





my general age bracket and he too, had a pair of blue suede loafers. (In fact Bill said he may still have his underneath something out in his

garage).

In case you have been in Antarctica the last few weeks, tomorrow, August 16, is the 20th anniversary of Elvis' death.

I am old enough to remember when there was not an Elvis Presley. There are two other things I remember about Elvis: I hated his guts and I met him once on a street corner in my hometown of

corner in my hometown of Hillsboro, Texas. In 1956, even eight-track tapes had not been invented. For music, we listened to the radio or if you were lucky enough to have a phonograph, you could buy 78rpm or 45rpm records.

or 45pm records.

Hillsboro did not have a record store. Us teens would drive about 15-20 miles to Italy, Texas, where a friendly couple sold sheet music, musical instruments, and records.

On one such visit, the record store lady suggested I buy this new record called Heartbreak Hotel by a

artist named Elvis Presley.
No one had heard of him, but I No one had neard of him, but I bought the record anyway. It was indeed a good tune. Shortly after, Elvis appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show to great fanfare. I remember seeing him on our black and white

seeing him on our black and white TV.

After that, it became a whole lot more difficult for boys like me to get a girlfriend. Once Carolyn and Virginia and Mary Sue got a glimpse of Elvis, Ronnie and Bobby and Booger were dog food.

Let's face it, Elvis was drop dead good lookin'. He made our high school "most handsome" look like a goober. The girls would twitter and scream and almost faint at the mere mention of Elvis.

God I hated Elvis. I also hated my black horn rimmed glasses, my ears that stuck out like open pickup doors, and my pitiful excuse of a flattop haircut. I not only hated Elvis, I hated Frankie Avalon, and Fabian, and Rock Hudson too.

It was bitter sweet revenge for me years later when I found out Rock Hudson was gay. There is some justice after high school.

Heartbreak Hotel became Elvis' first million seller in 1957. By 1958 he had become very popular. He bought Graceland for \$100,000 and amid much fanfare, was drafted into the U.S. Army.

I graduated from HHS in 1957.
By 1958, my ambition had not kicked in so I was still hanging around Hillsboro working for Barnard's Grocery, a job I had held since my sophmore year.

Highway 77 which ran from Dallas

including buses carrying Army
recruits to Fort Hood.

stopped to eat.

I had seen a Greyhound bus parked at the curb but the notion that Elvis Presley was here in this small no-name town was far fetched.

Even the "mature" lady bank tellers were tittering and fluttering.
The thought of leaving their cash The thought of leaving their cash unattended was the only thing keeping them from rushing next door for a cup of coffee.

"Go see", they urged me. "Go see and come back and tell us."

With my bank bag in hand, I headed for history. When I walked out the bank door, Elvis Presley,

America's most famous Army recruit, was standing on the sidewalk about to board the bus. I was 18 at the time, he was 23.

Amazingly, there were no crowds of screaming girls. In fact there was nobody except me, Elvis, and the bus driver.

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



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1997 Property Tax Rates In Parmer County & FM Road

This notice concerns 1997 property tax rates for Parmer County & FM Road. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

NBC News Pays Visit To Samarron Family

BY RON CARR
For the Samarron family of Friona, a call from NBC News in New York stirred the sorrows they have struggled with over the last four years.
Juan Samarron, Jr. died in February of 1994 at Texas Tech University Medical Center. He was 30 years old.
He fell ill 10 months earlier with a severe skin rash which was initially diagnosed as a dermatology problem.
From Parmer County Hospital he was referred to Amarillo. As the illness persisted, he was sent to the Tech Hospital and later to Houston for examination, before returning to the care of the Lubbock facility.
His situation worsened. His skin began to peel and crack. According to his wife Sandra, he became so weak that he could not work couldn't take a bath, and suffered constantly with fever and chills. And he was afraid.
The frequent 110-mile trips to Lubbock for treatment became more dreadful and agonizing.
It was all the more difficult on him and the family because Juan Samarron, Jr., along with his brothers Richard and Jose, was a world champion powerlifter.
In 1982 and 1983, he was an all-district linebacker

Samarron , Jr., along with his brothers Richard and Jose, was a world champion power-lifter.

In 1982 and 1983, he was an all-district linebacker for the Friona Chieftains. His weight lifting skills were legend around Parmer County. He and his brothers traveled as far as Russia, where they won international weight lifting competition.

So the mysterious pain and suffering and weaknesses, the fevers and chills, were even more foreign and frightening to a once powerful Juan Samarron, Jr and his loved ones.

He and his wife Sandra had been together five years. He continued to work at Parmer County Pump Co., where he had been employed since he was 15-years-old. He cared for her and his three stepdaughters Sue Haye, Monica, and Hillary.

In the end, they cared for him as he struggled to live. After ten months doctors finally diagnosed his illness as a rare form of skin cancer.

Sandra says, "After all that time, when they finally figured out what he had, four days later he died."

The struggle to work, care for three little girls and tend to Juan's needs was a burden. In February, 1994, he was back in the Tech Medical Center.

She spoke to him by phone the night of Tuesday, February 8. At 5:30 a.m. on February 9, the hospital called to say that he had

died during the night.

In addition to the death
of Juan, Jr., the Samarron
family lost two of Juan
Samarron, Sr's brothers in
1994, then on June 1 of this
year, Juan Samarron, Sr.
died at the age of 61.

Through all the distress,
the Samarron family has
relied on each other for
comfort and support. Life
was going on. Coping was
growing easier.

Then a call came from an
NBC News producer in New
York working on a "Fleecing
of America" segment for Tom
Brokaw's NBC Nightly News.
Brokaw's NBC Nightly News.
Brokaw and staff
produced a series on Medicare
fraud among the country's
largest hospitals. The
practice of having residents
tending to patients instead of
their attending physicians
was discussed.

