## FORGET THE COWBOYS, Broncos, et al. Never mind Penn State, Nebraska, Florida. Move over, Mojo, Sealy, Wink, and Springlake-Earth.

The best football this season is being played in Parmer County, Texas. Small town football is alive and well in Parmer County.

Probably for the first time since they've all been fielding teams, the four Parmer County high schools finished the mid-point of their seasons with a combined 19-1 record.

That's a winning percentage of .950, thank you very much! All three of the 11-man teams hit the halfway point of the season (if you're going to only play 10 games) with 5-0 records. Lazbuddie's Longhorns have suffered our only loss for the season so far. Their record is 4-1.

Friona's Chieftains, hoping to repeat as champions in District 1-3A, have scored 171 points (had 21 other points called back for penalties), and allowed 51. Last year's state semi-finalists, and the only Panhandle team competing in games 14 and 15, the Chieftains have now won 18 of their last 19 games, and are ranked sixth in state by the Associated Press.

Pre-season hype had River Road as Friona's top rival. The Wildcats did give the Chieftains a game for three quarters before bowing, 33-20. Now it appears that Dimmitt will be their biggest obstacle.

One sportswriter said "In the past, if you said the Dimmitt Bobcats had a big game this week, you would assume that basketball season had started." Those who have followed the Chieftains for any length of time can identify with that statement.

Bovina's Mustangs, also back from a playoff appearance, hit the 5-0 mark after a close call against Lorenzo, 14-12. The Mustangs have been pointing to their October 17 date with Lockney as their hopes for a district title.

The Mustangs forged an 8-2 record in 1996, and we can't remember another year in which both Bovina and Friona made the grid playoffs.

If quarterback Tony Beauchamp's injury doesn't keep him from being 100 per cent next Friday, many folks have thought that the Mustangs might surprise the pre-season favorite Longhorns.

Bovina has scored 158 points and given up only 37. Farwell's Steers hit the mid-point at 5-0, having scored 156 points and allowed just 30. The Steers have been playing in the shadow of district mate Springlake-Earth, which has been ranked third in the state most of the season.

The Steers and Wolverines clash this Friday, so it's a battle of undefeated teams. Farwell's main problem is that four other district mates, S-E, Kress, Nazareth and Sudan, are playoff veterans. It's a stacked district, and like Friona's, has eight members, which is about three too many.

Lazbuddie's only blemish has been a 44-20 loss to Samnorwood, a non-district loss. The 'Horns were state semi-finalists in six-man in 1992, and would like to do that again. They host Silverton October 17, in a game that will give the winner the inside track for district honors.

Lazbuddie made it to the regional finals last year, posting a 10-2 season record. The Longhorns are paced by junior QB Josh Morris. Lazbuddie has been in the playoffs eight of the last nine years.

We heard this week that old Tiger Stadium in Detroit had a sign in the dressing room area that should have been photographed and sent to Jay Leno. The sign said "Visitors' Clubhouse. No visitors allowed."

Sort of reminds Ye Editor of his futile attempt to gain a seat in the press box at Dalhart last year. There was no pressbox on the visitors' side, so I went up the 50 steep steps on their pressbox that I had traversed in the past, only to find that visiting scouts and the home coaches with their two-way mikes had every spot filled.

"Sorry, we don't have a space for you," they told me. I made the remark that I had always assumed that the term "pressbox" was intended for reporters and/or broadcasters, but it didn't do much good. Oh, well: the Chieftains beat the Wolves 44-21, rolling up their third-most yardage in history. I enjoyed every minute of it.

## Chiefs Visit Rival Muleshoe Friday

One of Friona's oldest sports rivalries will be renewed Friday night in Muleshoe, when the Chieftains take on the Mules. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

"They are a much-improved team. We are wary of Muleshoe, as they are coming off a big win at Dalhart last week," Coach James Morton said.

"I think Muleshoe and Friona will always be a rivalry--and It helps our program," the coach commented.

The Mules snapped a three-game losing streak last week with their 15-6 win over Dalhart. The three losses were to excellent teams: Denver City and Springlake, both on the road, and Dimmitt, who is co-district leader with Friona.

