Parmer mule deer season meeting Mon

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department invites all interested landowners, sportsmen, and the public to participate in a special information meeting for the new mule deer season this fall in Parmer County.

The meeting will be held Monday November 9 at 7 p.m. at the Calvary Baptist Church, 1500 Cleveland in Friona. The meeting will consist of a brief presentation and a question and answer period.

According to Todd Montandon, Wildlife biologist from Canyon, the purpose of the meeting is to provide useful information to landowners and hunters about mule deer biology, habitat management, general harvest guidelines, and trespass laws. The implementation of the new mule deer season for Parmer County will be the main focus of the meeting.

"We want to afford a chance for folks to interact with our local Wildlife biologists and State Game Wardens on a county-by-county basis where deer seasons are being offered for the first time," Montandon said.

The Friona city council will meet Monday November 9 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers on Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

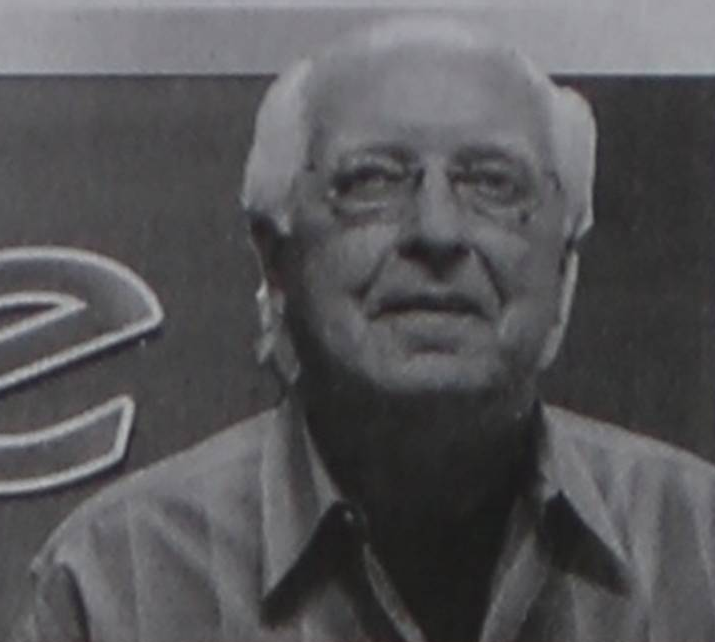

Here is a recipe out of the Prairie Acres November newsletter. It is called One-Pan Pumpkin Raisin Bread. Looks easy enough and sounds good. Spread some butter on a warm slice and enjoy. Thank you Prairie Acres for helping me fill some space this week. Sounds really tasty.

One Pan Pumpkin Raisin Bread

Makes 1 loaf

- 1/3 cup cooking oil
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 3 eggs
- 2 1/3 cups Bisquick baking mix
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup raisins

1. Heat oven to 350
2. Generously grease the bottom of loaf pan 9"x5"x3".
3. Stir all ingredients except raisins in the pan with a fork until moistened, then beat vigorously for 1 minute.
4. Stir in raisins.
5. Bake until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, 45-55 minutes.
6. Cool 5 minutes. Run knife or metal spatula around sides of loaf, pressing gently to loosen; remove from pan.

