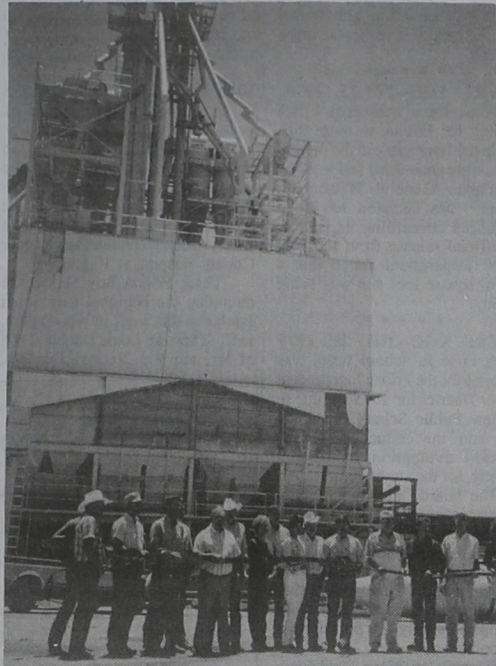

State DEM Asks For More Fed Aid

Texas Division of Emergency Management (DEM) has requested additional federal assistance for fifteen counties adversely affected by the late spring weather system that caused extensive damages to infrastructure and private properties.

Governor George W. Bush declared Llano, Nolan and Tom Green counties disaster areas June 5, and requested a presidential disaster declaration for individual assistance programs, including grants for temporary housing, home repairs, medical and dental expenses and unemployment assistance, as well as low-interest loans.

President Bill Clinton issued a declaration June 13 for Tom Green County only. The decision on Llano and Nolan counties is pending.

DEM subsequently requested declarations enabling individual assistance for Gray, Hidalgo, Parmer, Wheeler and Wilbarger counties.

Public assistance to compensate local and state government for repairs to infrastructure and debris removal has been requested for these counties as well as Childress, Collingsworth, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Hemphill and Wichita counties.

"We would like to invite anyone to come by to bid them farewell," a spokesperson said.

Council voted to adopt a resolution to apply for a grant from Texas Recreation and Parks Account program for a new swimming pool park. Council discussed the grant application for funds to repair the wastewater treatment plant through the disaster relief fund of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Chief John Taylor's police report for the month of June included a total of 226 calls received, plus 288 calls to 911. Plus 23 offenses were reported, 13 arrests made, one juvenile detained, 3 accidents reported resulting in no injuries.

Three Are Injured In Excel Explosion

Three men were injured, one seriously, in an explosion at Friona's Excel plant last Saturday evening.

Santiago Lucio, 61, who lives at Lariat, suffered burns over 30 per cent of his body. The burns were considered first and second-degree burns.

Lucio was airlifted to Lubbock's University Medical Center, and was treated in that facility's burn intensive care unit. By mid-week, Lucio's condition had been upgraded from critical to serious.

Two other workers, Esau Barraza, 26, and Jose Valles, 21, both of Clovis, N.M., were also burned, but not as badly. They were both airlifted to Lubbock, however, as a safety precaution.

Barraza and Valles' burns were considered second and third-degree, and covered less than 15 per cent of their bodies.

The men were working in the bone-processing area of the plant, located in the plant's older portion on the east end.

Valles was actually outside the building. He is an independent contractor who works in a cleanup capacity.

The fortunate part of the event, according to manager Scott Entz, is the fact that no more than three or four employees are in that area at any time. "It is mainly an equipment-orientated room," Entz said.

Investigators from the U. S. Department of Labor, Occupational Safety and Health Administration were to investigate the blast. However, plant officials said they believed that the explosion was related to natural gas, which is used in drying the bones.

The beef bones are sent to the processing area after the rendering process is completed and tallow is removed. They are separated according to size. The small bones are ground up and used as part of animal food. The large bones are exported to Europe for the most part, where they are used for such things as an ingredient in the manufacturing of photographic film.

Very little production time was lost because of the blast. It was fortunate that this area is at the "end" of the production line. Other portions of the plant were not affected.

"We'll just farm out our bone processing for the time being," said Bill Rupp, a plant official.

