## 2009 rainfall tops 13 inches in town

Local official weather guy John Gurley brought in his August weather report this week.

It has been a good summer for Friona and the area with June, July, and August as the three wettest months this year. At Gurley's official rain gauge in the city he recorded 3.65" in August. The 2009 total is 13.04" with 10.60" of that total received in the three months of summer.

Here is the rain amount by month: Jan -0; Feb 0.31; Mar 0.74; Apr 0.60; May 0.79; Jun 2.27; July 4.68; Aug 3.65. These are recorded amounts in the city. Other areas of the county reported receiving more than these amounts.

Temperatures for August ranged from a low of 57 to a high of 96. The lowest high temp was 80 on August 21. Rain overnight Sunday was about one inch with up to two inches in some areas of the county northwest of Friona. Rain remains in the late evening forecast this week through Saturday.

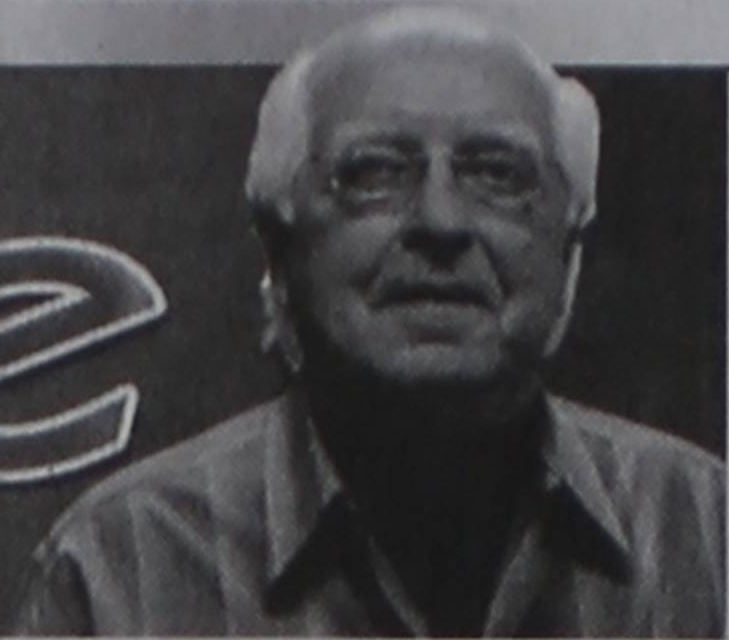

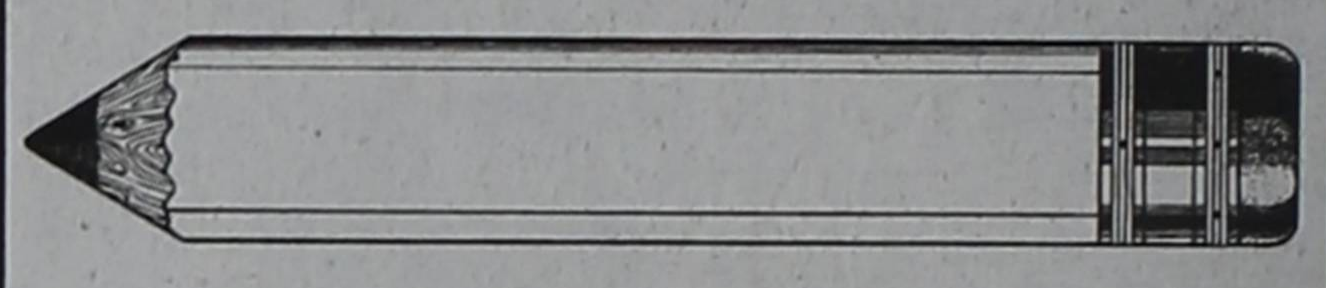

Haha! Decided to write the title of this week's recipe in code like the young folks do. It translates to Blueberry Cream Cheese Pound Cake. Most of you ladies probably already know how to bake this cake or a similar one. Don't know why I'm even bothering to print it except the photo in the magazine looked delicious and we need to fill some space.

This recipe was included

in American Profile magazine submitted by Dee Williams of Kingsland, Georgia. She says, "This is a combination of recipes from my grandmother and aunt and my husband's aunt. It doesn't stay around very long."