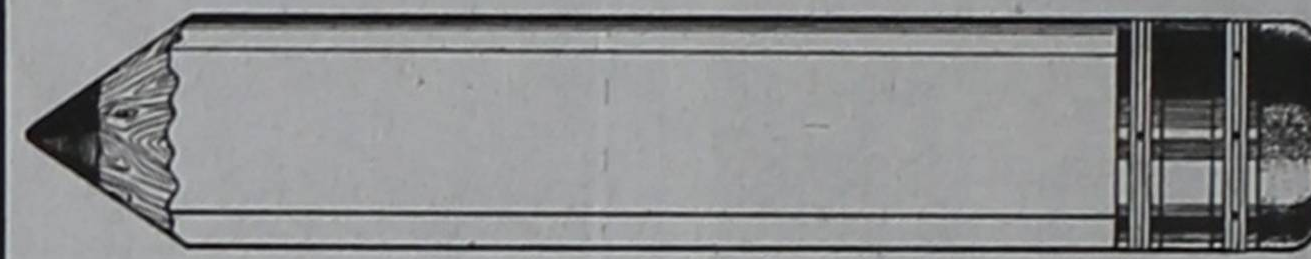

For the 19th year the Hereford Senior Citizens Association will stage its Festival of trees. This year it is November 14-18 at the Hereford Senior Citizens Center.

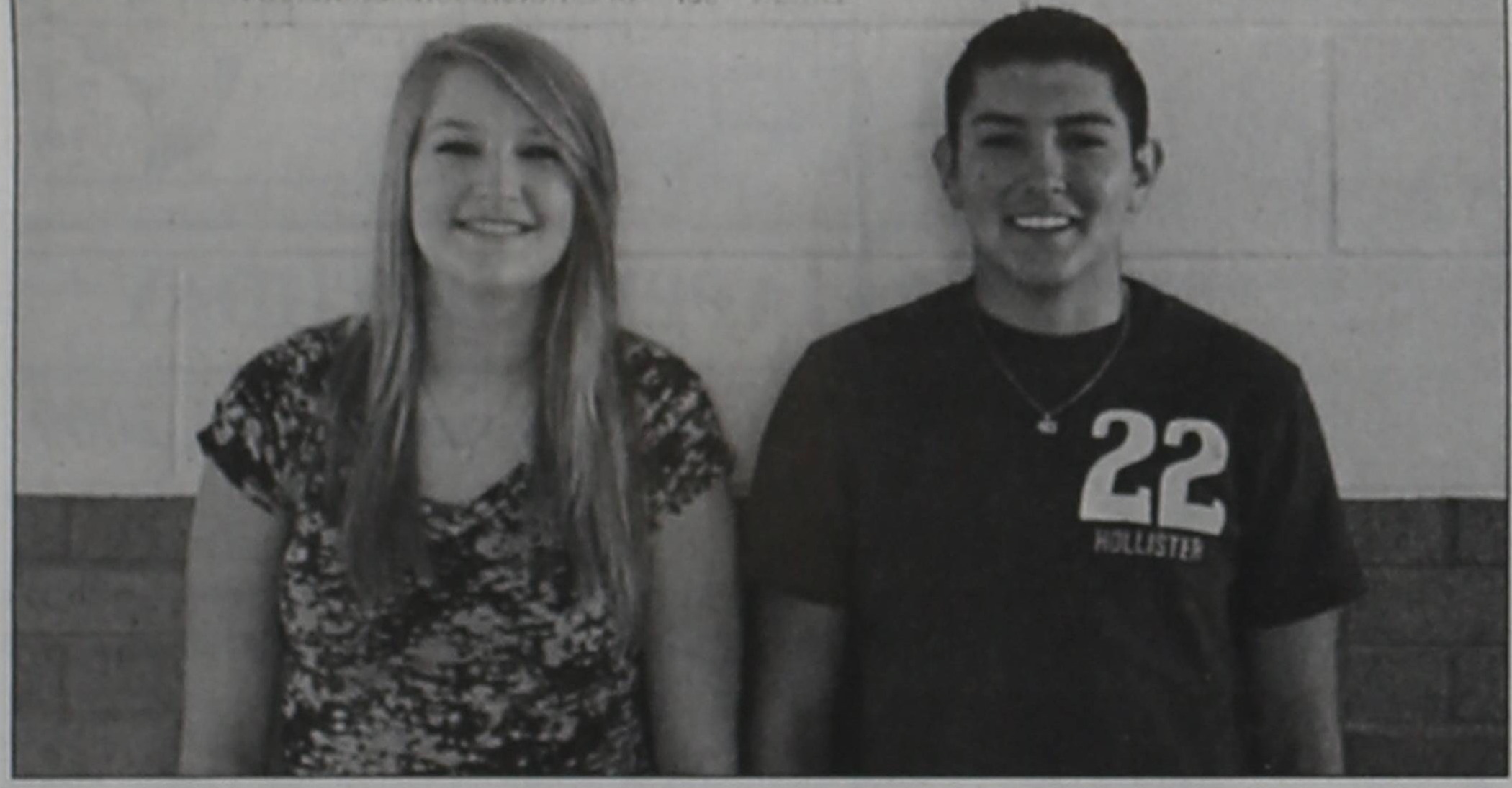
Christmas trees are decorated by local businesses and organizations,

