MY TURN

I DOUBT THAT PEOPLE in the larger areas of downstate Texas have the close feelings for one another that we do here in this area. South of here to Lubbock, and all the way north to Stratford and Perryton, the people of the Texas Panhandle feel a sort of kinship to one another, like we're all members of one great big "small" hometown.

In recent weeks we have wept for the little town of Claude as they tragically lost several of their lovely promising young people. This week, we all breathed a sigh of relief for the families of the victims of Samuel Hawkins. The taxpayers of Texas spent close to four million dollars before finally ending the miserable existence of "The Traveling Rapist," Samuel Hawkins, this past Monday night.

There was never any doubt about his being guilty of two murders in the Texas Panhandle area, plus over forty rapes in various other places. He admitted his guilt. Juries convicted him for the 1976 murder of a 12-year-old Amarillo girl and the 1977 murder of a 19-year-old pregnant Borger housewife.

Hawkins sat on death row for nearly 18 years, filing appeal after appeal to delay his execution. Two years ago *The Borger News-Herald* did a cost study which included all the trials, appeals, hearings, and prison expenses up to that time, and they came up with a three million dollar figure.

A spokesman at the *Herald* this week told me that you could safely add nearly another million for the last two years. She said every time there was another hearing, their local sheriff had to travel to Huntsville and bring Hawkins up to Lubbock, and then back again.

This is a far cry from the "swift justice" that our founding fathers had in mind when they set up our country's judicial system. I would hazard a guess that Hawkins' four million dollar expense is just a drop in the bucket to what California will be paying out for the O.J. Simpson mockery of justice. Just think how much good could have been accomplished with that \$4,000,000.

While on the subject of crime, criminals, justice, etc., I'd like to commend Farwell's Chief of Police Roy L. McGaa for his recent letter in the *Lubbock Avalanche-Journal* in support of Governor Bush's proposed "concealed weapons" law. McGaa related some very impressive facts, including the following:

1. Florida experienced a 22 percent drop in homicide rate after it passed the concealed carry law.
2. New York has a virtual handgun ban. New York has only three percent of the total population of the U.S. but has more than 12 percent of the total U.S. handgun-related homicides.
3. Washington, D.C. banned handguns in 1976 and since that time has seen its murder rate rise 200 percent with a 300 percent rise in handgun-related homicide.
4. While the lower courts have been divided on the issue of guns, the Supreme Court, in all relevant decisions, has recognized that the Second Amendment guarantees an individual the right to keep and bear arms.

Chief McGaa goes on to say "As a cop, my job is to seek out the criminals, but even then the majority of Texans I know are decent, law-abiding citizens. I resent the social engineering mindset that wants them to remain risk-free victims to the criminal element that couldn't care less about gun laws."

"Americans have never taken kindly to being walked on and elected lawmakers are starting to get the message," McGaa continues. "Governor Bush is probably hearing the majority of Texans saying 'Each individual is responsible for his or her own actions, and it's time to stop punishing all Texans for the actions of a very few.'"

His service project included planting trees in the area around Reeve Lake. He planned and organized the project enlisting 22 other members and families of Troop 56.

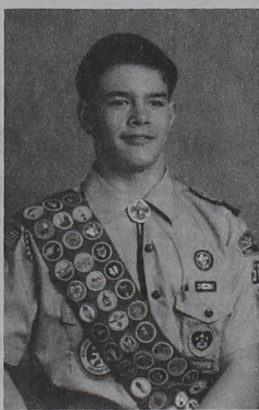

Friday, February 24 was a staff development work-day for faculty and was a holiday for students.

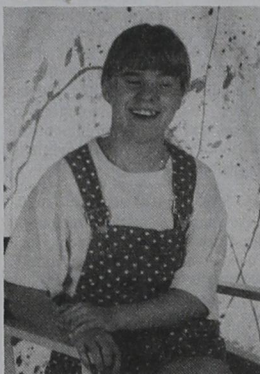
The annual ski-break will be observed Monday and Tuesday, February 27-28 for students and faculty of Friona ISD.

