
Veterinary medicine is a great equalizer and we have experienced great triumphs and some unpleasant defeats but always have the best interest of the client and patient at heart.

- · Authorized having and grazing of Wetlands Re-

serve Program (WRP) easement areas in droughtaffected areas where having and grazing is consistent with conservation of wildlife habitat and wetlands.

- Lowered the penalty on CRP acres used for emergency haying or grazing, from 25 percent to 10 percent in 2012.
- Simplified the Secretarial disaster designation process and reduced the time it takes to designate counties affected by disaster by 40 percent.

ranchers include the Emergency Conservation Program, Federal Crop Insurance, and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. The truth is, in Texas your home does not have to be forfeited to the recovery process from Medicaid. With the use of an Enhanced Life Estate Deed, otherwise known as a "Lady Bird Deed", a person can protect their home from the recovery process without incurring any transfer of resources penalties. This deed also allows a person to pass their homestead to their heirs, but at the same time has no negative impact on Medicaid eligibility.


People often think of their "homestead" in terms of how the tax office looks at it. (ie. Home and 10 acres etc)

There are also strategies to protect that same homestead from Medicaid Estate Recovery so it can be passed to who the resident wishes.