## Blueberry Cream Cheese Pound Cake

Serves 16

- 1 8 oz package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 18 oz pkg yellow butter cake mix
- 1 3 oz pkg instant vanilla pudding mix
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 cups fresh blueberries
- powdered sugar (optional)

1. Preheat oven to 325°. Lightly spray a 9-inch tube or Bundt pan with cooking spray and dust with flour.

2. Combine cream cheese and oil in a medium bowl, beat with a mixer at high speed until smooth and creamy. Add cake mix, pudding mix, eggs, and vanilla. Beat at medium speed until blended. Fold in berries. Batter will be thick. Spoon batter into prepared pan.

3. Bake 60 minutes or until a wooden toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool cake in pan on a wire rack for 20 minutes. Remove from pan and cool completely on a wire rack. Sprinkle with powdered sugar before serving.

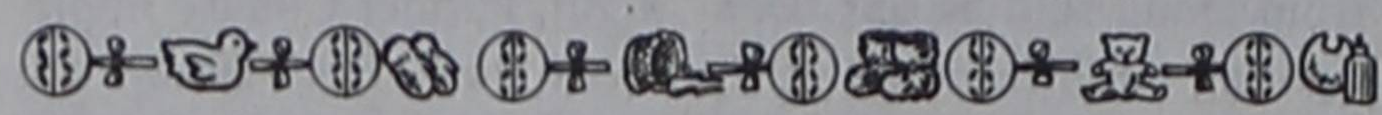

## NW Plains Pest News

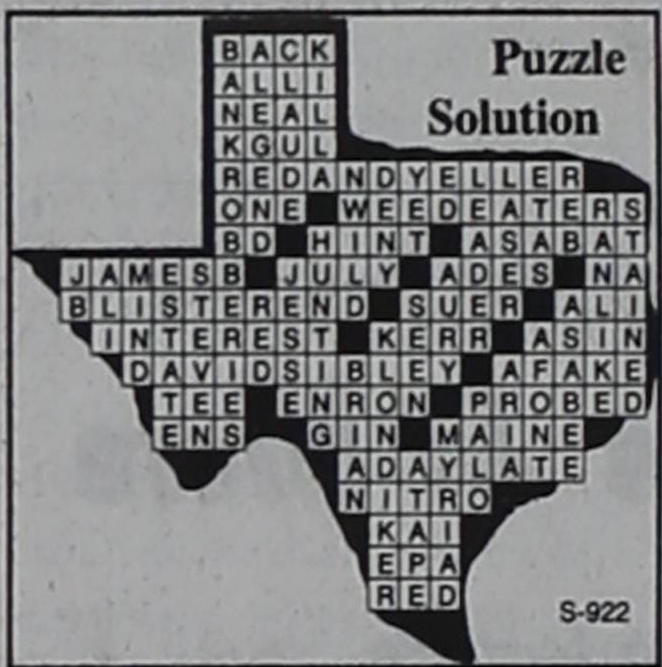
(From the Northwest Plains Pest Management News of August 27 provided by Extension Agent Monti Vandiver.)

Com silage harvest has begun and early yield reports ranged from around 20 tons per acre on limited irrigation to 30+ tons per acre on fully irrigated fields.

Cotton is progressing very well, many fields have bloomed out the top and are filling a heavy boll load. The pest situation in cotton remains slow. Lygus pressure continues to be light. Low, sub-threshold populations of bollworms have been found in most fields but higher populations around 5000 worms per acre have been observed in a few fields.

Spider mites have completely crashed in many area corn fields this week. Abundant natural enemies as well as environmental conditions are playing an important role in suppressing mites in many fields.

