



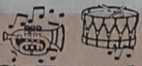
First Cotton Delivered To Co-Op Gin

The on-again, off-again 2001 cotton harvest sputtered to life this week but the Wednesday night rains slowed things again for area farmers.

The first cotton module was delivered to Friona Farmer's Co-Op Gin on Tuesday, October 2, by Kevin Welch and the first bale ginned that day also.

According to gin manager Jerry Butman, they have ginned around 80 bales so far, keeping pace as the cotton comes in.

Several farmers told us that a lot of the cotton was too green still to strip. Butman said that cotton farmers were expecting good yields this year, but low prices continue to hamper the market.



FHS Band To Compete In Amarillo

The Friona High School Band will travel to Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium this Saturday to compete in the annual UIL Region 1 Marching Contest.

Olton Visits For District Encounter

Olton's Mustangs visit Chieftain Field for Friday's District 5-2A game.

According to their season record (2-3), Olton may not have "jelled" as yet.

However, those who saw the Chieftains hand a vital district game to Hale Center last Friday, may think the same might also be said for Friona, which finds itself 3-3 on the season.

Not since 1995 have the Chieftains lost three games during the regular season, much less standing in fourth place in district after two games. The 1995 team was also the last FHS team to miss the playoffs.

The Chiefs still have some players with nagging injuries.

Alex Wilkerson injured a knee this week in a non-football incident, and Adam Bandy's back has been hurting him since last week.

Olton looked to be a contender in pre-season, with 13 returning lettermen, eight offensive and nine defensive starters back from their 2000 team which went 4-6, 1-5.

Sawyer Perry, a 165-pound junior running back, is Olton's main offensive threat. He rushed for 902 yards and scored 11 touchdowns to lead the Mustangs last season.

"He is a good runner and was all-district last year. He has some speed, and can hurt you," said Coach Mike Scott.

They also have a good receiver, Scott said.

The receiver is senior Justin Griffin, 6-3, 185-pounds, who averaged 22 yards per catch last season from his tight end position.

Olton's fullback, named Molina, had a good game against Friona last year, Coach Scott recalled.

Senior Zach Pinkerton and juniors Willie DeLeon and James Estes are returning starters in Olton's offensive line. Junior Tray Johnson, a 6-0, 160-pounder, is the Mustang QB this season.

Olton lost to Hale Center, 37-7 in its only district game. The Mustangs lost to class A Farwell, 26-0 in a non-district outing last week.

Last season was the first Friona-Olton meeting in football in 14 previous seasons. Olton leads the all-time series, 15-10-1. The teams first played in 1946. All of the games but two (1986-87) have been district games.

Rep. Combest Hails Attack; Farm Program

Congressman Larry Combest (R-TX.) discussed the attack on Afghanistan, as well as the House of Representatives' passage of the new Farm Bill, in a telephone conference call Tuesday morning.

Reacting to a question by this reporter, Combest said "I have no idea how long the campaign will last. I think the president has done a very good job lining (the attack) out. He said he wants to root out terrorism wherever it exists, so that (what happened September 11) doesn't happen again."

Combest says he feels the present campaign undoubtedly will go beyond Afghanistan, due to the president's phrase "wherever terrorism exists."

New York, Washington, and the entire country was under siege on September 11, Combest said. "After the planes hit the WTC in New York, we got word that an unknown plane was on its way to Washington. We had not realized that we were such an open target," the congressman said.

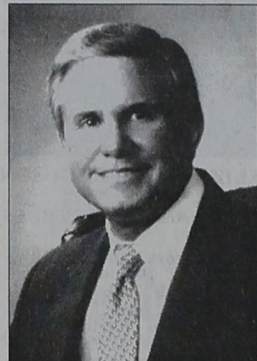
The Lubbock congressman said he had heard that the cities of Los Angeles, Chicago, Dallas and Houston had also been targeted.

"There has been a very heightened security around the capital, and I suspect there will be for some time," he added.

Rep. Combest said he was pleased that the House had passed the Farm Bill last Friday, calling it the culmination of a two-year program where he listened to farmers and got their input on what they wanted.

He said that during the final days of debate, the bill received the support of one of the most liberal forces, an environmentalist group.

"I was asked by the USDA not to bring the bill

up at this time (after the September 11 events). I thought it strange that this is the first time I had heard from the USDA in two years." (Combest is chairman of the House Agriculture Committee).

Combest said he hoped the Senate would act favorably

on the bill before Congress dismisses for the present term, so that "the American farmer won't be left holding the bag at this serious time."

