## Attention: All Friona landlords

Panhandle Community Services' weatherization department will be in Friona Monday, March 22, 2010, at 9 a.m. to discuss free weatherization services for your tenants. A PCS spokesperson says "We invite all landlords who have questions to come see us."

If you qualify, PCS may be able to help with insulation, caulking, doors, windows, and some appliances. The goal is to help homes become more energy efficient, all at no cost to you.

The meeting will be in the city council chambers at 619 Main St. Landlords are invited to attend and hear about the PCS services. There is no admission fee, no cost to landlords or tenants.

## City election set for May 8

Monday was the deadline for candidates to sign up for city, school, and hospital board elections. Only incumbents signed up for the school board and hospital board, so no elections will be held for those two.

A city election will be necessary and will be held Saturday May 8 at the council chambers at 619 Main St. Two council seats and the race for mayor will be on the ballot.

Candidates for the two council seats are Martha Barker, Ronnie Stevick, and Cheryl Weatherly. Barker and Stevick are incumbents. For mayor, incumbent John Taylor and J. B. Douglas are the candidates.

## Council sets May 8 election, approves wind farm lease

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday March 8 at 6:30 p.m.

Jim Taylor addressed the council during the public comments portion of the agenda. Mr. Taylor lives near the trailer park on 5<sup>th</sup> St. and told the council that loud music was already becoming a problem and would get worse as the weather gets warmer. He asked that the council do something about the situation, preferably to have the police department write citations for loud music violations. The council agreed to look into the situation.

A resolution was passed setting Saturday May 8 as city officials election day. Mary Ford was chosen as presiding judge and Angie Tirado as alternate judge for the election. Candidates on the ballot will be Martha Barker, Ronnie Stevick, and Cheryl Weatherly for two city council seats, and incumbent John Taylor and challenger J.B. Douglas for the mayor's chair. The election will be held in council chambers at 619 Main St.

They okayed the lease agreement with Friona ISD for the adult softball field and approved an application to be made for a Go Texan grant to benefit the Cheeseburger Festival and Maize Days promotions.

Approval was given for a variance for Salvador Garcia to construct a carport at his residence at 905 Frio. In other business Kip Kimbrough was appointed to the board of the Friona Public Library. A discussion was held regarding the financial

statements and auditors comments, EMS writeoffs, and how to handle grants on the city's budget projections.

After some discussion, the council approved a Friona Economic Development Corporation grant to Holly's Fitness Center in the amount of \$5,000 to purchase additional treadmill and fitness equipment. Councilman Stevick questioned the grant since the fitness center had already received a loan and grant from the FEDC. The motion to approve passed with Stevick voting no.

The council heard a presentation from Jim and Kay Swafford of Bovina, principals in Scandia Wind Southwest LLC, a local organization signing up landowners on leases for potential wind farm negotiations.

Jim Swafford told the council that the developers of the Parmer County wind farm operation were proposing 1,000 turbines here and landowners income could be from \$14,000 to \$24,000 per year for each turbine on their property. He expects building to commence in the next couple of years, generating as many as 20,000 jobs during the construction phase and 1,500 permanent jobs in the operations phase.

He said the wind farm operation could produce over \$50 million per year in property taxes and total investment could exceed \$1 billion. Each turbine will cost about \$6 million to build and install. Swafford told city officials that there is a possibility that city land north of town could be used for a

substation. Success of the project depends on being able to connect with a grid to sell the electricity downstate or out west.

After Swafford's presentation the council went into executive session with city attorney Slater Elza and an attorney from Elza's law firm that has expertise in wind farm leases. After returning to open session, the council approved the signing of a lease agreement with Scandia Wind Southwest LLC on certain city land.

The next meeting of the city council will be 6:30 p.m. Monday April 12 in council chambers at 619 Main St. All regular council meetings are open to the public. The current council is Mayor John Taylor, Jim

Atwell, Martha Barker, Mark Osborn, Ronnie Stevick, and Charlie Pope. Patricia Phipps serves as city manager and city secretary.

## Memorial benches donated to hospital

The new Parmer Medical Center has a landscaped walking path near the northwest corner of the building. The path will be utilized in conjunction with other rehabilitation facilities for rehab patients. The path area extends from the northwest door of the hospital to what will be the south parking lot and new helicopter landing pad.

Two black marble benches were recently installed in the landscaped area, donated in memory of Jo Blackwell and Sarah and Dustin Campbell. The benches, engraved with gold lettering, were given by John Blackwell and Holly and Danny Campbell.

The late Jo Blackwell was Administrator at Prairie Acres Nursing Home from 1980 to 2008. Mrs. Blackwell's five sisters also contributed to the memorial bench. John Blackwell arranged the purchase of the benches through Lagrone Monument Company in Amarillo.

The Campbells gave a bench in memory of their children Sarah (1979-2000) and

Dustin (1983-2001). Holly Campbell worked at Parmer County Community Hospital from 1973 to 1985 (two of those years were her junior and senior years in high school). Her 2nd cousin, Elda Hart, was the administrator, and her aunt, Othelia Bennett, was in charge of medical records. Current hospital administrator, Lance Gatlin, is also her 2nd cousin.

Both Sarah and Dustin Campbell were born at Parmer County Community Hospital. Dustin was one of the last babies born there.

