## Chiefs Are Number 7 In State!

This week's Associated Press poll listed Friona as number seven team in their 3A classification. It's the highest ranking ever attained by Friona in football.

Friona received 73 points in the voting. They moved up from the tenth place ranking the team had held the previous two weeks.

The Chieftains moved ahead of regional rival Vernon, which lost to Wichita Falls High and slipped to eighth place.

## THE BEST THING about Maize Days was the barbecue. . .tasty and tender. The worst thing was the weather which decided it was time for Summer to be finished, and Fall sort of fell upon us just in time for the parade on Saturday morning. Those balmy Summer evenings which we enjoyed all week long, previous to the Saturday finale, would have been just perfect for a carnival.

The Dixon Six-Mile Race has been a nice addition to the Maize Days line-up for about the past 20 years or so. Jim and Jane Dixon and family sponsor the race and provide the trophies themselves, and they don't even charge an entry fee.

Participation in most events was down a bit from previous years, perhaps because of the big move from Main Street out to the area around the High School. We do appreciate the school officials for allowing the townsfolk to use their facilities for this purpose. Everyone I ran into made the comment, "It will be better next year when everything gets back to normal and the celebration can be downtown on Main Street again." We hope!

The six-blocks of reconstruction work on Main Street has been nothing but a bother and an expense to everyone so far and with progress being hampered by weather, it promises to continue being a REALLY BIG MESS for quite a long time to come. Officials stated that since construction began on May 27, they have had 43 work days and 42 non-work days due to the rain. The contract calls for the job to be completed in 100 work days.

Everyone who owns property on Main Street has already had to shell out some big bucks on this project. First rattle out of the box, 24 Main Street merchants and/or offices were told by the state highway people that all of the signs, canopies, flower boxes, or anything that stuck out onto or over the sidewalk would have to be removed because it was in the right-of-way belonging to the highway. Ethridge-Spring Agency had gone to quite a bit of trouble to beautify their end of Main a few years ago, by remodeling their building with an attractive western-style canopy. Then they got the expense of tearing it all down.

Next we've all had to be out plumbing expenses involved with moving the water and gas lines from the front of our buildings to the back, which is where they should have been in the first place. This was a mistake made by the city fathers many years ago. But the business merchants now have the privilege of paying for that mistake.

So between plumbing expenses, paving over the back parking lot so our customers can get into the back door, and glass breakage (windows and doors) from gravel out in front, we've got a low estimate of about \$8,000 of expenses just for our building. And I don't know how much it's costing the other Main Street merchants, but I doubt that those nice new sidewalks are going to repay all the expenses which are being incurred.

They are starting work on the east side of the street now and we are wondering if mail in and out of Friona will come to a screeching halt. At some point, the U.S. mail trucks simply won't be able to get in and out of the drive-way at the Post Office, and neither will anyone else.

This whole thing was started because the curbs and sidewalks down Main Street were in such poor repair that little old ladies were afraid of falling and breaking a hip when they were trying to get to their weekly beauty shop appointments. Now those same little old ladies are having to park a block or two away and slog through muddy back lots to get where they're going when they have bills to pay or other business to conduct on Main Street.

Will Maize Days be back down on Main Street this time next year? I'm not gonna put a big wager on it!

## Area Gets Nice Rains; Total Grows

The Friona area received from 1.7 to two inches of rain early Monday. The slow-falling moisture halted the corn and ensilage harvest, and added to the area's mounting moisture for the year.

Friona's official gauge recorded 1.75 inches in the latest spell. The week's rain brought September's total to 3.84 inches--the third month of the summer to top three inches.

The year's total stands at 22.98 inches, about six inches above average. Of the year's total, 20.38 inches have fallen since April 1, an average of 3.4 inches per month.

Contestants are asked to include their name, phone number, the date of the submitted guess and the date of the freeze.

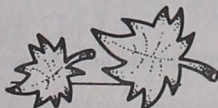

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

**65 Yrs Ago-Sept. 30, 1932**  
T.J. Crawford has been designated by Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve as Governor R.S. Sterling's representative in the preparation and submission of Parmer County's application for funds out of the \$300,000,000 provided by the Federal Emergency Relief and Construction Act of 1932.

The district school tax assessor-collector has been instructed by the board of trustees that another cut of ten per cent in the valuation of property within the district has been made, which will make quite an appreciable reduction in the current taxes.

**55 Yrs Ago-Oct 2, 1942**  
Full mobilization of manpower on the small farms of Parmer County for increased food production is needed to win the war, Earl L. Fine, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, believes, "Unless our small farm operators can produce greater quantities of food," said Mr. Fine, "our country will be compelled to ration almost all foods and there is no assurance that we can maintain nutrition needs of our civilians."

