

"MY TURN"

SPEAKING OF BOMBS, my good friend Anne Spring has some vivid memories of the bombing in England during World War II when she was an impressionable teenager. The other day, after the horror in Oklahoma City, I asked her what the rescue, salvage and clean-up efforts were like following the bombing raids by the Germans in Great Britain during the war. She said "At that time they had neither the technology nor the manpower to do extensive searching through the rubble of bombed out buildings, such as is currently going on in the Oklahoma City Federal Building."

"However, the authorities in each city, neighborhood and village attempted to keep a pretty close register of where everyone was to be at any given time. Each person was assigned to an air raid shelter in their area and someone was put in charge of checking the list of those present at any given time."

But this system wasn't foolproof by any means, as Anne points out that her own school was bombed one day and many of her young friends perished. Her mother was ill that day and Anne stayed home from school to look after her. Eventually the rubble from the school was scooped up and all the remains were buried in a mass grave in the local cemetery with a large marker listing names of all the children who died in that bombing. Since the officials thought Anne had been at school that day, her name was placed on the marker. She said that she and her family went through all sorts of complications for a very long time before they could get her name scratched off that marker. After that, when she would run across someone she hadn't seen in years, they'd say "Oh! I thought you were dead!"

It has been over 130 years since the U.S. has fought a war on our own soil, during the Civil War when citizens waged war against their own countrymen, brother against brother, because of idealistic differences.

We are now at war, once again, on our own soil, and this time it is with a certain radical fringe faction of our own countrymen who advocate the overthrow of the government. A few members of this paramilitary fringe appointed themselves spokesmen last week and kicked off their war by bombing a federal building. They view the government as an abstract entity devoid of any humanity, and so the human lives that were lost meant nothing to them.

I grieve for those who lost their loved ones in Oklahoma City. I also grieve for the freedoms that were destroyed in that bomb blast. Never again will we feel at ease when entering a federal building anywhere. Never again can we brag about the "heartland" of the country being free from crime and violence.

I predict that strict gun control will be the outcome of this incident. Personally, I abhor guns, but I believe that every home should have one and people should be free to arm themselves, because that is what the founding fathers wrote in our constitution. Now, that particular freedom is in jeopardy of being taken away, too, because a bunch of fools enjoy dressing up in camouflage and running around in the woods playing war games.

Authorities have pretty much looked the other way while these so-called militia groups organized themselves and played shoot-em-up with each other on their weekend retreats. We all knew these organizations existed and thought they were just a little bit looney but harmless. Harmless no more! It is ironic that the "freedom to bear arms" is the one big rallying cry of these anti-government militia groups, and now, because of the actions of a few of their members, that very freedom could be lost.

As of this writing, the number of persons murdered in the Oklahoma City bombing stands at 110.

The hospital district's early voting is being held at the hospital from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily.

On May 6, the three elections will be held at the Friona Fire Station.

Candidates for the City Council include Bill McCoy, Robert R. Jones, Lee Romo, Betty Renner, John Gurley and Dave Buske. Three will be elected.

School board candidates are Kathryn H. Gurley, Jerry Butman, Mike Martin, Danny Black, Kevin Welch and Paul (Lucky) Gonzales. Two positions are to be filled.

In the city and school elections, compound voting will be allowed. This procedure was used here in the 1994 elections.

On the hospital district ballot, Wendell Gresham and Danny Kendrick are unopposed for the two expiring seats.

Students Register

Friona Primary School is asking for assistance in contacting all parents of children who qualify for the pre-kindergarten program for the 1995-96 school year. A pre-kindergarten enrollment has been scheduled for May 1-5 at the Primary School office.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a child must be four years old on or before September 1, 1995 and meet one or more of the following qualifications: (1) low-income, eligible for assistance; or (2) physically handicapped.

Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate, immunization record, Social Security card, parents proof of income, Social Security card, and proof of federal assistance to the primary office. A copy will be made and the original returned to you.

