IF CATTLE FEEDERS and raisers didn't already have enough problems with their declining market, an idiotic organization from Washington, D. C. exploited elementary school children in Amarillo in an attempt to further their animal rights cause.

But the PETA representatives (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals) may have met their matches in the Amarillo school officials, who refused to allow the Washington-based group entry to their school campuses.

So, the group, featuring a seven-foot-tall "Cris P. Carrot," met the children on the sidewalks in front of two schools. A number of children were given fliers and buttons which read "Meat Stinks," and "Eat your veggies--not your friends."

The Washington-based representatives tried to suggest that the beef industry is a "violent, bloody industry," charging cruelty to animals as their main theme.

The fliers handed out also said "Hamburgers are really cows who have been separated from their families and killed," and "Bacon and bologna are really little piggies who are taken in crowded, smelly trucks to their deaths."

Walt Barnhart, acting director of the National Livestock and Meat Board in Chicago, defended the beef industry. "Producers of meat are good caretakers of the environment and very concerned about giving good treatment to the animals they raise," Barnhart said. "Obviously, PETA believes it is not appropriate to use animals for food, but we do," he continued.

Many parents were upset that a radical organization could hand out leaflets and make unwanted statements to their children.

One woman even made her own sign that said "Beef eaters don't exploit children."

Three men, apparently beef supporters, decided to set up a grill on the sidewalk across the street from the "Carrot" episode. They busily grilled hamburgers, and the barbecue smell wafted across on the breeze.

One man said: "Just offer the kids their choice of a good hamburger, or a carrot, and see which one they choose."

THE CURRENT movement toward recycling materials, such as aluminum, glass, newspapers, etc., set us to thinking recently.

All the time Ye Editor was growing up, when you purchased soft drinks at the grocery stores, you paid a deposit on the bottles, and when you came in for a new batch, you brought your bottles as your new deposit.

Bottles were returned to the bottling plants, where they were washed, sanitized, re-filled with cola, and sent back out to the stores. By being careful with them, bottles were re-used for years. You could tell, because many of them had a date, along with a bottling location imprinted on the bottoms of the bottles.

No-Smoking On School Property

According to FHS Principal Frank Belcher, new legislation passed this summer prohibits smoking at all times on all school property, during school activities.

As the Friona Chiefs look toward their first home game September 22, it is important to note to fans that smoking is now prohibited anywhere on the football field property.

Previously, smoking was prohibited only in the stands during games, allowing fans to leave the stands but smoke on school property.

This is no longer the case. Fans are prohibited from smoking in the stadium on school property. School personnel and law enforcement agencies are allowed to enforce the policies.

Exit Test Schedules Are Given

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) or the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this fall.

Testing will be on the following dates: TAAS--October 23, writing; October 25, mathematics; October 26, reading; TEAMS--October 25, mathematics; October 26, English language arts.

All individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test(s) must register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements.

The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test(s) are those who are no longer enrolled in school who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test or a student who will be testing in a district other than the district that they are enrolled in. A registration packet may be picked up at any high school campus, district central office or education service center.

Your completed registration form must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5 p.m., September 22.

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Local Lady Has Book Of Poetry Published

Since the recent publication of "Electric Fence...and Other Stories About Cowboys and Indians," by T. & L. Publishing Company, Amarillo, things have not been the same at the Crump residence at 610 Greene Avenue in Friona.

That's where Lucy, the drawer-opening cat, and her owner, Mary Dalton Crump, a retired Hi-Pro Feeds employee, live.

Of course, Lucy still keeps busy prowling through drawers while Mary is writing more poetry, but the tempo has changed.

The first printing of this book of humorous cowboy poetry has already sold out and the second one is scheduled to come off the press in the near future.

The author reports, "I have been writing poetry for many years and enjoy it very much. Friends have encouraged me to have some of my works published for a long time but this is my first literary venture."

"I'm real proud of the book," she continued, "and feel deeply indebted to Linda and Pat Henry for their assistance."

"Electric Fence...and Other Stories About Cowboys and Indians," is dedicated to The Southwest Cowboy Poet's Association of Amarillo, of which Mary is a member.