"Their quarterback (Matt McClanahan) throws real well, and also runs well," Morton said. McClanahan was a starter at QB last year as a sophomore. He has passed for 288 yards, but his completion ratio (28 of 68) isn't nearly as

good as Aaron King's (16 of 34). King has also thrown for a two-point conversion.

"They also have an outstanding offensive tackle, Rick Aguirre. He is listed at 275 pounds, and is every bit of that," Morton said. Aguirre is touted as one of the district's premier linemen.

Greg Pena, 190-pound fullback, and Gilbert Vela, 165-pound runningback, are the top rushers for the Mules.

Meanwhile, Matt Kendrick has become the leading rusher in both district and area 3A leading rusher. Kendrick has stepped into his older brother Andy's shoes in Friona's backfield right well.

Muleshoe's coach David Wood said "Kendrick is one of the hardest runners I've seen. He's just determined to get the extra yard."

Wood said the Mules need to cut down on their mistakes and control the ball more. "If we can stay in the game until the fourth quarter, we have a chance," Wood said.

The Mules were plagued in their early games by penalties and turnovers.

Muleshoe-Friona is the oldest rivalry in point of time, starting in 1926. Friona has won 24 games, and Muleshoe 21. The teams tied 0-0 here in 1958. Friona is hoping for their fifth straight win.

An indication of what can happen was the 1994 game, when the district champion Chieftains had to hold on for a 9-6 win at Chieftain Field.

## Mayor Is Elected To PRPC Board

At the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) annual banquet on Thursday, October 1, 1997, at the Tascosa Country Club in Amarillo, Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe was elected to serve on the Board of Directors of the PRPC.

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission is a voluntary association of cities, counties and special districts in the Texas Panhandle.

Established in 1969, the Planning Commission assists local governments in planning, developing, and implementing programs designed to improve the general health, safety, and welfare of the citizens in the Texas Panhandle.

The PRPC is an association of local governments, formed with the idea that local governments can get more done together than alone.

Current activities include programs of workforce development, aging, community development, economic development, dispute resolution, emergency communications, criminal justice, solid waste management, regional services and technical assistance.

The Panhandle region covers a 26-county area consisting of almost 26,000 square miles. The region's population is 371,956.

The PRPC has 92 member governments, including the 26 counties, 58 cities, and 8 special districts. The 1997-98 budget is \$7.5 million, about \$38,000 more than last year.

Monroe has served on the Friona city council since 1978 and has been mayor since 1983.

## 65 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 12, 1932

The local board of school trustees is finding it a hard task to meet all financial obligations of the district and at the same time keep the school in operation until the current taxes begin coming in. It has been suggested that the board try to pay one-half of all salaries of teachers and bus drivers until more funds are received. It is hoped that all taxpayers who can possibly do so will meet their tax payments as soon as possible after November 1.

## 55 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 9, 1942

Ray Landrum, proprietor of the Regal Theatre, who is now employed at loading bombs at the Pan-Tex Ordinance Plant, came home Saturday evening and spent the weekend here with his family.

While in Friona this week, H.C. McCandless of Santa Anna, California, sold his residence pro-party here to Frank A. Spring.

## 45 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 10, 1952

Committeemen representing the 13 counties in the Hi-Plains Water Conservation District voted to require permits for drilling water wells and to leave well spacing in the hands of county committees. The action, taken at a meeting in the Hotel Jim Hill at Hereford October 2, was a followup of recommendations made at recent county meetings in the district. Only one dissenting report was presented against the well permit and spacing action. Parmer County farmers, committeeman Bruce Parr reported, are opposed to any rule which would limit their freedom in drilling wells.

## 40 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 10, 1957

Easements for 7.2 miles of new farm-to-market road right-of-way has been arranged with property owners bordering the proposed road, reports E.G. Phipps, county commissioner. ## Protect Against Infection While In The Hospital

(NAPS)—Although hospitals are known to make sick people well, one out of every 20 patients will become sicker because of infections they acquire after they enter the hospital. These hospital-acquired diseases—which claim 80,000 lives and cost the American health-care system more than \$4.5 billion each year—are most frequently caused by bacteria.

