Football, volleyball starts Monday, freshman orientation is August 21

Friona High School students may pick up their schedules from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on the following dates: seniors August 15; juniors August 16; sophomores August 17. Freshmen August 21 at 6 p.m. (during orientation). Students will be released at 1 p.m. August 27 & 28 for teacher staff development activities.

The first official day of varsity football and volleyball practice is set to begin Monday, August 6. Coach Ferguson said the tentative schedule for football workouts will be from 8 a.m. to noon for the first two weeks then move to the evening hours when teachers report to school August 20.

With school starting later this year (August 27) the Chieftains will scrimmage Panhandle there August 18 and Levelland here Thursday August 23. The first game of the season will be Friday August 31 at Abernathy.

The complete 2007-08 football schedule for varsity, JV, and junior high is printed in the Star this week. Also included this week is a complete school supply list for primary, elementary, and junior high.

Freshman orientation has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 21, at 6 p.m. in the high school auditorium. All freshmen and parents are urged to attend.

FHS principal Denver Crum

has advised that volleyball coach Celia Weaver resigned due to a family illness emergency. Coach Weaver's mother was diagnosed with terminal cancer and has been given a few months to live. Weaver left to take care of her mother and help the rest of her family.

Crum said the school would fill the volleyball coach position from within, most likely promoting Coach Carrie Arias to the position although that was not official at press time. Coach Arias has served as assistant volleyball coach and basketball coach at FHS.

New teachers at the high school are Elliot Ruleaux, government/economics and world

history; Jennifer Smyrl, algebra II; Zach Henderson, life skills/special education; Sherry Hurley, biology; and Michael Hurley will teach English as a Second Language (ESOL) and is the varsity girls basketball coach.

Mr. Ruleaux did his student teaching at Friona last year. A graduate of the University of Nebraska, he will also assist with coaching. Miss Smyrl is a graduate of Canyon High School and West Texas A&M. This will be her first year to teach. Mr. Henderson is from Amarillo, also a WT graduate and first year teacher.

In other high school changes, Amy Cook will move from the elementary campus to serve as

high school librarian. Claudia Hanes has moved from the high school campus to the school administration office where she will serve as technology coordinator.

Improvements during the summer at the high school included new lights at Chieftain Field and new floors in the band hall, choir room, and auditorium stage.

Principal Crum said anyone interested in submitting an application for the Friona High School Hall of Distinguished Graduates can pick up packets from the high school office. The application deadline is October 31.

Thornberry disappointed in partisanship on farm bill

Congressman Mac Thornberry (TX-13) expressed his severe disappointment at

Speaker Nancy Pelosi's attempts to slip partisan amendments into the Farm Bill. "Of

all the areas considered by Congress, agriculture and national security have tradition-

ally been above partisan games," said Thornberry. "First with national security and now

with agriculture, Speaker Pelosi has changed that by injecting partisan tax increases and non-agriculture amendments into the Farm Bill."

Thornberry noted that he and other Republicans supported the Farm Bill as approved by the House Committee on Agriculture. "The Ag Committee passed a bipartisan bill on voice vote; it was not a perfect bill, but overall it was a good product for our area and for the country," noted Thornberry.

After the bill left the Ag Committee, however, new provisions were added that include significant tax increases and make certain foreign aid programs a mandatory entitlement. In addition, the bill now makes it virtually impossible for Texas to administer its Food Stamp program.

"These midnight amendments, including some \$10 billion in tax and fee increases, never even had a committee hearing and have nothing to do with food safety and security or production agriculture; in fact, they will increase costs to farmers," concluded Congressman Thornberry. "Everyone concerned about agriculture and rural America should unite against these partisan tactics."



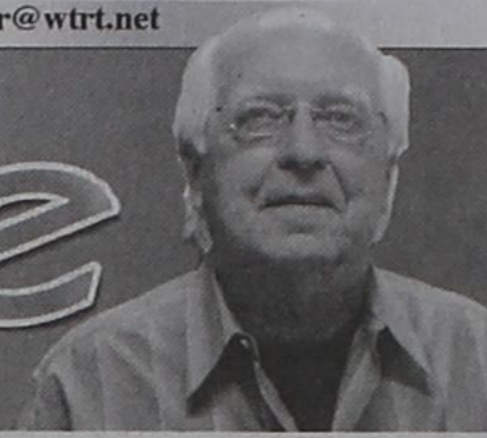

whose kid is it anyway

It seems no matter what position Susan Combs holds in state government, she is determined to be the "health nanny" to your kids. As Texas Agriculture Commissioner she punished all school students in Texas by taking away cookies, snacks, soft drinks, and other food

she deemed unhealthy from the school system. No fried foods. No Cokes. No cupcakes at school parties.

