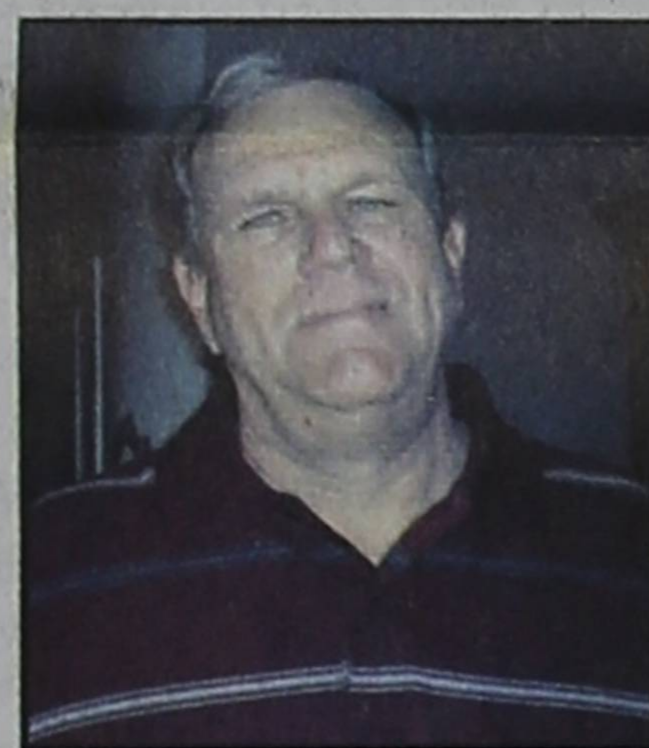
Friona dairyman on Cattlemen's Beef board

Friona dairy farmer Tom Alger has completed an extensive orientation to kick off his three-year term on the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research board, which oversees administration of the national Beef Checkoff Program.

After being nominated by fellow producers in Texas and appointed to the board by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, Alger officially started his term on February 4, becoming one of 103 producers and importers repre-

senting the U.S. beef industry in making recommendations about how to invest national beef checkoff dollars.

During a two-day orientation session March 15-16 in Denver, Alger joined other new Beef Board members in learning about his volunteer checkoff role during the next three years. That included education and discussion about board policies, procedures and responsibilities—including work on checkoff committees to prioritize strategies aimed at leveraging beef

producers' checkoff dollars on the research, educational and promotional efforts that

they believe offer the biggest return on producers' investments.

Alger was born and raised in Artesia, California. He graduated from Dordt College in Sioux Center, Iowa. After graduation he owned and operated a calf-raising business but has been running his own dairy operation in Texas for the past 20-years. In addition to the Beef Board, Alger has been active with the Dairy Farmers of America, where he has served in leadership for corporate resolutions.

The Beef Checkoff program was established as part of the 1985 Farm Bill. The checkoff assesses \$1 per head on the sale of live domestic and imported cattle in addition to a comparable assessment on imported beef and beef products. States retain up to 50-cents on the dollar and forward the other 50-cents per head to the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board, which administers the national checkoff program, subject to USDA approval.

"Don't forget to go to our website, we have several really great products there also!" I reminded her. "They bring too many books and homework, we are lucky to get everything done before bedtime—no time," she said again, "maybe this summer." How sad is that? We are all too busy...

I just wanted to reach out to her so badly—check out our website, e-books, Overdrive & Tumblebooks, TexShare Databases, Learning Express, Worldbook Online, et al. Our latest additions include *Atomic Learning and Muzzy Languages Software*—log in and check them out at www.frionalibrary.org. You will need your library card number and pin number because these products are purchased for our use by Harrington Library Consortium and Friona Public Library. For example, *Brain Fuse*, a live tutor homework help product, which is for 4th grade through first year college in all subjects in English and in Spanish, costs HLC \$28,000 annually for that subscription to which all

HLC libraries have access. Sadly, it is not used enough to warrant the cost and will probably be dropped in the fall.

As libraries and businesses and people strive to remain relevant and viable in today's instant access world, it is difficult to know which way to jump sometimes and how to invest your available resources in the best way possible for your users and your community to have the best access possible. Service is what libraries have always been about. That is why I love them!

