
Junior parent meeting



School traffic plan

When school begins Monday parents of junior high and primary school students will have a traffic challenge dropping the kids off at school. Euclid and Cleveland will remain closed at Highway 60 until the construction is completed.

Euclid drop-off will be accessed via Main and 10th St. Junior high parents can drop-off their students at the 10th St. Church of Christ parking lot then make a U-turn to take 10th back to Main.

Primary school parents take 10th to Euclid, turn left, drop-off the kids at the cafeteria then take 9th St. back to Main. Check out the traffic map. All primary students will assemble in the cafeteria. Elementary school drop-off and pick-up will be the same as last year via Euclid and 8th St. Primary school pick-up will be kindergarten on 9th St. and first grade on 8th St.

School officials and Friona police will be present to assist in directing traffic until everyone figures out the traffic patterns. Drive safe, be patient and courteous.





The Merry Widow

While doing a little digging on a different subject, I came across an article in the 1956 Maize Days edition of the Friona Star about the Frio Draw. It was Friona's 50th Birthday Edition and the first Maize Days. The article described how, after

the flooding in 1941, the railroad went to considerable expense to build a dike to prevent such flooding of the town. Recent rains have shown that the Frio Draw can still flood. It also described about the trains which came through town



and it mentioned that early on there were two 'through trains' daily, one going east and one going west.

There was also a special little train that went from Clovis, New Mexico to Amarillo, Texas and back each day; and this little steam engine train, a two-coach affair, was called 'the Merry Widow.' No one, at least to that writer's knowledge, knew why it had been given that name. This train was for the 'con-

venience of residents on the plains'.

been a very popular operetta by that same name; so who knows? Think of the 75 or so through trains which pass through Friona now each day on two sets of tracks and none of them are passenger trains. Who can forget our 2nd grade trips to Clovis from Friona on the awesome 1950's passenger trains?-still the only time I have ever ridden a train.] When the excursion trains bringing prospective settlers to Friona to view the XIT land for sale came in 1906, they arrived on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of every month. Mostly from Il-

linois and Indiana the settlers could purchase land which had cost \$1.50 per acre for \$22.50 an acre.

"These trains carried from 250 to 500 prospective land buyers who were wined and dined and slept on the train." Evidently, those trains were much larger than the Merry Widow. In 1908, the only depot was the M. K. & T Boxcar [Missouri Kansas & Texas Railroad]. The Depot in the park was built in 1912 or 1913.

made the newspaper: "...Mrs. Bob Pipin of Canon City came down on the Merry Widow to visit her mother..." Hereford Brand July 1, 1910. And, even if you didn't, you still made news: "Mrs. Lee Bivins of Amarillo came down by private auto...to visit her friend and former schoolmate Mrs. T.E. Shirley..." Evidently, that was even bigger news.

Also, recently Carol Ellis brought me a photograph Stanley took of the old Sante Fe Water Station/Stop at Black. I saw that for years before my daddy

on they would have to stop every 7 to 10 miles for water until they built the tenders or coal cars. Those two black water tanks stood until only just a few years ago ...

Note: In last week's article about the Purple Heart Reception in Amarillo, I incorrectly stated that the Bronze Star was the Army's 4th highest medal. Always question, always double check told me that it was a water stop and always verify, even if you for steam engine trains! Early feel you can trust the source. db



No mention of the fare, but in a similar train story from 1911, that fare was 55 cents round trip. If you rode the train, you





As James 1:21 says, "Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls."



Wheat, stocker cattle lease impacted by corn prices


With all the rain in July, things are looking a little more optimistic for wheat and stocker cattle operators than in the past four years in the Rolling Plains of Texas and southern Oklahoma, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist. "It looks like we will have some pasture once we get our wheat crop in; at least we have some moisture to plant our wheat on," said Stan Bevers, AgriLife Extension economist in Vernon.

While little to no corn is grown in the Rolling Plains region, the corn market has a big impact as it is the intersection between cattle and wheat, the two largest commodities of the region.

"Right now we have a very large corn crop growing out there, which looks like it will influence wheat prices to the lower side," he said. "So that's kind of a dark cloud hanging over wheat. And we have to ask ourselves what will prices be come spring next year. It And that leaves wheat and certainly appears that it is gostocker cattle operators with ing to be lower than the last few years."

\$6.30 a bushel. Adjust for local basis and the local price is between \$5.75 to \$6.

"What are your expenses per bushel - about \$6 a bushel, depending on yield average," he estimated. "So there are a couple of options to look at when it comes to the wheat crop we are about to plant." One option for the Rolling Plains is to graze stocker cattle on wheat pasture for a portion of the year. The problem with that is stocker cattle are very expensive right now, Bevers said. Cattle as a whole





some decisions to make in the next few months.

"What we are looking at now is, 'Should I try to harvest for a wheat crop next spring, or should I run cattle through the entire season?"" Bevers said.

Bevers said the Aug. 10 corn report reported the largest corn crop in history at 14 billion bushels. If the price is to start moving up, it will be after that. On July 29, the July 2015 wheat contract price was

are in very short supply, so producers must understand they are going to have to pay very high prices.

"So one of the things we've talked about is if I don't want to own the cattle and make that investment, we can take cattle in 'on the gain," he said.

The next decision will be: What should the lease price on wheat pasture be?

He said the wheat producers want all they can get and the stocker operators want to pay as little as possible.

The wheat guy needs enough to make him whole again, knowing with grazing he will lose some bushels and have some increased expense, "so you as the stocker operator need to pay him enough to get him back to where he didn't graze it at all - and then some."

From the wheat producer standpoint, the things that come into the equation are 5-6 bushel loss per acre, a heavier seeding rate and added fertilizer, which averages out to about \$11 per acre, he said. The stocker operator has to determine the maximum he can pay by looking at everything except pasture costs. "Using the numbers we have now, the average is about 62 cents per pound of gain," Bevers said. "That's what a wheat producer and stocker operator would kind of negotiate as the mid-point to start the bidding, and that number could go as low as 55 cents or as high as 64 cents." The wheat producer has to have 54.1 cents per pound of gain to make him whole again. The stocker operator can pay up to 70 cents for him to generate zero. "So this becomes a lease negotiation - 62.2 cents would be a meet-in-the-middle type of situation. But not everyone plays nice together. And, all this changes on a daily basis," he warned. "There are lots of options to consider, so you have to run your own numbers," Bevers said. "But at least this year we have some moisture to think about."