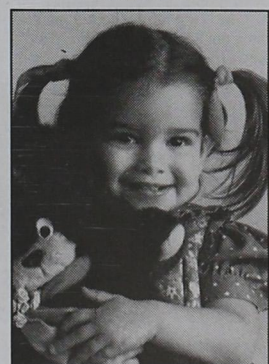

65 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 28, 1930

W. H. Warren has the masonry work done on his new building on Main Street, with fair prospects of completion within the next two weeks. The building will be 26x60 feet, one story high and divided into three offices. One of these rooms will be an office for Dr. Wills, and another to be occupied by the Friona Star. The third is as yet unrented.

55 Yrs. Ago--March 1, 1940

Our people received word with regret which informed them that Dan Ethridge has arranged to move from our city to Lubbock, where he and Mrs. Ethridge will make their home in the future, although they extend congratulations to Dan for the promotion he has received by his appointment as special agent for the Cravens and Dargan Insurance Brokers of Houston.

50 Yrs. Ago--March 2, 1945

The Friona Squaws became champions of District 19 after beating four good ball clubs at the tournament February 23 and 24 at Claude. The Squaws downed Lazbuddie in the opening round, 25-14, and then Lakeview, 28-20. Friona downed Claude, 19-14 in the semi-finals, and then outplayed the Quail Bobwhites, 31-24 in the finals. The Squaws are eligible to attend the state tournament in Hillsboro by virtue of winning this tournament.

45 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 24, 1950

At a meeting of the directors of the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. Tuesday night, it was definitely decided to build more elevator and storage space for the wheat growers, and a contract was let to A. 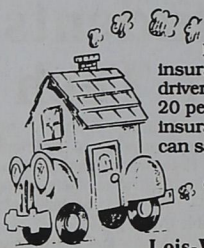
5 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 24, 1990

Capt. Bailey Roberts of the Friona Police Department said about \$11,000 worth of drugs were recovered.

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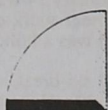
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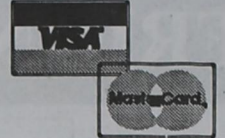
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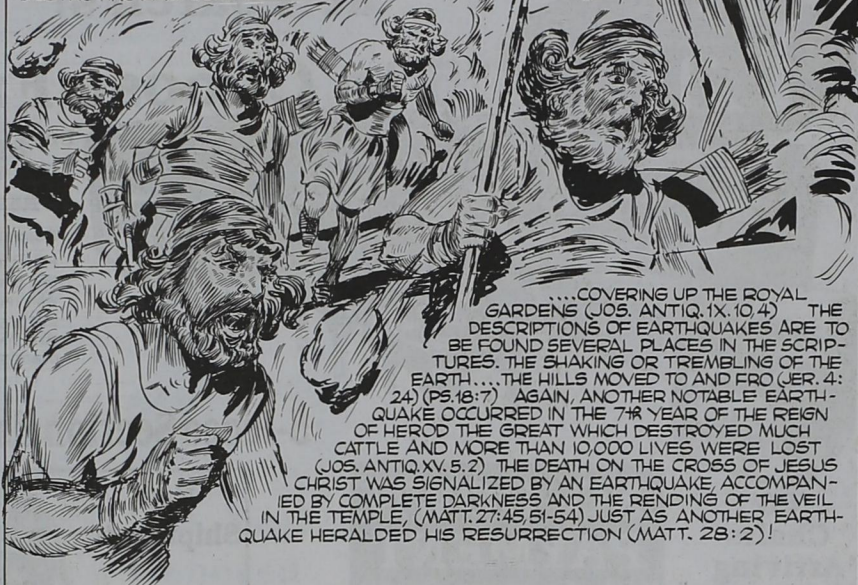

Dear Friend of Animals,

That's right. February 28. The First Spay Day USA, the most visible and perhaps most important event the Doris Day Animal League has ever undertaken. With the support of friends like you, it could be the most important event ever, in saving the lives of millions of animals each year.

On that day, we're asking every humane American to take one dog or cat to a veterinarian for spaying or neutering or to sponsor others to take care of their animals.

