HARVEST IS IMMINENT

Local Wheat Farmers: "Waiting To Exhale"

Area farmers are sitting on one of the best wheat crops in several years—if the weather cooperates and lets them get the nice-looking crop in to the elevators.

Some farmers had their wheat, as well as cotton and

corn, damaged considerably during this past Monday's storm. Farmers, and the businesses which serve them, are getting more than a little gun-shy with the continuing round of bad storms, such as the one that devastated crops near Dalhart on Monday.

The hail damage seemed to be contained in two strips—one in the Rhea community, and one mostly west of Hub and along and south of Highway 86.

"Generally speaking, we're in pretty good shape," said Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers' elevator. There was some damage all right, but luckily it didn't cover a wide area. The ones who got hail said their crops were hurt pretty badly," he continued.

Those who suffered damage in the area described included Jerry London, Mitchell Wiseman and Jon Jarecki. London had two different fields hurt.

Smiley predicted that harvest operations might get underway by this weekend, weather permitting.

"The wheat farmers need to have a good crop. It's been a number of years since they did, and it would help everyone immensely," Smiley said.

Several hundred acres of the area's cotton crop were also hurt by the Monday storm, according to ginner Jerry Butman.

Those suffering cotton damage included Butch Preston, Larry Hodnet, Jon Jarecki and Carroll Cook.

"By and large, the cotton still looks fairly decent, considering the additional rain and cool weather it has

had," Butman said. "I went to Lubbock Wednesday, and the best cotton I saw was between here and Muleshoe. Then there was some between Sudan and Amherst that looked pretty good. The closer you get to Lubbock, the cotton looks pretty sick," Butman, indicating that compared to some places, Friona area farmers are doing well," he added (maybe we'd better date this—10 a.m., Thursday, 6-19).

Joe Allen, manager of Sherley's Rhea elevator, said things were looking great for crops in that area. This is one of the best wheat crops I've seen in several years—maybe ever," Allen said.

"There was a strip about three miles south of Rhea which had some bad hail damage Monday evening," he added.

Norman Taylor told Allen that his wheat crop suffered all the way from a 25 percent loss to 75 percent. "We didn't hear about many bad storms, but those in this strip had some bad damage," Allen said.

The Rhea community received 1.2 inches of rain Monday. That area's corn and milo crops are doing well. The corn was slightly stripped Monday, and might recover. Some of the corn in the Rhea area is four to five feet tall.

"It has been so long since this area had an exceptional wheat crop. I think they deserve a break. They haven't had a bumper crop in a number of years. Many of our farmers didn't even harvest any wheat last year," Allen said.

The Rhea community is mostly "dryland" in nature. Allen estimated that 70 percent of the land in that area had no irrigation, with the

remainder having at least some sprinkler systems.

"If the farmers can harvest this wheat crop, it would boost the economy of the entire area, whether some of them realize it or not," Allen concluded.

Allen likewise expected the harvest to get underway by about next Wednesday.

"The cool weather and the rains have contributed to a good crop, but they also are somewhat worrisome, since it has pushed the harvest back at least two weeks," he concluded.

"Mac" McMurtrey at Hub Grain said the wheat crop in that area was much better than average. He affirmed the damage farmers suffered west of Hub. "It battered the corn somewhat, but it should grow out of it. Some of the cotton is questionable, but it might be a week or so before they'll know," he said, indicating that these farmers might really get in a bind on making a crop.

McMurtrey thought it might be a week before wheat in his service area might be sampled. The extra rain and cool conditions have made the harvest later. "A year ago, we got our first load on June 10th," he said.

Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain, said several of his customers had sustained some damage. "First one evening and then another, they've been hit. I think the storm with the hail went from Rhea southeast, across the Parmerton area and then west and south of Hub," Huckabee said.

"If we can have a few hot days, there will be a lot of farmers trying to cut wheat. They will be going for sure by Monday (if it stays dry)," commented.

"Writing a column isn't hard," Moten used to tell his friends. "All you have to do is sit at your typewriter for an hour or so and sweat blood!" Dolph used his head and got out of the newspaper business while he still had his right mind.

By the way, Dolph, if you're listening: the only thing that's changed since you were at it, is the fact that computers have replaced typewriters. The good news is: you can sometimes whack out an article much faster on a computer than on a typewriter. The bad news is: if you're still sweating about what you're gonna say, it's not a darned bit faster.

VIRTUALLY EVERYONE has a camera and takes pictures these days. You can even take your film to Fox Photo or Photo Express, and get your pictures back in an hour's time. But it hasn't always been that way.

Up until the year 1888, about the only "picture takers" were professional photographers. Everyone in the photo business in the late 1800s, since and including the first great American photographer, Matthew Brady, had to really like their profession.

These photographers had to carry their cameras, which were large and cumbersome (usually mounted on a tripod), along with the glass-enclosed film, chemicals and the almost dangerous flash apparatus.

Today, photography is our nation's number one hobby, and you can buy a "throw-away" camera down at the drugstore for as little as \$5.95. They are made by Kodak, Minolta, etc., and contain film for 15 to as many as 27 photos. They even have one variety that takes the panoramic-type pictures.

If that sounds like a 21st century marvel, consider this: We learned this week that in 1888, George Eastman introduced a new and more portable camera for the general picture-taking public.

The new box-type camera cost \$10.00. They were loaded with enough film to shoot 100 pictures. When you had taken up your 100 shots, you sent the camera to the Kodak laboratory, where the film was developed and the pictures printed.

Then, the camera was re-loaded with film and returned to its owner. That sounds like about ten cents per picture. Or, unless we badly miss our guess, the photos taken by those old-style cameras were probably 1,000 times as clear and sharp as we get on our present-day fully-automatic cameras.

