The President said Gen. Shafter, who is now serving as a major general of volunteers, but who has been retired as a brigadier general of regulars, an unusual compliment when he this week nominated him to be a major general in the regular army. It was the wish of the President to make Gen. Shafter a major general before his retirement, but there was no vacancy in the grade at that time. There may be some objection to the nomination, which will result in increasing Gen. Shafter's pay from that of brigadier to major general, as under the law he cannot do duty as an officer of the regular army, having been retired because of the age limit, but it is not expected to be serious enough to prevent the confirmation of his nomination.