Since most of us who care deeply about animals have already had our pets spayed or neutered, this is an opportunity for us to encourage others to follow our lead.

And, if there is a pet we have overlooked or postponed neutering, February 28 is the day to correct that oversight.

It is our hope that Spay Day USA will receive the same attention to achieve a reputation equal to such national programs as the Great American Smokeout and other similar efforts. And the reaction so far gives us every reason to believe that will happen.

Veterinarians and Humane Societies all across the country have agreed to perform or sponsor spaying and neutering operations on this date, and we've received the endorsement of the American Veterinary Medical Association as well as the state veterinary medical associations in more than twenty individual states.

Also, over 1,000 humane and animal rights organizations have voiced their support of our Spay Day USA efforts. But for it to be successful--and it MUST be--we have had the added help of loyal friends and supporters like you.

There's too much at stake for us to make anything less than an all-out commitment to this life-saving effort. Remember, almost every two seconds, an innocent dog or cat is killed in humane societies and animal shelters all across the country--14 to 17 million animals a year.

And at least that many more don't make it to those shelters, dumped or abandoned and left to die



all because no one cares enough for them to provide a home, nourishment, love.

The goal of Spay Day USA is to put an end to this senseless, needless killing. Dr. Joel Osborn, heart specialist of Amarillo, a native of Friona, spoke at the meeting along with Jack Young of Plainview, who has a piggyback heart.

Dr. Osborn spoke of a new treatment, now being used to treat coronary artery disease. The new surgical procedure is a "Stent" balloon surgery. "It is improved over the angioplasty procedure, with a 96 per cent success rate," Osborn said.

The "Stent" procedure takes approximately 2 to 2 1/2 hours to complete and a four-day hospital stay.

Osborn said the American Heart Association has made great strides in educating the public about heart

disease treatment and prevention. "Education by the AHA is phenomenal," he said, "and the CPR courses are wonderful."

Dr. Osborn also answered several questions by those in attendance. Osborn is the heart physician to many local residents.

Jack Young of Plainview told about the procedure he had done almost two years ago, his "piggyback heart." His original heart was kept in place, but another donor heart was also added.

Young said one of the hearts does the pumping and the other the distributing, they work in series together. He is the third person in the United States to have a "piggyback heart."

Young said he was working again and feeling great. "I'm a miracle walking around," he said.

The evening ended with refreshments and a time of fellowship.

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

With 12 returning lettermen and nine players who started at one time or another, the Friona Chieftain baseball team for 1995 has high hopes heading into their season.

Friona was opening their 1995 season Friday afternoon at Lockney, and will host Fritch in a double-header Saturday, March 4 at 1 p.m. in their home-opening games.

Bob Ferguson, an assistant coach in '94, is the head coach of the Chieftain baseballers this season. He is assisted by Tim Anuszkiewicz and Raul Santillan.

Main player that the Chiefs lost from their 1994 team was pitcher Tony Cuevas, who was a four-year starter, and Kit Preston, who decided not to play this spring. Preston was a designated hitter and utility player in '94.

Lettermen returning include pitcher-first baseman Cory Hamilton; first-baseman-designated hitter Sheldon Burleson; second-baseman Davy Hamilton; shortstop Juan Gamboa; shortstop Moses Reyes and third-baseman Chris Hanna, who played centerfield last season.

Jamie Cruz, a sophomore who pitched for the junior varsity last season, will be vying as a starting pitcher, Ferguson says. Cruz and Blackburn are the only two sophomores who are on the varsity at this point.

The pitching staff will include Hamilton, Houston, Pope and possibly Reyes. Of these, Pope is the only left-hander.

"And we don't have a left-handed hitter in our lineup. Pope even bats right-handed," Ferguson says.

The Chieftain baseball coach says that early workouts have made him feel good about the team's defense. "We should do well in the field. Our weak spot might be in our hitting. We had about eight guys hit home runs last season, but none had a bunch."

As to the pitching prospect, Ferguson added "We have some kids who can hit the strike zone. Usually at the start of the season the hitters are ahead of the pitchers, but I think our pitchers will be ready."

