says Gerald Crenwelge, USDANRCS soil scientist.
Soil moisture readings are laken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed alumimonitoring sites within the 15Eaunty Water District service area, soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.
Plant available soil moisture
varies according to the previous varies according to the previous
crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture at cotton sites averaged about 0.4 inches at
the one foot soil level, 0.3 inches the one foot soil level, 0.3 inches at the three foot level, 0.4 inches at the four foot level, and 0.5 inches the five foot level.