Mary and her husband, the late James Crump, and their two children, Gary and Patti, moved to a farm northwest of town from Littlefield in 1964.

Gary, who is deceased,

graduated from Friona High School in 1969 and Patti graduated six years later. She and her husband, Johnny Arrington, and his son, Joe, live in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Mary and James both grew up in the Paducah area and were friends in high school. Following their marriage they lived in Dallas a few years before he joined the United States Navy and served in the Pacific during World War II.

Following James' discharge they spent several years operating Willson-Crump Lumber Yard in Floydada and Littlefield, where they lived sixteen years before moving to Parmer County.

As a member of The Southwest Cowboy Poet's Association of Amarillo, Mary performs often as the headliner at the regular second Saturday morning breakfasts at The Big Texan.

She also belongs to the Poetry Society of Texas, the Democratic party and the Methodist Church.

To date she has won many awards, monies and otherwise and is to be congratulated upon the publication of this, her first book of humorous poetry.

Although Mary grew up in the middle of ranching country, she did not come from a ranching family. Her family owned a music store on the square in Paducah and every Saturday night the cowboys would gather at the music store, so she got acquainted with every cowboy for miles around without living on a ranch.

In the fall, the busy time of the year, the store would stay open until midnight on Saturday nights. The Dalton family lived in the back of the store, so on many nights, Mary went to sleep listening to "Little Joe, The Wrangler," and "Strawberry Roan."

With Mary's permission, here's a sample of the contents of the book:

Our new electric fence.
(To keep the stupid cattle in,

They don't have too much sense.)

We hooked it up and tested it,
To see if it was hot.
I barely touched it with my boot

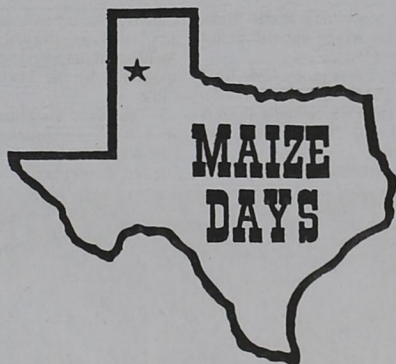
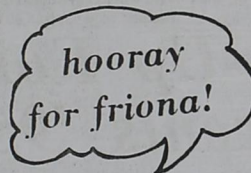

Farmers Reminded Of Nearing Deadlines

A notice from the county's Farm Service Agency (nee USDA) this week warned farmers of approaching dates, as follows:

Insurance Dates:

The final date to cancel current insurance coverage on small grains is September 30, 1995. In order to cancel your insurance coverage on your 1996 small grains, written notice of your intent to do so must be provided to your crop insurance provider no later than September 30, 1995.

If you plan to change insurance providers, you must provide written notification to your current carrier

prior to September 30, 1995.

Please be aware that you have a continuous insurance contract. Coverage will automatically renew on September 30, 1995, with your present provider if you do not provide written notice to cancel your contract.

If you are purchasing insurance for the first time on any small grain (barley, wheat), the final date to do this is September 30, 1995.

CRP Signup Announced:
The 13th CRP signup will be conducted September 11th through the 22nd. The focus of this signup will be placing only environmentally sensitive land into CRP. A limit of 651,000 acres will be accepted during this bid period.

Basic requirements for eligibility have changed. A new system will be used in ranking applications and caps will be established on each bid. These bid caps will be unique to each parcel of land and will be provided to the applicant before submitting a bid. Any bid submitted that exceeds the bid cap will be rejected.

Mustangs Stumble At Olton

Bovina High School's Mustangs were overmatched by class AA Olton, which looks to be a power in their district, in last Friday night's season opener for both teams.

When the dust had settled, Olton's variety of Mustangs came out on top, 47-7.

Martin Reyna led Bovina's offensive department, picking up 92 yards on only four carries, including a 78-yard scamper for Bovina's only touchdown.

Olton was potent both by land and by air. They gained 404 yards rushing, and 129 yards passing, where Olton's quarterback Paul Armanza completed six of ten attempts.