Bacteria can infect a patient through the air, patient-to-patient contact, health-care workers who have been in contact with infected patients, and unsterilized utensils or bedding. One of the most common routes of hospital-acquired infection is the use of catheters used to supply nutrients or medicine or to drain fluids after surgery.

These catheters are indispensable in modern medicine. Dennis Maki, MD, head of the Section of Infectious Diseases at the University of Wisconsin Medical School, agrees. "Central venous catheters are essential to modern day health care for total nutritional support by vein and to adminis-

ter chemotherapeutic agents and high concentrations of antibiotics."

Until recently, bacteria could contaminate the surface of any catheter and enter directly into the patient's bloodstream. But Dr. Maki and a team of researchers from UW have just published results of research that they conducted on a novel series of catheters impregnated with silver sulfadiazine and chlorhexidine, an antiseptic agent. This agent limits the chances for bacteria to survive on the catheter and infect patients.

In the report, published in the August 15 edition of *Annals of Internal Medicine*, Dr. Maki's team found an 80 percent reduction in the rate of hospital-acquired infections when these novel catheters (manufactured by Arrow International of Reading, PA) were used instead of traditional catheters.

According to Dr. Maki, anyone who is being admitted to a hospital should ask his or her physician about the infection-protection methods that will be used.

# Chieftains Score Vital Win Over River Road

For awhile there last Friday night, between the resurgent River Road Wildcats and a series of crippling flags against Friona, it looked as though the Chieftains might lose their first game of the season.

But like the champions they are, the Chieftains kept their heads. They drew a line in the sand, and allowed the Wildcats only 47 net yards during the last 11:51 of the game, and made a pair of lengthy drives which consumed over 8:30 of the period.

The result was a 33-20 win for Friona, getting the team off to a 2-0 district record.

Prior to the season, this sixth game of the season had been targeted by Amarillo media as perhaps the deciding game for District 1-3A.

Although the 'Cats may have been hurt by some early injuries, most of the Friona fans would attest that the 20-0 River Road run in the second half was more like the game that had been expected here in August.

Neither team claimed a first-quarter score. Friona drove to the RR 23, but a fumble ended that early threat.

On Friona's third possession, the Chieftains put together a flawless 80-yard drive. A nice 32-yard run by QB Aaron King moved the ball from Friona's 38 to the Wildcat 30.

A penalty against the Chiefs, and a sack to King threatened to stall the drive. But Matthew Kendrick burst up the middle 11 yards for a first down at the 15, and then used another good hole plus a nice move for a 15-yard touchdown run. Angel Vega's perfect kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead, 1:51 into the second quarter.

River Road tried to answer, driving 32 yards following the kickoff to Friona's 40. The 'Cats made the decision to go for the yardage on fourth and six, and King made an excellent defensive play on the long pass, which fell incomplete.

Kendrick burst through for a vital seven-yard gain on another fourth down attempt as Friona drove to the Wildcat 43.

King then dropped back and looped a perfect pass to Vega, who caught the ball over his shoulder at full speed, and raced into the end zone for the touchdown, his third in two games. The little speedster then added the PAT kick, and the score became 14-0 with 4:24 left in the half.

The Wildcats almost fumbled the kickoff. --In fact, many Friona fans thought the ball was recovered by the Chiefs. Then, on their first offensive play, Wildcat QB Jerod Fikac's pitchout meant for Chris Floyd went behind him. King recovered at the River Road 18.

Two plays later, King lobbed a pass over the middle, which was smothered by Jesus Mata in the end zone. Vega was three for three in the kicking department, and Friona fans breathed a little easier with a 21-0 lead. The Chieftains had scored twice in less than a minute of clock time!

The 'Cats drove to midfield but on their next play their rushing star, Trenton Mills (21) was hit a lick. The ball spurted free, and Richard Flores recovered for Friona, with 1:21 left in the half.

Daniel Cuevas, who had his best game of the season, burst up the middle for 30 yards to the River Road 32. King hit Vega for a 17-yard gain to the Wildcat 15, and then King appeared to have a touchdown when a holding penalty wiped out the score.

Calm and collected, King again lofted a pass toward the end zone, and Kendrick made a nice catch for the touchdown. Officials ruled

Vega's kick wide, but Friona had captured a 27-0 lead, having scored three touchdowns in less than four minutes of clock time.