"(Farmers) are the segment of the economy that has been hurting the worst over the past four years."

Combest said that Senator Daschle had not been anxious to deal with the bill, but now the pressure should be on the senate, and that body is "months behind the House on the subject."

"Congress decided that there was a lot of work that they needed to address, besides taking care of the distress in New York and Washington."

"The tragedies have readjusted our agenda. There is no question that the fiscal condition of the government has changed radically. This will probably lead to some deficit spending. But we have dealt with serious matters before, and we probably will again," he concluded.

We're Sharing General Franks With America

A SHORT GENEALOGY lesson: Gen Tom Franks joined my Ellis family several years ago. His wife is the former Catherine (Cathy) Carley, whose mom is Gaynelle, the daughter of the late Jimmie Ellis of Hobart, Oklahoma. So, Cathy Franks' grandfather and my grandfather, the late Willie (Bill) Ellis of Mulshoe, were brothers.

Bear with me: this story has a "tie-in."

On July 9, 2000, Tom Franks was appointed head of the United States' Central Command. As such, Gen. Franks is third in command of the U.S. Armed Forces, behind President George W. Bush and Air Force Gen. Richard Myers, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Carol and I were watching TV news Sunday evening, after our Armed Forces had flown its first night of bombing in Afghanistan. This particular news program was reporting on the meeting earlier that day, or perhaps on Saturday, when President Bush was meeting with Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld and Gen. Myers.

Pres. Bush asked Gen. Myers, the Joint Chiefs' chairman: "Is Tommy Franks ready?" to which Gen. Myers replied "Yes, sir, he is." Pres. Bush's quick reply was: "Then let's do it!"

At the time of his appointment in July of 2000, Franks, a four-star general, was serving as commanding general for the 8th U.S. Army in Korea, and asst. Chief of Staff for the United Nations troops.

He saw duty in Vietnam, where he served as an assistant division commander, and in Desert Storm, where he was commander of the 1st Cavalry.

After his appointment to head the U.S. forces, my cousin Gaynelle Ellis Gray, who is Gen. Franks' mother-in-law, said "I'm concerned for him, but I'm happy for our country. I'm happy that our country has a good, moral, capable and caring person leading them. I'm proud that he's getting recognized for his good work."

ONE OF YE EDITOR'S pet peeves is the way the national media, television in particular, is so careless in showing and telling things which could cost American lives, or cause some area of our defense to be completely compromised.

This has come up this week, as the TV news folks ask what most would consider utterly ridiculous questions of the president, or Rumsfeld, or Gen. Myers. In most cases, the official being quizzed replies that they cannot answer the particular question, as it could threaten our military.

A writer to the Amarillo Globe-News this week took that newspaper to task for publishing information the writer deemed threatening, if our enemies had read it. "What ever happened to the slogan 'Loose lips sink ships,'" the writer asked.

For years the CBS program "60 minutes" has aired segments during which Carol and I would look at each other and shake our heads, as the broadcast showed vital defense areas, with the reporter giving potential enemies a good "how to" course as to how they could completely de-mobilize whatever installation they were discussing that particular evening.

We used to like the "60 Minutes" program. It was the trailblazer of all the TV "news magazine" shows that are currently being aired. But about the only part of the program we can tolerate now is Andy Rooney at the end of the show. I think he's the only member of that show with any common sense.

off and Friona's "postmaster general" Larry Rogers earned a quick \$5 in third place at 21 points off.

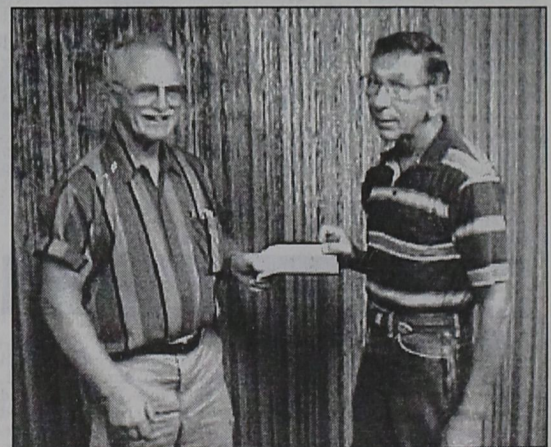
So what about Raul? Somebody had to finish out of the money. Mr. Braillif won fourth place at 23 points off but like horseracing, fourth place doesn't pay.

