# Clyde Grows; Outlook Bright, Leaders Say

Clyde, the garden spot of West Texas, sits atop a pool of wealth more valuable than oil. For beneath its rich, sandy soil is water -- said to be unlimited in quantity.

Water is playing a big role in Clyde's growth. People are moving here in increasing numbers. They come for many reasons -- low taxes, suburban atmosphere, cheaper building costs and because things grow so easily.

Whether its roses, grapes or just grass, Clyde has historically been known as the "Little California of West Texas" and water is the big reason. A plentiful supply is available at less than 40 feet. Even many homes within the city limits which are tied on to the city water lines also have wells for gardening or irrigation.

Many of the businessmen say Clyde will double in size during the next three to five years.

A slogan used by Clyde merchants in their promotional efforts might sum up the reason why the town is attractive to newcomers, "A Good Place to Live."

## New Growth

It's hard to pinpoint population in Clyde because the old, established city limits don't take in much of the new growth. In 1950 the population inside the city limits was 908. But educators guessers as to the population in "metropolitan" Clyde today (including the homes within a mile or so of the city limits) run between 2,000 and 3,000. The West Texas Utilities office here figured in 1955 it was serving around 2,800 people in the Clyde trade area, which would extend a little further out. It was serving 637 customers in the immediate Clyde area at the end of April. Figured at the rate of 3.4 persons per meter, a figure often used in estimating population, there would be 2,163 per-

sons in the close proximity of Clyde.

Most everybody you talk to says Clyde will grow. Their opinions differ at to the rate of growth. Tommy Odum, whose Clyde Telephone Co. has increased from 119 phones in 1950 to 600 today, says Clyde will double in population within three years. Odum and H. E. (Chick) Swofford, insurance and real estate man, are two of the town's leading boosters. Swofford says: "I don't believe it's possible for Clyde to keep from doubling in size within five years, and it may be even sooner if present trends continue."

Odum says Clyde will grow because, "People have just discovered our unusual soil and water conditions. We think our growth has just started. People are coming from everywhere."

Up to 150 New Homes

In the past five years, business leaders say up to 150 new homes have been built in the immediate vicinity.

Mayor R. L. Luncford, 68, says he thinks Clyde will increase in population at least 70 per cent in the next two years. "I think there are several reasons why this will happen," he said. "First our low taxes, and second we're such an easy drive from Abilene. We have a world of water, and our young people want Clyde to grow."

Luncford estimates 30 per cent of Clyde's population works in Abilene. Other businessmen say it's 50 per cent, at least.

All of them agree that Clyde needs a bank. Clyde citizens now their banking in Baird, just six miles away, or in Abilene. With the mushrooming population, the town will have a bank soon, many agree. Odum said, "We won't have any trouble capitalizing a bank. We just need an experienced banker to come over here and run it."

Home building is picking up momentum. The new Bryant

Acres Addition, southeast of the high school, is now being developed. There are 71 lots in the development, the lots to be sold by B & H Development Co. of Abilene. A spokesman for the company said this week that plans are now in to FHA for 20 homes to be built by Nathan Morris of Abilene. Several lots have already been sold to individuals who are building in the \$12,000 to \$18,000 class.

A new street has been cut through the Bryant Acres Addition and is nearly complete. Utilities are installed, ready for home construction.

Just east of the old Baird highway and northeast of Bryant Acres, several new homes are being built by C. C. Broyles of Abilene. A new street has been cut through in this area, too. Other homes have been built along the old Baird road by Swofford and A. B. Foster. Besides the additions, new homes have sprung up over all of the older portions of town and along the rural roads outside the city limits.

Clyde has four churches, Baptist, Methodist, Catholic and Church of Christ, and its residents say it is a "church-going" town.

More In School

Its school population has increased from 465 in the 1954-55 school year to 567 during the 1958-59 term, and high school enrollment from 124 to 152 in the same span. Its new high school was completed in 1955 and has 12 rooms.