The landscaped area runs adjacent to the alley on the west side of the hospital. Lance Gatlin said they hope to run a fence along the alley south past the parking lot once the new entrance and parking lot are completed.

Once the asbestos abatement in the old hospital building is completed in about six weeks, demolition of the building will begin and final construction of the new facility entrance and parking lot can commence.

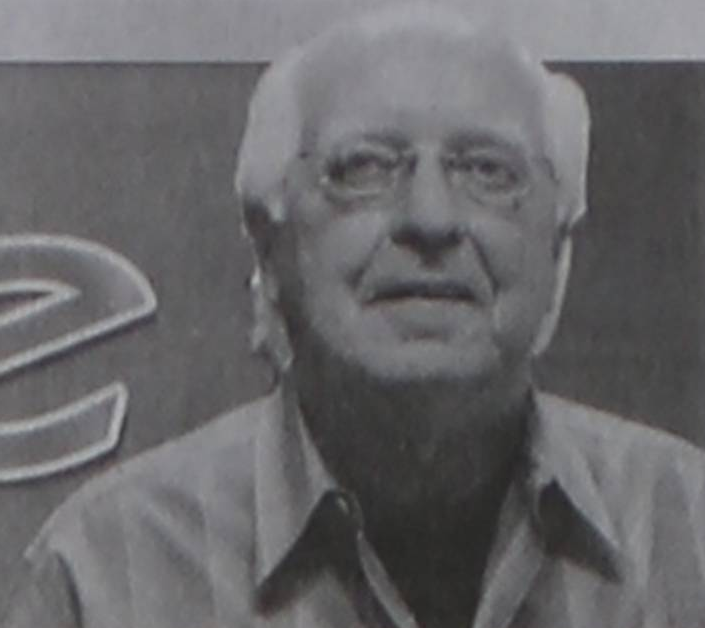

## keep news out of politics

Newspapers should not endorse political candidates.

There, I said it. Real newspaper people probably will look down their nostrils at me. After all I do not have a journalism degree and operate only a small weekly newspaper, which is not a real newspaper by big city newspaper standards.

I have been known to express opinions about certain candidates in this column. Not sure that sways any votes one way or the other. No small town newspaper that I know of would publish an endorsement for local candidates for city council or school board.

All big city papers publish their endorsements in political races. Prior to election day their editorial boards meet and in their wisdom decide who we should vote for. That can be helpful in cases like a State Supreme Court race with six candidates, none of which we have ever heard of.

Example: Rick Perry visited Amarillo but declined to meet with the Amarillo

Globe-News editorial board. Instead, he mingled with the folks. The Globe-News endorsed Kay Bailey Hutchison. How did that work out for them? Obviously everyone does not go along with newspaper endorsements.

It is not a newspaper's job to decide which candidate should win or lose an office. Consider the negative press hatchet job the Globe-News did on Victor Leal in his run for the state legislature. There was a question about his residency in Potter County. They made a big deal about there being no tracks in the snow around his Potter County home so he must not really live there. They even reported there was a bunch of mail in his mailbox.

All this, complete with photos of his home, were on the front page. Any way they characterize it, it was negative reporting. Then they endorsed Four Price who won the election. (Yes I was disappointed Victor did not defend his position

more aggressively).

In Sunday's Globe-News, editorial page editor John Kanelis wrote a piece that suggested many voters across the state cast ballots against candidates because they had Hispanic sounding names. He hinted that might have been the case in Victor Leal's defeat. No doubt some people vote for candidates by the sound of their name just like horse race bettors buy a ticket based on the horse's color. Maybe that is why Bill White beat Farouk Shami so bad in the Democratic

governor's primary. Doesn't mean it is right or wrong, just means they are uninformed and reckless.

It is helpful to some uninformed voters for a newspaper to tell them who to vote for. There are a lot of independents and organizations that attempt to sway our votes. That is okay. This is America. I just don't happen to think it is a newspaper's obligation to pick and support one candidate over another. Guess this means I would have flunked journalism school huh?

Shucks. That's too bad.

## Shakshuka: Israel breakfast buffet

Stumbled across some neat recipes in a recent Relish magazine. One in particular made good reading. It is for eggs cooked in tomato sauce. In fact this Relish magazine issue was devoted to using eggs in various recipes. More will come later.

I don't cook, remember, so help me out: how do you know when an egg white is set?

Shakshuka is an Israel dish you can make when your refrigerator appears to be empty. Shakshuka variations abound but the traditional recipe includes three main ingredients: tomatoes, hot sauce, and eggs. Other popular ingredients are onions, red peppers, leeks, potatoes, and sausage. It is served in the same frying pan it's cooked in, with bread and a salad. No tomatoes in this one though.

For more Israeli recipes Relish magazine recommends The Book of New Israeli Food: A Culinary Journey by Janna Gur. Happy shakshukas.

## Shakshuka with spinach and feta

Serves 6

- 1 tbsp butter
- 2 leeks, sliced
- 2 garlic cloves, pressed
- 1 lb fresh spinach
- 1/2 tsp salt
- coarsely ground black pepper
- 6 eggs
- 4 oz crumbled feta cheese

Melt butter in a large nonstick skillet. Add leeks and garlic and sauté until soft, about 10 minutes. Add spinach, salt and pepper and sauté 5 minutes. Break eggs one by one and slide onto spinach around the pan. Sprinkle with feta. Reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer until egg whites are set, 5-7 minutes. Serve immediately (straight out of the pan).

