Friona Police Dept. Instigates Program

HAD A NOTE this week from my former classmate at Muleshoe High School, Nelda Merriott, who is the longtime Bailey County Clerk.

Nelda, along with all of the residents of Muleshoe, as well as thousands of fans across the nation, are double-upset at the fact that CBS-TV has cancelled Lee Horsley's "Guns of Paradise" show for the fall season.

As you no doubt know, Horsley is a Muleshoe native, and his Paradise series has been hailed by those who work for quality programming on television for its wholesome, family-type theme.

In fact, due to the overall appeal of Horsley's show, an independent company, Viewers Voice, Inc. of Wisconsin, has become involved, and is helping Horsley's fans in their efforts to save the show.

Viewers Voice is urging fans of Lee Horsley to do one of three things: write or call the executives of CBS, voicing their disapproval, or sign a petition. The company hopes to secure 10,000 signatures from TV fans in their efforts on the Muleshoe native's behalf.

We will have a couple of the petitions available at our newspaper offices, for those who wish to participate. In these days of "raunchy" and violent TV programming, viewers need to do everything in their power to keep a wholesome show on the air.

Viewers Voice feels that a united effort on behalf of the show could convince the network to put the show back on their schedule in the fall.

But haste is important. The petitions need to be returned to Wisconsin by June 25.

Ellis made 33 DWI arrests in calendar year 1990, and has made 12 so far in 1991.

Sen. Bivins Will Speak Here Thurs.

With the conclusion of the 72nd Legislative Session leaving Texas lawmakers preparing for a special session scheduled for July, Senator Teel Bivins will hold a Town Hall meeting in Friona to give citizens an overview of the legislative agenda just completed in Austin.

The meeting will begin at 8 a.m. Thursday, June 20 at the Depot in the City Park in Friona. The public is encouraged to attend and visit with Senator Bivins.

The trip beginning in Friona is Bivins' third round of Town Hall meetings since the regular legislative session ended on May 27. Bivins is scheduling Town Hall meetings within Senate District 31 to explain issues that impact the Crown of Texas through lawmaking decisions made in the recent legislative session.

In the meeting, Bivins will discuss such issues as the new education bill, legislative and congressional redistricting, ethics reform and the state budget.

Staff members from Bivins' district office in Amarillo will be accompanying him.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1956