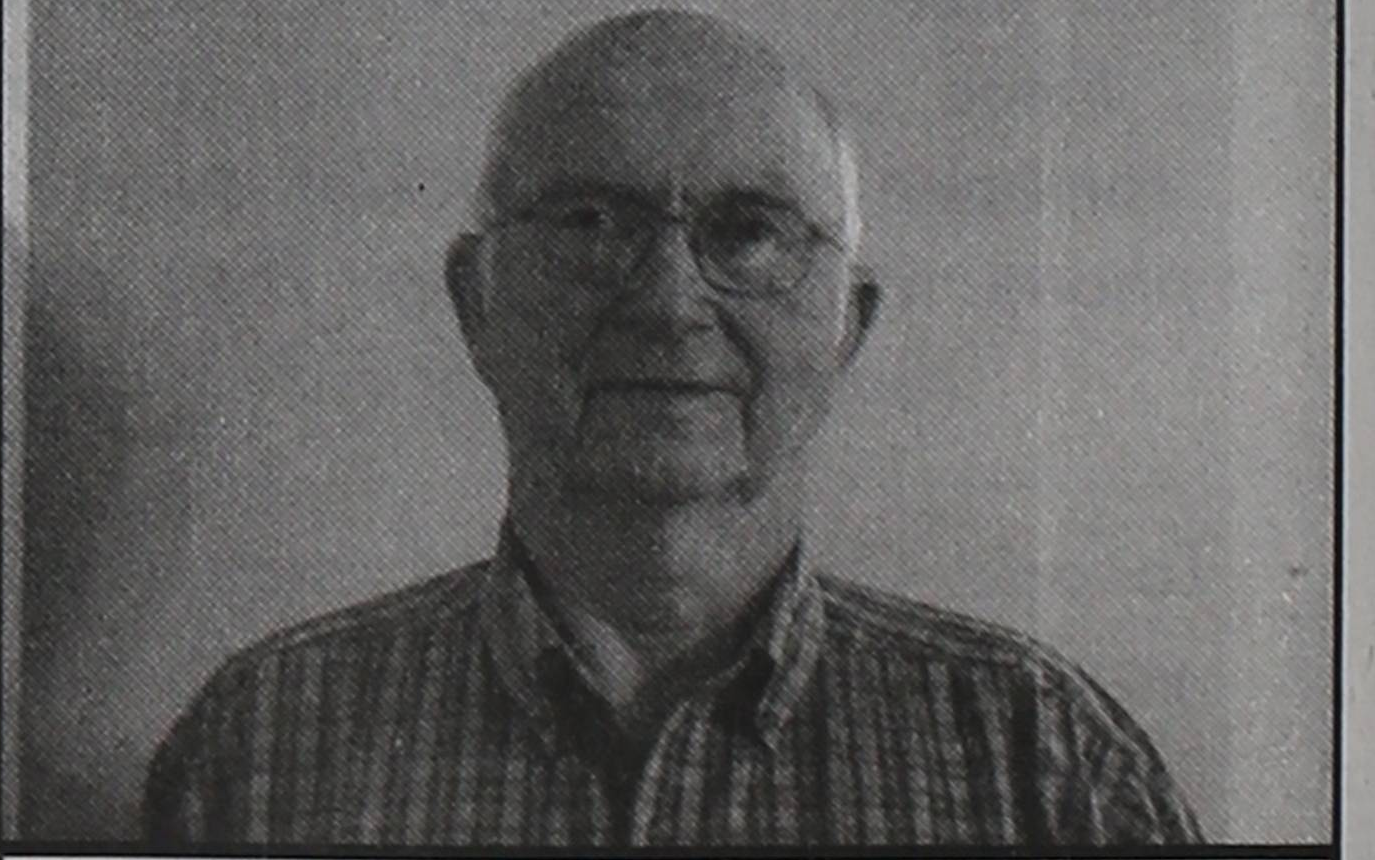

# Chiefs hang on for 14-7 win at Abernathy

There was not exactly a bunch of offensive fireworks at Abernathy Friday night. The Chiefs managed two quick touchdowns in the second quarter. The first scoring drive was capped by a Joey Dickson to Stetson Reed 10-yard touchdown pass. Reed made a great catch just inside the end zone

corner and managed to get a foot down before falling out of bounds.

On the ensuing Antelope drive the Chiefs intercepted a pass (one of three on the night) and marched to another score. The drive was highlighted by an 18-yard pass from Dickson to Zack

Fair to keep the drive alive. Fair was slammed hard by an Abernathy defender as he went to the air and held on for the completion.

A couple of plays later Ernesto Monreal took a handoff to the left side, turned up behind a block from teammate Jonathan Licerio and ran in for a 4-yard touchdown. Monreal, a senior, also kicked both extra points to give the Chiefs a 14-0 lead at the half.

The Chieftain defense was a bright spot throughout the

night. In addition to three interceptions, and several quarterback sacks, the defense held Abernathy to 117 rushing yards and 90 passing. They allowed the Antelope quarterback to score on a 32-yard keeper play in the middle of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter as Abernathy narrowed the margin to one touchdown.

