Recently I bought a small cache of paintings in Lubbock by Friona artist Sybil Allen. These canvases were attached to the stretchers with nails, indicating that they probably were produced in the 1950s or before. So far, I have been able to find nothing about this artist in any reference materials. Most of the paintings were signed and many had a Route 1, Friona, TX address on the back. The paintings themselves are impressionistic with a sophisticated palette.

I am interested in finding out more about the artist:

--Is she still living and, if so, does she still have the same name?

--Did she study in an academic institution, or with private instruction by other artists/teachers?

--Is her work represented in any permanent collections such as libraries, museums, public buildings?

--Are there collectors of her work in the Friona area who know anything about her career as an artist, or her personal life?