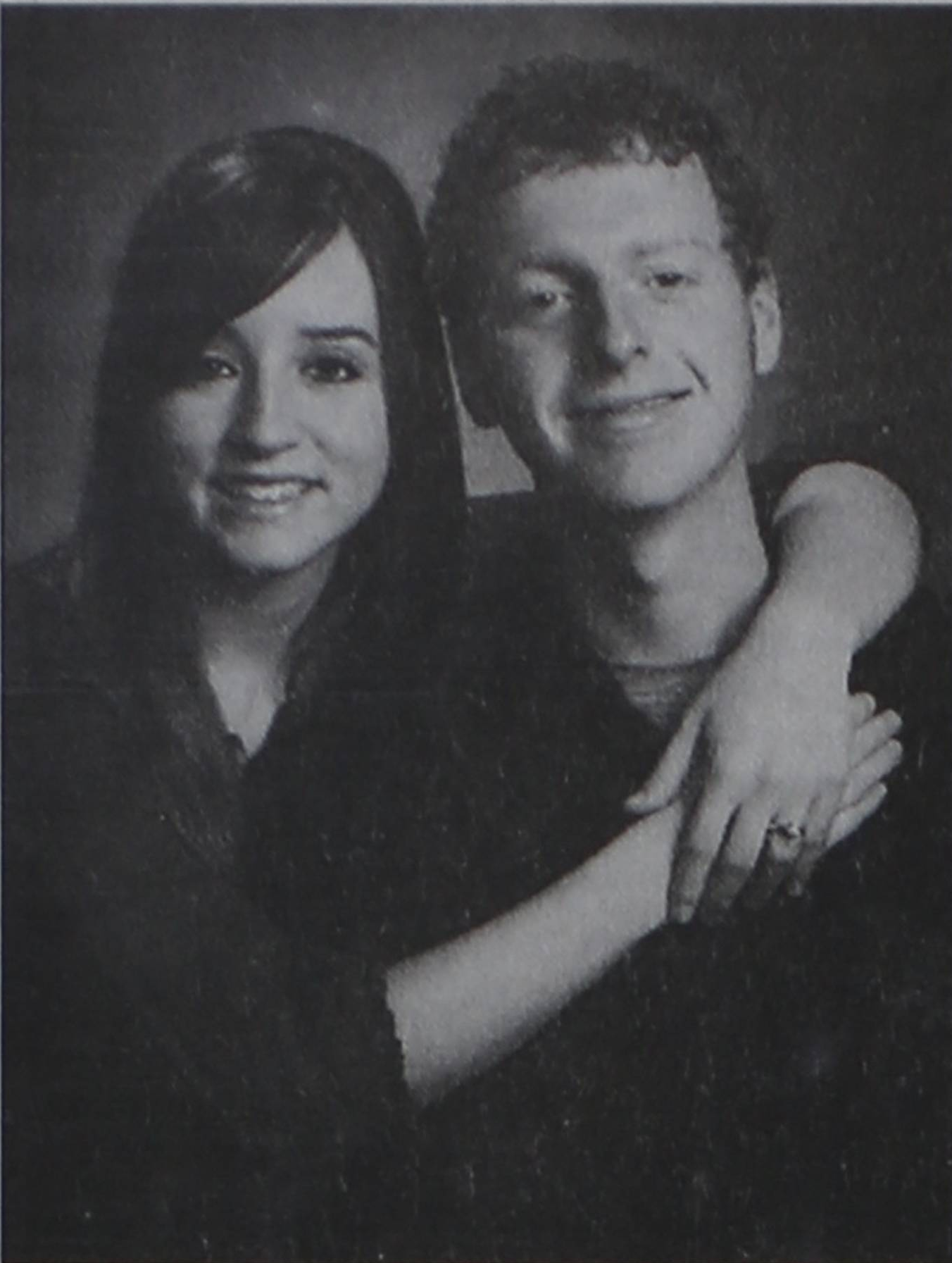

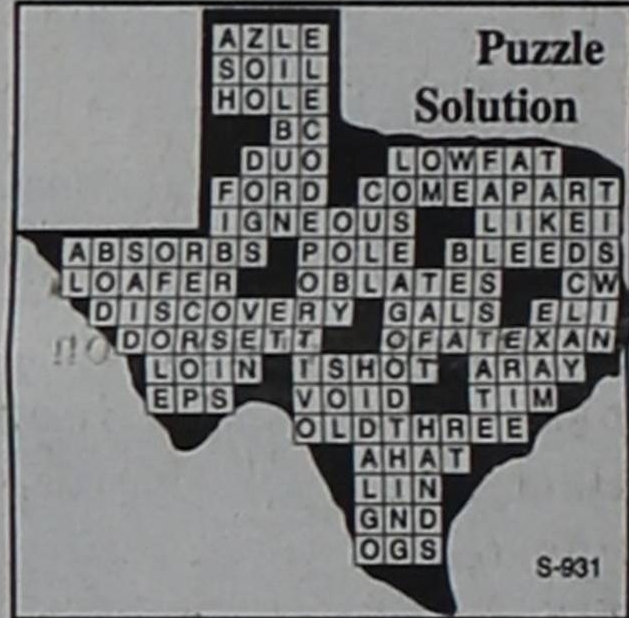

Chiefs outlast Childress 35-28, play Muleshoe for district title

In spite of another flat second half effort, the Chiefs outlasted the Childress Bobcats 35-28 Friday night in Childress. The Bobcats finally got on the scoreboard in the third quarter but the Chiefs took a 28-6 lead into the fourth quarter.

Starting quarterback, senior Joey Dickson, suffered an injured ankle on Friona's second possession and left the game. Junior backup Brenner Barnett took over and did an outstanding job guiding the Chieftains to the important win. Barnett carried three times for 12 yards and completed five of sixteen passes for 72 yards and two touchdowns.

Childress' first score in the third quarter was a 68-yard pass play. The Bobcats scored twice in the fourth on two touchdown runs by Seth Simpson, one for 24 yards and the other went 64 yards to pull Childress within 8 points, 28-20, with 8 minutes remaining in the game.

On the ensuing kickoff, Friona fumbled at about the 10-yard line and the Bobcats recovered. However Childress was ruled offside on the kick-

off and they had to kick over. Barnett and the Chieftains moved the ball downfield using up the clock until Zack Fair went on a broken tackle spinning run to cover 30 yards and a final Chieftain touchdown for a 35-20 lead.

But the Bobcats were not finished. They managed to score again and complete a two-point conversion to make the score 35-28 with little over a minute remaining. After an unsuccessful onside kick by the Bobcats the Chiefs ran out the clock to complete a 4-0 district record and head for a showdown with the 4-0 Muleshoe Mules Friday night with the district title on the line.

Zack Fair, one of the premier running backs in the Panhandle, rolled to an impressive 234 yards on 23 carries and two touchdowns. He ripped off a 66-yard run in the first quarter to set up a Chieftain touchdown. Fair also had two pass receptions for 20 yards.