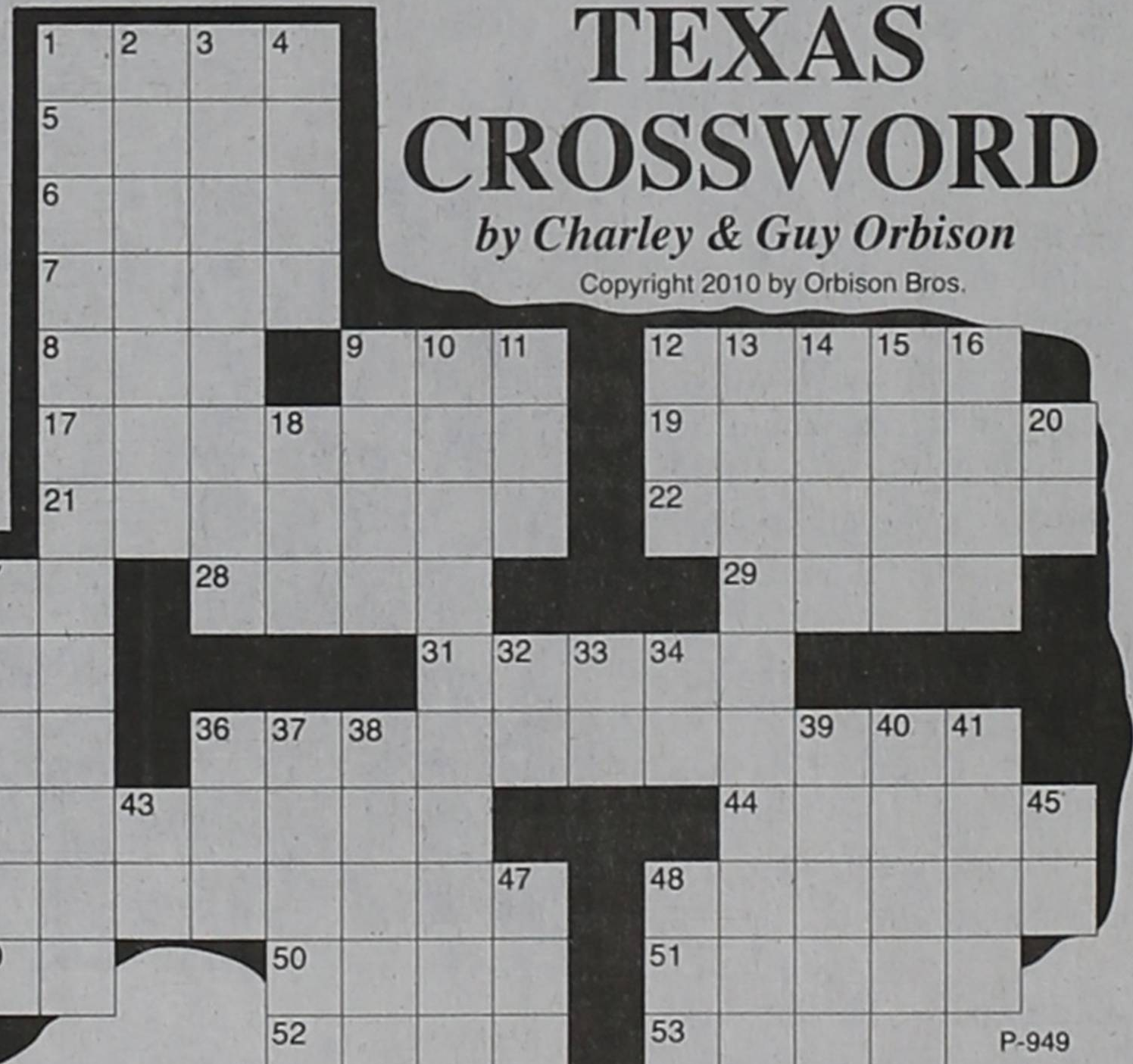

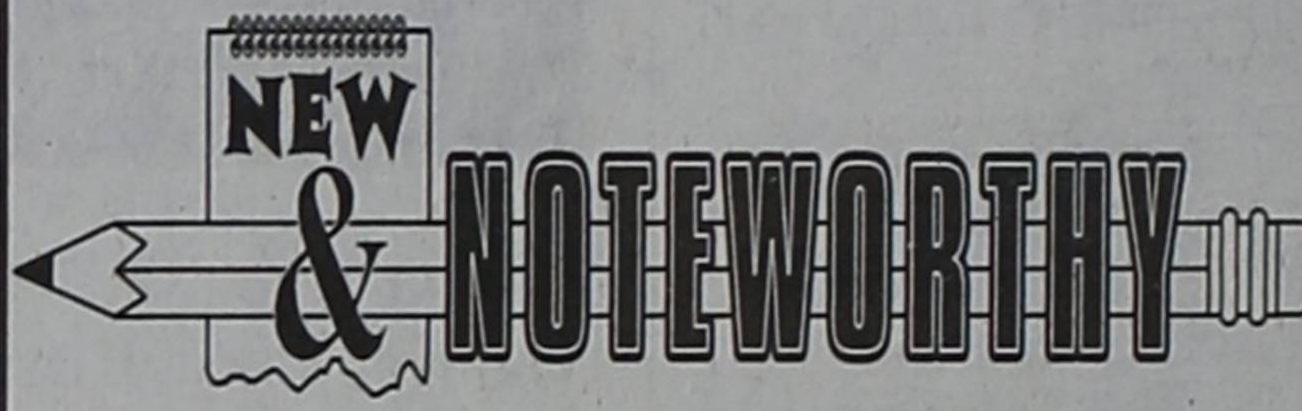

## Chieftain Band students need help for Branson trip

The Friona Chieftain Band will be participating in the competition at the Ozark Showcase of Music Festival in Branson, Missouri, May 6-9.