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1961

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1981

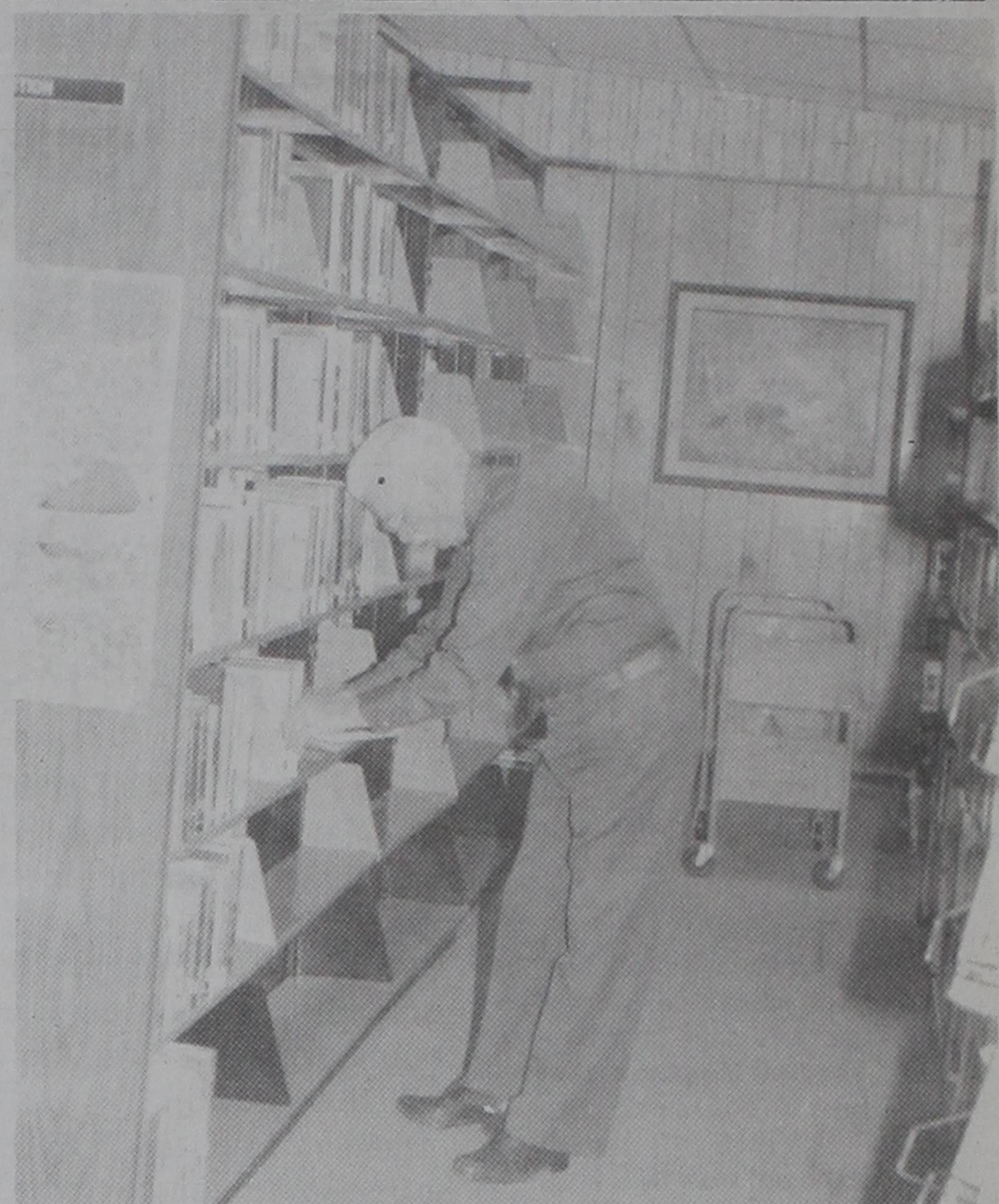
A Parmer County youth, David Allen Steelman, 20, was killed, and his companion was seriously injured in a one car rollover south of Bovina early Wednesday morning.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."