It did not matter if your child was slender and diabetes-free they were classified and punished the same as overweight kids. Evidently that program has not worked well because a news release received this week from now-Comptroller Combs contained the following quote: "Childhood obesity and type 2 diabetes among children is an epidemic that we, as a state, must address now. Overweight children have a 70% chance of becoming overweight or obese adults."

Epidemic is a pretty strong word. Besides if a school is going to win a state football championship it needs a bunch of big overweight boys to block for the healthy fast ones.

Comptroller Combs, in her zeal to heal, has established a program she named Texas Fitness Now. She says it will provide crisis money for our schools.

Well not all of our schools. The grant money will only go to middle school students attending schools where enrollment is at least 75 percent economically disadvantaged.

Texas Fitness Now is a grant program schools can use to support in-school physical education, nutrition, and fitness programs for students in grades 6-7-8. She's got \$20 million to spend. There are only 700 schools in Texas that qualify she says. The rest of you schools that are not economically disadvantaged are on your own to pay for your fat kid problem.

The minimum grant available is \$1,500. A school can get more based on enrollment. How far will \$1,500 go in the average school? Not far based on the list of requirements a school must meet to

receive a grant.

As is the case with all free government money there are strings. To receive a grant a school must ensure the 6-7-8 grade students have physical activity 30 minutes a day, have a physical education curriculum that meets national standards, adopt a coordinated school health program, have a quality P.E. program based on TEKS, submit a wellness and nutrition policy, establish a school health advisory council, have certified P.E. teachers, and conduct a campus fitness evaluation before October 15 and again at the end of the school year.

That's it. Do all those things and your \$1,500 check is in the mail.

There are other agencies in on the scam. The Texas Education Agency (TEA) will administer the program and award the grants (which will probably take up a big hunk of the \$20 million). The National Association of Sports and Physical Education, the Texas Association of School Boards, the Texas Department of Agriculture, and (my favorite) the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance have all applauded the Texas Fitness Now program.

Of course they have applauded spending taxpayer money. They are top-heavy education bureaucrats that make their living forcing costly rules on schools and students in the name of goodness and mercy. It is time for Comptroller Combs to stick to controlling and stop meddling with local health and school issues.

I'm not even going to ask Superintendent Jim Parker about this latest program. My guess is that Friona ISD will not be applying for a Texas Fitness Now grant.

Not as long as we need big offensive linemen and Muleshoe is on our football schedule.

Friona Star December 11, 1925

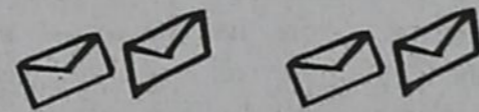
SUFFERING FROM SPRAINED ANKLE

An open letter to the people of Bovina:

Over the course of the last several months, we (Old World Tuscany Properties and Hartline Real Estate Developments) have made several headlines in this publication. We feel it is time to have our say made public.

We are developing a parcel of land (180 acres) along US Hwy 60. Our goal is to construct and sell attractive, high quality and affordable homes for the communities in and around Bovina. This has been a long and tedious journey, to say the least! While some people in the City of Bovina feel that we flew into town on a lark and decided to build houses, I can assure the public first hand (no hearsay here!) that a lot of prayer, research and demographic studies have been done; both by us and by unbiased professionals.

Our initial conversations with Mayor Miller and City Manager Ernest Terry were to determine if the city would be in favor of the new housing. We were met with a resounding YES! Subsequent conversations were regarding the possibility of annexation into the city limits and the possibility of the city providing the basic infrastructure needed.

Basic infrastructure included access to the sewer main and the water main. After attending three city council meetings and a city-wide meeting held at the park, we still were at a loggerhead with the city. Cindy Spicola and I embarked on our own mission to help the city find funding, meeting with USDA and speaking with various governmental offices, doing hours and hours of internet research.

We had several good leads and presented those to the powers that be in the city. Has any funding been acquired? Or have any grant applications been completed? I have no idea. During the city's last city council meeting, the unanimous vote said the city would not enter into a special agreement with Mr. Spicola. They stated that they would go by what the city code book stipulations for a contractor/developer declared. Fair enough....