Band members are seeking the help of local citizens to provide opportunities to earn money for the trip. Director Ron McWilliams says, "Our band has currently earned over three quarters of the funds needed for the trip but some of the students still need more opportunities to earn their share of the overall cost of the trip."

Students who do not raise their share of the total cost of the trip will not be able to participate. "Unfortunately the lack of some students' participation could affect instrumentation which would affect the overall performance of the band," McWilliams said.

To earn money for the trip, the band students are planning a work week March 13 - March 20, during spring break. McWilliams said, "If you need students to help with spring cleanup, spring planting, or anything else, please support our students by giving them an opportunity to reach their financial obligations."

You can hire as many students as you need but each one is billed at \$10 per hour. To hire a student or students call the high school band room at 250-3383. "Leave your name and phone number on the answering machine and I will get back to you. Please call, our kids need your help," McWilliams said.

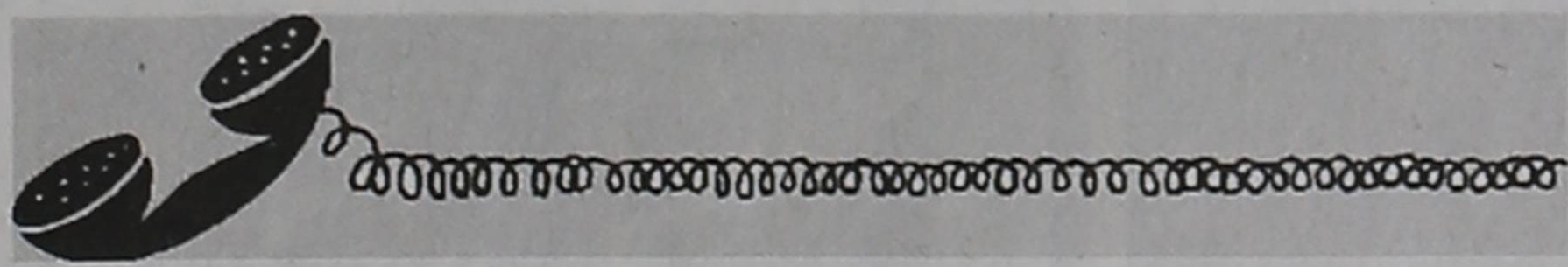

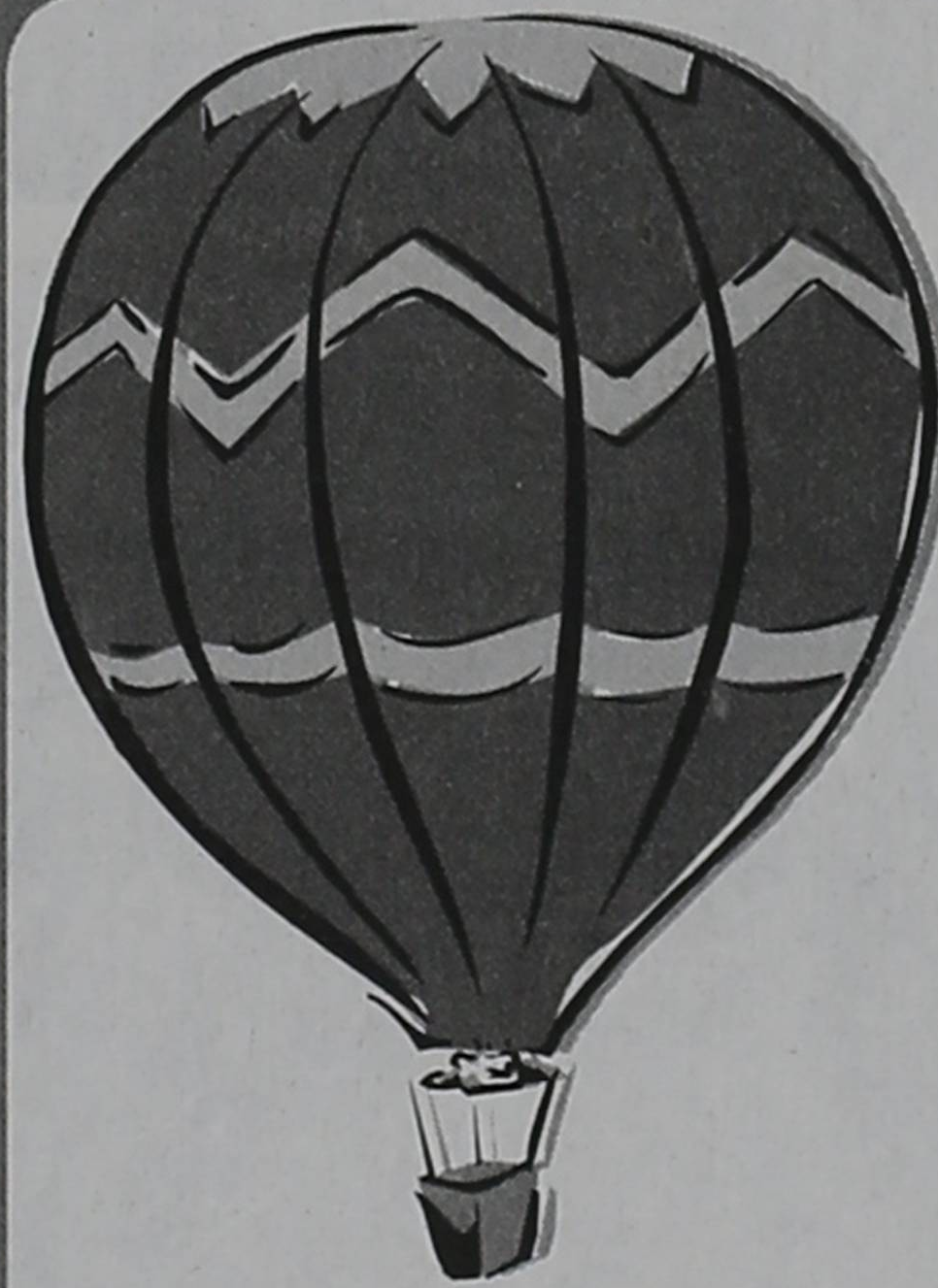

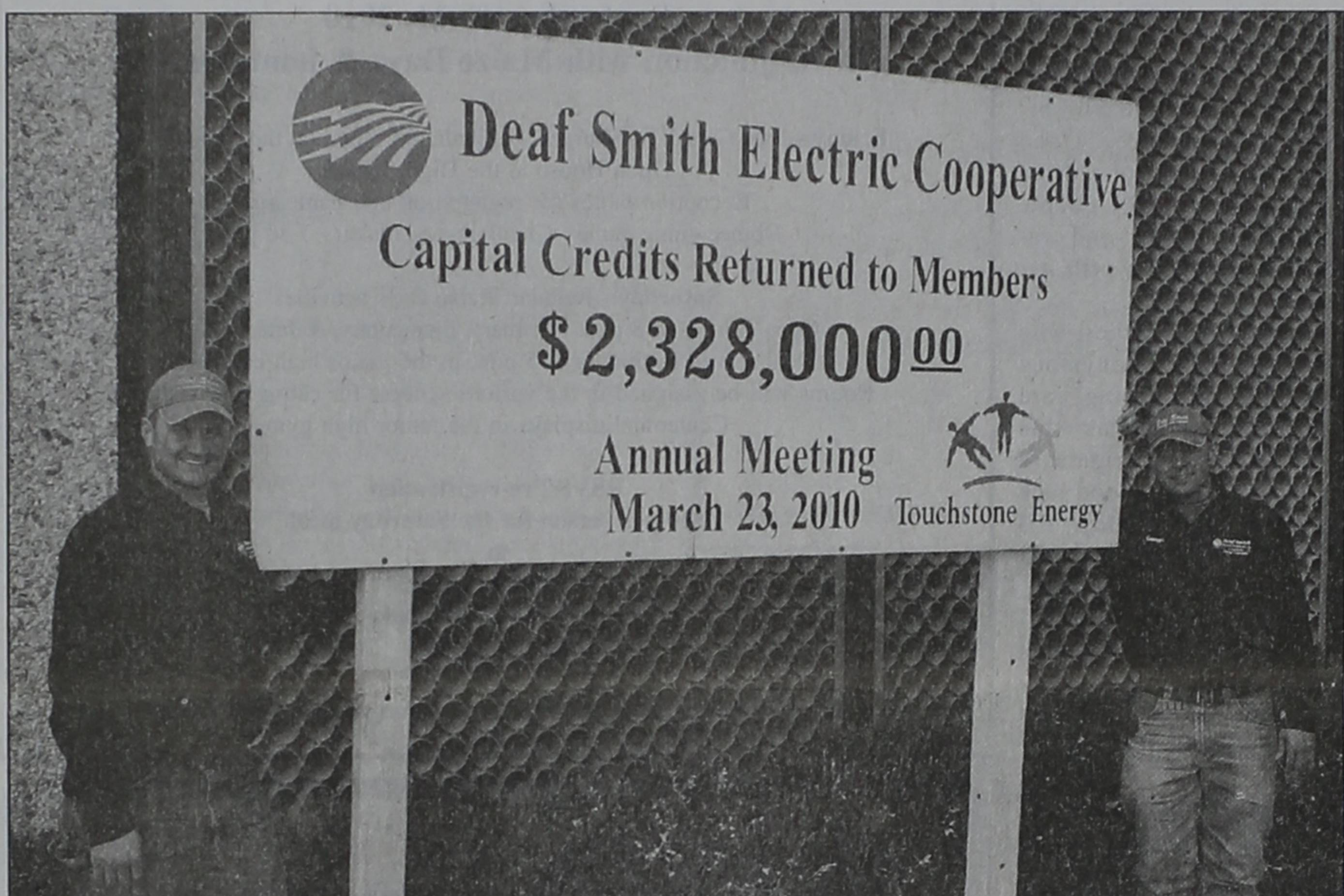
When the doors open at 5:30 p.m. at the Hereford Bull Barn, members may