Entz has only recently moved to the Friona plant, where he will be replacing Rupp as plant manager. One of his first experiences was the night the tornado struck the plant, causing considerable roof damage.

"It has definitely been a hectic introduction to the Friona plant," he said.

Cancer Center Sets Clinic August 16

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic in Friona at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue on Wednesday, August 16.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our program is certified by the FDA, American College of Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning

the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. Financial aid is available for breast screening and mammograms to individuals who qualify.

60 YRS AGO--JUL 26, 1935

Whether it is generally known by the majority of our citizens or not, it is nevertheless a fact that our city commission has levied what it calls a street tax on all citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years, of \$1.00 each. Purpose of the tax is to make an effort to keep our streets and gutters in passable and presentable condition. It is also provided that this tax may be paid in labor if the citizen so desires, rather than cash, and the rate of pay shall be \$2 per day, so that a married man may pay for himself and his wife with a day's labor.

55 YRS AGO--JUL 26, 1940

The political rally and pie supper at the grade school building last Thursday sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary was pronounced a successful affair, except that the attendance could have been better.

Five of the candidates for Congress were present. They were Louis Goodrich, Deskins Wells, Henry S. Bishop, James O. Cade and Lewis Fields. The three candidates for state legislature also were present and spoke.

45 YRS AGO--JUL 21, 1950

Announcement of construction of a 200,000 bushel elevator addition to the local Santa Fe Grain Company was made jointly in Ft. Worth and Friona Tuesday morning. The new unit, comprised of six bins, will raise the capacity of the local elevator to 715,000 bushels and will be built just to the east of the present elevator. G. 25 YRS AGO--JUL 23, 1970

Plans for a new post office building for Friona, to more than double the floor space at the present office, were announced this week by Postmaster General Wilson M. Blount. No decision has been announced concerning the site as the official release from the Post Office Department stated that a 22,400 square foot site was being sought.

20 YRS AGO--JUL 20, 1975

A raise in school taxes was approved for the Friona Independent School District for 1975-76, due to the new Public School Financing Law and the reduction of the assessed evaluation of district property, for the current year.

The board, after much study and discussion, voted to raise the ratio on real estate from 37.5 per cent of the evaluation to 50 per cent, and reduce the tax rate from \$1.80 to \$1.55. This would bring about an increase in real estate taxes of approximately 14 per cent, it was pointed out.

Deposits at Friona State Bank set a record for mid-year, it was revealed this week. The bank's June 30 statement revealed that Friona State Bank had deposits of \$20,842,645.42. This was a healthy 12.5 per cent increase over the total of \$18,526,573.11 which the bank had on deposit at the same time a year earlier.

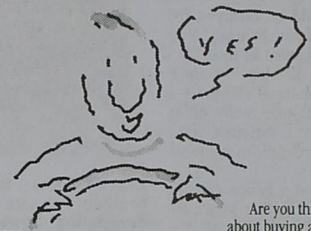
5 YRS AGO--AUG 4, 1990

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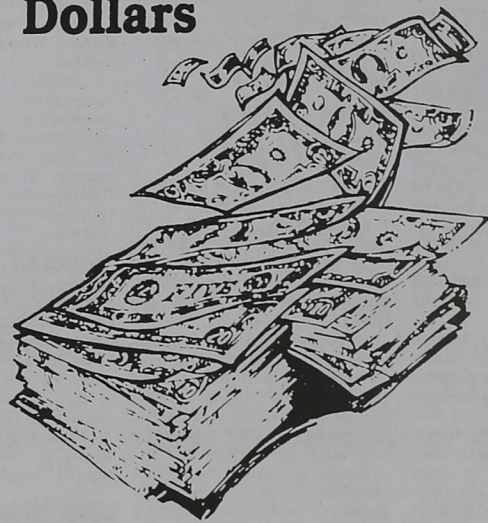



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Parmer County Cattlemen Give Cool Season Matua Hot Reviews