Looking ahead to agricultural wartime production for 1943, the Texas USDA War Board already is conducting a survey on transportation facilities for farm labor.

**50 Yrs Ago-Sept. 27, 1947**  
Mary Joyce Renner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R.J. Renner, Sr., was crowned Football Queen in halftime ceremonies last Friday night.

Mary Joyce is a sophomore student at Friona High School this year.

**45 Yrs Ago-Sept. 25, 1952**  
A county wide meeting of Parmer County farmers has been announced for next Monday night at the Bovina School Auditorium. This meeting, called by county committeemen Parr, Euler and Caldwell, is intended to learn from farmers what regulations, if any are desired for issuance of permits for drilling of irrigation wells. Permits will be required beginning February 1, 1953.

A home freezer demonstration will be held at the Friona Club House next Thursday, October 2. Sponsored by the Parmer County Implement Co., the International freezer will be demonstrated by Miss Evelyn Altman, IH home economist.

**40 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1957**  
Hurschel Harding, 28-year-old Farwell lawyer, was appointed Monday by the Parmer County commissioners court as county attorney. He fills the vacancy created by the resignation of Bill Sheeham of Friona, who is now district attorney.

The city commission Monday night decided on a less strict code of regulations for persons who peddle milk in the city, but an ordinance has not yet been written with their intentions, according to the city clerk, Roy Wilson. The commission has for several months been discussing passing an ordinance to regulate milk peddling, and one which was presented them was unsuitable on the basis that local producers could not normally afford to purchase a mechanical bottling machine required by the state code.

**35 Yrs Ago-Sept. 27, 1962**  
A group of Parmer County officials was treated to a special field trip to the Brady Creek Watershed project in Central Texas. The group, which included the County Commissioners Court, Soil Conservation District supervisors, Friona Star News Editor Bill Ellis, and other interested parties in the county, gathered in Plainview and flew to Brady for the special tour.

**30 Yrs Ago-Sept. 28, 1967**  
The Board of Advisory Editors of "Outstanding Civic Leaders of America" announced recently that five Friona residents have been chosen for inclusion in the 1967 edition of the national publication. Those chosen are Mrs. Roy V. Miller, Steve Messenger, Dr. Loyd Shackelford, Mrs. V.J. Zeman and Andy Hurst.

**25 Yrs Ago-Sept. 28, 1972**  
Twenty-five girls will seek the Maize Queen title Thursday in a full day of competition which begins at 4 p.m. Reigning Maize Queen Kathy Horton, is away at college and will be unable to be present at the festivities. Dean Kelley, sports news editor for KFDD-TV (Channel 10) Amarillo will be emcee for the event.

Highlight of the Saturday afternoon events of Maize Days this year will be a big Air Show held at Bengier Air Park just east of Friona on Highway 60.

**20 Yrs Ago-Sept. 25, 1977**  
Rhea Bradley, Littlefield, resident engineer for the Department of Highways and Transportation, reports that the construction project on State Highway 214 has been officially completed and has been accepted by the state.

Several hundred area farmers fired up their combines last week and pulled into their corn fields.

**15 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1982**  
The arrest of four young Friona men last Saturday has apparently cleared up recent burglaries, in which over \$3,000 worth of radio and electronic equipment was taken. The Friona Police Department found over \$3,000 in stolen merchandise in the attic at the home of one of the young men.

Roger Fields was the weekly winner in the Friona Star's football contest, correctly picking 16 games. The winning check was presented by Betty Chaney, representing Chaney Fertilizer.

Funeral services for Ralph T. Roden, 73, were held Tuesday, September 21, at United Methodist Church. Roden died at his home September 19. He was a pharmacist for fifty years and owned and operated Bi-Wize Drug.

**10 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1987**  
The weather in the Friona area has taken a turn for the better in recent days, with beautiful warm days which should facilitate the maturing of crops and allow farmers to get into their fields. Thursday's high temperature was 85 degrees, and more of the same was being expected for the weekend.

Lazbuddie Fire Chief Glen Lust reports that the Lazbuddie WEPS truck was one of the vehicles which was sent to California to help battle the forest fires there. None of the Lazbuddie Volunteer firefighters were able to go with the truck, but it is being driven by National Forest Service personnel.

Lance Looper, a freshman at Friona High School, was the winner of the second week's Friona Star Football Contest.