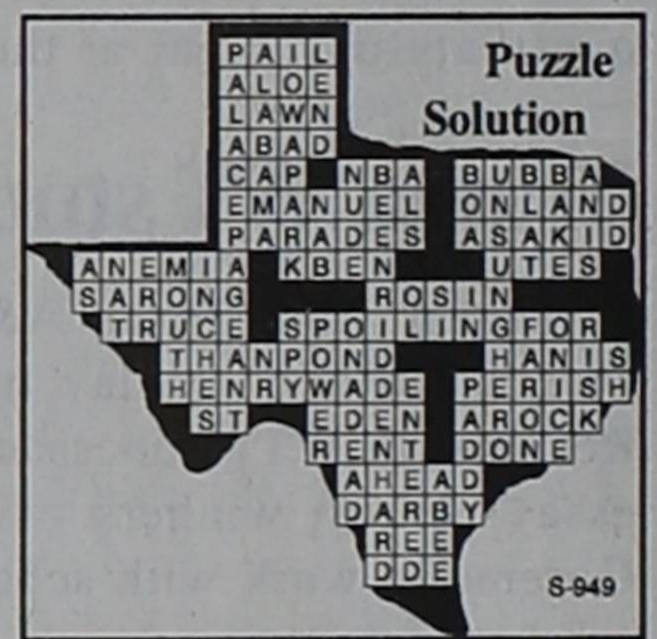

The boys played Tuesday March 2. Scores were Duncan Welch 103 and Ismael Rocha 110.

