Four Major Types Of Municipal Bonds

The term "municipal bond" generally includes bonds issued by a state, municipality, political subdivision or public agency of the U.S. government. Municipal bonds are issued to finance public projects such as building and repairing highways and streets, expanding and upgrading water and sewer systems, and improving bridges.

Municipal bond issuers promise to return to each investor a specified amount of money, called principal, at a specified time, called maturity, and to pay a set amount of interest on a regular basis over the life of the bond.

Although municipal bonds are issued by government subdivisions and agencies, they are not government-guaranteed. The safety of municipal bonds depends on the ability of the issuer to meet all of its obligations. It is important, therefore, to understand the four major types of municipal bonds and how they generate the funds to pay bondholders.

General obligation bonds are secured by the issuer's full faith, credit and taxing power to make timely payments of principal and interest. General obligation bonds were once considered the safest type of municipal bonds. However, as many cities, counties, school districts and other public entities began to face financial problems, the credit-worthiness of some issuers was brought into question.

In some instances, those who issue municipal bonds are limited to a specific maximum tax rate. These bonds still fall under the category of general obligation, but

they are more accurately described as limited tax bonds.

The second major type of municipal bonds are special tax bonds. These bonds are paid from the proceeds of a tax levied for the use of a specific public project. Highway bonds, for instance, may be financed by gasoline taxes. A sports arena may be paid by hotel and motel taxes approved to fund that project.

The third major type of bonds are revenue bonds. These bonds are paid off with the proceeds of fees charged to those who use the facility that the bonds financed. Toll highways, for example, often parallel free-use highways. Sometimes when additional roadways are needed, there is not enough tax revenue to fund them. Revenue bonds are issued, and user tolls are implemented to pay off the bonds. Motorists may still travel the free road, or they can pay a price to use the more efficient toll road.

The final major type of municipal bonds are certificates of participation (COPs). When an investor purchases a certificate of participation, he owns a piece of a lease and is entitled to a share of the municipality's lease payments. The major risk for an investor is the failure of the municipality to appropriate money to fund the lease. Funding must be approved every fiscal year, and, in lean times, as with all appropriations, politicians might look to cut payments to leased projects.

Understanding what type of municipal bond you're considering and how the issuer will generate the income necessary to pay off its bondholders will go a long way toward helping you determine how safe a bond truly is.

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
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
