COAL DISCOVERED

IN GARZA COUNTY.

The Important Mineral Discovered in Abundant Quantities on Dr. A. O. Scarborough's Ranch in Garza County on Double Mountain Draws.

We were shown last week a lump of coal that had been brought into town from Dr. A. O. Scarborough's ranch in Garza county. The specimen was taken from the side of a deep canyon from among a mass of conglomerates and slaty shales and from surface appearances seems to be deposited in great abundance. The out crop extends over considerable area and is found in some of the creek beds in large quantities, the coal being apparently, free from impurities, to any great extent, and of a very dense quality.

The find is located among the breaks and draws contributory to Double Mountain River, in a very rugged section of the country near one of the gaps in the mountains that marks the pass-way to the plains and on the projected railroad line through this northwest section into New Mexico. Whether or not the coal exists in workable quantities will be left to further investigation.

HURT BY HORSE.

Frank Moore who lives on the Herndon place two miles south of town while out driving up some horses last Sunday received injuries that came near costing him his life. Parties from town were at the Herndon place when Mr. Moore came riding up in a semi-conscious condition. On examination his shoulder and arms were found to be badly bruised. He could give no account of how the accident occurred.

PRIMARY ELECTION LAW.

Art. 192A. Penalty for illegal voting:—Any person voting at any primary election called and held by authority of any political party for the purpose of nominating candidates of such political party for any public office who is not qualified to vote in the election precinct where he offers to vote, at the next state, county or municipal election, or who shall vote more than once at the same or different precincts or polls on the same day, or different days in the same primary election, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding sixty days or both such fine and imprisonment.

Art. 192B. Procuring illegal vote:—Every person who shall knowingly procure any illegal vote to be cast at any such primary election shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as provided in the preceding article.

Article 192C. Officers making false return:—Any presiding officer, manager, judge or clerk of any primary election called and held by authority of any political party in this state who shall knowingly make or return, or cause to be made or returned, a false statement of the result of any such primary election shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding sixty days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

Art. 192D:—Officer divulging votes.—Any presiding officer, judge, clerk or other officer of an election who shall divulge how any person voted at such primary election, from an inspection of the tickets, unless in a judicial investigation, shall be fined in any sum not less than one hundred or more than five hundred dollars.

CONTRACT LET.

The contract to paint the bridges of the county and the roof of the court house has been let to John Coleman for a consideration of \$65. There are four iron bridges in the county. Two on the Colorado road, one across Sulphur at Dunn, and the other across Rip Roaring Hollow. The others are across Ennis and Deep Creeks. Mr. Coleman began work the latter part of last week.

DEATH ANGEL CLAIMS

ANOTHER SOUL.

Mrs. J. D. Sigler Passed Away at Her Home in this County on the 19th—Funeral Services at Baptist Church—Entertainment in Snyder Cemetery.

Mrs. J. D. Sigler, nee Miss Alice Rosser, was born in Chattooga county, Georgia, May 1st, 1862, and died June 19th, 1902, at her home in the Bison community, in the west part of this county, where she had come with her husband and children some months ago in hope that this climate might prove beneficial to her health.

She had been a consistent member of the Baptist Church for eighteen years and bore her long illness and great sufferings with all the patience and fortitude that characterizes the true christian spirit, realizing as the end approached that:

"The true life was drawing nigher
And the morning star shone brighter;
Earth's hold on her was slighter,
And its heavy burden lighter
And the dawn immortal brighter."

The funeral services, conducted by Rev. D. H. Burt, were held at the Baptist Church Friday at one o'clock p. m., and the remains entered in the Snyder cemetery where she had a brother laid to rest just one year ago. The deceased leaves a husband and three children, two girls and a boy, the eldest fourteen and the youngest five years old, a brother and sister in Georgia, and two brothers, Dr. H. E. and Prof. M. E. Rosser, of this place, to whom we extend our heartfelt sympathy in the hour of their great bereavement.

The convention passed a resolution declaring in favor of the quarantine line with the proviso that cattle free from ticks may pass at any time.

OPENING OF SNYDER

SUMMER NORMAL.

Snyder Summer Normal Opened Monday with Fair Attendance with Prospects of Large Increase—Addresses by Judge W. H. Harvey and Others.

The attendance at the opening of the Normal Monday was not so large as it was last summer but there were present a number of the representative teachers of this and adjoining counties and a number of others will be here before the week is out, which will swell the attendance to a good sized working Normal.

A representative of The Coming West, in company with Judge W. H. Harvey, had the pleasure of witnessing the opening exercises and listening to some very forcible educational talks by Judge Harvey, Prof. W. M. Cavness and B. W. Hudgins. The work of the Normal was outlined by Prof. Hudgins who also spoke of the great problems confronting the teachers and the need of necessary equipment to meet them which can be obtained only by persistent and thoughtful effort. Among other things he said that education was a long problem requiring years in the solution but could be briefly stated thus: Given; children, teachers, school houses, books, laboratories and all other necessary equipments, to develop men and women of character. That the results to be obtained are such as should enthruse the teacher in his undertakings.

The Normal pupils are welcomed to Snyder and we trust that their sojourn among us may be both pleasant and profitable in the highest degree.

Call For Democratic Primary.