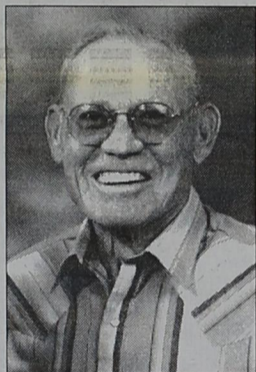
He moved to Dalhart in 1945 after being discharged from the Army. He married Frances Bieganowski July 28, 1947.

55 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1946

It is reported on good authority that word from the State Highway engineer of this district, is to the effect that the work of surveying State Highway 214 (the north-south highway) has been under construction for sometime. The road extends through Cochran, Bailey and Parmer counties until it intersects U.S. Highway 66. The survey work could allow paving contracts to be awarded early in 1947.

50 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1951

Funds for construction of the rural telephone lines for the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative are expected to be released soon, local officials have announced. Orville Houser and brother Vondyl Houser have purchased the Cash Way Grocery Market here, taking over operations this week. Orville, who has been manager of the Cash Way Market, says a new name will be chosen for the store.

45 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1956

Friona Insurance Agency moved to its new location over the weekend. The firm is now located in the former Drake Real Estate building just north of the old bank building. Bill Woodley of the agency said they have purchased the present location. Half of the 25-foot front is shared by Nazworth Shoe Shop.

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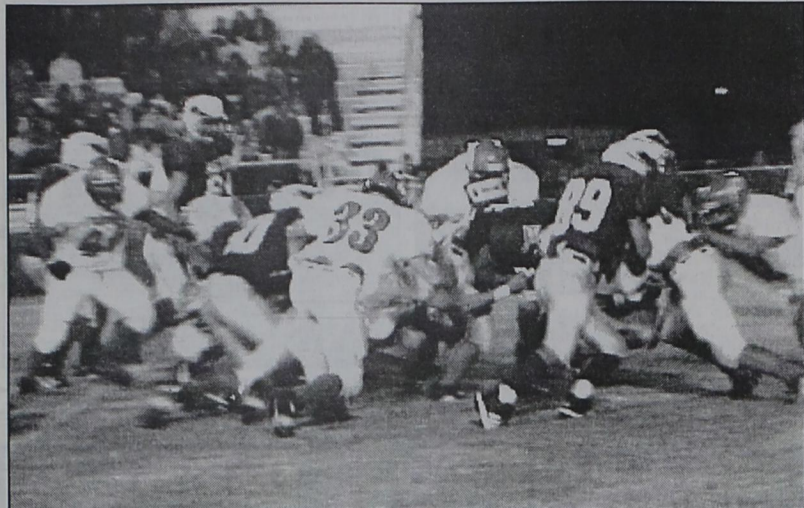

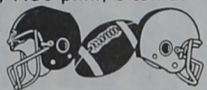

DISTRICT LOSS

Mistakes Cost FHS; Owls Convert, 27-20

Two lost fumbles in the first quarter, and a failed defensive play late in the game cost the Chieftains dearly at Hale Center last Friday. The Owls scored after two of the mistakes, and the third prevented Friona from scoring.

The result was a 27-20 win by Hale Center, a blow to Friona's playoff chances.

Friona fumbled the ball on the opening kickoff, to more or less set the tone for the game.

Hale Center recovered on the Friona 18. It took the Owls just four plays to punch the ball into the end zone, and the home team grabbed a 6-0 lead just two minutes into the game.

The Chieftains put the ball in play at their 36 yard line after the second kickoff.

Runs by Nathan Haile and Adam Bandy moved the ball across midfield, and Bandy's seven-yard run gave Friona a first down at the Hale Center 30.

Four plays later, facing a fourth and five situation, QB Brock Field hit Andy Carthel for a ten-yard gain, and the Chieftains had a first down at the Owls' 18.

Bandy gained five to the 13, but on the next play Friona fumbled once again and H.C. recovered at their ten, to turn Friona away from the goal-line after a 54-yard drive.

On their second possession, the Chieftains took over on the H.C. 40 following a short punt. Sparked by a 30-yard run by Haile, the Chieftains moved to the Owls' five.

Hale bulled across from the one on the first play of the second quarter. Brian Wiseman's kick was just low, but Friona had tied the score at 6-all.

Friona again held on downs, and Carthel's good punt return gave Friona the ball at the Owls' 40.

Field rolled out to the right, turned the corner and sprinted 28 yards to the Hale Center 12. A timely penalty against the Owls gave Friona a first and goal from the three.