These eight students had to meet strict criteria before induction into NHS, which included grade point average restrictions, character and over-all citizenship and recommendation by teachers and administrators.

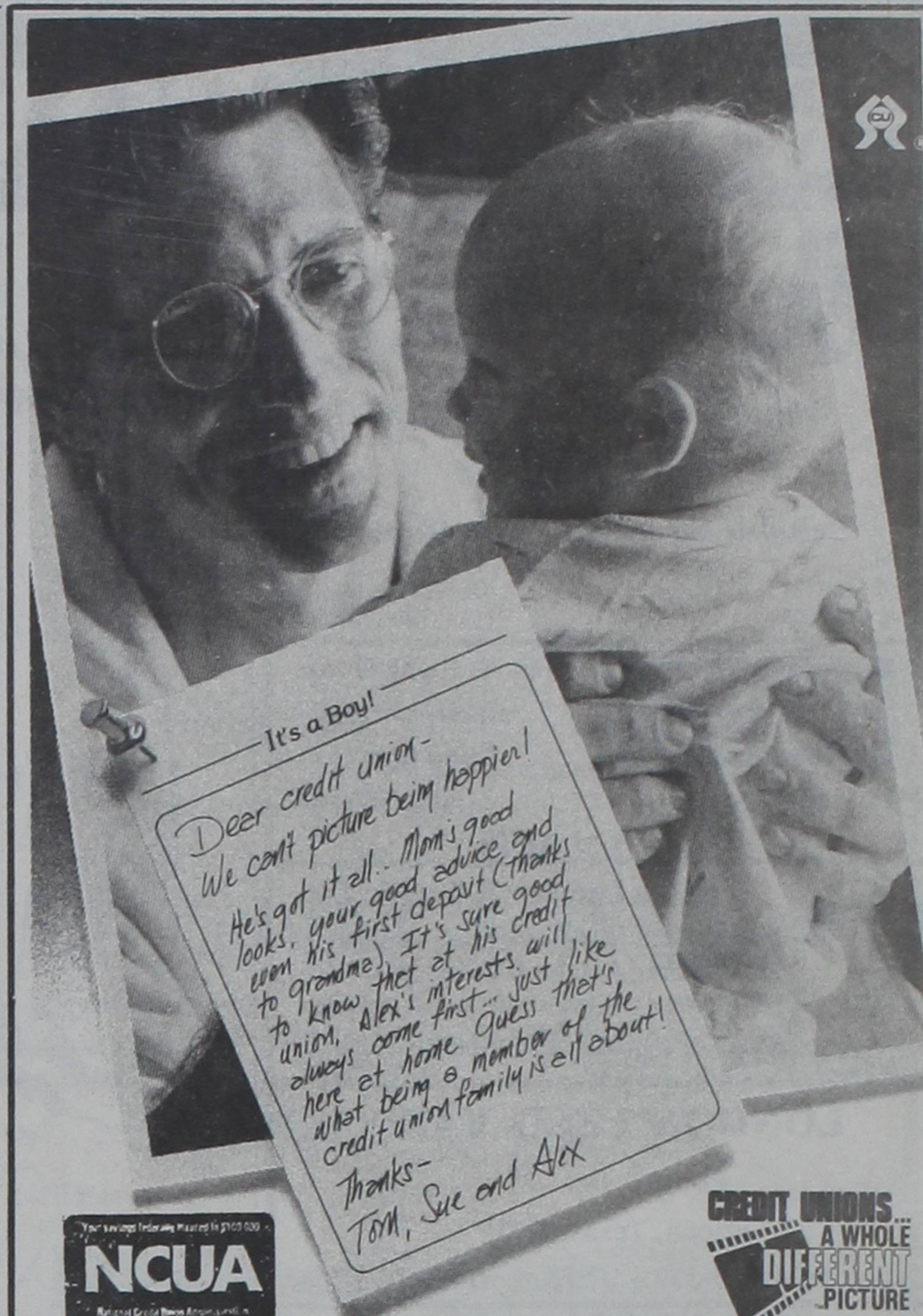
National Honor Society officers and members conducted the induction ceremony. Stacey Barber led the prayer. Casey Bradshaw, president, inducted the new members.