According to the Texas Education Code, in order for a student to enroll in school, his/her immunizations must be current. If all records are completed at pre-registration time, you will not have to wait in line when school starts this fall.

Voters Urged To Pass 1¢ Tax

Friona voters are urged to approve the half-cent sales tax for economic development, as well as the half-cent tax for property tax relief, on the May 6 city ballot.

Unlike state or federal taxes which are sent to these governmental agencies to be disbursed as needed, this additional "cent" of sales tax will stay and work in Friona.

The economic development tax will allow Friona to compete on a "level playing field" with other cities its size, in courting businesses and industries.

And the property tax relief portion is exactly what it says it is. For years the sales tax has been lauded as the "most fair" tax of any tax that has been devised. By designating a half-cent to the city's property tax coffers, it will assure that everyone who shops in Friona will participate in city taxes, and not just the property owners.

The average homeowner should realize an estimated \$35 per year savings on their city taxes, if the proposition passes.

We're automatically paying this extra penny tax when we shop in places such as Amarillo and Lubbock--and this does not hinder us buying the item we're shopping for. In like manner, you won't miss this tax a penny at a time, but over a year's time it could do wonders for our town and its citizens.

A vote for both "halves" of this penny tax is a vote for progress. And, if at a later time the citizen see for some unknown reason that it isn't working, it can be easily recinded.

That makes Saturday's vote a win/win proposition!

Cotton Producers Okay "Boll Weevil" Program

Cotton growers in the High Plains said "yes" to a referendum establishing a boll weevil eradication zone which includes 30 counties in West Texas.

Woody Anderson, chairman of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, Inc., said a majority of growers voted to establish the High Plains Zone. There were 7,861 votes for the establishment of the zone and 1,887 votes against the zone for an 80.6 per cent approval. Growers also voted 7,464 to 2,199 for a per acre, per year assessment to pay for the program which is a

77.2 per cent approval.

"Both portions of this referendum passed easily," Anderson said. "This program benefits cotton growers in the High Plains and throughout the state. We are looking forward to working with producers from the High Plains Zone and ensuring the cotton boll weevil is eliminated."

Frank Myers, executive director of the foundation, said cotton growers in the High Plains Zone also elected Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation board of

directors to represent growers within the zone. Huffaker has been serving as interim director and will continue in his position as secretary on the board.

There were 10,810 votes cast in the zone from more than 24,000 cotton producers and landowners eligible to vote. Invalid votes totaled 576. Eligibility for voting was determined by cotton acreage planted in 1994.

Counties included in the zone referendum are Andrews, Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Ector, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Kent, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Motley, Parmer, Randall, Swisher, Terry, Yoakum and parts of Borden and Midland. Cotton planted in these counties represents about half of the cotton grown annually in Texas.

Myers said eradication programs in other states have shown that ridding cotton fields of the boll weevil provides economic benefits to the state and reduces the use of pesticides. Boll weevils infest approximately 3.5 million acres of cotton in Texas.

This is the fifth of nine zones in the state which have passed both referendums. The other four zones are the Southern Rolling Plains Zone, Lower Rio Grande Valley Zone, Central Rolling Plains Zone and the South Texas/Wintergarden Zone. The remaining four zones have yet to vote on the referendum.

Conservation tillage is a broad term used to describe using less tillage than traditional or conventional tillage.

Minimum tillage, no-till, and ridge-till are other terms used to describe this practice also.

By Natural Resources Conservation Service's standards it would mean leaving at least 30 percent of the previous year's stubble or at least 1000 lbs./acre crop residues on the soil surface until planting time.

The benefits of conservation tillage generally outweigh the negatives, depending on who you ask. The obvious benefits such as reduced fuel costs and labor requirements are what first attract farmers to this concept.

Disappointments are often encountered when herbicide uses are increased or furrow irrigation systems are blocked by excess trash. Every farm is different and experimentation is a must.

It may be that an extra trip across the land with a water furrower is necessary to allow better water flow. Cattle can complicate things by compacting the soil. Every case is different.

The long term benefits of conservation tillage cannot always be measured in the first year's profit.