Funeral Services Are Held For Lois Austin

Funeral services for Lois W. Austin, 69, of Friona, were held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 11, 1995 at First Baptist Church with the Rev. Don Kimbrough of Friona and Rev. Hub Collier, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home. Mrs. Austin died July 15 at Parmer County Community Hospital. Born July 12, 1926 in Quanah, Texas, she married Gordon Austin on September 5, 1975 in Las Vegas, Nevada. He preceded

her in death on June 6, 1984. She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Friona and Modern Study Club. She has made her home in Friona since January of 1992, moving here from Santa Maria, California, where she had lived thirty years. She retired from managing a jewelry store there in 1991 prior to moving to Friona. Survivors include one son, Bob Sparks of Bovina; two daughters, Judy Rhodes of Friona and Cookie Bouslaugh of Durango, Colorado; six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Cattlemen and dairy producers throughout the plains states who have been using Matua bromegrass in their operations are coming in with some very promising results. "The interest is high," according to Bob McBride, Oklahoma NRCS field man, of Boise City, Oklahoma. "Our recent field day on Matua was attended by fifty-four people from four states. They like what they see, but they do have a lot of questions." Matua grazed near Boise City last year provided 270 days of grazing (March-November) and 1400 pounds of gain per acre during one of the most severe summers on record.

This year began for most producers with a mild winter that allowed them to graze even newly established stands of Matua straight through the winter. Some near Muleshoe have carefully monitored over 30,000 "head-days" on a 120 acre circle from mid-November to May 31.

"We haven't found the 'catch' yet," says Boyd Magby, a Parmer County cattleman. "It does seem too good. We've tried to find the flaw in it. We can't find it." Boyd and his son, Skip Magby of Lazbuddie, have already produced and sold 1150 pounds of beef per acre off their Matua from October to April and moved a second set of cattle (400-455 pound calves) on in May.

"Even with that stocking rate (over 1500 pounds per acre) we needed to hay half of it to catch up this spring," says Skip. "I have no doubt that we're looking at more than a ton of gain per acre in 12 months." The Magbys plan to add another 600 acres of Matua this fall.

Because Matua continues to grow through the summer months, these producers are expecting 365 grazing days with Matua this season, but only because of the exceptionally mild winter. During most years, Matua will need to be rested during January and February in these areas.

While producers throughout the region are intrigued about the upper "limits" production potential of Matua, there are others, faced with ever-increasing machinery costs and soil erosion concerns, who see it as an opportunity to get away from planting wheat year after year.

"We can 'graze out' wheat each year and then replant, or graze 'right on through' with Matua," Skip said. "It's really not much of a choice. We're running three times as many pounds per acre as we can on wheat and doing it nearly three times as long."

In every region of the country, cattlemen are finding that the cattle show a real preference for the Matua, and they are performing well on it. Dairy heifers consistently gain two pounds per day on the grass and beef steers two and a half or more.

Producers are also finding out another important point--Matua responds to management. Adequate fertility affects not only yield, but also energy, protein content and stand life. This cool season grass can extend the season best in a system where it is almost abused for short periods and then receives time to recover or rest each rotation. Matua persists best under a rotational grazing system in which it can receive a 25-30 day rest each rotation or in a monthly harvesting hay system.

Allowing a 50-day rest period will be sufficient for Matua to drop mature seed that can thicken the stand if needed. Continuous reseeding or seed production is not recommended as this can result in loss of stand vigor and disease resistance due to head smut infection.

Pressure Canner Testing

The dial gauge on pressure canners should be checked at least once each year, and more if the canner is used frequently or if the lid is dropped or receives a hard knock.

The Parmer County Extension Home Economics Committee is sponsoring a canner check on Monday, July 24. Just bring your canner by Friona State Bank from 1-6 p.m. There will be no charge.

In order to ensure you are preserving your food in as safe a manner as possible, make plans to attend this canner check workday.

Any type of seed that appears untreated or is not certified should be avoided. Planting a seed with a clearly visible fungicide treatment (i.e. Easy-Drill) will help prevent the initial introduction of head smut into the stand, and practices that might spread smut spores throughout the field should be avoided.

On the Shelton Ranch near Dalhart, Buryl Miller manages over 600 acres of Matua that was drilled into existing bluestem last fall. "I've never seen anything like it," he says. "We're running 1300-1400 pounds per acre, and the grass is way ahead of us."