With about four minutes left in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, the Chiefs

were deep in their own territory and were forced to punt. The snap was low and Monreal couldn't get the kick away. It appeared Abernathy would take over inside the 30-yard line with plenty of time on the clock.

However, a flag went against Abernathy for 12 men on the field. The penalty gave Friona a 1<sup>st</sup> down but they were forced to give the ball back to Abernathy for one

last 2-minute drill. The Antelopes launched a passing attack and were moving downfield toward the tie when senior Stetson Reed stepped in front of an Abernathy receiver for a leaping interception that sealed the win for Friona.

Quarterback Dickson completed 2 of 8 passes for 28 yards and one touchdown. He also carried 4 times for 11 yards. Zack Fair led in rushing with 12 carries and 90 yards. His longest carry was 21 yards.

Fullback Noe Saenz gained 57 tough yards on 8 carries. Jonathan Licerio was 8 for 46. Chris Garcia was 2 for 2, and Ernesto Monreal was 2 for 9 and the touchdown.

Fair caught one pass for 18 yards and Stetson Reed one for 10 to account for the 28 passing yards. Licerio also had a good night punting in spite of the one low snap. He punted three times for 109 yards, an average of 36.33. His longest was 43 yards and two of the three punts were downed inside the 20-yard line.

Friona and Muleshoe were the only two winners out of District 2-2A as Childress, Floydada, Tulia, and Dimmitt all lost in the season opener. The Chiefs host Littlefield Friday September 4 with kickoff at 7:30 p.m. Littlefield beat Tulia last week 56-0 at Tulia. This week Muleshoe visits Portales. Childress is at Iowa Park, Lockney at Floydada, New Deal at Tulia, and Dimmitt at Hale Center.

## Cross country meet results

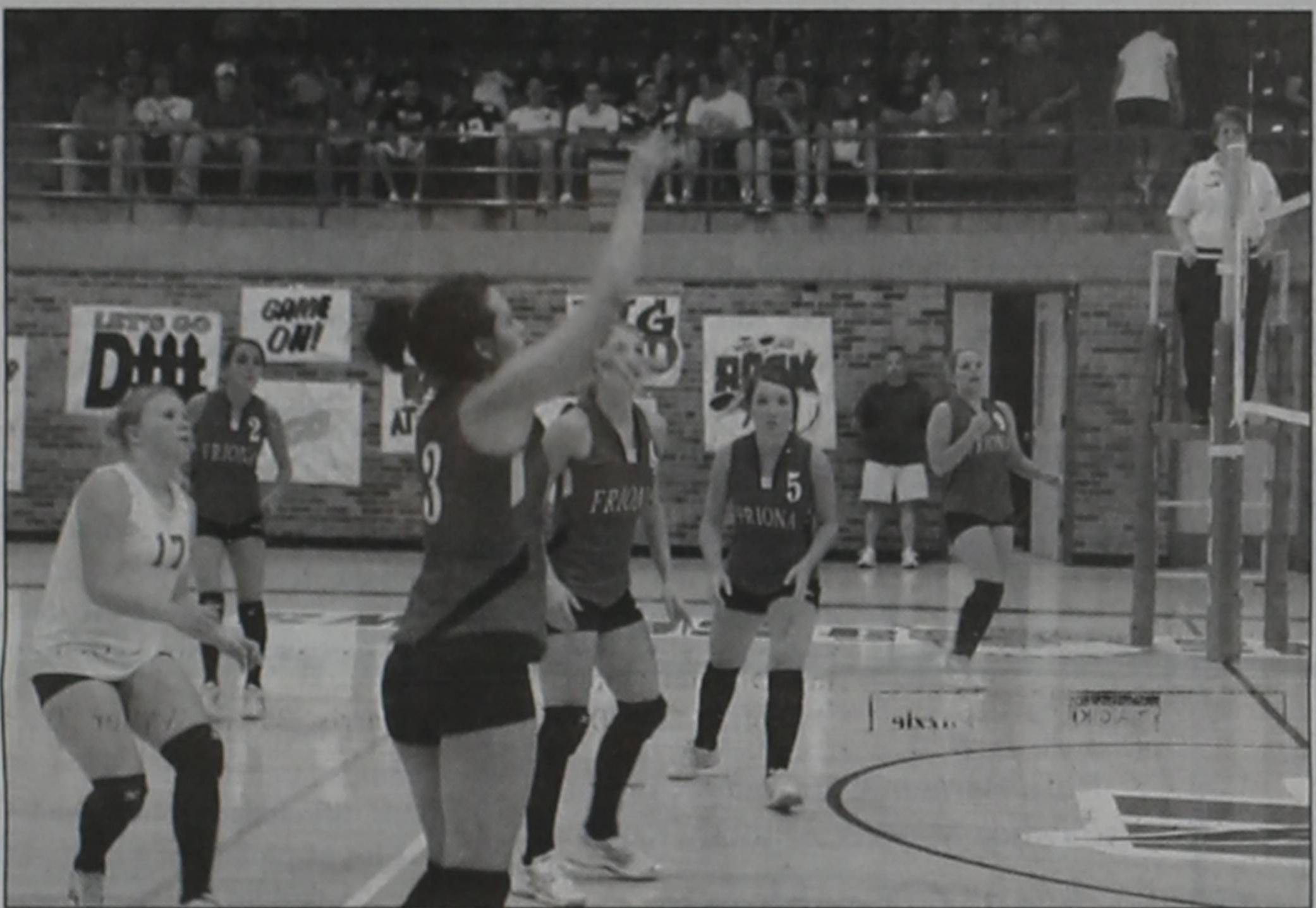
Friona high school cross country runners participated in a meet in Borger last Saturday.