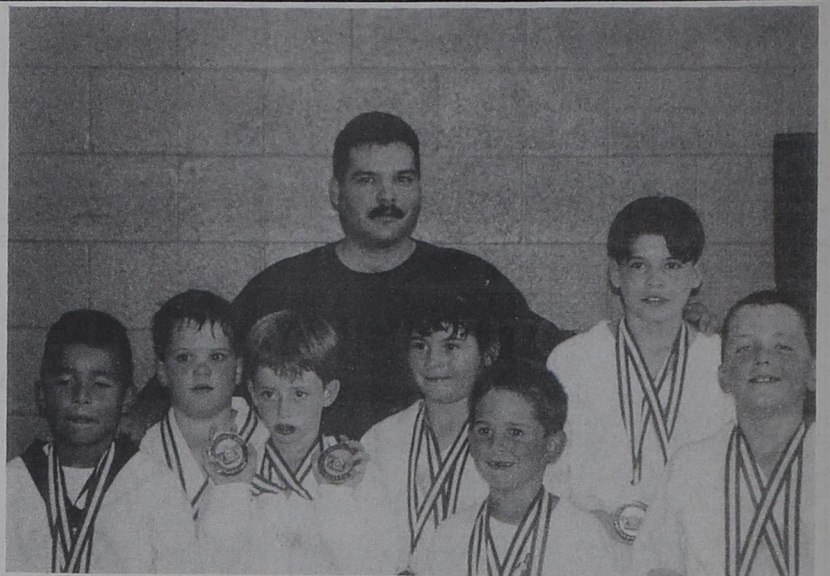

\*Alex Gurley, son of John and Kathryn Gurley, bronze medal in sparring and bronze medal in forms.

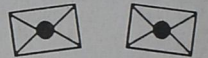
\*Tolby Wilcox, son of Terry and Varla Wilcox, silver medal in sparring and bronze medal in forms.

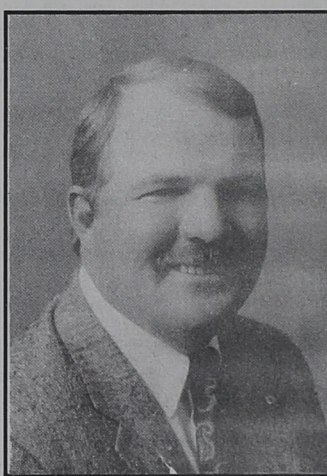

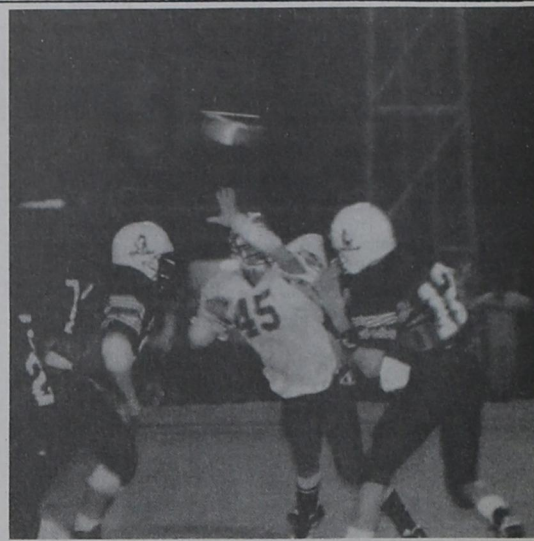

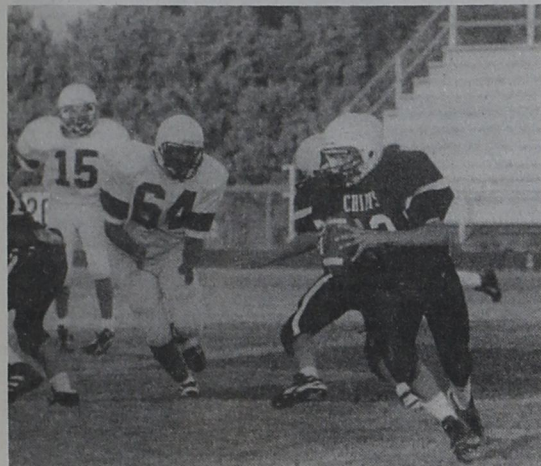

Kendrick gained seven yards to the Shallowater 14, and on the second play of the second quarter, Kendrick reeled off a ten-yard gain, taking the pitchout around the left end and being forced out of bounds at the five.

At this point Shallowater put together their best drive of the game. They put together a mixture of running and passing, converting on three third down plays and one fourth down from midfield. On the early series, the Mustangs needed 16 yards on third down and completed a 20-yard pass.

When the score came with 3:08 left in the half, Shallowater had cut Friona's lead to 14-7, and had used up 8:08 of clock time in the second quarter.