I ran across some stickers that we used to put on all our VHS videos 'Be kind, please rewind.' I think that is good advice for all of us: we need to allow ourselves time to unwind and then time to rewind. Hope we all get a chance to do that a little more often. Libraries, as the heart of every community, can help us do that :)

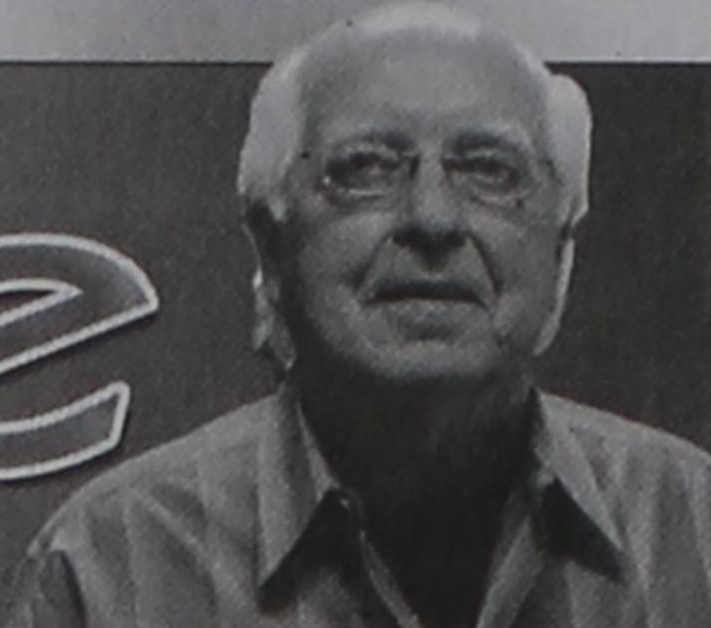

I hope you will pay attention to what the government is doing between now and November 6. If President Barack Hussein Obama is re-elected your life will change whether you pay attention or not.