# Friona student ventures to Mars

Kenneth Newhouse, a senior at Friona High School, completed an intensive six day internship at the Texas High School Aerospace Scholar (HAS) Program at NASA in Houston this summer. The week was the highlight of all of his work since January 2009 with the HAS program.

Each week for eight weeks through the summer 44 different students were invited to NASA to participate as a member on one of four Mission Teams. Over 350 scholars were invited from an initial field of 800 participants. The final candidates were selected by obtaining a high level of academic achievement on quizzes, projects, and studies. Scholars were provided transportation, housing, and meals during their week-long stay.

The four teams were focused on getting to Mars and living and working there. Each team participated in group projects, neutral buoyancy lab, and various competitive activities including lander activities, rover competition, and rocket launches, mentoring by NASA engineers, participation in engineering activities, and briefings by astronauts, engineers, and other NASA experts.

Each team had to manage and organize time and money. They started with a budget of \$323 million to buy materials and were rewarded or penalized for various goals during the week. A final team winner was an-

nounced at the closing luncheon.

Kenneth was a member of the White Team responsible for designing the living facilities on Mars. The teams worked everyday from 7:45 a.m. to 10 p.m. The program helps a student narrow down their choice of college majors and future career interests.

The week ended with a fi-

nal luncheon and team presentation with an overview of the details of their mission for parents and NASA officials. The program encourages students who have an interest in advancing their studies in math, science, engineering, or computer science. Kenneth met a fellow intern from Hereford during his week at NASA.

The state of Texas, in part-

nership with JSC and the Texas educational community, developed HAS in 1999 to encourage more students to pursue studies and careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. More than 1,800 students across Texas have participated. Any students interested should go to the Texas High School Aerospace Scholar site, talk with Ken-

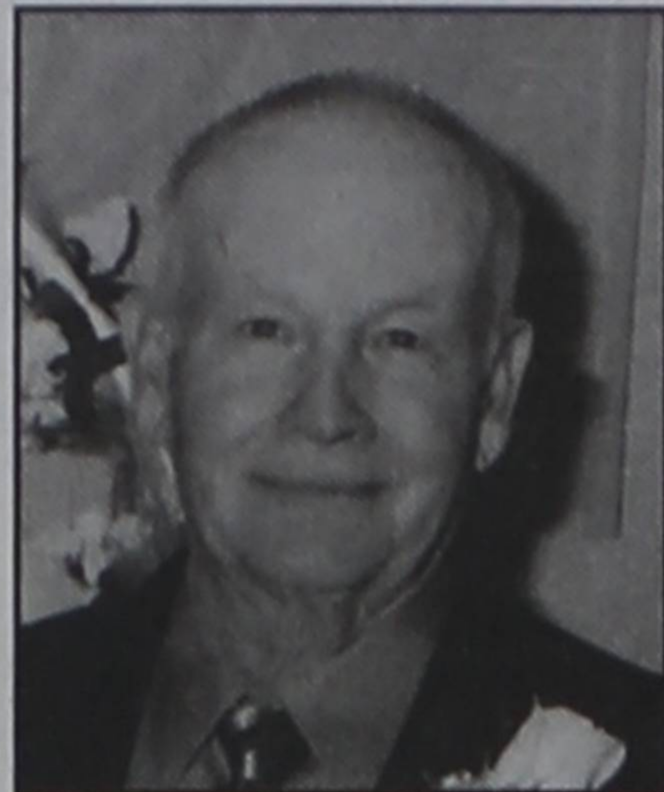
Donn was born August 14, 1936, in Plainview, Texas, to G. E. and Opal Harlin Tims. He attended schools in Amarillo and Clarendon.