You expect things such as improved water penetration and storage in the soil, decreased runoff, lower soil temperatures, reduced evaporation and transpiration, reduced soil erosion by water and wind, reduced soil compaction, increased micro-bacterial activity, and better soil tilth.

These benefits will continue to improve the productivity of your soil as you continue to farm.

The amount of crop residue on the soil surface has a direct effect upon the soil temperature. The more residue, the lower the soil temperature resulting in decreased evaporation and plant transpiration making more water available for plant use.

Bare soil temperatures can reach 145 degrees when the air temperature is 100 degrees. Soil

bacteria will die at these temperatures.

Crop residues allow better water penetration by slowing down the velocity of runoff. The soil type dictates how much is absorbed per hour but stubble on the surface, contour farming and furrow dikes can aid the process.

Conservation tillage requires more than anything a change of thought. You must be able to experience change, adapt by trial and error and cease to farm out of habit.

The best way to get started is to try one field for a couple of years, keep your eyes open to methods that are working for others and talk to other farmers who have made it work for them.

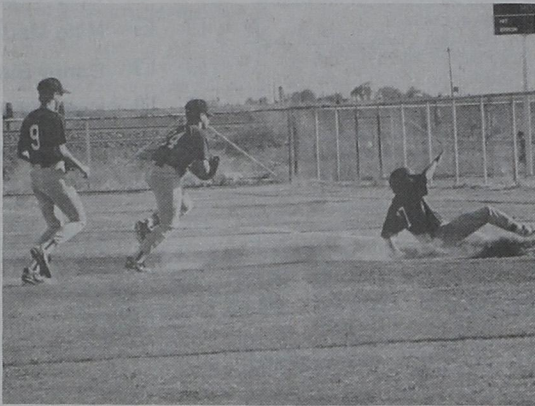

New Discus Record Tops FHS Efforts

A school record toss of 171-11 by Colby Carthel in the discus event highlighted an otherwise "average" performance by both the boys and girls at Canyon Randall's Regional Qualifiers meet last Friday afternoon.

Holders of the meet did one thing right, by having it on Friday, which turned out to be near-perfect. On Saturday, the mercury dropped back into the 30s, with a brisk wind.

Carthel's best throw of the year (his previous best was 163-4 in the district meet at Littlefield) will put his family name back on the discus record at Friona High School. Papa Don held it for 18 years, until Danny Padilla topped the record in 1988.

Andy Kendrick got the other gold-medal for Friona, clearing 14-6 in his specialty, the pole vault. Tony Mejia, who is district alternate in three events, placed third in the long jump at 20-1.5, and in the 300-meter hurdles in 44.26.

Raymond Flores got the Chieftains' other points, finishing third in the triple jump, with a best jump of 38-8.5.

Keri Reeb, who competed in three individual events, got her season's best mark in the long jump at 16-9, and placed first in that event.

Miss Reeb had a 34-6 in the triple jump, and was second to Borger's Kim Miller, who jumped 35-4. Keri, who has a best high jump of 5-5 this season, cleared 5-0 last Saturday, for third place.

Vanette White also had a win for the Squaws, with a 52.49 in the 300-meter hurdles race, above her best mark of the season, as was her 17.0 in the high hurdles, where she was edged by Borger's Joshe Kerr, whose mark was 16.4.

Teresa Juarez got a win in the 1600-meter run with a 6:03.7,

likewise above her season's best time.

"It wasn't a real good regional qualifier's meet," said Squaws coach Dennis Field. For instance, Friona's mile relay team's mark was about 15 seconds off their best.

Chieftain Coach Kenny Austin

had to be away from the team, due to his father having open heart surgery.

Both teams are in action Friday and Saturday at Odessa in the Region I meet. First and second-place finishers there will qualify for the state meet.

Carthel Gets Name Back On Record

When Don Carthel threw the discus 160 feet, two inches in a meet at Abernathy in 1970, he probably didn't give a thought as to what the throw would mean.