Kendrick picked up Friona's ninth first down, but Friona had to punt with just 1:20 left in the half.

Neither team could drive on their first possession of the third quarter, although Shallowater did get to the Friona 35, where the Chieftains held and took over.

The Chieftains decided to get back on the scoreboard. Runningback Kendrick carried the ball six times in the eight-play drive, having gains of six, three, five, 15 and two, and then went the remaining 20 yards untouched on a third down play.

Vega's kick made it 33-6, and allowed the reserves to play the final series of downs. The King-to-Ellis scoring pass is the second-longest pass play in FHS records compiled by this writer.

Kendrick had a whopping 184 yards rushing, easily his best of the season, and King rushed for 56 yards and passed for 101 more.

The win gave Friona a 3-2-1 lead in the series.

Mr. Phipps was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church where he had served as an Elder for many, many years. He also served many years as a school trustee at Stegall.

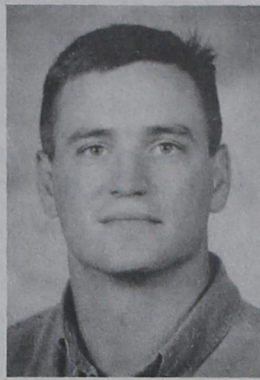

## County SWCD Sets Director Election

An election of a Soil and Water Conservation District director to serve zone five on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District #140 is scheduled for October 7, 1997 in Wilbur Ellis at Clay's Corner, M.C. Osborn, chairman of the board, announced. The election will be at 9 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and Water Conservation District director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be eighteen years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be eighteen years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation District directors serve four-year terms of office.

Zone five of the district includes all land in the Midway and the Lazbuddie school district, the same of which is now the Lazbuddie school district since their recent combination.

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District are M.C. Osborn, chairman; Troy Christian, vice-president; Kevin Welch, secretary; Mike Beauchamp, member and

Mike Miller, member. The purpose of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation district with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations. The district has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

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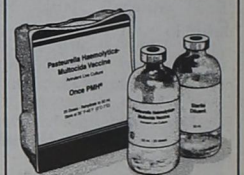
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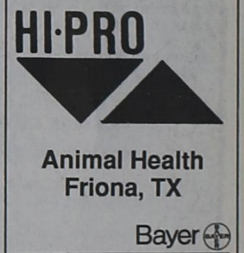

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# Out Here

How much is a human life worth? I'm sometimes troubled by that question.

It seems to come up often. Comedians write a lot of material about Dr. Kervorkian, whose name has become synonymous with death through assisted suicide.

Most people, if asked, would put life first without hesitation. Consider the pro-life vs. abortion issue. It is a debate that will never have a solution.

Even if the federal government enacted a law making abortions illegal they would not stop. Legislating morals and basic human instincts does not work.

And in my opinion, individual moral behavior is not a federal function. If government intervention in our daily lives spreads, no doubt someday using common sense in public will be outlawed.

"Halt! FBI. We just saw you exhibit individual good judgement right out here in the open. You're under arrest!"

What's the value of life? It is a question preachers try to answer every Sunday. It is a dilemma played out daily in hospitals across the world.

Traffic accidents and criminal or domestic violence leave victims on life support, clinically dead. Families are forced to make life decisions. It is a cruel irony.

I have often wondered why it is that if an individual wants to take their own life, the rest of us go to great lengths to prevent it. Why, really, do we prolong lives so fiercely?

Is it because death is so final? We think that the desire to die is a temporary emotional aberration and the person does not realize the consequences so we must save them from themselves.

Do we think that as long as we can keep terminally ill people barely alive, a miracle may happen for them?

Families often destroy themselves, spending all their material assets to keep a loved one legally alive, for seemingly unending years.

Yet history has shown that life can be cheap. Millions and millions of lives have been lost in places like Cambodia, Russia, Central and Southern Africa. We will never be allowed to forget the Holocaust where 6 million Jews were murdered.

Today in Algiers, rebels are raiding towns and killing 200-300 villagers at a time. Jews, Palestinians, and Arabs have been killing each other for centuries. To a suicide bomber, life is no more important than warm spit.

I believe we have a right to live as long as we can. I also believe we should have the right to die. Peacefully and with as much dignity as possible.

I do not believe in killing people but I do support a person's right to choose death over agony and suffering.

Which brings me back to the original question. How much is a human life worth?

Discussing life and death is in the same category as sex, politics, and religion. Emotions can run high.

Here in America, very often a life is evaluated in dollars. Lawyers have managed to escalate the value of death far beyond what a life may have been worth had the person lived.