Bovina was led on defense by Jesse Villarreal with 13 tackles, and by Marrufo with 11.

Michael Wilborn piled up 239 yards and scored four TDs for Olton.

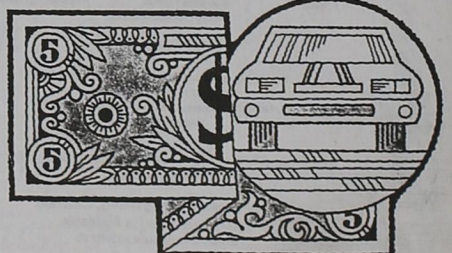

Chieftains Snag Rare Win Over River Rd.

The Friona Chieftains were picked by the "experts" to finish last in the district and lose to River Road by 19 points.

Coach James Morton put it in perspective in his pep rally speech, "I put a football down by all those pieces of paper with picks and predictions, and you know what? That football didn't move. And it never will. Those predictions will never move that football."

Maybe those "experts" were basing their predictions on the fact that Friona hadn't beaten River Road since 1989. Or maybe they were looking at the number of starters Friona lost to graduation in May. Whatever they used, the "experts" were wrong.

The Chiefs capitalized early on mistakes made by the Wildcats. "Our special teams are doing a great job. We've always rushed the

kicker and we always will," said Morton.

"We take a lot of pride in our swarming defense."

River Road muffed three punt snaps, two of which the Chiefs turned into touchdowns.

The first missed snap gave Friona the ball at the River Road 11-yard line. A pass from quarterback Kyle Grimsley to Lance Looper scored the touchdown, with Angel Vera adding the point-after for a 7-0 Chieftain lead.

The next snap error took the ball to the Wildcat one-yard line. From there, Rusty Simmons was able to push across the goal-line to make the score 13-0.

Then, the momentum shifted when River Road took possession and drove for four first downs. Quarterback Rowdy Lundegreen made a lateral pass to Jesse Pitt, who raced 21 yards for a touchdown just 34 seconds before the half.

That was enough to wake up the Chieftains. On Friona's first play, Lance Looper busted through a hole in the line and raced 60 yards to the River Road two yard line.

Once again, Rusty Simmons pushed through for the TD. A two-point conversion play failed, but didn't dampen the spirits of the Chieftains as they went to the locker-room at half-time holding a 19-7 lead.

"Lance's big run gave us the momentum going into the half," said Coach Morton. "We had the wind going into the third quarter, as if that really matters. I never feel comfortable against River Road until the final buzzer sounds". The boys must have felt the same way, because they came back out ready to play.

(Editor's note: Coach Morton had a right to feel uneasy. The last two years the Wildcats had snatched last-minute wins, and have had the habit of coming from behind to defeat the Chieftains in the games they have won against Friona.)

River Road started the second half with a series of turnovers. The Wildcats began to get rattled and knew they had to make a big play, but their passing game wasn't working.

Angel Vera deflected a pass, and when the ball came down on

his chest, wrestled to keep it away from the River Road receiver.

That play took the Chieftains back down the field where Angel kicked a field goal, making the score 22-7. "We went for the field goal because we didn't want them to be able to win by just scoring twice," said Morton.

The Chieftains showed character even when things were not going real well. During a break out run by the Wildcats, Angel Vera stripped the ball from the runner just before he reached the goal-line, and Daniel Cuevas scooped it up.

When the other guys were congratulating him for getting the ball, Cuevas replied, "Well, it was my fault that the guy got all the way down there anyway".

In the final minutes of the game, Andy Kendrick swept out on the wishbone offense. Fending off tackles and crashing down the edge of the sidelines, he pulled off a 42-yard run. With Vega's PAT, the final score was 29-7.

The front four, Casey Renner, Lance Looper, Hugo Santiago, and Quint Ellis look to be a real powerhouse this season. "Our front four are going to be quicker than anyone else we play," said Morton. "And the highlight of the game was our defense."