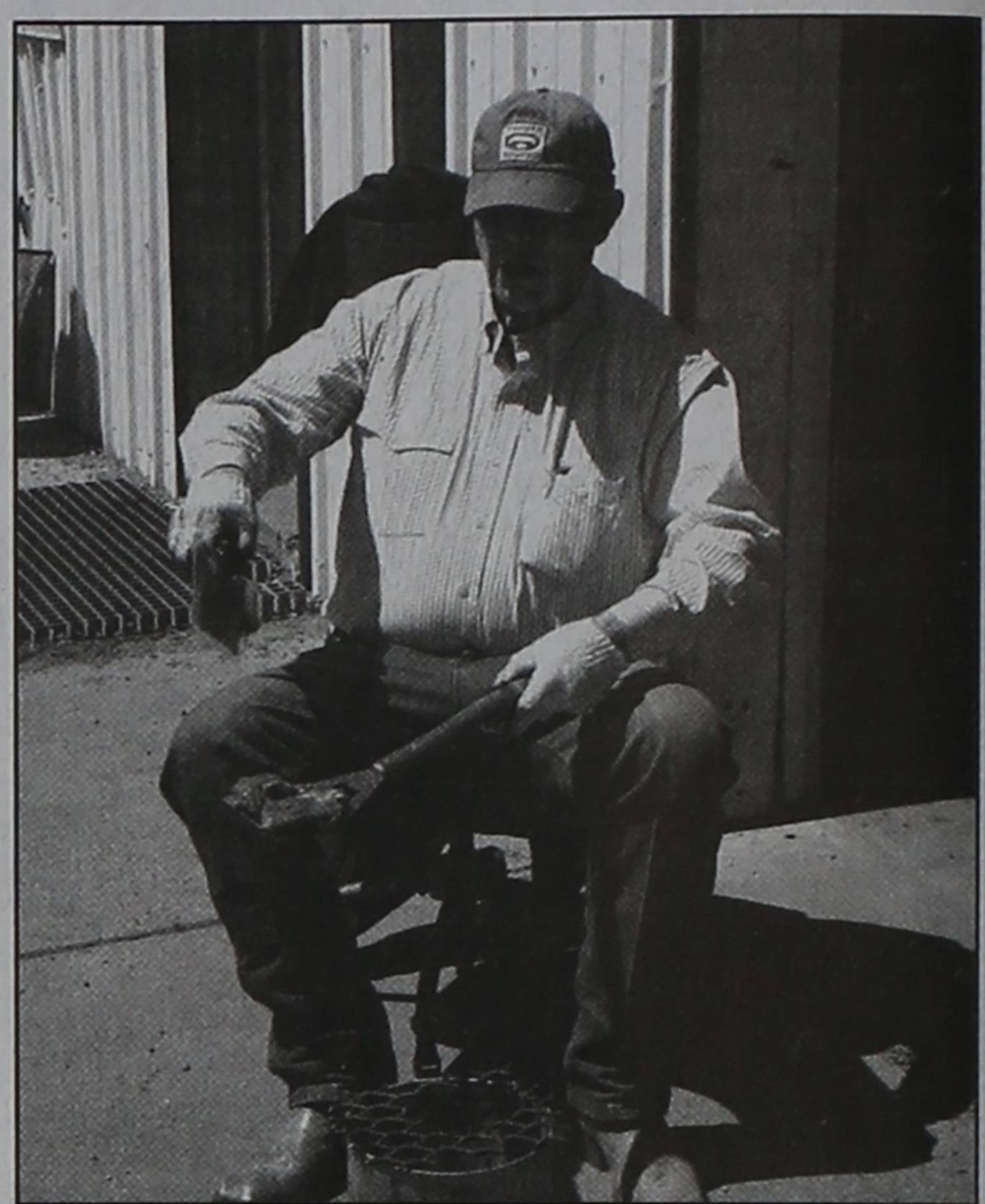

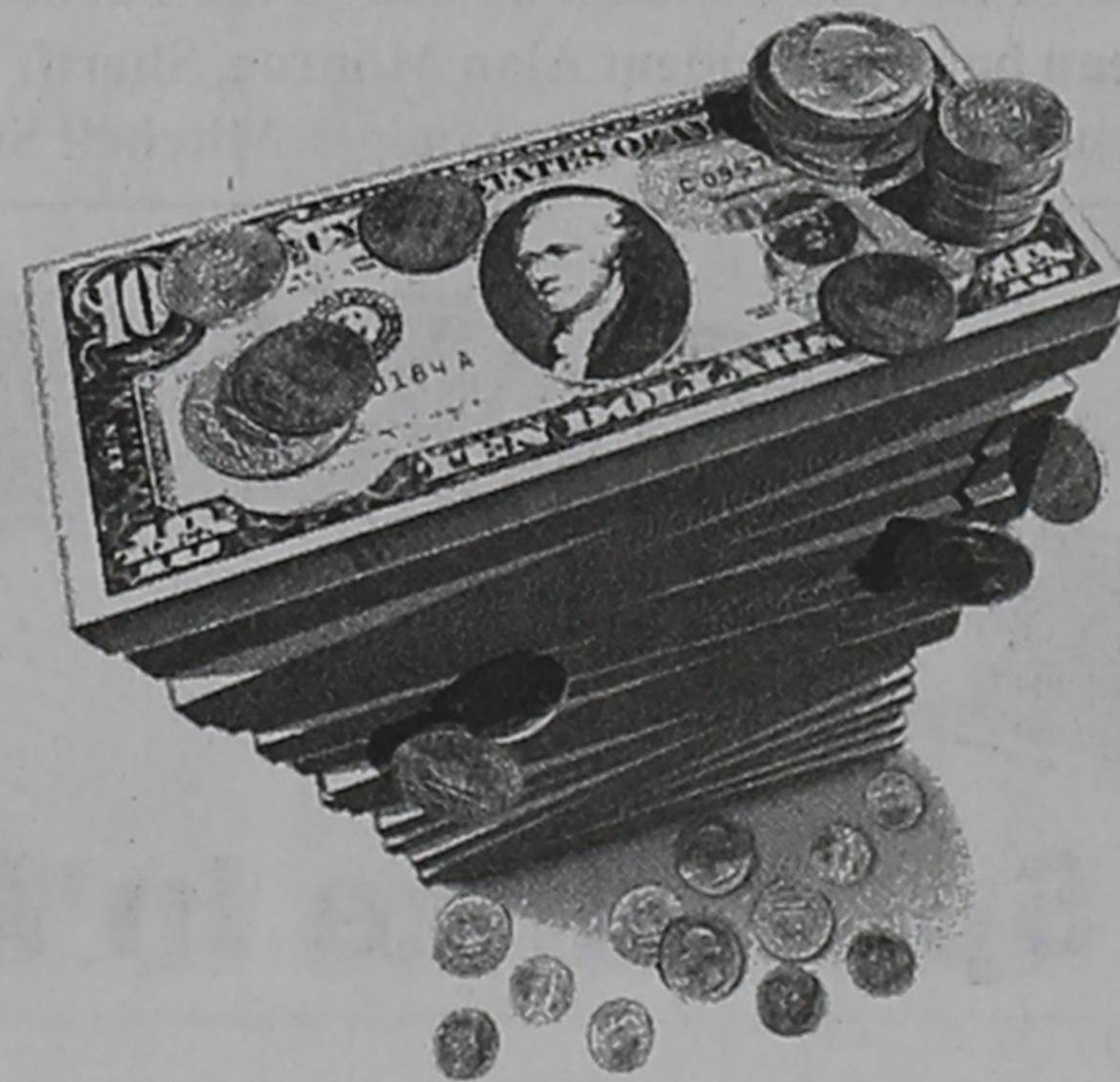

WE'RE HERE TO HELP

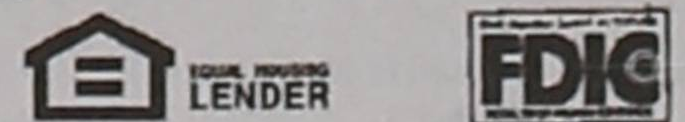


There's a tendency to think of "banks" in terms of the services that we provide.

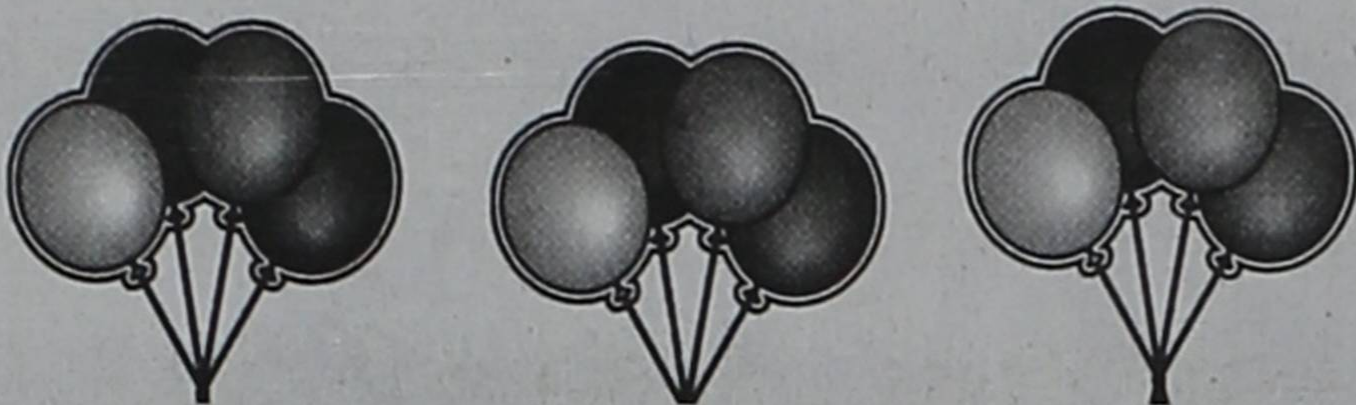

County sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that state sales tax revenue in March was \$1.87 billion, up 16.9 percent compared to March 2011.

"The latest sales tax revenue numbers mark a continuation of recent trends we have seen in sales tax receipts," Combs said. "Strong collections continued in oil and gas-related sectors, while growth in revenue from the retail sector and restaurants also accelerated."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in February.

Parmer County's April 2012 payment totaled \$40,310.94 broken down as Bovina \$7,411.01; Farwell \$6,323.93; and Friona \$26,576.00. In April 2011, the tax payment total was \$35,989.08.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 12.00%, broken down as Bovina 24.83%; Farwell -9.31%; and Friona 15.15%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$184,132.41 as compared to \$176,382.63 for the same period last year, a 4.39% change.