The Wildcats took the second-half kickoff, and came out with a purpose. Mills ran the ball four straight times and racked up gains of 16, 17, 6 and 6. Then Fikac hit Cody Smith on a 22-yard TD pass, and the kick got River Road on the scoreboard at 27-7.

Vega ran the kickoff to the 40, but the first of several flags against Friona moved the team back to their own eight. They had to punt after making one first down.

Five plays later, Mills broke loose for a 64-yard scoring run, and the kick

made it a 27-14 game with 4:58 left in the third.

Kendrick made a nice run to the 31, and then King broke loose for what should have been a 54-yard gain to the River Road 15. But Friona was flagged for holding, and the ball came back to the Friona 31.

Another penalty against FHS led to another punt and the Wildcats set out from their own 23. Six plays later, Fikac hit Aaron Wise on a sideline pattern, and Wise had clear sailing to the end zone.

The third R.R. touchdown came on the first play of the fourth quarter, and the Wildcats had trimmed Friona's four-touchdown lead to 27-20.

The snake-bit Chieftains then set out on a drive from their own 26. Five plays into the drive, Kendrick ran 52 yards for what appeared to be a touchdown. But Friona again was flagged for a foul, and the ball came back to midfield.

But, give the '97 Chieftains credit. They didn't let adversity ruin their plans. Runs by Kendrick and Cuevas advanced the ball, with Kendrick finally getting a TD that officials "let stand."

A low snap foiled the kick, but the 33-20 lead with 8:01 to play looked much better.

On River Road's third play, Fikac tried a long pass,

but King came up to intercept the pass and give Friona possession at their 23 with 7:25 left to play.

Led by the King-Kendrick combo, Friona moved the ball 72 yards to the R.R. three. On third down, a pitchout was fumbled, with the 'Cats recovering. However, only two minutes remained in the game, and the charged up Friona defense finished off the win.

"We just tried to keep our heads up," said quarterback King, referring to the tough third quarter. "Coach Morton told us that the fourth quarter would be ours, and we finally got it going again. They (River Road) mainly hit us on some big plays, where we failed to cover."

"In the end, we got it done," said the Chieftain signal-caller, who was honored this week as the "Player of the Week" for the area by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Kendrick gained 216 yards, King 112 and Cuevas 111.

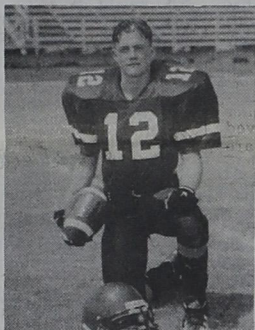

WTPS meets at 7 p.m. the first Thursday of each month at the Knipling Center on the sixth floor of the west parking garage at Methodist Hospital. "We welcome anyone with Parkinson's Disease and their care-givers," the president said.

# Out Here

*"101 Friona"  
"Go ahead 101"  
"Gonna be 10-8"  
"10-4"*

If you have a scanner, you know Doris Richards.

She is the calm, soothing, efficient voice communicating with county law enforcement, fire and EMS personnel between the hours of 3 p.m. to 11 p.m.

She is the voice that sorts out the panic, routes instructions, and provides confident security to personnel out in the field.

Whether it is a traffic ticket, a wild-goose chase, or a serious problem, she is the "go ahead" response heard around the county.

That is up to now she was that calm voice. After 28 years of service, Doris Richards said her final 10-4 and her last "go ahead" on Tuesday.

At her retirement Doris is the most senior city employee in terms of years of service.

When she came to work as a part-time dispatcher in 1969, Bill Denny was chief of police and there were three officers.

Communications were done on a clanking, noisy teletype. The department had radios about which Doris says you "could almost talk to Clovis on good days."

In 1971 Doris became a full-time dispatcher. For most of her 28 years she has worked the evening shift. Her only break in service came in 1991 when she quit for five months to pursue private business but returned for another six years.

The small dispatch office at the front of the police station is now loaded with whiz-bang electronic communication equipment which she could only dream about in 1969.

She was there when 911 came to Parmer County. She was there when teletypes and typewriters were replaced by computers, even though the dispatch office still has a typewriter. Even a dispatcher needs backup.