The team will play about 25 games, which includes tournaments at Brownfield and Clovis in addition to their own.

Road non-district games will be against Lockney, Dalhart and Tulia. Home pre-district games are with Fritch, Tulia and Clovis J.V.

The district schedule begins on April 4 with Dimmitt here.

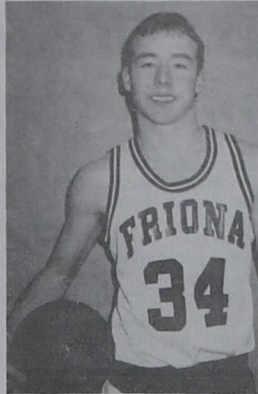

Keri Reeb Paces Squaws' Scoring

Senior Keri Reeb paced the Friona Squaws in scoring for the 1994-95 season.

The Squaws' playmaker scored 357 points in 30 games, averaging 11.9 points-per-game. She was the only player on the team to average in double-figures.

Runnerup in scoring was Britny White, who scored 236 points for an 8.1 points-per-game average. Third was Courtney Carthel with 230 points and a 7.9 scoring average.

Kristi Meyer had the best field goal percentage for two-point attempts, 49%, making 43 of 88. Miss Reeb hit 43 per cent, making 94 of 221 shots. Keri also led in three-point baskets, hitting 42 of 110 attempts, a 38 per cent average-excellent for three-pointers.

Heather Martin had the best free throw average at 89 per cent, 16 of 18; although Miss Carthel had considerably more shots, making 84 of 116 for 72%.

Leading rebounder was Jodi Loooper with 235 (109 offensive and 126 defensive). Next was Courtney Carthel with 200 (104 offensive and 96 defensive).

Miss Reeb also led in steals with 83, to 65 for Britny White and 61 for Miss Carthel.

Keri also had the most assists (passes leading to baskets), 128. Mary Cass was runnerup with 60.

Chieftain Cagers' Leaders Revealed

Scoring leaders and other statistical champions were revealed this week in season statistics released by Coach Kevin Cooper of the Friona Chieftain basketball team.

Senior Cory Hamilton was the scoring leader, posting 432 points in 27 games, for an even 16-point average. Fellow senior Kit Preston was runnerup, scoring 364 points in 25 games, for a 14.6 point-per-game average.

Roy Hendley scored 223 points in 27 games for an 8.3 average, and freshman Quint Ellis scored 194 points, averaging 10.2 points-per-game as a reserve on the team.

Preston was the leader in field goal percentage, hitting 56 per cent of his shots, 151 of 272 attempts. Ellis was runnerup in field goal shooting, hitting 48 per cent overall (78 of 161), and 54 per cent of his two-point tries, 74 of 138. Hamilton was third at 46 per cent overall (166 of 354) and 50 per cent of his two pointers (135 of 271).

Hendley was the top three-point shooter, making 41 per cent, 12 of 29. Jason Rector made 38 per cent, 22 of 58, and Hamilton made 37 per cent, 31 of 83.

Ellis, who was on the junior varsity to start the season, led the way in free throw shooting, hitting 67 per cent, or 34 of 51. Rector was runnerup with 58 per cent, 14 of 24.

Preston was the leading rebounder, with 197. He had 117 defensive boards and 80 on offense. Hamilton was runnerup with 144 (98 defensive and 46 offensive). Ellis was the only other member of the team to top 100 rebounds with 104.

In other categories, Hamilton led in steals with 45 to 38 for Hendley. Hamilton also led in assists with 85 to 77 for Hendley. Hamilton also had the most blocked shots, eight, to seven for Ellis. He wrapped it up by also leading in fouls with 107 to 81 for Rector.