Leonard Alvarado paced the defense with 15 tackles, followed by Hugo Santiago with eight, and Rusty Simons and Lance Looper, each with seven.

Due to their solid win over River Road, the Chiefs were chosen as the Amarillo Globe News "Team of the Week". In addition, Andy Kendrick was on the honorable mention list for "Player of the Week."

At Tucumcari, the Chiefs are looking to get better at fundamentals like blocking and tackling. The real threat will come from their 6'4" quarterback, (who, incidentally, is the son of an ex-Squaw, all-state basketball player Glenda McClellan.)

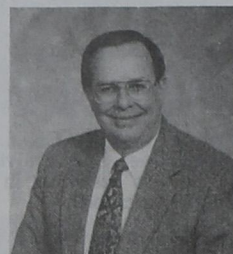
Also, the Rattler's running back was the Globe News' Player of the Week, and will be a force to contend with.

"They run the ball well," said Coach Morton. "We'll have to recognize what they do on their sets and call a lot of plays off that".

The Friona Junior Varsity continued their winning ways last week as they trounced the River Road JV 20-6.

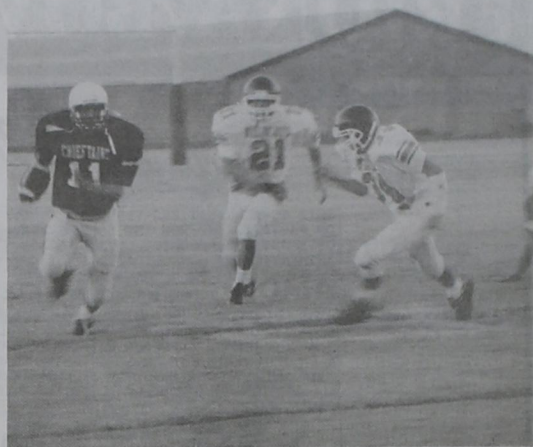
According to Coach Bob Ferguson, "The River Road JV offense did not score. The six-points they managed was a returned fumble by the defense."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, and approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10%-30%	\$ 5,000
30%-50%	7,500
50%-70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

Tim, a Friona native, is the son of Steve and Willene Baxter Grundy and Opal's grandson.

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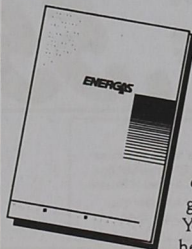

The Friona Chieftains' 29-7 opening night victory over River Road snapped a four-year losing streak to the Wildcats, and served as Coach James Morton's first win over the Road in four attempts.

In fairness to Coach Morton, it should be pointed out that his three losses to the Wildcats were by a total of only ten points. The Chiefs lost 20-19 here in Morton's first season, 1992. Friona lost in 1993 on a last-second field goal, 17-15 and 27-20 here last year on a TD with 1:30 left in the game.

The victory was Friona's ninth win in the series to ten wins for the Wildcats. The teams have met 19 times on the gridiron, starting in 1978.

Friona's 22-point victory margin is the most since that first meeting in 1978, which was River Road's first year to play varsity sports. Friona won that game, 40-6.

The game has served as the season opener for the two teams since 1982. They have played every year since 1978, and played

twice in '82, in both the season-opener at Amarillo and in a bi-district playoff game at Hereford. The Wildcats won both games that year, serving as "bookends" on the Chieftains' schedule.

Children And Sunglasses

Anytime you'd put sunblock on a child, put sunglasses on, too. That's the advice of the chief of ophthalmology at Children's Mercy Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri. Sun-

glass protection is advised in the prolonged intense sunlight you'd find in a day at the beach or pool. Children have less pigment in the lens of the eye, leaving them more open to ultraviolet damage.

What's important in sunglasses for a child is that they have tough polycarbonate lenses approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI), that the lenses not be warped and that they block ultraviolet rays by 95 per cent or more. The darkness of the lens is no indication of the protection it offers; in fact, too-dark lenses without UV protection could even damage the eye. A high price may reflect no more than a designer frame.

And no matter how much a child likes the sunglasses, they are not for all-the-time wear, which could inhibit natural development.