With school enrollment increasing steadily a need is arising for another new school. Swofford, who is president of the school board, said, "It won't be long before we're going to need another school, and I think a junior high is our next move."

A new \$20,000 vocational agriculture building was added last year at the high school and \$3,000 spent on gymnasium improvements this year.

Clyde has one doctor and a clinic. There has been talk about a small hospital but nothing has been done yet.

City bonded indebtedness is low, with \$45,200 in water and sewer bonds outstanding, dating from 1926 and 1956. City taxes are 60 cents per \$100 evaluation with the assessments being based on about 50 per cent of actual property value.

Clyde Manufacturing Co. is the largest manufacturing concern in town. Operated by Douglas and Elbert Bonline, it has been here a year. The Bonlines manufacture lollipops for the retail and advertising trade. In the other portion of their building they have an air-conditioner plant, manufacturing evaporative coolers and duct work. The Bonlines are shipping lollipops into 44 states now, using direct mail to advertise their goods.

Lions Have Building

The Clyde Lions Club serves as the town's chamber of commerce. J. M. Pveatt will replace A. N. Johnson as president in June. The Lions have their own building south of the T&P Railroad, and it also serves as a community center.

Finding a house to rent is difficult. One real estate man said, "There hasn't been a vacant house in Clyde in the last 10 years." Average rent runs \$40 to \$50 a month, he said.

Because of cheaper lots, building costs are less, often meaning a saving of up to \$2,000 in building an average three bedroom home.

Municipal affairs are directed by the City Council. Luncford is mayor, Emmett Eager, mayor pro-tem; Bill Shelton, fire marshal; Mel Green, cemetery and parks; John Estes, streets and lights; Harold Holden, sewer and health. Luncford and Estes are the two new members, elected in April. Luncford, who first came to Callahan County 42 years ago, is in the sand and gravel hauling business. He succeeded C.

## Rev. Ottinger New Methodist Pastor

Rev. Cecil Ottinger, who has been pastor of the Rotan Methodist Church the past year, was transferred to the Baird Methodist Church in the Annual Conference of Methodist churches held in Abilene last week.

Rev. and Mrs. Ottinger come highly recommended. Mrs. Ottinger has specialized in Youth work. They have one daughter, who is married.

Rev. T. G. Craft, who has served the Baird church as pastor the past two years, is retiring from active work, and was super-annuated at the conference. He has been a member of the Methodist conference for 35 years, and he and Mrs. Craft plan to take a much needed rest and vacation before deciding just where they will make their future home.

**As It Looks From Here . . .**

Omar Burleson, M. C. 17th District, Texas  
Washington - There is a growing menace of mail order obscenity. The sale of obscene lit-

erature and photographs by mail has now reach sales estimated at more than half a billion dollars a year.

The Postmaster General has emphasized that the absolute privacy of the mail is a basic American right. The Post Office does not and should not violate this right unless it has absolute evidence that the mail is being used for unlawful purposes. For the Post Office Department to reach this problem and prosecute offenders, they must rely on the complaints of an alert citizenry.

Until August of 1958 an additional handicap was on the Post Office Department. Obscenity laws had shackled the Government by permitting it to prosecute only at the point of origin of the mail. This meant that court actions occurred mostly in New York City and Los Angeles, but could not be prosecuted in the community where it was received. In the first place, the offense was difficult to prove by witnesses, and second, the standards of morality and decency are usually different in the place where this filth is received than from the cities where it is mailed.

In 1958 an amendment was enacted into law, which permits the Post Office Department to prosecute violations where the obscene material is received, as well as where it was mailed. During the past year 14,000 separate investigations have been completed. About two-thirds of the investigations were based on complaints from American parents whose children receive lewd and obscene materials through the mails.

A child need not have indicated any interest in this trash to receive it. The peddlers of filth openly solicit young people whose names they can obtain by various methods. They have all sorts of schemes, such as an advertisement to purchase some innocent item such as a baseball bat, a doll or an air rifle. They receive the child's name and they are then on the mailing list.