Fullback Noe Saenz was again consistent on short yardage with 14 carries for 68 yards and one touchdown. Chris Garcia added 44 yards on 5 carries and Jonathan

Licerio was 4 for 21 and also again perfect on extra point kicks, 5 for 5.

Barnett had touchdown tosses of 31 yards to Matthew Stanberry and 10 yards to Caleb Monroe as the Chiefs amassed 474 yards of total offense while holding the Bobcats to 143 yards rushing and 175 passing.

The Chiefs intercepted Childress three times, one each by Barnett, David Schwab, and Gabriel Avalos. Alan Tafoya and Stanberry were each in on 8 tackles to lead the Chieftain defense. Clayton Smiley, Diego Licerio, and Tafoya each carded three unassisted tackles.

The win sets up a long-awaited showdown with Muleshoe Friday night November 6 at Chieftain Field for the outright claim to the District 2-2A title. Muleshoe is the defending 2A state champion. Both teams have 4-0 district records.

The game will be Senior Parents night as the Chieftain seniors play their final game at Chieftain Field. Senior parents will be honored in pre-game ceremonies beginning about 7 p.m. with kickoff at 7:30 p.m.

He was on his way back to Seattle, Washington, when the earthquake hit Alaska on his 21st birthday, March 26, 1964. His ship pulled some equipment to Alaska to help, then returned to Seattle. He was shipped out to Hawaii, Guam, Philippines, Japan, China and Vietnam for six months and was discharged from the Navy September 27, 1966.

He worked for Hydro Products in San Diego, California for a number of years. His company made cameras for the disaster at Three Mile Island. They made the first minibus and mine chasers. Ken equipped them with radar equipment and tested them under water. Honeywell bought the company and moved it to Seattle, Washington. FSA loans for disadvantaged farmers, ranchers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) allocates a portion of its farm loan program funds specifically for socially disadvantaged applicants (SDA) including minority and women producers.

"FSA farm loans are available to all qualified applicants, but by setting aside funds specifically for minorities and women, the Agency ensures members of these specific groups can receive a portion of available funds - assuming they meet FSA loan eligibility requirements," said Thomas S. Taylor, Farm Loan Manager for Parmer County FSA.

By FSA definition, an applicant is considered socially disadvantaged if he or she is a member of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice, without regard to individual qualities. FSA has identified socially disadvantaged

groups as Women, Blacks, American Indians, Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

FSA offers both direct and guaranteed farm loans. Farm loan funds can be used to purchase farms, livestock and equipment. They may also be used to operate a farm, build or repair service buildings, pay for soil and water conservation practices, and in some cases refinance debt.

For direct loans made by FSA to purchase a farm the terms may extend to 40 years with a current interest rate of 5.00 percent. Direct operating loans may be made for one to seven years with a current interest rate of 3.125 percent, which is subject to change.

"Applicants requesting direct real estate loans should be aware that funding for this program is limited and may require a waiting period before funds are available

and applications approved," said Taylor.

FSA guaranteed loans are made by banks or other commercial lenders and are guaranteed by FSA for up to 90 percent of any loss. The guaranteed loan program includes both operating and real estate loan programs. If a loan applicant is able to obtain financing from a private lender equal to 50 percent or more of the total funds needed to jointly finance the purchase of the farm, the interest rate on the FSA direct loan would be fixed at the current interest rate at the time.

SDA loan applicants do not receive automatic approval. Individuals must be U.S. citizens with a satisfactory history of meeting credit obligations, have sufficient education, training or experience managing or operating a farm, possess the legal capacity to incur debt, and be unable to obtain credit through traditional lending means.

"Qualified loan candidates are provided information and assistance to develop sound management practices, analyze problems and utilize available resources essential for successful farming in the ever-changing agricultural environment," said Taylor.