Haile's number was called, and he converted for the touchdown. Wiseman's kick was good, and Friona took a 13-6 lead.

Friona recovered a fumble at midfield, and had another scoring opportunity.

Haile gained 10, Bandy 15, and the Chiefs were quickly at the Owls' 20-yard line.

But Haile was stopped for no gain on second down, Field's pass was incomplete on third, and the young QB was sacked on fourth down, and again the Chiefs came up empty. They still led at the half, 13-6.

Hale Center drove 75 yards with the second half kickoff, and QB Jacob Rieff ran it in from a yard out. Willie Joe Johnson took a pitchout and got into the end zone for two points, giving the Owls a 14-13 lead, and their homecoming crowd roared their approval.

The Owls' special team hurt the Chieftains, who couldn't advance the ball after the kickoff.

Field got a good punt to the H.C. 30, but the Owls returned the kick all the way back to the Friona 30—which was the line of scrimmage prior to the punt!

The fired-up Owls moved 30 yards in five plays, with Johnson going in from six yards out. A pass for points failed, but Hale Center had taken a 20-13 lead with 2:59 left in the third quarter.

Bandy got loose on Friona's first play following the kickoff, and rambled 41 yards, finally being tackled at the Hale Center 40.

Bandy continued to thrive, going 13, then 10 yards as Friona moved to the Owls' 15. Four plays later, Haile bulled in from two yards out, and Wiseman's kick tied the game at 20-all with 10:52 left to play.

Neither team could mount a drive in their next possessions, but Hale Center took the ball with 4:00 left in the game.

The Owl QB launched a long pass which Carthel tried to intercept. However the

ball went through his hands, and turned out to be a 63-yard gain to the Friona nine.

It took all four plays, but Hale Center got into the end zone, and took a 27-20 lead with just a minute left.

A roughness penalty

against H.C. moved the ball to midfield, and Field hit Cody Grimsley for 11 yards to the Owl 38 with 34 seconds left to play.

But two plays later, Field's arm was hit as he tried to pass, and Hale Center intercepted and that was the game.

Coach Scott's Comments:

"We had four or five critical failures in the game, and that cost us. We played pretty well at times, and had a few exceptional plays.

"We were close to having a big win, but they capitalized on the mistakes we made, and they didn't make any mistakes.

With the Chieftains having a few nagging injuries, Coach Scott indicated that next week's open date may be coming at a good time. "These injuries are keeping players out of practice, and when you don't practice, you don't improve from one game to another," Scott said.

TEAM 2-0 IN DISTRICT

Chieftain JV Pops Hale Center, 33-18

The Chieftain Junior Varsity scored in every period last Thursday, and claimed a 33-18 victory over the Hale Center JV last Thursday at Chieftain Field.

The two teams played "swapout" on scoring in the first half, which ended with Friona holding a one-point (13-12) lead.

But the Friona team scored three straight TDs in the second half to open up a 33-12 lead and the JV Owls couldn't cope with that.

The Owls got on the scoreboard first, scoring on a 25-yard fumble recovery. But Friona answered with a drive capped by Sergio Saenz's one-yard run. The kick failed, leaving the score tied, 6-all.

Hale Center came back with a 12-yard run to take a 12-6 lead in the second quarter. Friona again answered, with Saenz again scoring on a one-yard plunge. Freddie Reyes kicked the PAT, giving Friona the halftime lead at 13-12.

The third-quarter was all Friona. Ruben Alvarado capped a drive with a two-year run, and Reyes' kick hiked Friona's lead to 20-12.

A few minutes later, Alvarado got loose for a 26-yard TD gallop, and Reyes' kick bumped Friona's lead up to 27-12.

Friona made it three

straight TDs when Willy Castillo broke loose and ran 40 yards for a score. The kick failed, but Friona's lead became 33-12 in the fourth quarter.

Hale Center scored again before the game ended, on a 49-yard pass play for the final margin of 33-18.

Friona led in yardage, 324 to 149. Saenz was the workhorse, gaining 122 yards on 20 tries. Castillo added 62 yards on only three attempts.

Defensively, the Junior Chiefs recovered three fumbles, by Trey Widner, Rogelio Sanchez and Johnathan Nava. David Mendez, Freddie Reyes, Nava and Saenz were singled out by Coach Hayden Merkett for their good play on defense.

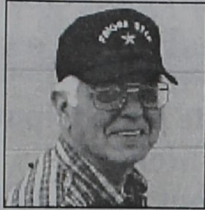
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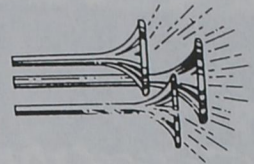

Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the captain decided to risk his life and bring the sticken man back for medical attention.

Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, he reached the soldier and began pulling him toward his camp. When he finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier but the soldier was dead.

The captain lit a lantern. He caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw that the dead soldier was his own son.

The boy had been study-

ing music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, he enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted.

The captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for the son at the funeral. That request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate.

Out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one

musician. The father chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of his dead son's uniform.

The wish was granted. This music was the haunting melody we now know as "Taps" that is used at all military funerals.

Many do not realize that there are words to "Taps" or that there are three verses. Here are the words:

Day is done
gone with the sun
from the lakes
from the hills
from the sky
all is well

safely rest
God is nigh.

Fading light
Dims the sight
and a star dons the sky
gleaming bright
from afar drawing nigh
falls the night.

Thanks and praise
for our days
neath the sun
neath the stars
neath the sky
as we go this we know
God is nigh.

Let's pray we do not have
to hear Taps during this
conflict.
God Bless America!

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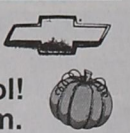

Lazbuddie ISD Is Recipient Of Xcel Energy Foundation Grant

The Xcel Energy Foundation, on behalf of Southwestern Public Service Company's Tolk Generating Station, has awarded a \$9,000 grant to Lazbuddie Independent School District for the district's new Ecological Center.

Xcel Energy officials presented the check at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, October 11 at the school auditorium.

The Ecological Center is made up of a pond and a new greenhouse in the high school courtyard, said Cheri Sain, family and consumer sciences instructor at Lazbuddie High School. Sain said a group of male students in her housing and interior design class started the project last year for a national competition.

The pond has since grown into a living lab and workshop for students in science, agriculture, art and industrial arts. The \$9,000 grant from Xcel Energy/SPS will allow the school to complete work on the greenhouse, Sain said.

The pond and greenhouse will provide habitats for animals and plants that are native to surrounding playa lakes, she said.

Xcel Energy became interested in the project when officials began to look for area partners in environmental and conservation projects, said Charles White, community relations manager for Xcel Energy's Energy Supply power generating group.

Tolk Station is the largest generating plant in the SPS service area, producing almost 1,000 megawatts of power with three coal-fueled steam generators. Tolk and other Xcel Energy/SPS plants are heavily involved in conservation projects because so many are located in the natural habitat outside of urban areas, White said.

"We rely on natural resources just like farmers and ranchers do," White said. "So we want to support any effort in the region, especially efforts in our schools, to better understand and protect the ecosystem of the plains."

The Cherokee Indian tribe will also be featured by Linda Knowles at the October meeting.

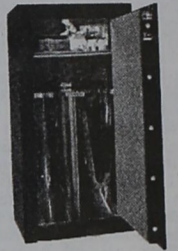
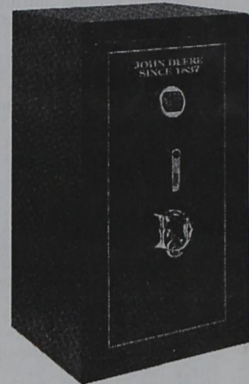

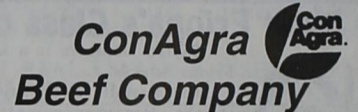

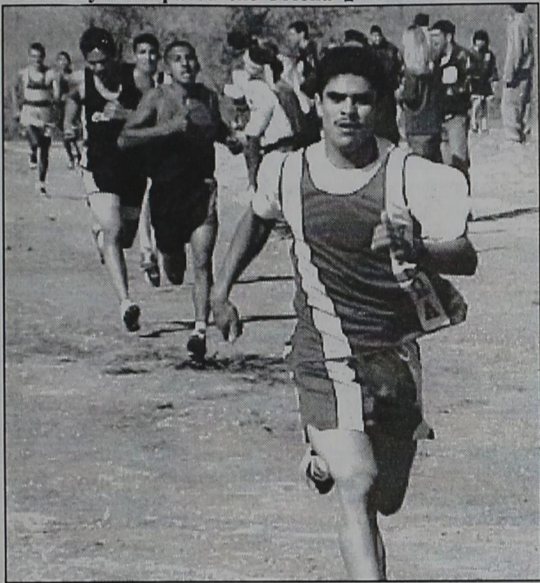
Muleshoe won the girls' small-school title with 118 points. Dimmitt was second and Farwell third.

