Bill Ellis IF IT'S MARCH, then it must be about time for Weldon Crim to do the annual "crop forecast" that was originated by his grandfather, Taylor Crim, who learned it from the Indians, and carried on by a member of the Crim family for most of this century. When I first knew Weldon, we both were third graders at the old Midway School, in southern Parmer County. My grandparents had bought the place a couple of miles south of Clay's Corner, adjoining what is now State Highway 214, but was then just a caliche road that connected Farm-to-

caliche road that connected Farm-to-Market segments south out of Friona and north out of Muleshoe.

The Crim place was very near the Midway School. I just happened to get in on the last year that the school operated. We moved up to bettheme Barmer County from

school operated. We moved up to southern Parmer County from Southern Bailey County, Ye Editor having begun his formal schooling at the metropolis of Baileyboro. The following year, we students from Midway were bussed over to Lazbuddie, where there were a number of new faces. Since Weldon and I had made up about two-thirds of our third-grade class, it was nice to have a buddy going into a new to have a buddy going into a new school.

The thing Ye Editor remembers most about our year at Lazbuddie was the fact that the school had was the fact that the school had begun a lunchroom program. A gentleman and his wife operated the lunchroom in a trailer house that was moved onto the Lazbuddie school property, where they served up such delicacies as meatloaf, mashed potatoes and every so often, soup or chili.

soup or chili. If you've never had to carry a sack lunch to school simply because that's the only way you'd have anything for lunch, then you can't imagine how excited a bunch of us old country kids were to have an honest-to-goodness lunchroom-even if it was just a remodeled trailerhouse.

I don't recall a lot of things about my year at Lazbuddie, but I do remember that first lunchroom. do remember that first lunchroom. That, plus the fact that the entire school was bussed into Muleshoe for a special showing of a Lassie movie. And toward the end of the school year, the school showed us the Shirley Temple "Heidi" movie. As I recall after many intervening years, this was in the darkened school gymmasium

school gymnasium. My family moved again--over to the Oklahoma Lane/Lariat area, and Ye Editor was then among the final students to attend the Oklahoma Lane school (seems like everywhere we went, we closed down their school, except for Lazbuddie and Muleshoe). Now, Oklahoma Lane had a

real" lunchroom. We students even got the opportunity to return thanks prior to our lunch--many years before the Supreme Court would have held us as lawbreakers for such an unimaginable crime. We wouldn't trade our rural

upbringing for anything in the world. The student-teacher ratio was hard to beat, and the teachers were ultra dedicated And we formed some friendships

and acquaintenances that have lasted for a lifetime. Now, many years later, Weldon

Crim is carrying on the tradition of his grand-dad and his late father, J.W. Crim, in determining what kind of weather our crops can expect.

Who'd have thought that in that Midway third-grade class we'd come out with a weather prophet (Weldon) and a weather recorder (Bill)

We need to keep our traditions alive, and we salute our childhood friend for continuing the yearly weather forecast. We also need a prediction of a rainy year. Weldon will do his "reading" of the smoke next Wednesday morning, the 22nd, and well print his findings, because we all depend on good farming results.

The City of Friona provides a large roll-off dumpster for furniture, mattresses, appliances or any item too large to be placed in your dumpster. There is also a trailer provided in which to place grass clippings and yard waste. Both of these are located behind the City Denr at Einsth and Leckson

Barn at Eighth and Jackson. Tree limbs should be taken to a location at Reeve Lake directly behind the Sonic Drive-In. If these items are not placed in the household dumpsters, there will be ample room for residential garbage.

The alley and the area around the dumpsters must be kept free of weeds and litter. Make sure the lid

tires and chemicals. In the very near future the city will be providing oil recycling centers where you may place your used oil and filters.