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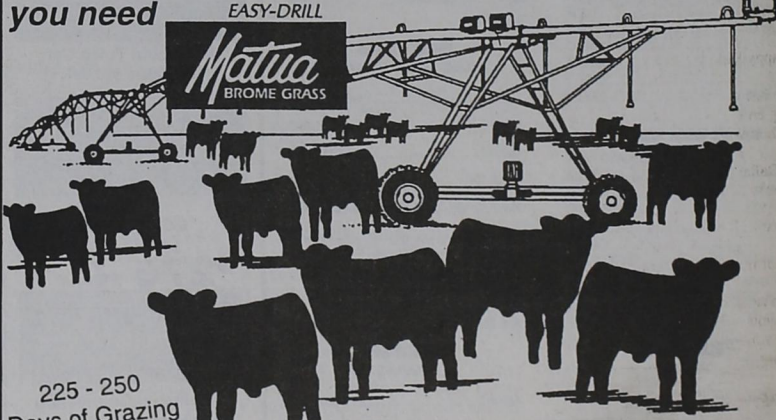

Higher Income vs. Better Quality (Second of two parts)

When making a major purchase, such as a car or a home, people spend many hours researching their options to ensure they're getting the best quality. The same type of research should go into making investment decisions. Instead of jumping into the investment that offers the highest income, it's important to evaluate the security's quality.

A recent study of utility stocks illustrates the value of this practice. The study, which appeared in the publication, *Public Utilities Fortnightly*, found that in the long term, lower-yielding, high-quality utility stocks may provide higher total return than higher-yielding, low-quality utility stocks.

How could this happen? Utility companies typically pay dividends out of their earnings. However, lower-quality utility companies, in order to maintain high dividend rates, are sometimes forced to use most or all of their earnings to pay dividends. Even worse, if the company's earnings are insufficient to meet the dividend payment, other company assets may have to be tapped to pay the dividend.

On the other hand, high-quality utilities may initially pay lower dividends, re-investing most of their earnings into the company. As the company grows stronger, not only does the value of its stock increase, but so do dividends.

The study published in *Public Utilities Fortnightly* compared the total return (appreciation in value plus income) on six low-quality, high-yield utility stocks to that of six high-quality, low-yield utility stocks. The study followed the

stocks from 1979 to 1982, a period when utilities went from lagging behind the overall market to leading it.

The results showed that the total return before taxes for the low-quality group was 23.3 per cent. However, total return before taxes for the high-quality group was 68 per cent—nearly three times as much! (See Table 1) The initial lower dividends of the high-quality stocks were compensated for by more rapid growth in earnings, and eventually higher dividends, giving the high-quality stocks an overall higher return for the period.

A more recent study showed similar results, with high-quality utilities outperforming the low-quality group nearly 3 to 1 again. Ten randomly selected, high-quality utilities increased earnings per share (EPS) an average of 10.9 per cent over the study period and increased dividends per share (DPS) a corresponding 10.1 per cent. The EPS and DPS of ten randomly selected low-quality utilities decreased nearly one per cent during the same period.

These studies recognize that high yield can sometimes indicate a depressed stock. In such cases, if the stock recovers, investors could enjoy an attractive bonus. However, the study concluded that, on average, "high-yield, low-quality utilities have been, and probably will continue to be, a bad investment."

The lure of a high current dividend attracts many investors to low-quality utilities. However, this study shows that utility stocks should not be purchased solely on the basis of high income. The underlying soundness and quality of the utility--its ability to increase earnings and dividends--is a vital consideration when investing in utility stocks. Do your homework, and you'll be rewarded.

YOUR EYES



Your Eyes And Your Medications

Your health and any medications you take can affect your vision. It's wise to alert your optometrist to any changes in your eyesight.

*If you're pregnant, for instance, vision may change as pregnancy progresses; water retention exacerbates myopia.

*Birth control pills can dry eyes to the extent that contact lenses become uncomfortable.

*Diabetics report that vision changes with blood sugar levels; better management can control fluctuations and avert eye damage.

*Digoxin, used against heart disease, can cause blurred vision and may also interfere with perception of greens and yellows. Cordarone, another heart drug, may lead to pigmentation of the outer eye layer.

*Among arthritis drugs, Plaquenil may cause color changes in the retina, and Prednisone--a steroid--may accelerate cataracts and cause glaucoma.

*Drugs used against hypertension have been known to cause blurred or double vision, blurring, irritation and dry eyes.

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