However, it recently came to our attention that part of the acreage is already in the city limits. Approximately 13 acres lies within the boundaries of the existing city limits. Admitting to this huge oversight is somewhat humbling, but I have to ask, which part of the city council or city leaders already knew this and chose to not offer this information? Since the city council chose to vote the way they did at the last council meeting, we are obligated to go by the guidelines set in the city code book which says that (in summation) when a landowner requests necessary sanitary sewer and water mains access and pays the sewer and water connection charges, the city shall extend, lay or construct the mains a distance of 100 feet. (Information accessible at www.cityofbovina.org city hall, city code.)

So, all the months of discussion aside, it seems the city council has made a decision that is beneficial to all concerned. We have been in contact with an engineer who will immediately begin to determine a plat for a lot, and progress will finally begin.

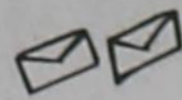
In our research to find funding for the city we have also found incredible financing opportunities for potential homeowners. We are remodeling a home in Bovina and plan to have an open house/house fair with USDA and various other mortgage lenders on site when the house is complete. Notice of this "house party" will be given in advance to allow all who are interested to come and be a part of this!

We are also campaigning with the city officials to clean up lots that have dilapidated and vacant homes. We feel the city and it's citizens have the right to live in an attractive and marketable neighborhood. Homes that should appraise for \$80,000 will not do so if they are across the street from a "structure" that has a partial roof and a tree growing through the window.

To summarize from the city code book again (150.65.9) these "structures" should constitute a menace to health and safety. In a conversation held with the Mayor on Tuesday, July 24, we feel he has a handle on the particular properties that several city residents have complained about and feel assured that immediate action will be taken.

Our goal has always been to build homes for the people of this community. People who go to work every day, doing the best they can to support their families. People who drive 45-60 miles one way to work, people who just need a helping hand in finding a way to own their own home. That's what we're doing here—no political agendas, just working for a living.

Water from grandpa's well.....!

Great-grandpa Allen lived on a small farm near Wylie, Texas.

As a lad in the 40s we often visited Grandpa and Granny Allen. They had an outhouse, a smoke house, a few pigs and chickens, and a water well beside the house. There was no indoor plumbing.

A long-handled blue-speckled dipper hung on a nail on the pole that held the well pulley. The pulley lowered a bucket into the dark hole until it hit the water. A couple of tugs submerged the bucket 'till it was full, then it was pulled back to the top by the pulley rope.

It was great excitement for the grandkids to watch the bucket free-fall until it splashed into the water below. Grandpa would let one of us grab the rope and tug the heavy bucket to the surface. It was fun but taught us responsibility too.

Everyone drank out of the bucket of water. The dipper was a community dipper. Everybody used it and passed it around. No one ever bothered to wipe it off much. If the water got too warm to drink it was thrown out on the ground and a new bucket drawn up. Water from the well was always cold. A drink of cold water out of that dipper and the world was a better place.

Grandpa's water well came to mind this week when bottled water was on the national news. People seemed upset that Aquafina, bottled by Pepsi, was just tap water from the public water supply. We're not sure where people thought bottled water comes from. Most of us don't really care.

It is water. It is in a bottle. It's convenient. No one drinks a particular bottle of water because of where it comes from. The different brands do taste a little different and everyone has their favorite. But in the end nobody gives a flip about the source. We just want it to be cheap, cold, and clean.

If you have an old dipper still hanging in the barn, clean it out, pour a bottle of water in it and drink a toast to Grandpa Allen. He would be mighty proud.

Quickbooks courses offered for farmers & ranchers

Courses covering the business accounting program Quickbooks Pro will be offered in Amarillo and Lubbock in August, a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist said. In these two-day courses, participants will use a case study to learn the program in a hands-on setting, said DeDe Jones, Extension risk management specialist in Amarillo. The software program is used by many agriculture lenders and producers.

Each participant will develop cost and profit centers, enter transactions and create reports, Jones said. Program tips will be discussed throughout the course. No prior computer experience is necessary.

The courses will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. The Amarillo course will be August 22-23, and the Lubbock course will be August 28-29, both at the respective Texas A&M University System Agricultural Research and Extension Centers.

The \$75 course registration fee covers computer lease payments and teaching materials. Couples will be charged only one registration fee if they share a computer.