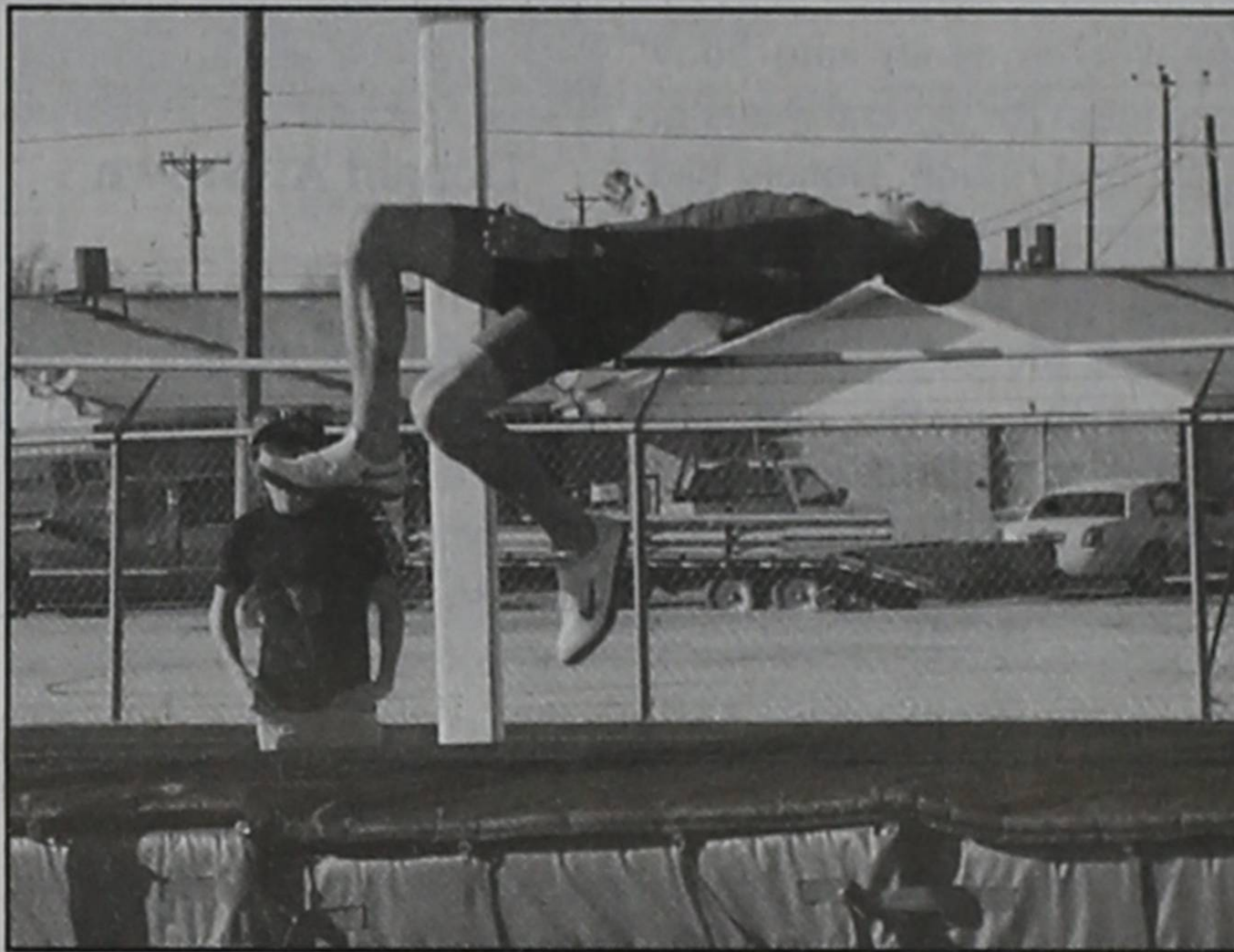

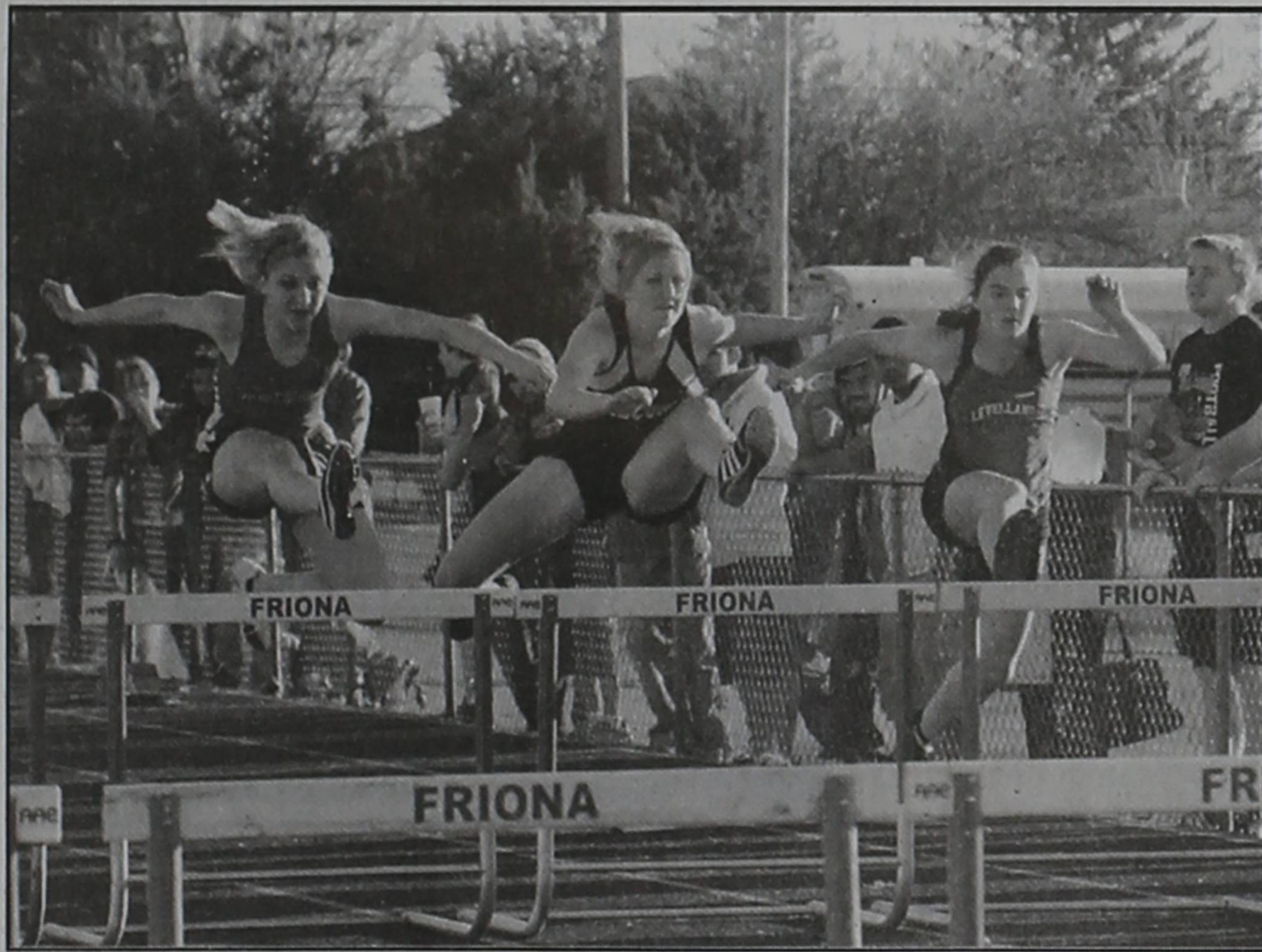

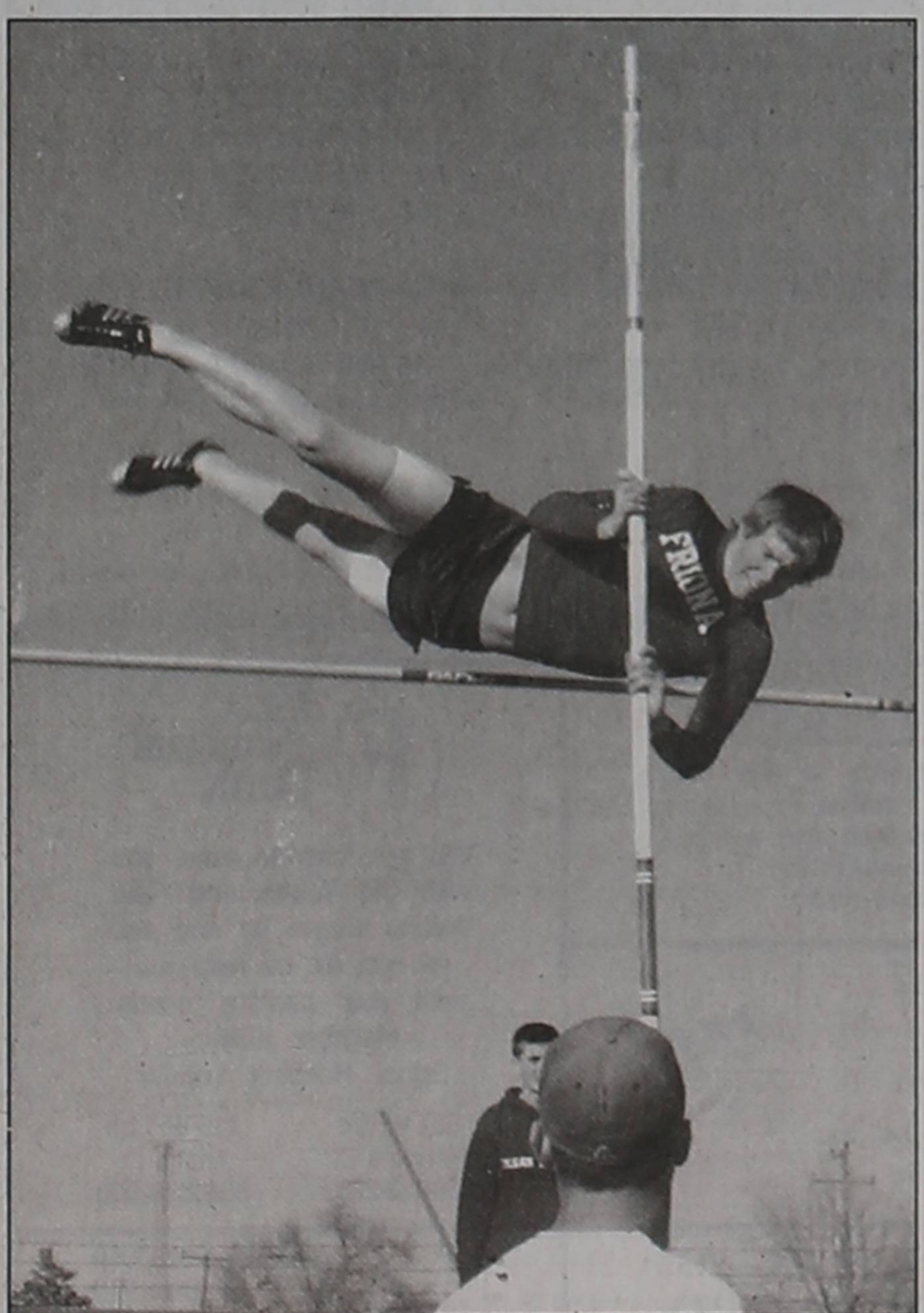

## Commitment that doesn't change

How many times in your life have you tried to strengthen your commitment to the Lord, only to discover that in a few days or weeks your were right back in the same old mess as before? Being a faithful follower of Christ demands a commitment that doesn't change, and is constant and zealous for the Lord.

In 1<sup>st</sup> Samuel, chapters 1 and 2, Hannah displays a strong commitment to the Lord in various seasons of life. When you meet Hannah, her life stinks because she is barren and plagued by her husband's other wife who is fruitful. In 1:11 she makes a powerful request of God that if God would grant her a baby she would give the child to the Lord. Miraculously God grants her request, and baby Samuel is born to her. What a joy that she now has her lifelong dream of a baby, but will she keep her promise to devote the child to the Lord?

Things are better for her now, she has what she wants and it would be easy for her to forget her commitment to the Lord, especially because her devoting the child to the Lord meant that He would be taken to Shiloh, where worship was centered at that time in Israel, and left there to be brought up by the priests who served there. The child would not be at her home, day in and day out, but at Shiloh.

Instead of faltering in her faithfulness, Hannah sticks to her commitment, even when difficult. 1:19-18 explains that after Samuel was weaned he was taken to Shiloh and left. Can you imagine the difficulty of this for a mother? It is unimaginable, but a strong reminder that following the Lord is not easy, but it is always worth it.