When she became full-time in 1971, current police

chief Randy Geries was ten-years-old and a couple of our officers were not born yet.

She recalls at least six police chiefs she has worked for and has a list of all officers she worked with too. She says that list is very long.

All 911 calls in the county come through Friona and dispatchers alert the proper personnel to respond. (911 calls that come from the Farwell area are transferred to the Sheriff's dispatch office.)

She says her worst times were when emergency calls came from a rural area and the caller tried to give directions to the location of the emergency.

"They are numbering county roads now", Richards says. "Hopefully sometime in the future, all residents will learn their address by number which will make response quicker."

However, she admits that it will take a long time for old-timers to learn a new system. She says many times she was frustrated by a panicked caller who would say, "you know, we are out that dirt road by the old so-and-so place."

"I just had to try and calm somebody down and get them to tell me in miles", Richards said.

She remembers once when a rookie officer was so proud of his uniform and gun that he tried a quick draw at the station with dismal results.

"He was showing off for the midnight dispatcher", she said, remembering with a smile. "The gun went off. The bullet ricocheted around the office and ended up putting a hole in the chief's office door." Her dispatcher colleague had a good father to son talk with the young officer.

One incident in particular still disturbs her. Officers arrested two Indian youths, a 13-year-old girl and an older teen. They discovered the young man was wanted for kidnapping the underage girl and officers around the state were searching for them.

Doris says they booked the young man on the

charges and while attempting to put him in a cell, the 13-year-old girl started cussing, yelling, and fighting officers to keep her boyfriend out of jail.

Doris says in the scuffle, she lost a "handful of hair" to the girl. She says when the girl finally sat down outside her office she kept yelling back to her boyfriend everything they were doing.

"I just wanted to take that little girl across my lap and spank her bottom. She made me so mad, and sad because I had a 13-year-old at home at that time myself."

Richards had three children, Tammy, Rhonda, and Randy, all of whom grew up here and graduated from the Friona school system.

Many people will remember her daughter, Rhonda Bentley, who died of cancer in June of 1995. "Rhonda had many friends," Doris said. "She was only 38 and was an active mom and girl scout leader. The people of Friona were wonderful to our family during Rhonda's illness."

Yesterday, October 9, Doris Richards celebrated her 60th birthday. Almost half of her years she gave to the citizens of Parmer County.

For about 10 years, Doris has operated a part-time bookkeeping and tax service business from her home. She also does typing, creates flyers, makes copies, and is a notary public.

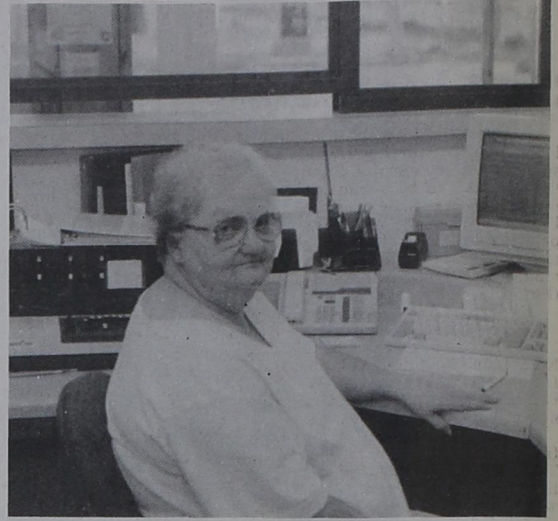
So in case you think Doris Richards is completely retired and out of touch, she is not. Her daughter Tammy is studying tax preparation.

# Thomas Gibson Submits Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times" and for printing in The Friona Star and Bovina Blade. This month we feature Thomas Gibson.

I was born on March 16, 1913 in Tupelo, Mississippi to Nola Lamb and Ben Gibson. I had four sisters, Mertel, Benji, Gussi, and Willie Ora and my brother, Durrel.

In the year of 1919, my family moved to Dodson, Texas. Pop farmed and I helped out in the field. Mom was a housewife. I started school in Dodson and went up to the eighth grade.

Our home was small and cozy. We had no running water. Our house had gutters all around the top and when it rained the water would run into the cistern.