The citizens of Friona are presently in the position to shape the entire future of their community. Proposition 1 and 2 on the May 6 ballot can determine the quality of life and the security and future of Friona, according to Teresa Buske, executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Proposition 1 is a vote for proposition 1 is a vote for jobs, business retention and new business and industry; and Proposition 2 is a vote for property tax relief." Mrs. Buske said. The chamber representative went on to

chamber representative went on to give these points: What is economic development? Economic develop-ment involves four principal activities--(1) information and research; (2) existing business retention and expansion; (3) marketing and business recruitment; (4) infrastructure and community (4) infrastructure and community

(4) infrastructure and community development. Where will your investment go? The revenues generated from passage of Proposition 1 may be used for a wide variety of projects including land, buildings (municipal, museums, exhibition facilities and related stores, restaurants, concessions and parking restaurants, concessions and parking and transportation facilities, or demolition of existing structures), equipment, facilities (recycling, public safety, street, water and sewer), and related improvements (streets, roads, drainage and related generally improvements,

municipally owned improvements, maintenance and operating costs associated with projects), or any other project that the board determines as contributing to the promotion and development of new or expanded business enterprise.

The revenues generated from the passage of Proposition 2 will go toward a reduction in property

tax rates. "Opportunity is what these two "Opportunity is what these two propositions offer the City of Friona. We have all made the choice to make this our home. Let's continue to work together to make Friona the best it can be. Proposition 1 and 2 are an investment in Friona," Mrs. Buske concluded.



Leading Nations Join To Stabilize Currencies Think about all the things you use or buy in a typical day. You might check the time on a Swiss-made watch, drink a cup of coffee made from South American beans, or drine a Language are in today? or drive a Japanese car. In today's global economy, foreign-made goods have become woven into the very fabric of our lives, and the economies of the leading nations all affect one another affect one another. For example, the American

dollar is one of many currencies in the world. When the value of the dollar rises or falls in relation to other currencies, it affects all world currencies. In recent months, there has been global concern about declines in the value of the U.S. dollar relative to some of the other major currencies, such as the German mark and the Japanese yen.

There are several possible causes of a falling dollar. One is when the Federal Reserve raises interest rates, which it did for the first time in five years last February. As a result, the securities markets stalled, and foreign investors temporarily looked elsewhere to invest. The decline in foreign capital and


Another theory about the dollar's recent drop in value is that the Clinton administration encouraged a weaker dollar to encourage a term of the second s pressure Japan into opening its markets to more U.S. goods. However, some economists saw no reason for the cheaper dollar. They cite a strong economy that should be attracting foreign investment, thereby increasing demand for dollars

dollars Whatever its cause, a cheaper dollar affects several areas of the U.S. economy. Cheaper dollars cannot buy as much currency of other countries. The products that these countries sell in the United States then become more expensive, and higher import prices add to U.S. inflation. A cheaper dollar also disrupts the U.S. government bond market, which is a major factor in setting interest rates. Rising interest rates typically accompany a falling dollar and could cause the stock market to

A cheaper dollar also affects our foreign trading partners. As the dollar falls, foreign imports become more expensive, and U.S. consumers stop buying foreign goods

Because of the interrelation-ships among world economies, leading industrial nations agreed in 1985 to coordinate the purchase and sale of one another's currencies when circumstances demanded. For example, if the dollar begins to fall example, if the dollar begins to fall in the international money market (a network of brokers, banks and individuals who buy and sell currency), central banks from other leading nations begin to purchase U.S. dollars. This reduces the supply and usually stabilizes the price. This practice is put into action with all major currencies, such as the German mark, Japanese yen, British pound and French yen, British pound and French franc. In some cases, the stabilization may not be permanent because market forces can be more powerful than the central banks.

In the past, other nations' currencies were of less concern. But today, they play a vital role in the world economy. Trade among nations, world stock markets and international travel are just some of the areas affected by currency fluctuations. No industrial nation can affect the luxury of isolation: can afford the luxury of isolation; their economies are so interrelated that weakness in one country demands the immediate attention of other nations. Through their combined efforts to buy and sell one another's currency, the financial ministers of the leading industrial nations have taken a giant step to stabilize the world economy. For individual investors to have well-diversified portfolios in today's world market, it's important to own securities of different countries other nations.
