
The investigation of the deadly crash in Paris that took the life of Lady Diana and two other occupants of the vehicle has revealed that for a city of several million people, Paris' emergency medical response system wouldn't even approach those we have in Friona and Bovina, where most all of the EMS personnel are volunteer workers. It was over 15 minutes before any emergency workers arrived at the scene in Paris, and they then spent another 30 minutes trying to stabilize Diana at the scene, rather than working the territed the location.

The biggest shocker: Emergency crews in Paris don't even have a simple "jaws of life" machine, which have been used by our EMS crews for a number of years. When minutes and seconds count, the "jaws of life" often make the difference in a vicim surviving or not. They have no equivalent of "911" in Paris! Does this blow your mind, or what? They have a police department, a fire department and ambulance service, but apparently they don't work together. If a potential resident came to our towns and learned what we've said here about Paris, they most likely would decide to go "on down the road," and you couldn't blame them. Earlier this summer, we had occasion to use the "911" system in Friona. I had glanced at my watch, and the EMS crew drove up in just over five minutes. I thought at the time that this was fantastic, and now I know for sure.

Each of these cat-egories of people supposedly need to save money because they are poor. they are poor.

Suddenly your welfare and social security checks will go further and life will be better. If I lived in Amarillo, I would not shop there. Not that they are not nice stores. They are very nice. First of all, it wouldn't do me any good to borrow my mother's car again with the handicapped license plate. No doubt, the old black and white citizens would have those parking spaces all taken up. PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a per-son to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment elimi-nating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution." "The constitutional amendment to al-low a person who holds the office of mu-nicipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation." Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes a amendment to allow the Supreme Cou of Texas to hold sessions at any locatio in this state. Currently, the court is limite to holding sessions only at Austin, the sec of state government. **PROPOSITION NO. 2**

ON THE BALLOT ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65-and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law to effect. The proposed amendment will appear

n the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to au-thorize the Legislature to limit in-creases in the appraised value of resi-tence homesteads for ad valorem taration and to permit a school dis-trict to calculate the school property tar freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderty person or the surviving sponse of an elderty person in accordance with the law authoriz-ing the transfer of the school property tar freeze to a different homestead re-gardless of whether that law was in ef-fect at the time the person established the person's homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 3

constitutional amenament to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amend-ment would authorize the Texas Water De-velopment Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set forth in the amendment. **ON THE BALLOT** Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the Constitutional antendinent of anow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad va-lorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented. The amendment would also allow the Board to use loan repayments coming into the fund after the end of the fiscal year to make bond debt service payments, and would provide certain conditions for the flow of funds for repayment of Texas agri-cultural water conservation bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to au-thorize the legislature to permit a taz-ing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conserva-tion initiative has been implemented."

The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process. The proposed amendment will appear the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Consti-tution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeoumer's consent, may place against a homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would au-thorize the legislature to authorize a prop-erty tax of five cents for each \$100 valua-tion in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The consti-tution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts regardless of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to au-thorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire pre-vention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Pund (and its aux-illary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass vio-lence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment desig-nating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 59 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the Legislature from authorizing additional state debt payable from the general rev-enue fund if the resulting annual debt ser-vice (the amount needed each year to make payments) would exceed five per-cent of the annual general revenue avail-







Crop Insurance Deadline News

Curt Miller, County Executive Director, Parmer County Farm Service Agency, Farwell, Texas announced today the sales closing date for crop insurance is September 30 for wheat. Last year in Texas, \$171.50 million in protection (liability) was provided to producers through more than 20,000 policies.

"The freeze of last April is

"The freeze of last April is a vivid reminder that eventually everybody will have to cope with crop losses or low prices. Appropriate crop or revenue insurance protection will help you survive these hardships," said Miller. Sales closing dates are significant because signing up for insurance, changing the crop insured or level of protection, and changing insurance providers, must be done prior to the announced date. Sales closing dates vary by crop and location. Beginning with the 1998 crop year, crop insurance is

crop year, crop insurance is available exclusively through

crop insurance agents. USDA will continue to subsidize all policies, establish policy terms and conditions, set rates, and guarantee funds for the payment of approved claims. Although a producer's policy will be randomly transferred from USDA to an insurance company, producers have the right to choose their own agent prior to the sales closing date for the insured crop

closing date for the insured crop. To ensure that all producers are served, insurance companies are required to insure all eligible crops, and provide all levels of coverage in the states in which they operate. A waiver of admin-istrative fees for producers who qualify as limited resource farmers is available from all crop insurance companies. Private agents are willing and prepared to

are willing and prepared to assist those qualifying producers with determining eligibility. A listing of agents may be found in all local Farm Service Agency offices.

Junior High Qualifiers In Duke TIP

Seven students from Friona Junior High School have qualified for par-ticipation in this year's talent search for mathematically and verbally advanced students sponsored by Duke University's Talented Iden-tification Program (IDE). The program identifies highly capable sevenths graders from a 16-state region in the south, southwest, and midwest. To be eligible, students must have scored within the upper three percent of national age-grade norms on acceptable math, verbal, or total composite sections of an in-school achievement test. They will take the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or ACT Assessment (ACT), normally taken only by college bound juniors and seniors, in December, Jan-uary, or February. All participants receive Certificates of Merit and some become eligible for state-wide regognition ceremonies or a variety of educational programs. The purpose of the TIP program is to help aca-demically bright students develop their special abilities, to assist schools in working with their brightest students, and to understand the nature of exceptional mathematical and verbal ability. 

YOUR EYES

Cross-Eyes

A generation or two ago, the taunt, "Cross eyes, cross eyes" might be heard across the school playground. A child whose eyes did not point in the same direction often suffered teasing by class-mates. Parents might be saddened by the condition, but most accepted it. Today, we know that crossed eyes--properly known as strabismus--can be corrected. Most cases are corrected in early childhood before it affects vision, usually before the child is six years old. old.

Old. Perhaps remembering the old stigma of crossed eyes, it is usually the parents or grandparents who first notice that one eye is turning out or in. This is a signal to see the eye doctor promptly, because strabismus does not usually cure itself. Without correction, the child will suppress vision in one eye and, in time, that eye will be largely unused. Vision training can effectively teach the patient to coordinate ever muscles. Glassee may be used; only argetly is surgery coordinate eye muscles. Glasses may be used; only rarely is surgery necessary.