The cistern would hold 200 gallons of water. We always kept it covered. When we ran out of water from the cistern, Pop and I had to travel two miles to the nearest well and haul water in wooden barrels.

I married at the age of nineteen to Letress Black from Hollis, Oklahoma. I met Letress at a dance held in an old abandoned house between Dodson, Texas and Hollis, Oklahoma. These dances were held every weekend.

Letress and I had a home built in Dodson. I was a truck driver and hauled cotton seed and cotton for three years. Our daughters, Sue and Joyce were born

while we were living in Dodson.

In 1939 we moved to Friona. I worked on a farm for Mr. Osborn as a mechanic for eight years. During this time we had four more children, Merlene, Thomas, Lee and Linda.

Later I went to work for "Red" McFarland at Parmer County Implement as a mechanic for ten years. Then I worked for D. C. Herring at the John Deere business as a mechanic until I retired.

My wife and I kept a garden and did lots of canning. We enjoyed fishing and camping. We had a camper that was always filled with everything that was needed. We just had to hook it up and take off. We had good times together.

My wife passed away in the year of 1988.

Lee and Sylvia live in Friona and have two daughters and a son. Linda and Carl Osborn live in Friona and have two daughters and a son. Joyce and Glen White live in Farwell and have three daughters and a son.

Sue and Elmo Barrett live in Amarillo and have three daughters and a son. Thomas and Faye live in Kansas and have two daughters and two sons. Merlene and Eugene Starks live in Florida and have four sons and a daughter.

I have two sisters still living, Benji, who lives in Amarillo and Willie Ora lives in Dallas.

I came to Prairie Acres in August of this year.

## CRP Signup Will Begin This Month

The 16th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) signup will begin October 14 and will run until November 14.

Parmer County is located within a state air quality priority area so most of the land in the county is automatically eligible for the program during this signup period.

All land that was previously in a CRP contract which has expired, been withdrawn, or scheduled to expire September 30, 1998 is eligible to bid during this signup. Also, any new acres may be offered for CRP during this signup.

All CRP bids are ranked and are accepted on a priority basis. Environmental benefits and cost are the two primary factors. Environmental benefits can be improved by offering to enhance existing grass stands by planting at least 51 per cent of the acreage to a native mixture of grasses, forbs or legumes.

The maximum "point" value would be a mixture of five grasses consisting of at least three native grasses and at least one legume. For new land being offered the same criteria would apply.

An added bonus of ten points is available during this signup if water for wildlife can be provided on or within a quarter mile of the CRP land on a year round basis.

CRP rental rates are tied to an average rate for each soil type. The average rental rate for Parmer

county is \$36.00 which includes a \$5.00/acre maintenance adjustment. A typical Olton soil rental rate would be \$39.00.

Producers can bid the maximum or choose to lower their bid to increase their "points." Each dollar bid below the maximum is worth one point for up to fifteen points.

Producers also have the option to accept cost-share for establishing grass on either existing stands and new acres. Cost-share for establishment is equal to fifty per cent not to exceed \$65.00/acre.

If a producer elects not to receive cost-share, his "point" value is ten points higher.

The signup will take place at the Farm Service Center in Farwell. During signup, FSA and NRCS personnel will be available to advise participants on how to make their offer most competitive and will calculate maximum bid prices.

At this time each producer must decide on several critical items: (1) How much land to offer; (2) What type grass cover to establish; on existing grass stands to offer what is on the land or agree to overseed to other grasses; (3) Will you provide water for wildlife? (4) Bid the maximum or accept a lower rate; (5) Accept cost-share or not.

## YOUR EYES

### Applying Eye Drops

It seems simple enough. You're supposed to put a few drops in your eyes. Easier said than done. Chances are you've had the experience. You put medication in your eye only to have it immediately spill out. Here are some precautions and steps you might take to assure that the medication stays in and works.

Start by washing your hands. Read the recommended dosage and stick to it. Lie down or sit up with your head tilted back and put in the drops. Once in, keep your eyes closed for 30 to 60 seconds. This encourages absorption of the drug. Do not blink for a few minutes. Finally, hold your index finger at the junction of your lower eyelid and nose for a few minutes. This blocks the opening of your tear outflow canal and cuts down on drainage.
