Exit Tests Set For July

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or more sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) or the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this July.

TAAS testing will be on the following dates: July 15, writing; July 16, mathematics; and July 17, reading.

TEAMS testing will be on the following dates: July 16, mathematics; and July 17, English Language Arts.

All individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test must register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements. Individuals who have met

high school graduation requirements.

The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test are those who are no longer enrolled in school who longer enrolled in school who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test or a student who will be testing in a district other than the district that they are enrolled in.

A registration packet may be picked up at high school campus, district central office, or education service center.

Completed registration forms must be received in Iowa City, Iowa no later than 5 p.m. June 13, 1997.

Bank Depository Vote: An Adventure

Vote: An Adventure

It took several votes, over a pair of County Commissioners' meetings, but Parmer County's official bank depository for a four-year period, 1997-2001, was finally approved.

Friona State Bank was awarded the county's bank business, but it wasn't as easy as it sounds.

When the bids were first opened on April 21, the bid was awarded to Muleshoe State Bank.

However, Jerry Hinkle, representing Friona State Bank, pointed out that the bid submitted by the Muleshoe bank did not comply with the specifications outlined by the Commissioners Court in their bid instructions.

After some discussion, a motion was passed to rescind the previous motion, and allow the court to seek legal advice on the application format.

Another motion was passed that the applications submitted be tabled for further discussion.

After a recess, another attempt to accept the bid by Muleshoe State Bank was denied by a 4-0 vote of the court. The commissioners also voted to have the bids re-submitted on May 12.

Hinkle again addressed the court and asked that it be noted that he protested the fact that the commissioners declined the bid made by his bank, which were completely in accord with the form provided by Parmer County.

When the commissioners re-convened on April 28, the court again discussed the bid matter to a great extent, particularly the two bids which had been received.

After much discussion, Tom Ware made a motion to rescind the April 21 motion to have the bank services re-bid. This motion passed, 4-0.

Then, Raymond McGehee made a motion and John Tannahill seconded, to accept the bid submitted by Friona State Bank for the county bank depository. The motion was carried unanimously.

County Sales Tax Revenue Is Received

State Comptroller of Public Accounts John Sharp distributed city sales and use tax for April to Texas counties.

Parmer County received a total of \$18, 691.16. The comparable period payment last year was \$23,588.29, a 20.76% decrease.

last year was \$23,588.29, a 20.76% decrease.

For the current April period, Bovina received \$1,446.09, down 7.76 %. Farwell received \$3,227.87, an increase of 11.76% and Friona got \$14,017.20, down 26.73%.

1997 payments to date for the county total \$92,223.78, which is 10.56% behind last year's year-todate revenue of \$103,114.47.

Both Bovina and Farwell are slightly ahead of last year, but the comptroller's office report shows Friona sales tax revenue down for the year by 14.58%.



We have sayings to describe liars too. "He would lie when the truth sounds better." "Don't believe a word he says."
And my favorite: "He would rather climb a tree to tell a lie than stand on the ground and tell the truth."
We apply medical terms to lying. How about chronic liar, habitual liar, or pathological liar.
I have heard people say that sometimes lying just makes life easier. Tell people what they want to hear and ret en with it.

makes life easier. Tell people what they want to hear and get on with it.

They seem to think that lying is okay as long as it doesn't hurt anybody.

Speaking of hurt, sometimes we lie about a relative or a disease or a tragedy to spare a person from anguish until they are well enough to handle the truth.

Telling the truth is one of the main virtues we try to instill in our children. At least most parents do. I think a few parents might actually teach their kids how to lie but I don't have any proof.

From an early age, we tell them stories about "The Little Boy Who Cried Wolf", George Washington and the Cherry Tree, and, of course, Honest Abe.

If you know the real truth but say nothing, is that a form of lying?

The reason I thought about lying this week is because of the Timothy McVeigh trial. (Of course we could throw the O.J. trial in there too.)

A young couple, Michael and Lori Fortier, were friends of McVeigh. They all hung out together, drank beer, did some drugs, and generally just coasted aimlessly about.

Timothy told them all Telling the truth is one of

Timothy told them all about his plans to blow up a building. They didn't take him serious, even after Timothy and Michael drove to Oklahoma City and circled the block around the Murrah Building.

Driving along the Interstate with the windows rolled down, smoking and drinking beer, Timothy told his buddy almost every detail of his plans to blow up a building.

At one point I guess McVeigh asked Fortier to help him do it. Thinking he wasn't serious anyway, Fortier declined to be a part of it.

After the bombing, Fortier was shocked. When the FBI finally tracked him down, he reverted to the dirty diaper defense. He lied. There is a major difference in lying to mommy about a dirty diaper and lying to the FBI. In both cases, you are just trying to save your butt.