On August 16, 1993, Gregorio Gutierrez, 43, his wife Maria, 34, and 13-year-old son Greg, Jr., died in a grinding collision with a Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corp. train. Their 1984 Mercury was struck broadside and crushed.

The accident occurred around 8 a.m. at a grade crossing about a mile west of Friona. Mr. Gutierrez was employed at a truck wash located on the other side of the tracks. There were no bells or signals at the dirt crossing.

Some say the early morning sun could have blinded him so that he didn't see the train.

The engineer and the conductor said the train's whistle blew as they approached the crossing.

Witnesses said they only heard the noise of the crash followed by the screeching of the train's emergency brakes--but no whistle.

One of those witnesses, Jim Atwell of Friona, was at work on his farm adjacent to the truck wash. He said he did not hear a train whistle.

Last week he testified to that fact in El Paso. The couple's parents and their three surviving children had filed suit against the railroad.

In an ironic sense, the family was lucky Jim Atwell was already at work that morning.

Those who know him can attest to Jim's honesty and integrity. He is a hard worker, a family guy to whom a handshake or a commitment still means something. (That ought to get him some pretty good "ribbing" around town. Sorry Jim.)

If he says he didn't hear a whistle, you can take it to the bank. Which is what the defense lawyers did. They flew Jim to El Paso, he testified, they flew him home.

His was not the only testimony in the trial. The defense called him near the end. Smart move, I guess.

Maybe you missed the small article on page 7A of last Sunday's Amarillo Globe. The headline read: "Railroad to Appeal \$60 million Verdict." An El Paso County jury found the railroad grossly negligent in failing to sound a whistle to warn the Gutierrez family of the train's approach.

Money can never replace the loss of parents for the three surviving children. Money cannot replace loved one's for any of us.

On the other hand, money can make the future

better, more secure. Money can be used to replace the loss of earning potential caused by the death of the breadwinner in the family.

I wonder what the \$60 million verdict was based on. Seems to me there has to be some yardstick by which the value of a life is measured. If all life is precious, and it is, why are some deaths worth more than others?

No one reading this column can prove that their lifetime earning potential is \$60 million. So what criteria does a jury use? Vengeance? Naked emotion? Sympathy?

Money makes the lawyers really happy. How much better does it get in the lawyer game than an unmarked train crossing, three deaths, and no whistle. It is the kind of case that makes a lawyer pucker.

The appeals will take time. Chances are that an out of court settlement will be made. Life will go on. At least some will.

How much is a human life worth? I have no idea why one is worth \$60 million and another is not worth a wad of belly button lint.

But that's what I like about life. It is so darn stupid, it keeps life interesting.

I don't answer the questions, I just ask 'em.

## Flu Shots Are Urged; Especially For Elderly

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) urges all Texans to get yearly flu vaccinations. The experts also warn that the elderly and others who may be at high risk of influenza and its complications should be immunized even before the flu season begins.

The flu season usually lasts from December through April.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year predicts which strains of influenza pose the greatest public health danger in the U.S.

The vaccine CDC has recommended for the 1997-98 season is meant to combat the A/Wuhan, A/Bayern and B/Beijing strains of the disease. The effectiveness of each year's shots declines with time, therefore, annual immunizations with the appropriate vaccines are recommended for everyone except people with serious allergies to eggs.

People most at risk of severe or fatal complications of the disease include those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems, diabetics and children on aspirin therapy.

Influenza kills about 20,000 in the U.S. each year. According to Jim Schuermann, public health technician in the TDH Infectious Disease Epidemiology and Surveillance Division, the elderly are the group hardest hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 per cent of elderly Americans and others in high-risk groups heed our regular warnings to have yearly influenza vaccinations," he said. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of a persistent, unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza."

The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strains of influenza, but not from the vaccine. If they do become ill with flu, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of the case.

Other categories of people who are most likely to develop influenza complications are:

\*Adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma.

\*People under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, diabetes, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems.

\*Children (18 and younger) who already are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye's syndrome after influenza.

"We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in high-risk groups, international travelers or pregnant women," Schuermann advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flu complications."

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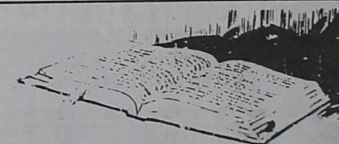
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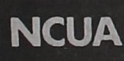

### About Eye Makeup

\*Avoid lash-lengthening mascara. It has fibers that can irritate the eye and damage lenses, too.

\*Use hair spray or nail polish remover before inserting lenses, first washing hands carefully to remove chemical residue.