After about a third of a century of trying to figure out the workings of a 35mm camera with flash, Carol was among the first in line to get one of the new cameras, which take the guesswork out of such things as focusing, flash setting, aperture setting, etc.

You might say that Carol was born 50 years too soon. Or, in the case of Mr. Eastman, maybe it was 75 years too late.

Friona's City Council met in its regular session on Monday, June 9, with mostly routine matters under discussion. Only three aldermen were present due to conflicts.

The council tabled a discussion wherein a property owner on Main Street has been asked to bring his building up to city code requirements.

He said that he will have accrued \$40,000 in college tuition money by the end of his enlistment and if he takes college courses during his tour, the Army will pay 75% of the tuition.

However, Shelby said he is leaning toward staying on in the Army as a career but will decide after he gets more

experience.

Shelby, who went to school in Bovina from kindergarten thru fifth grade, then moved to Abilene, came to Friona to begin his sophomore year.

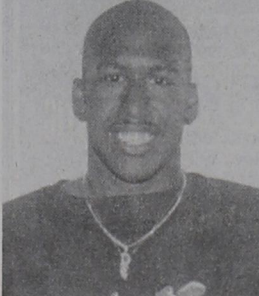
He smiles with enthusiasm when he talks about the good friends and good memories he will carry with him from his days at FHS.

Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs Ago-June 24, 1932

F.W. Reeve and others of this place who were taking an active part in promoting the plan for a north and south highway across Parmer County, met with quite a disappointment in their efforts when they presented their petition to Judge John H. Aldridge for his signature as an endorsement of the project by the Commissioners Court. At a recent meeting of the court it was unanimously agreed that the court should endorse the move, but no motion, it appears, was made to that effect, and Judge Aldridge contended that he could not conscientiously sign the petition unless the matter had been made of record by the court.

55 Yrs Ago-June 19, 1942

Probably the most destructive and the most widespread hail storm on record for Parmer County struck late Sunday afternoon, when an estimated half million bushels of wheat, destroyed in a storm of from three to five minutes duration.

From the best available reports reaching the Star office, the storm originated somewhere near Grady, New Mexico, and spread east and a little south in its mad race of destruction.

45 Yrs Ago-June 19, 1952

Alan Romich, manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, submitted his resignation to that group early this week.

The reality of a sightlier and safer playground at the Friona Grade School is

nearing this week with a crew at work filling in dirt leveling etc. New soil is being placed over the grounds preparatory to lawn seeding before commencement of the fall school term.

40 Yrs Ago-June 20, 1957

M.L. "Marty" Martinez is now on duty at Parmer County Community Hospital. He finished exams before the Texas and Oklahoma Board of Examiners and started work June 15. He is a recent graduate of Southwestern State College in Weatherford, and obtained experience while in college by having a job in a Weatherford drug store.

35 Yrs Ago-June 21, 1962

Anni Jensen, Friona High School's first exchange student, left the city yesterday morning, to begin the first leg of the trip back to her native Denmark. She left behind a year full of memories, new experiences and most of all, a town full of friends, who learned to love the cute Danish girl, and who also learned a lot about her country, its customs and way of life.

30 Yrs Ago-June 22, 1967

25 Yrs Ago-June 22, 1972

On June 2, 1972, a group composed of Parmer and Lubbock county residents filed an application for a state bank in Friona with the Texas Banking Commission. The proposed bank would be named "Texas Bank," with a capitol structure of \$400,000 and would be located in the downtown area, according to a spokesman for the group.

Evelyn Ora Crawford, 77, of Lake Dallas, died June 8, 1997 in Lewisville.

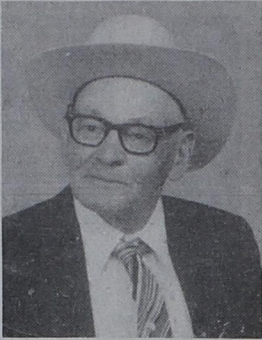

Mr. Estes died June 15, at Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

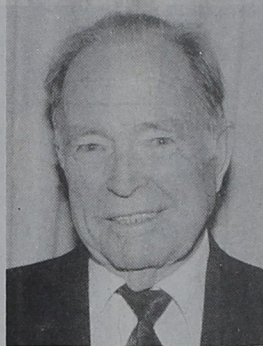
He was born April 1, 1913 in Rockwood. He married Edna Shamblin September 7, 1935 in Forth Worth. She preceded him in death December 23, 1996.

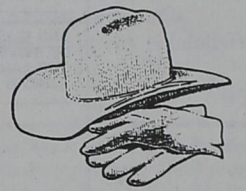

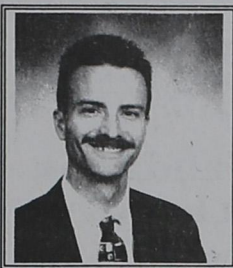
Talley is a senior majoring in missions from Friona.

OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SPECIAL ELECTION

AUGUST 9, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

rently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

YOUR EYES

**Eye Exam
Guidelines**



When was the last time you had your eyes examined?
*Eye examinations should start at about the age of three, while it is relatively easy to correct conditions like strabismus, or crossed eyes, and amblyopia, or "lazy eye."
*Because visual acuity changes rapidly during the growing years, children and teenagers should be examined once a year.
*People between 25 and 40, in good overall health and with no history of vision problems, usually find examinations every two years enough--until they have difficulty reading small print.
*After 40, eyes should be checked every year, because visual changes start to accelerate. It's important that the eye doctor check for glaucoma and other diseases at this stage to make possible the prompt treatment that protects vision.
At any age, eye strain or any change in vision should trigger a prompt visit to the optometrist.