Class size for each course is limited to 13, in order to provide hands-on experience for all participants, Jones said.

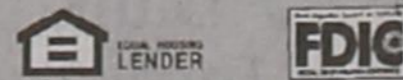

Alfalfa workshop Aug 9 in Farwell

Crop producers, cattle raisers and grass farmers who are interested in alfalfa should mark August 9 on their calendars. That is the date for a regional alfalfa workshop in Farwell, sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension and New Mexico State University. "We will cover a wide variety of production topics, from variety selection, fertility and irrigation to weed control, entomology and forage quality," said Calvin Trostle, Extension agronomist based at the Texas A&M University System Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. "We will also visit a nearby alfalfa field."

The workshop will begin with registration at 8:30 a.m. Central Time at the Farwell Community Center, 207 Ninth St., two blocks south of U.S. Highway 84. The program will run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Lunch is included with registration.

Trostle will present an overview of alfalfa production, fol-

lowed by a session on weed control. Leonard Lauriault, New Mexico State, will discuss variety selection and the university's alfalfa testing program. Monti Vandiver, Extension integrated pest management agent, will provide an insect and pest update.

Registration cost is \$20 per person and includes lunch and an alfalfa crop book containing Extension, New Mexico State, and National Alfalfa Alliance information.

Those who plan to attend are encouraged to pre-register by August 7, by calling the Extension office in Parmer County at 806-481-3619. Participants will qualify for continuing education units approved for Texas and New Mexico.

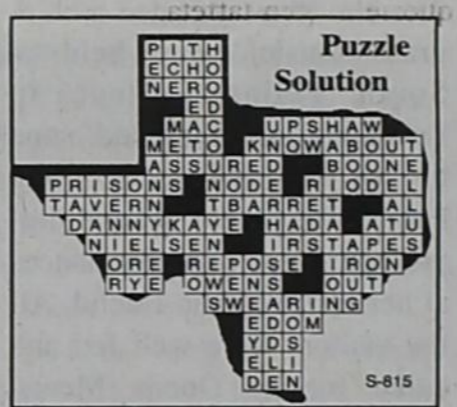
1. To prepare cookie dough, combine oil, sugar, cocoa, milk, egg, flour, baking soda, salt and vanilla. Beat with a mixer until well blended. Refrigerate for about one hour.

2. Preheat oven to 425F.

3. Drop dough, one teaspoon at a time, onto an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 5 to 10 minutes. Watch carefully to prevent burning.

4. Prepare filling while cookies cool. Beat shortening, sugar, marshmallow creme, vanilla and 3 tablespoons milk together until fluffy. Add more milk if needed. Spoon a generous dollop of filling on the flat sides of half the cooled cookies. Place another cookie on top of each to make a sandwich.

Yield: about 40 cookies.

WTA&M board approves requests

Each of West Texas A&M University's agenda items received approval from The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents, which met July 26-27 in College Station. As a result, WTAMU has a new vice president, a new dean, and the University received authorization to accept an historical marker for Buffalo Courts Alumni Center from the Randall County Historical Commission. Also, the University's request to attach three names to

various campus facilities was approved.

The new vice president is Dan Garcia, who had been assistant vice president for academic affairs/dean of enrollment management at WTAMU. Garcia henceforth will have the newly created title of vice president for enrollment management. Dr. Neil Terry, a professor of economics, is the new dean of the College of Business. Terry, who has been with WTAMU since 1997, had served

as interim dean since August 2006.

The board also approved the following name attachments to campus facilities:

- To name a digital broadcast studio in the Sybil B. Harrington Fine Arts Complex the "AT&T High Definition Production Studio". Stan Sigman, president and CEO of wireless at AT&T is a 1970 graduate of the University and was the speaker at WTAMU's spring 2007 commencement exercises;
- To attach Stanley Schaeffer's name to the "Stanley Schaeffer Agricultural Education Learning Laboratory". Schaeffer was a chief benefactor in construction of the \$530,000 lab, which received more than \$400,000 of that sum in outside donations. It was officially dedicated in April 2007; and
- To name a classroom in the Agricultural Education Learning

Laboratory the "Spicer Gripp Classroom" after the late Spicer Gripp, a well-known and highly respected cowboy from Hereford.

The Randall County Historical Commission recently approached WTAMU about placing an historical marker at Buffalo Courts, and regents approved the proposal. A date for placement of the marker has yet to be determined by Randall County officials.