During their
investigation, they became
aware of a former female
resident at Texas Tech
University Medical Center
who had resigned and filed
suit against the hospital for
just such practices.

In investigating the

In investigating the

resident's allegations, NBC researchers chanced upon the name of Juan Samarron, Jr. The female resident had mentioned his death in her filing. Details of the actual suit, and how Samarron's case is relevant to it, are not known at this time according to attorney Kathryn Gurley, a friend of the Samarron family.

NBC News contacted the Samarron family.

NBC News contacted the Samarron family a couple of weeks ago and on Monday, August 11, a TV crew interviewed Sandra Samarron at her home in Friona.

Leading the group was Pat Dawson, a news reporter for Brokaw's NBC Nightly News. Dawson, who lives in New York, was accompanied by a producer from Houston and two camera and sound men from Dallas.

In a 30-minute on camera interview, Dawson questioned Mrs. Samarron about events leading up to Juan, Jr's illness, the treatment he received at Tech Medical Center, and whether she knew that the doctor treating him was actually a resident at the hospital.

She said that she did not realize until now that the doctors were actually residents. When Dawson concluded the interview by asking if she was angry, Mrs. Samarron quickly replied, "No", but added that she would like some answers.

The news crew filmed at the Samarron family will not doubt be watching.

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

Persistence Pays As Deputy Solves Burglary

Being a small town
deputy has its rewards even
though praises and challenges
can be few and far between
for county law enforcement
officers.

A recent burglary at Cattle Town Feed Yard and the investigation which resulted in two arrest warrants, would normally be reported in a couple of paragraphs. We thought it would be interesting to detail the efforts involved in the most routine investigations.

Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Denver Redwine is a 1984 graduate of Bovina High School and a graduate of the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy in Amarillo. He has been a deputy for 3 years.

Cattle Town reported a burglary of tools and equipment on June 16.

On July 17 the Friona police department received a tip on the Student Crime Stoppers line about the burglary. An anonymous caller left a message that named a former Cattle Town employee as the thief. The caller stated that the former employee lived in a trailer house near Hereford, then hung up.

hung up.
Friona police contacted
the sheriff's office about the
tip. Deputy Redwine
received the call, listened to
the tape, and contacted the
Deaf Smith County Sheriff's

Deaf Smith County Sheriff's office.

On July 23, Deputy Redwine and District Investigator Julian Dominguez drove to Cattle Town to talk with officials about the burglary. They were told a night watchman would have information about the event, so they drove back to Hereford and contacted the man by phone from the sheriff's department.

The night watchman

The night watchmar voluntarily came to the sheriff's office and told the deputy he had overheard a Cattle Town employee talking about the burglary. The employee had said that

an associate of his was drinking with two men a few nights earlier and the two were talking about how they had burglarized the building.

Acting on the information, Redwine and Dominguez went back to Cattle Town to talk with the employee who had overheard the conversation. He told them that the two suspects, former Cattle Town employees, had taken equipment and tools from the shop.

Most important, he told Redwine and Dominguez that the two burglars had sold the equipment to a shop in Hereford and that the shop owner had given them a check as payment.

On July 28, Redwine went back to Hereford. He had learned that one of the suspects was working for another feed yard contractor. Locating his jobsite, they drove to the feed yard to question him.

The suspect was uncooperative during the questioning, told them he had nothing to say, and that he would be calling his lawyer.

A trip back to Hereford to talk with another former employee, led the deputy to a former residence, then to the water department to find a current address. A drive to the new address found the man, who agreed to talk as long as he could be anonymous because he feared for his family.

The man provided further details about the suspect pair, including the name of the person to whom they had sold the equipment, identified to

the equipment, identified by the name on a manure truck that had driven by once when he was with the two.

Tracking one of the suspects led Deputy Redwine from the labor camp in Hereford back to Cattle Town to talk with one of his former roommates.

The roommate said he knew nothing about the burglary but that the suspect

had been working as a maintenance person for a Hereford real estate agent.

The persistent deputy went to check with the real estate office and discovered that the suspect had left a week ago, allegedly for Big Springs, and that after he left they had discovered a weed eater and air compressor missing.

So it was on to find the manure truck owner who had bought the stolen equipment.

With only a street name for an address, he asked around the neighborhood and was finally directed to a residence. After a brief wait, the man returned home and verified that he had purchased a welder and a jack from the suspect. He led deputies next door to a trailer he owned where the merchandise was stored.

The man told Redwine that he had never met the suspect before he drove up to sell some equipment. The man loaded the equipment, including three tires that he had also bought, into his pickup and followed the deputies to the Deaf Smith Sheriff's office to unload the merchandise.

On the morning of July 29, a Cattle Town official identified the equipment as that taken in the burglary. Deputy Redwine released the equipment to Cattle Town after positive identification.

The same day he issued warrants for the arrest of Mark Anthony Garcia, DOB 10-10-65, and Mario Alberto Alvarez, DOB 07-03-69, for the offense of burglary of a building.

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



Glasses Slipping Down Your Nose?

If you've worn your glasses for a while, chances are the frame and ear pieces have stretched from wear or mishandling, and your glasses are slipping down your nose. Yes, it's annoying but-worse than that-this slipping can affect vision.

Glasses that do not sit properly on the bridge of your nose actually change what you see through the lenses. For those who are farsighted, slippage increases the power of the lenses and the size of the image. If you're nearsighted, slippage decreases the power of the lenses and makes images smaller.

Even normal wear can cause misalignment of the frames and the ear pieces. Other problems include glasses that leave marks on the face, become uneven or hurt behind the ears. Don't attempt to make eyeglass repairs or adjustments yourself. Count on your optometrist to make your glasses like new again, often as a no-charge public relations gesture.