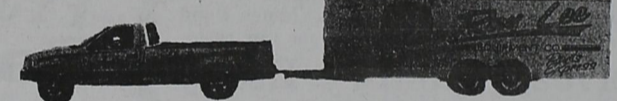

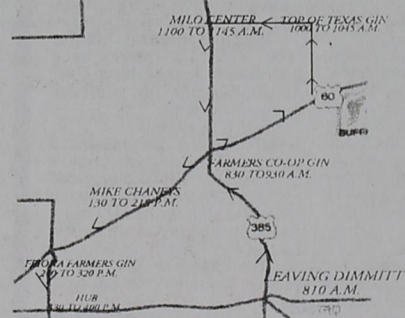

American History Essay Contest Topics Released

Los Ciboleros Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution is sponsoring two separate essay contests this fall.

The 2001-2002 topic is: "As editor of the Philadelphia Gazette, interview at least two signers of the Declaration of Independence and write an article for the July 5, 1775 edition", the American History Essay Contest for fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students.

July 4, 2001 will commemorate the 225th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. The interview should include why the person was willing to risk so much, as well as what they thought would happen once the Declaration reached the King of England. All fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students in a public, private or parochial school, or in a sanctioned home study program, are eligible.

The 2001-2002 topic for the Christopher Columbus Essay Contest for students in the ninth through twelfth grades is: "If you were to interview Christopher Columbus and John Glenn, what differences and similarities would you expect to find between them?" The length of the essay is to be no more than 750 words. Certificates will be presented to the first and second place winners in each grade level in each school.

DAR members judge the essay on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, punctuation and neatness.

In the American History essay Contest, every student submitting an essay will receive a certificate of appreciation while first place winners in each grade level in

each school will receive a bronze medal and second place winners are given certificates of award. These certificates and medals are presented at closing school assemblies.

One essay in each grade is selected as finalists. A non-DAR judge selects the best overall essay from the finalists, and essay is forwarded to the state competition. A book on American History is given to the school that the overall winner attends, with a name plate honoring that student.

Detailed information for both contests have been distributed to schools in Deaf Smith County, as well as schools in Friona.

Public libraries in Hereford and Friona have been provided contest instructions with a suggested bibliography to assist with research and for home study students wishing to enter the contests.

The deadline for either contest for submitting essays to the local chapter is Wednesday, December 5, 2001. Winners will be announced in February.

An Honors Tea will be given by the Chapter on Sunday, April 14, 2002, to recognize the winners of the contests. The students, their families, friends, teachers and school administrators will be guests of Los Ciboleros Chapter, DAR, at the Tea.

National Society Daughters of the American Revolution has sponsored the American History Essay Contest since 1956. Los Ciboleros Chapter has been a sponsor since the organization of the Chapter in 1970.

Tips For The Colorblind

Only one woman in 250 is colorblind. In contrast, one out of every 12 men has the same problem. Colorblindness is more common in men than in women because the genes that determine the ability to distinguish colors are carried on the X chromosome, the sex chromosome that boys inherit from their mothers. If you are colorblind, here are some suggestions to follow to make life a little easier:

- Ask the salesperson for help when you go shopping for clothes, furniture and accessories for your home or when you are coordinating colors for a matching decorator set.
- Be careful about what you consume. Sometimes it's difficult to know when food is moldy or if you are taking the right medicines.
- Keep matching attire and accessories together in your closets and drawers. Label them if necessary.
- Carefully learn the order of streetlights and the color of signs by the side of the road.

- Support children who are colorblind: •Learn all you can about the condition.
- Provide visual cues other than color, such as textures, aromas and patterns.
- Let teachers know your child is colorblind.
- Buy scented crayons and label pens with their ink color.
- Help them choose clothes and get dressed.
- Your vision care specialist can offer additional suggestions.

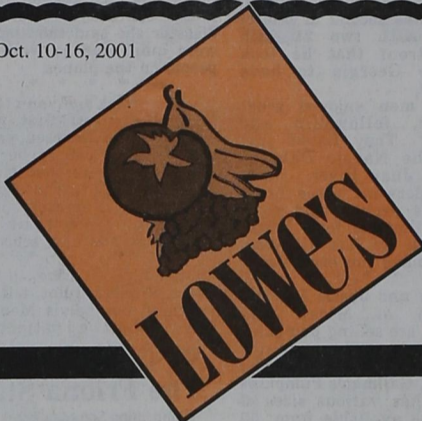


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