What areas have you waned in, regarding faithfulness. Do you love the Lord and serve Him wholeheartedly? Do you love His church and fellowship regularly? Wouldn't it be a great day to turn things around, start with a renewed dedication, stick to your vow and exhibit a commitment that doesn't change?

### Think about this

## A model person

T. LEON TALLEY, Minister, Sixth Street Church of Christ David, in Psalm 15, gives us ten qualities that God requires if we are to be in His presence. They are the kind of virtues that each of us can attain.

- 1<sup>st</sup> ...God requires integrity. This quality speaks of our morals, honesty, and sincerity.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> ...God requires righteousness. This identifies those who are upright, just and conforming to God's laws.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> ...God requires truthfulness in our heart. We must be steadfast and faithful in our speech and actions.
- 4<sup>th</sup> ...God requires that we not slander with our tongue. We must control our tongues. Our tongue has power to injure and hurt.
- 5<sup>th</sup> ...God requires that we do our neighbors no wrong. We treat our neighbors properly. Rather we are to love our neighbors.
- 6<sup>th</sup> ...God requires that we not slur our fellowman. We must regard men according to a moral standard.
- 7<sup>th</sup> ...God requires that we look with disfavor on the reprobate. We are not to be around those who contaminate our lives.
- 8<sup>th</sup> ...God wants us to honor those who fear and honor Him. We are to honor the righteous for what they stand for.
- 9<sup>th</sup> ...God wants us to keep our promises, even when it hurts. Our word should be our bond.

**What is the Project FRONTIER Study?** It is a research study being conducted by the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center looking at healthcare and aging. You must be 40 years of age or older & live in Parmer County to participate.