For one thing, it was fairly early in the track season, and Carthel was more concerned with advancing to regional and beyond.

But as it turned out, that was his best throw of the year, and when the school's track records were researched, Carthel's effort was the best one found.

"I didn't even make it to regional. There were several good throwers around that year, and apparently I peaked too early," said the former Chieftain star.

But his throw wasn't all that bad, as evidenced by the fact that it held up in the event for 18 years, until Danny Padilla beat it during his good senior year of 1988, when he went all the way to the state meet.

Another Carthel, Don's younger brother Davy, came close to beating the record in the spring of 1976, when he had a best throw of 159-10, only four inches below Don's record. "He came real close to the record two or three times that year," Don says.

Padilla then held the record from the spring of 1988 until April 21 of this year, when the latest Carthel put his name on the record. And he

did it with a series of excellent throws.

He had three throws over 170 feet, and a fourth over 169, beating the former record three times in all. On his first throw in the finals and fourth throw overall, Colby had his 171-11 effort that set the new record.

Colby isn't the only member of his family doing well in track this spring. His sister Courtney also is competing this week at regional in the discus event.

Courtney has thrown the disc 121-0, just two inches shy of the school record for girls.

"Dad had challenged me to top the record, and I put some pressure on myself to do it. Now I seem to be throwing well, and should have a legitimate chance of advancing to state," Colby says.

He competes this weekend at Odessa in the regional meet, against seven of the top discus throwers in over half of the state.

When George Marshall found a nugget of gold in Sutter's Creek, San Francisco became the biggest boom town in history. People from everywhere set out for the American West to claim their fortunes. The *New York Herald* proclaimed, "The El Dorado of the old Spaniards is discovered at last."

At about the same time, Loeb Strauss, a German teen-ager, came to America to fulfill his dreams, bringing with him only his ambition and entrepreneurial attitude. He started as a peddler in New York and changed his name to Levi. Each week, Strauss visited the New York wholesale markets to buy needles, thread and other items to sell to farmers in the surrounding countryside.

In the meantime, Strauss' brother-in-law, David Stern, had gone west to investigate opportunities in the gold mines. After seeing the boom town of San Francisco, Stern wrote to Strauss that the West's real golden opportunity was merchandising. Everything was in demand, especially tent canvas.

Strauss quickly converted his savings into canvas and passage to San Francisco. When he reached the city in 1853, the gold rush was already beginning to dwindle. Tent canvas was no longer a hot item, but there was a need for rugged work clothes.

If you were an investor in San Francisco in 1853 and were offered the opportunity to invest in a gold mine or the start-up business of an immigrant peddler named Levi Strauss, which would you have chosen? Strauss' business offered only hard work and long hours. Gold mines promised instant wealth. However, Strauss began

turning out heavy, durable work trousers made from canvas, and the miners called them "Levi's pants." The first Levi's were patterned after the Genoese sailors' comfortable pants, known as "genes."

How Strauss and another immigrant, Jacob Davis, teamed up to use copper rivets to reinforce the pockets on Levi's, and how the pattern sewn on the hip pockets with orange thread became the first designer trademark in this country, are other Levi's success stories.

The point is that gold mines may go broke, gambling casinos may turn losers, and oil wells may run dry, but businesses that find a legitimate consumer need and meet that need with quality products or services continue to prosper.

In his book, "One Up On Wall Street," Peter Lynch tells investors that the best stocks often are uncovered by following consumers in shopping malls. Retailers offering quality products and good service that meet consumer needs are good companies to own. History has proven this with examples like Sears Roebuck and Wal-Mart.

But one of the best examples of American entrepreneurship, hard work and quality products was given to us by a teen-ager who emigrated from Bavaria more than 140 years ago. Levi Strauss continues to outfit young and old with quality clothing that meets today's fashions.

Whenever you buy a quality product or service, you might want to find out if the company is publicly traded so you can participate in its potential growth and success. Although Levi Strauss is a privately owned company, there are many quality companies--such as Wal-Mart and Pepsico--that are available to individual investors.