Buffalo Courts, which in the 1980s became home to the Alumni Association, was a construction project begun in 1933 using student labor and community donations. The result was the first facility in Texas built solely to house student athletes. Only the two-story recreation hall remains standing today. It is constructed largely of limestone, petrified wood and other rock quarried in Texas and New Mexico.

August 1999—A research firm in California is granted \$10 million to study the idea of forgiveness. Psychologists, sociologists, and neuroscientists form the nucleus of the Campaign for Forgiveness Research. The name of God or Jesus is never mentioned.

August 1993—The pope makes a rare visit to the United States and speaks to 75,000 people at Mile High Stadium in Denver, Colorado. However, the main news story out of Denver is not the pope's views on several key issues but what the street vendors have for sale. Pope hats, caps, pens, and T-shirts are all the rage. The best/worst is the coffee mug. When it is filled with hot liquid, through some form of chemical reaction, an image of the pope appears on the outside of the mug. I'll have one confession espresso to go.

March 1993—Hundreds of thousands of people brave the hot sun in Agoo, Philippines, waiting for an appearance by the Virgin Mary. The crowd is there because a 12-year-old child claims to have seen her on the first Saturday of every month since 1989. Vendors have a brisk business hawking T-shirts, food, water, and various Jesus-related souvenirs. Making a profit on the Prophet is not limited to television.

September 1992—Several

thousand people in Marlboro Township, New Jersey, stand in heavy rain hoping to see the Virgin Mary. They are there because one of the local townspeople claims that since 1988 Mary has appeared in his backyard on the first Sunday of every month. The cost of getting a glimpse of Mary? The view is free, but parking is \$5.00.

October 1985—A picture (with explanation) appears in a Little Rock, Arkansas newspaper, showing the founder of a small religious toy company marketing her new Baby Jesus Doll. The newspaper quoted her as saying, "I think that people are getting to the point where they want something to believe in again, and I believe anyone who is a Christian would want one." The 13-inch vinyl doll comes with a manger, a nontoxic glow-in-the-dark detachable halo, and a card with the words: "My name is Jesus. Jesus loves you. I am your friend. Please love me." The price of Jesus's love? The love is free, but the doll is \$31.50.

April c.33 AD—A few people are gathered below three crosses on a lonely hill outside Jerusalem. They are there to watch a man die. At the foot of the middle cross, Roman soldiers are casting lots for the bloodstained garments of a man called Jesus. They, too, are collecting souvenirs.

When the soldiers left Jesus that day, their hands were full. Is that how we are to leave

the Cross? As Christians we are to minister to others, but we cannot reach out to a hurting neighbor with our arms filled with souvenirs, in whatever form that might be. We cannot hold on to old habits or poor attitudes. We cannot

hold on to anything that would keep us from grabbing hold of Jesus.

What are we holding on to? If we have truly met Jesus at the Cross, our hands will be empty...but our hearts will be full.

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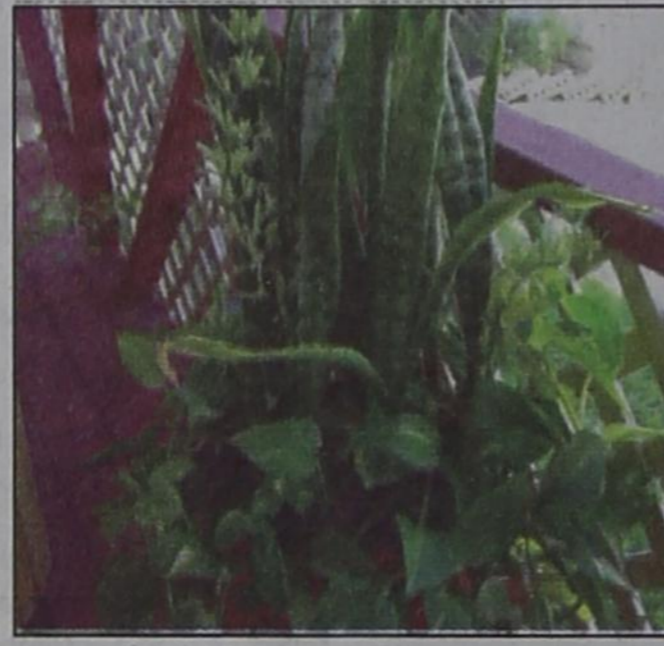