"According to Miller, many of the cattle have gained in the 2.6-2.8 pounds per day range. They are now on their second set of cattle. Owner Jim Shelton says, "We are really pleased with the Matua for now--

we're looking to see how it performs this summer and into the fall."

The three circles are divided into quarters and each stocked with 550-650 head. "Areas where we have abused the grass," says Miller, "actually look the best--it seems to come right on back in no time."

In Deaf Smith County, cattleman Bob Briggs is running nearly 320 pounds of beef per acre on a circle of Matua north of Hereford. Like many producers who are gaining experience with the grass, Briggs feels that he could hay roughly half of the circle each spring and never miss it in the grazing system. That hay fits right into the management program when cattle are moved to the corners or to nearby native pasture during wet periods.

This is especially important on

tighter soils. This spring when running a trencher through the field, Briggs discovered that Matua has a very impressive root system. "We traced roots all the way to 36-48 inches," he says. "We were really dry this spring, but I never would have believed they would go down that far."

Root growth and plant re-growth are closely tied to grazing height. Leaving 1/3-1/2 of the grass and moving on in a faster rotation allows root growth to continue and gives plants the ability to recover more quickly. This type of rotation also helps maintain higher quality forage in the system which further increases animal performance.

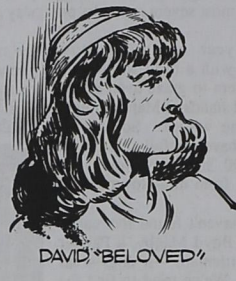

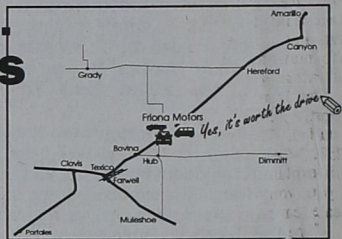

Summer School Well Received

Project S.M.A.R.T. summer school, for students this summer in grades 1 thru 5, was a six-week program at Friona Elementary School. S.M.A.R.T. stands for Summer Math and Reading Term.

There were 77 students enrolled and the average daily attendance was 59 students.

Students worked on math and reading skills daily and went to the computer lab twice weekly. In addition, students were involved in various arts and crafts activities and had some fun and educational experiences with cooking, kite-flying, and visiting various community businesses (Friona Police and Fire Department, the public library, and Friona State Bank.)

Overall, the program seems to have been successful and has helped students to enhance or maintain the reading and math skills they had at the end of the regular school term,

The 19-year-old Fort Worth driver, who was arrested in Curry County last week following a high-speed chase across Parmer County and into New Mexico, was still being held in the Clovis jail this week.

A spokesman in the Parmer County Sheriff's office said that Parmer County is waiting to make several charges against the man, when the folks in New Mexico get through with him.

Irrigation Water Management Vital

Irrigation water management is the process of scheduling water applications to meet crop requirements in a timely and efficient manner, and to effectively use available irrigation water to supplement rainfall conditions, while maintaining crop yield potential and quality through the growing season.

Widespread heavy pumpage of ground water during the past two years as a result of drought conditions has heightened awareness that improvements are needed to reduce pumping costs and save water. Many producers have equipped their farms with center pivot sprinkler systems which achieve both objectives. While the sprinkler system may achieve the ultimate agricultural water conservation goal, it is not the only alternative available to reduce pumping costs while maintaining adequate water for profitable crop yields across the area.

A small percentage of farms in the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District still have some open, unlined ditches in use, these ditches have water losses of one to two acre-feet per 100 feet of ditch per irrigation season. If the producer plans to continue furrow irrigation during the next several years, PVC pipe could be purchased to transport water, the use of PVC pipe saves money due to reduced pumpage. Adding a surge valve would increase the application efficiency about 20 percent.

A partial drop center pivot system has the same water savings as surge irrigation, center pivots can apply smaller amounts of water in a more timely manner than surge irrigation, also, center pivot systems reduce labor costs normally associated with furrow irrigation.

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 3.46 feet in 1994. This represents a decrease of 283,581 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogalalla aquifer last year in Parmer County.

The Llano Estacado Farm Tour is a joint programming effort of the Parmer, Bailey, Castro and Lamb County Extension offices. Participants will be viewing result demonstration fields and test plots that are in progress in the area. Four continuing education units (CEU's) will be offered towards Private applicator license recertification.