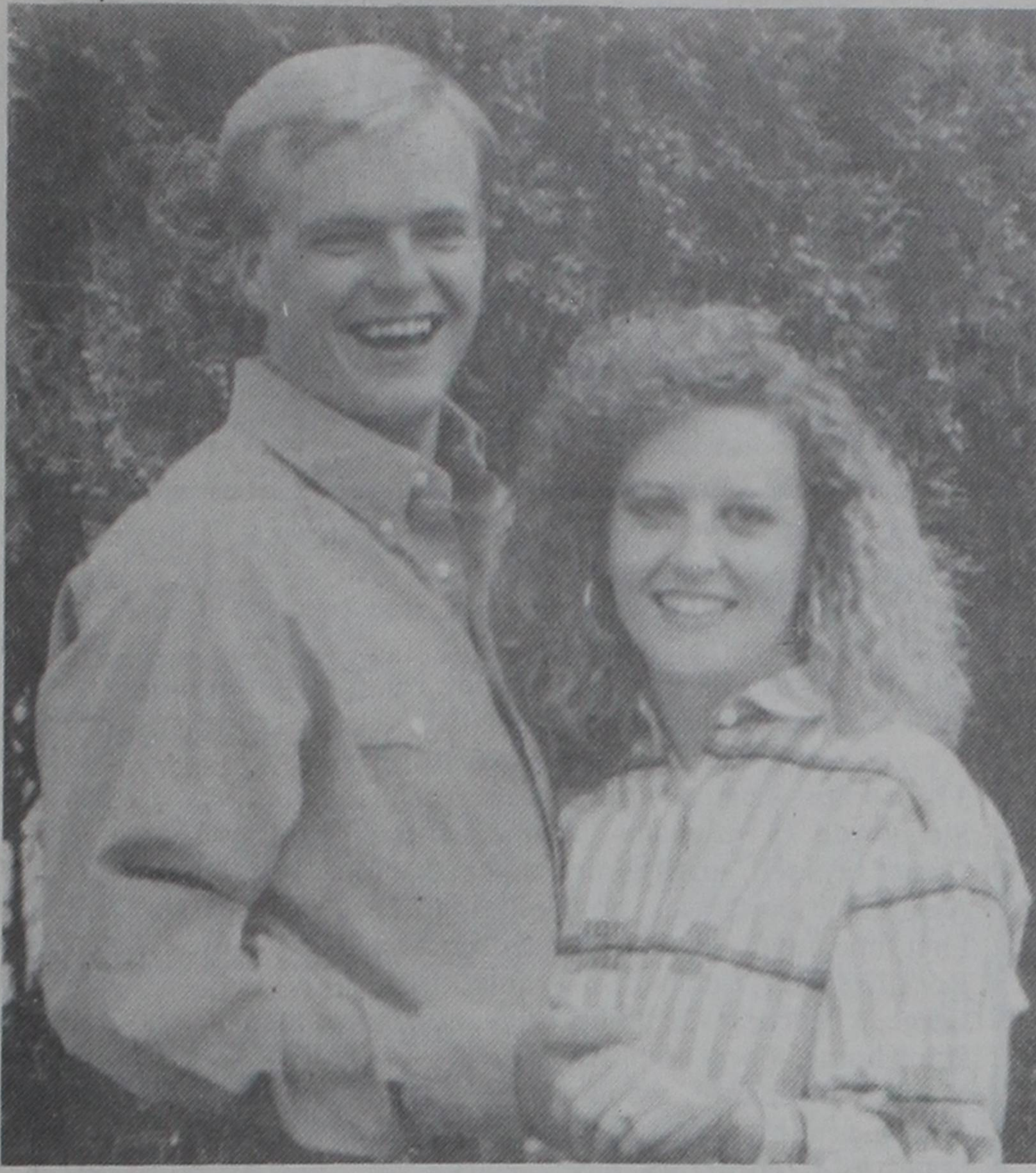

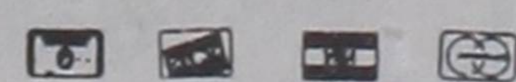

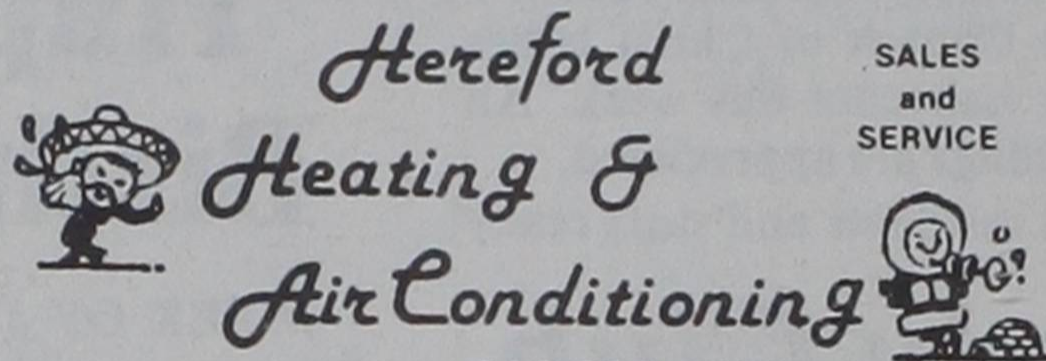

Those attending were Bobby Weid, president of the local artists group, along with Judy