In a recent raid by Postal In-

spectors in New York City, one dealer in pornography had 17 tons of highly obscene printed and filmed material for mailing, and lists containing the names of thousands of school students, culled out of high school year-books.

The Post Office Department estimates that between 700,000 and a million children in American homes will receive unsolicited obscene and pornographic literature through the mails this year.

Undoubtedly the defiant peddlers of obscenity are contributing to the alarming increase in juvenile delinquency.

From investigations of armed robbery, extortion, embezzlement and forgery, authorities find that those guilty were early collectors of obscene pictures and films.

The Post Office Department is urging an intense effort to stop this monstrous practice on the Nation's children. To achieve the greatest possible cooperation, those responsible for the enforcement announce a four-fold program which is:

1. Drawing maximum public attention to the menace of this racket;
2. Urging parents to help apprehend the mailers of filth to their children;

3. Help mobilize community support behind adequate law enforcement of local ordinances of state laws;

4. Rallying public opinion behind new and stiffer legislation on obscenity.

Parents into whose homes obscene material is mailed are urged to save all materials received, including the envelope and all enclosures, and to report the matter immediately to the local Postmaster.

House members, apparently eager to "get the monkey off their backs," passed out most of the program recommended by Gov. Price Daniel.

Biggest milestone was House passage by a 71-56 majority of the governor's "package bill." As finally passed, it would raise about \$150,000,000 in two years -- only about \$10,000,000 short of the governor's goal.

Included in the "package" would be an increased levy on natural gas, a new franchise tax in interstate corporations and bigger taxes on tobacco, liquor, automobiles, utilities, etc.

Some members bitterly criticized the bill as dangerous to Texas' industrial future and a product of the labor-liberal lobby. But most seemed to agree that it is "the only way to avoid a general sales tax or income tax."

Senators showed no apparent desire to set a speed record on the first money-raising bills sent them by the House. Book-keeping bill, designed to erase part of the \$85,000,000 deficit by changing the accounting procedure, was sent off for an Attorney General's opinion on its constitutionality.

A bill to increase the corporation franchise tax for one year only -- also to ease the deficit -- was set aside. Better to wait for the whole program, the Senators decided, than to work at it "piece-meal."

Senate did take one step forward, however, when Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro introduced the abandoned property bill which had bogged down in the House taxation committee.

Stitch-and-Cut Team -- Ten lawmakers -- five from the House, five from the Senate -- have the difficult task of making one package out of the different bills passed by the two houses.

Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria and Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah head the group. House-passed appropriation bill is more than \$20,000,000 larger than the Senate's. Conference Committee's task will be to cut a little off here, tack a little on there until an acceptable compromise is reached.

In past sessions, this piecing together process has taken several weeks. Even on a day and night schedule, this committee will be hard-pressed to finish its job before the present session ends in mid-June.

More than different spending ideas separates House and Senate. Each house used the bill to express its ideas on how the

State Board of Insurance should operate. House says full-time; Senate, part-time. Unyielding views have been expressed on each side.

Election Changes Urged -- Study leading toward a complete revision of the Texas Election Code is the goal of a House-passed resolution.

Rep. Harold Parish of Taft is sponsor.

If passed by the Senate, the resolution would provide for a 15-member committee to draft recommendations for the 1961 legislative session.

Making up the study panel would be three House members, three Senators, the Attorney General, the manager of the Texas Election Bureau, three persons named by the governor and four persons named by the national committee members of the Republican and Democratic parties.

All One Job -- Two House committees -- taxation and appropriations -- would be merged under a resolution proposed by Rep. Truett Latimer of Abilene.

One committee of 31, called the House Ways and Means Committee, would replace the two 21-member groups.

Latimer declared that since money raised and money spent have to come out even, it would be more logical to have the decisions made jointly rather than separately.