Some of the tour highlights include: Multi-county cotton variety test plot--Ted Magness farm; Irrigation Efficiency Test, Buctril resistant cotton test, seedling disease test--Phipps farm; and corn insecticides and IR corn--Bodkin Farm.

A noon meal and awards program will be sponsored by the Texas Corn Producers Board, and Hyman Fertilizer of Dimmit and Bovina. Area Extension Specialists will be on hand to answer questions throughout the tour.

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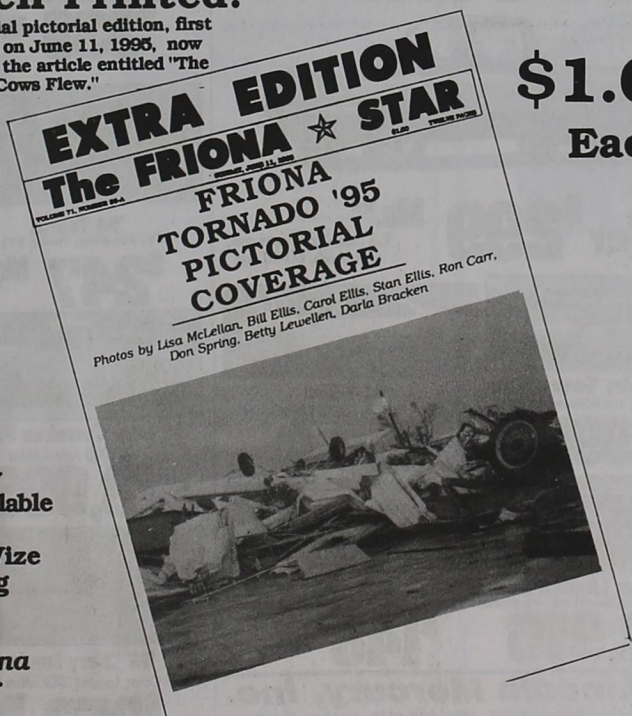

*The board approved the following policy on fighting for junior high school and high school students for the 1995-96 school year.

FIGHTING

Fighting is engaging in contact for the purpose of inflicting harm on another person. Fighting may occur on school property during school hours or at any school related extracurricular activity or event.

Disciplinary action will include the following action:

1. Parents of the students involved will be contacted and a conference held with the parents and students at the earliest possible time.

2. School discipline action will result in five days of placement in the alternative classroom. (Subsequent offenses will result in the action mentioned and could lead to expulsion.)

3. A conference will be held with parents and students before students return to classes. If hostilities still exist between the students involved, further placement in the alternative classroom could result.

4. Appropriate law enforcement officials may be contacted and a complaint filed. This will be determined by the nature of the fight and the age of the students. When a complaint is filed, it will be for disorderly conduct which is a Class C misdemeanor and is punishable by law with a maximum fine of \$500.00.

ASSAULT

An assault is a physical attack of one person, or a group of persons, upon another person, who does not wish to engage in the conflict. Disciplinary action will include the action outlined under fighting. School disciplinary action will be a minimum of five days of placement in the alternative classroom. (Subsequent offenses could lead to expulsion.)

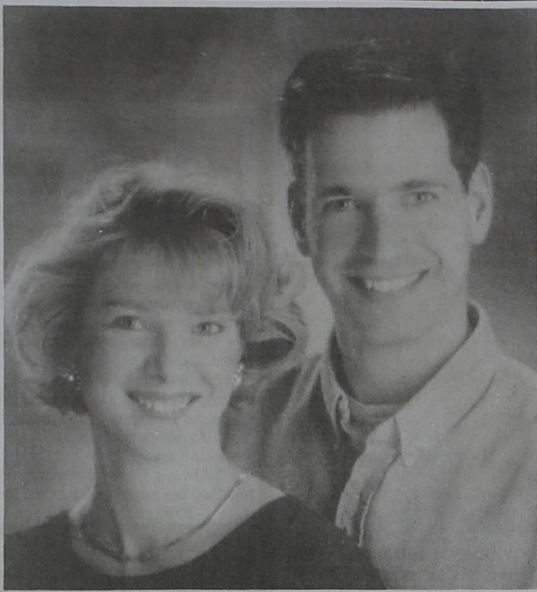

Registration will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, August 5. There will be door prizes, displays, concessions, sporting events and a special postmark commemorating