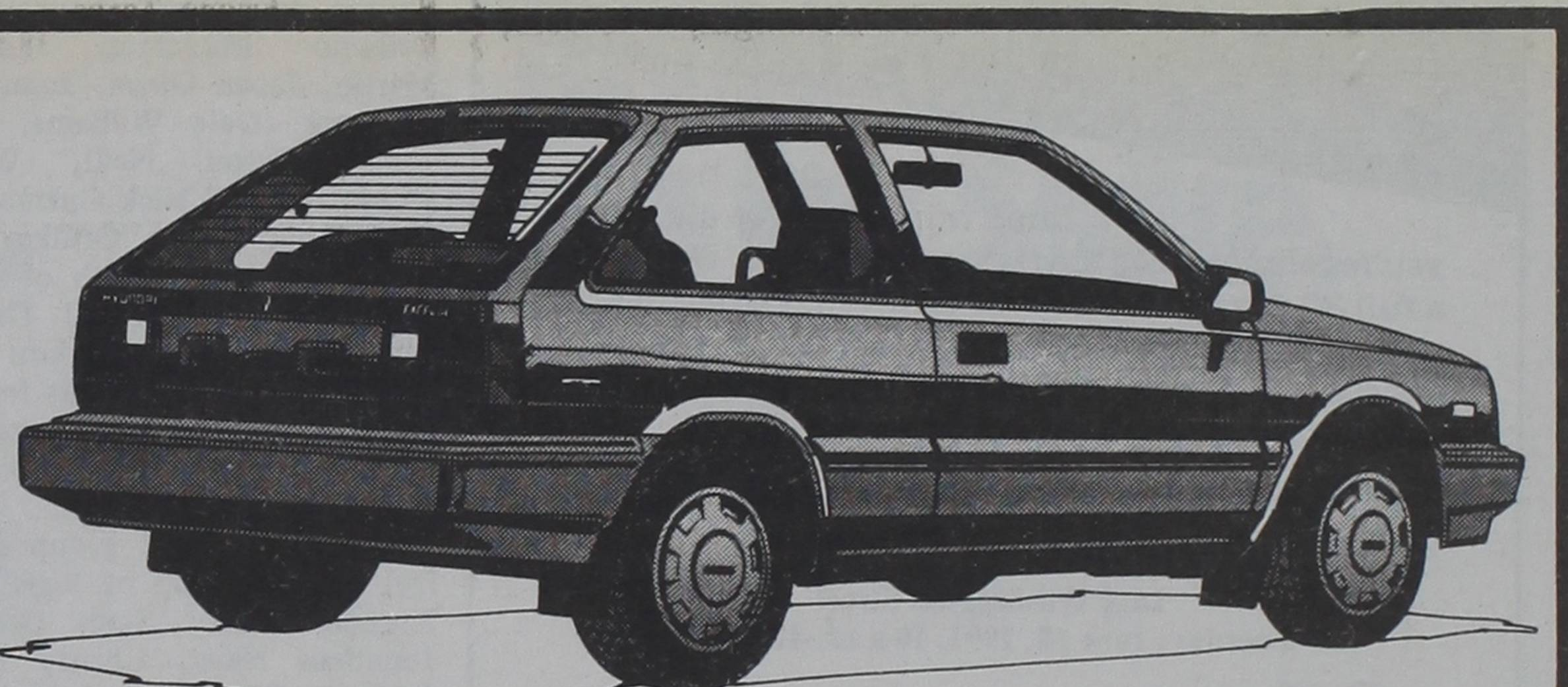

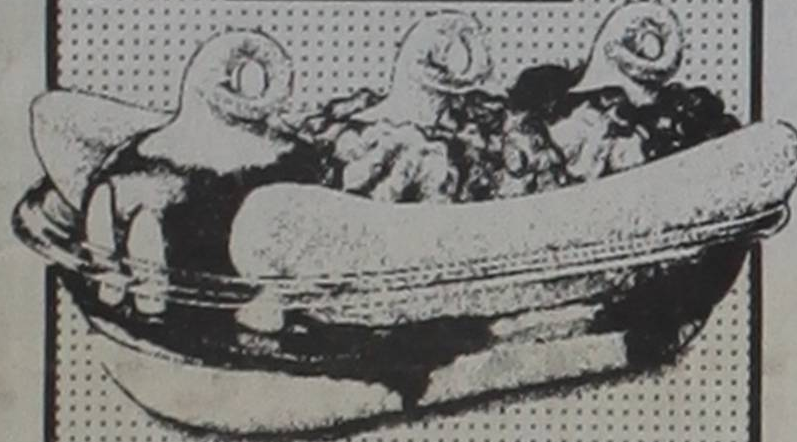

With the collapse of the savings and loan industry, investors have become leery of any investment purporting to be "guaranteed," but what about "guaranteed," fixed-rate annuities?

YOUR EYES



IF YOU WEAR SOFT CONTACT LENSES...

Soft contact lens are, for most people, the most comfortable means of vision correction. Now and again, however, certain "glitches" occur. Do you know how to solve these little problems?

If your soft lens seems dry, soak it for at least a half hour in sterile saline solution. Once the lens is fully hydrated, it should return to its normal texture. It's important that you follow a complete lens-cleaning and disinfection routine before you insert the lens into your eye.

Discomfort or blurry vision are signs that something is wrong. First step is to remove the lens, then check: Is the lens in the wrong eye? Has it been turned inside out in error? Is the lens dirty? Is it torn or nicked?

Changing the lens, turning it right-side out and/or cleaning it should solve the problem. A torn lens must be replaced, of course. And if discomfort or vision problems continue, see your optometrist promptly. *Brought to you as a community service by:*