So Michael and Lori Fortier wisely decided to cooperate and tell the whole truth. But as often happens to all liars, their credibility is now being questioned.

"If they lied before, are they lying now?" It is a question that is second only to the meaning of life.

Can you ever trust a liar? Especially one that has a reputation for lying. Can a liar be rehabilitated?

Timothy McVeigh's lawyers are calling the Fortier's every name in the book. Dope smoking, drug dealin', slime ball and sleaze bag are just a few of the adjectives I have heard on bag are just a few of the adjectives I have heard on TV.

One well-dressed lawyer who no doubt is a Christian do-gooder with a forgiving heart, told reporters that you "can't trust" people who take amphetamines like candy and act like sleazey petty thieves.

Maybe so. The Fortiers have told a riveting and damaging tale implicating Timothy McVeigh. Yes they traded their truthful testimony for immunity from murder prosecution. I believe I would have too.

Everybody is making a big issue of why they lied in the first place. They said

they were scared. (Have you ever been scared enough to

they were scared. (Have you ever been scared enough to lie?)

Here is my dilemma. I believe the Fortiers are telling the truth. I believe they were scared out of their socks at first and panicked.

I believe that people can change. I believe that drunks can get sober and liars can tell the truth. I believe lives can change. I believe we need to find a way to strengthen our trust and faith in people.

So, I pronounce this as "Love Your Liar" Week. Liars don't like to be told that they are lying. It is called denial.


Tell your favorite liar a lie this week, then say "there, how did you like that?"

"Repairing suburban and rural mailboxes improves the appearance of our community and makes delivering and receiving mail safer for our carriers and customers," Rogers says.

The Postal Service makes this yearly request because of the wear and tear that occurs to mailboxes every year.

Some of the typical activities that may need to be taken include: replacing loose hinges on mailbox door, repainting a mailbox that may have rusted or started peeling, remounting a mailbox post if lossened, and replacing or adding house numbers.

If a homeowner plans to install a new mailbox or replace a worn one, he or she (Continued on Page 6)

Wiegand cleared 10-3 on his last try, to dislodge Kendrick from second place. T. J. Henderson of Clifton, the other vaulter from Region I, also cleared 15 feet, but Andy had fewer overall misses, to win the medal.

Kendrick dismissed the weather as being a big factor. "It wasn't that bad. In fact, we had a little tail wind. I just didn't jump well today," said the Chieftain senior.

Having had to compete in everything from bitter cold to sandstorms, and a district meet with rain, hail and a tornado scare, most observers felt the weather for the past track season was the worst they could remember.

So, it should not be too surprising that the bad stuff followed the athletes all the way to the state meet.



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



Different agencies came together and united at Kansas City on the first and third Wednesdays of each month and formed large "Land Excursion Trains". These trains reached the Friona area the following day. Each train brought 250-500 possible land buyers. Many of these bought tracts of land containing 160 acres up to 640 acres. They were then converted from grassland to farmland. Many of the new owners soon built homes

and settled there with their family. All of this was made possible by the Santa Fe Railroad.

The railroad brought more than just eager settlers to Friona; it brought loads of supplies and all kinds of feed that the settlers were dependent on to shelter and feed their families and livestock. The trains also exported important items such as hides, cattle and wheat, which was important to farmers, for this was their way of making a living and providing for their family.

New residents were being

providing for their family.

New residents were being born, and Friona now had a tremendously growing population. Even though the automobile was becoming increasingly popular, they did not end the need and use of trains. The trains began bringing in bag loads of mail for the citizens of Friona. Also, many Frionans took train trips to and from nearby towns such as Clovis, New Mexico.

Over the years, Friona has grown and become the beloved home to many lives. It has produced outstanding successful people and organizations and is a great place to grow up.



YOUR EYES

Seeing In 3-D

Stereopticon pictuers were the wonder of the 19th century. Two almost-identical pictures, viewed through a contraption with aimed lenses, presented a three-dimensional effect. Fact is, that's pretty much the way our eyes work.



Six external muscles that control each eye direct them both to a target, whatever it is we want to look at. If the muscles are not coordinated as they should be, depth perception is reduced and many of our activities become extra difficult.

The optometrist's complete examination will determine the cause of the problem. Sometimes vision training may be prescribed to help the eyes learn to work as a team. Corrective lenses may be used, too, to help align the two eyes. Occasionally, in older people, a cataract may be closing off the vision in one eye. After the cataract is dealt with, a contact lens or implant usually will be inserted to replace the opaque lens that was removed. opaque lens that was removed.