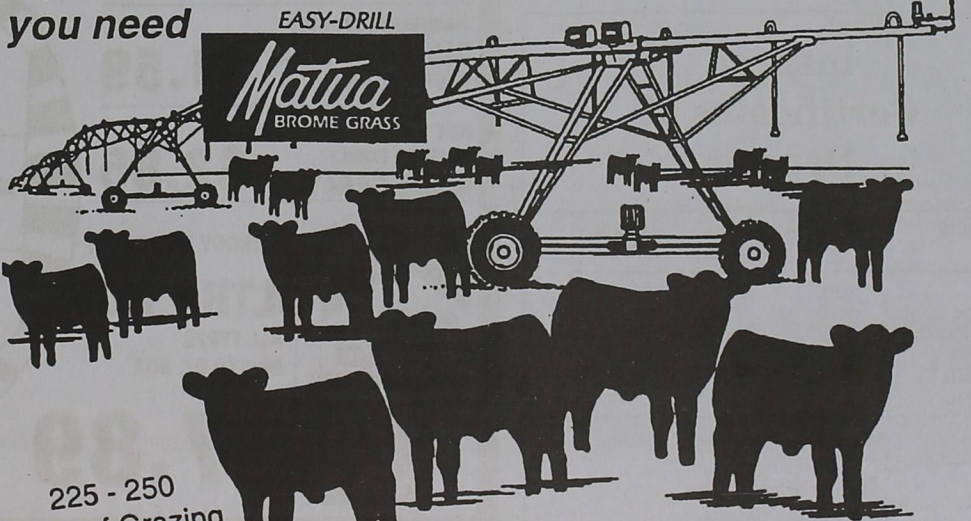
the school's 64th anniversary. A reception celebrating fifty years of F.H.A. will be held in the home economics room from 3-4:30 p.m.

Investment Butterflies Often Get Cooked

I recently received a call from an investor who wanted to know how the stock market's current performance was affecting his investments. After I learned that his investments were insured tax-free bonds, I asked some specific questions: Do you still receive the regular income checks that you were promised? Yes. Have your investment objectives changed? No. Do you want to sell your bonds and stop receiving this regular income? No.

Even though the daily fluctuations of the stock market were small, the investor panicked at every movement. On top of that, he did not understand that bonds are affected by interest rate fluctuations, not the stock market. When the media reported a decrease in the market, this investor was afraid that soon his investment and its income would disappear.

Unfortunately, many investors are unnecessarily plagued by similar concerns. If anything negative occurs in the markets or the economy, they want to sell their securities and move the money to what may appear to be safer (and often more popular) ground. Louis Rukeyser calls such investors "butterflies," flitting to the flower of the moment.

However, to achieve success, investors might be better off following the example of the turtle, which doesn't move around very much but generally manages to live long life through all kinds of

weather.

Individuals who identify their objectives and carefully select a diversity of investments can avoid having to move money around in response to changing conditions. Of course, a major change in financial objectives--for example, moving from your working years to retirement--can be good cause for restructuring.

The late Paul Cabot, co-founder of State Street Investment Corp., the nation's second-oldest mutual fund, was a proponent of long-term investing. He believed that focusing on long-term trends, not short-term speculation, was the only way to give individual investors a fair chance.

State Street Investment Corp. faced turbulent times in its early years--the 1929 stock market crash, the Great Depression, World War II and more. Yet no investor who held shares of the fund for ten years ever lost money--a remarkable testament to long-term investing.

Securities markets move up and down, interest rates fluctuate, economies go through cycles--and investment performance changes, too. As long as the companies and agencies underlying your investments remain sound, and your financial objectives stay the same, short-term fluctuations should not alter your investment strategy.

"Butterflies" who flit from one hot investment to another often wind up getting cooked. Turtles, on the other hand, are patient, steady and not so sensitive to changing conditions--a good lesson for successful investing.