## Changes in the church

Changes in the life of the church in my lifetime have been remarkable to see. I can remember when almost every male (from age 6 up) wore a coat and tie to Sunday School and worship. There was a general sense that if you were a member of the larger community you were a member of a Christian congregation somewhere. In fact, for many, going to church was an extension of being a good person...it was what good people did on Sundays.

Radical change has occurred. No longer is a tie a prerequisite for males to attend. Many people within the larger community do not associate with any church and many do not identify themselves as Christian. And many of the folk who do not identify themselves as Christians are still considered (rightly so) good people.

Discomfort with this situation is rampant in the church. People don't like change, in general, and these changes have been particularly uncomfortable. And there is a tendency, in the face of such change, to call for a pullback to the previous comfortable position, to hold onto the former way of approaching things, in spite of the ground having shifted beneath our feet.

Opportunity awaits in this new situation, however. We now enter into a mission field every time we exit the church doors. This is not an environment that guarantees the extinction of the church. Rather, it is remarkably similar to the environment in which the early church began, and prospered.

What is to be done in this time? I offer three items for consideration. First, **Assess Needs**. If we find needs in our community, in the individuals that surround us, we find the places for effective ministry to take place. Second, **Communicate Christ**. The good news of Jesus Christ has not changed. As we meet needs, we need to offer Christ, in winsome, persuasive ways. Third, **Transform Lives**. The good news we offer heals people's hurts, restores people's hearts, and heartens people's hope.

You may notice that the first letter of each item forms a word, **ACT**. And well we should.

Have you chosen to live or work in a Sodom? Even if you're strong enough to resist temptation, your family may not be. While Christians are commanded to reach people in the "Sodom" near them, we are to be careful that we don't become the very people we are trying to reach.



## Thrown away

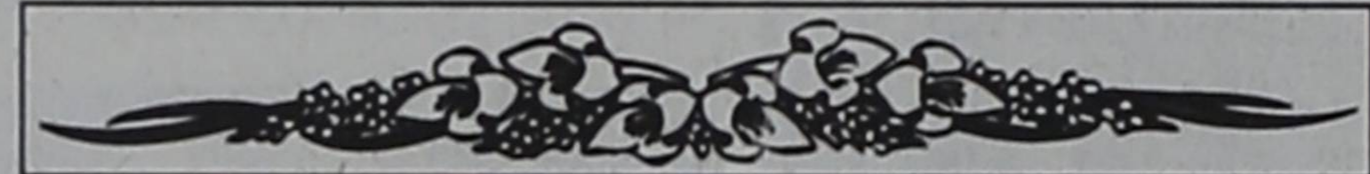

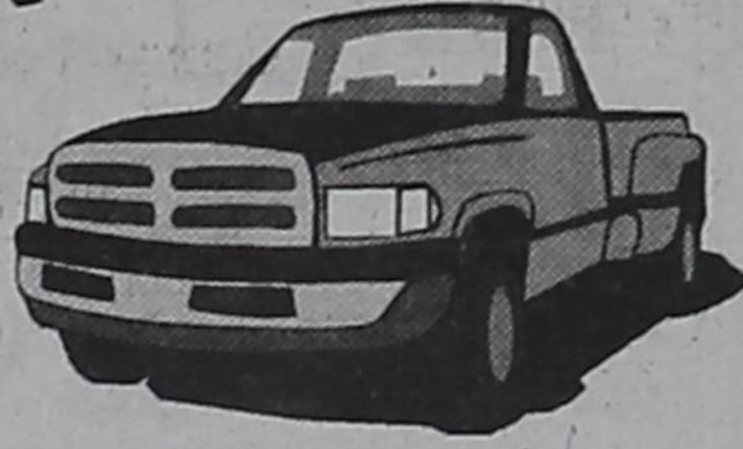
