

Dana Jameson Repeats As Top Grid-Picker

Dana Jameson became the first repeat winner in the Friona Star's 2001 Football Contest, winning for the second time in three weeks.

Mrs. Jameson, who is a Friona Elementary School teacher, pulled into a first-place tie with a stellar score of 17.

Local Library Earns \$9200 Grant

The Friona Public Library has received a \$9,205 grant from the Tocker Foundation, announces Darla Bracken, librarian.

The grant will be used to help provide furnishings to serve the Friona library's special needs collections, (i.e. Spanish Language, large

print, computer access and audio books).

"This is the second grant our library has received from the Tocker Foundation, and we are very grateful for the opportunity afforded us from the foundation," stated Mrs. Bracken.

The money will be used to

replace a computer, to purchase computer furniture for public access, PC shelving for the special collections.

The Tocker Foundation of Austin was established in 1964 by Phillip and Olive Tocker as a general philanthropic foundation and to help disadvantaged high school graduates obtain a college education.

Phillip Tocker was first an attorney, but switched advertising and became president of the Outdoor Advertising Assn. of America.

In 1992, the foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small rural

libraries in Texas, serving a population of 12,000 or less.

The direction is to assist libraries in making services more accessible to individuals who by reason of distance, residence, handicap, age, etc., are unable to receive the benefits of public library services.

Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community information referral centers and provide literacy and bilingual programs. The foundation partners with community libraries to meet the particular needs of the community.

Students Collect Money and Goods For Rescue Workers

Moved by the tragedy in New York, FHS freshman Kyla Graham had an idea.

She called school principal Kenny Austin at home on a Sunday night to get permission to collect money and goods for the relief workers. Mr. Austin enthusiastically endorsed the idea and the "Quarters To Care" program was born.

To make the program more interesting he promised a pizza party for the class that collected the most money. The senior class won the pizza.

The "Quarters To Care"

program was undertaken not only by the high school but the junior high and elementary participated also as did local churches.

In all, the students raised \$1,810.23 to send to New York, plus 1,302 pounds of water, food and paper products. The donations were delivered to the High Plains Food Bank in Amarillo.

Kyla's mother, Lanis Graham, said, "A great big thank you to all those who participated in the work for the High Plains Food Bank to send to the rescue effort in New York and Washington.."

Dustin Campbell Is Accident Victim

Funeral services for Dustin Lee Campbell, 18, were conducted Monday, October 1, at First Baptist Church in Friona, with Rev. Mark Stovall, pastor, and Rev. Waide Messer, former pastor, officiating.

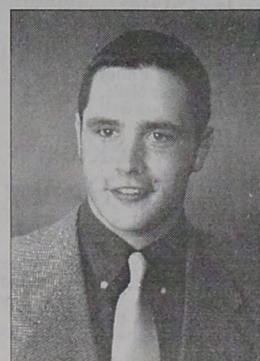
Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Campbell died at Brackenridge Hospital in Austin early Saturday, September 29, from injuries he received in a one-vehicle rollover near San Marcos.

Campbell and his college roommate were enroute to Austin to watch the Texas Tech vs University of Texas football game, played last Saturday. They were planning to stop in San Marcos for the night.

The roommate survived the accident, suffering cuts and bruises.

Dustin was born in Friona on February 25, 1983, and had been a lifetime resident here. He was a 2001 graduate of Friona High School, where he was active in football (four years), baseball (three years), the Science Club, Industrial Arts

Club, FFA, Student Council, and on the powerlifting team.

He was a member of the Friona Chieftain football teams that advanced to the area round of the playoffs two years, in 1999 and 2000. He was chosen to the All-District team at the defensive tackle spot following his senior season last year.

He had served as class treasurer as a sophomore, and as class president his junior

year. Campbell was selected "Most Cheerful" as a senior, and was nominated for "Mr. FHS."

Campbell was enrolled as a freshman student at Texas Tech University at the time of his death. He was preceded in death by his sister, Sarah, on June 14, 2000.

He was a member of First Baptist Church of Friona.

Survivors include his parents, Holly and Danny Campbell of Friona, his brother, Stephen Campbell of Friona, his grandparents, Laura and Dale Hart of Friona and Vernell Campbell of Fritch.

"MY TURN" Patriotism Is Reborn

SEVERAL NICE COMMENTS were sent our way regarding the series of flag pictures in last week's paper. They really were just a very small percentage of the flags which were displayed at homes all over town. I understand that there has been a major shortage of flags for sale in stores. In fact, there just aren't any. Manufacturers are hurrying to get a large supply of flags made up and sent out to the public.

This means that all the local folks who are displaying flags in Friona and Bovina ALREADY HAD THEM. I think this points out that people in our area are basically patriotic at heart, and not just during times of grave national disaster such as we have now.

In fact, the shortage of flags has caused people all across the country to get pretty creative. One small town in Kansas had all 1,500 of their citizens go out in a field wearing red, white and blue t-shirts. There they formed the stars and stripes of a living flag and a photographer went up on the water tower to snap their picture. One lady in Lubbock found that she couldn't buy a flag, so she just painted her entire driveway with the stars and bars. A Bovina elementary class fashioned a large flag for their wall out of red, white and blue construction paper chains.

Word is out that youngsters won't be dressing up as ghosts and goblins for Halloween this year. Costume sales seem to be leaning toward Uncle Sam, Lady Liberty, George and Martha Washington, Miss America, GI Joe, and such.

Folks have said that there hasn't been this much patriotism in our country since World War II. Of course, Pearl Harbor in 1941 was the last time America had been invaded and/or fired upon by hostile forces on our homeland. I was a little kid during the war years, but I remember we used rationing stamps for things like gasoline and sugar. Each family received a monthly allotment. Other things were in such short supply that you simply had to do without. It didn't seem like too big a sacrifice at that time.

In those days, the backyard buddies and I were prone to playing war games, darting out from behind the evergreens to mow down an imaginary enemy with makeshift wooden stick guns. When a squadron of planes would roar overhead, we kids would snap to attention and salute the sky. Of course we had no idea what the war was all about, but patriotism was constantly being stirred up by radio personalities and movie stars. Yes, young readers, television was not yet a part of our lives at that time.

Plus, patriotism was reinforced at school by repeating the Pledge of Allegiance and singing the "Star Spangled Banner," "America the Beautiful," "My Country 'Tis of Thee," "Onward Christian Soldiers," and "God Bless America." We were also expected to know the words to "The Lord's Prayer," and the Twenty-third Psalm. These were all part of our everyday routine.

There are places around the globe where red, white and blue American flags never seem to be in short supply. When some angry group or other in any far-off middle-Eastern country does not like something America has done, they have a habit of dancing up and down in the streets while burning an American flag, always with TV cameras recording, of course. Where do they get these flags? Why are they so easily available to the people who despise us?

I wouldn't have any idea where to get a flag of Iraq or Afghanistan or any of those other "stan" countries that live and breathe hatred for America. I don't even know what their flags look like. Show me one. I'll go out on Main Street and hop up and down and grin, while I burn it. Somebody alert the media!

This bale weighed 470 pounds, which was ginned out of 1710 pounds of seed cotton. The bale was purchased by the Friona Gin at a price of 12 cents per pound, a bounty or premium of one cent per pound, or a total of \$5.

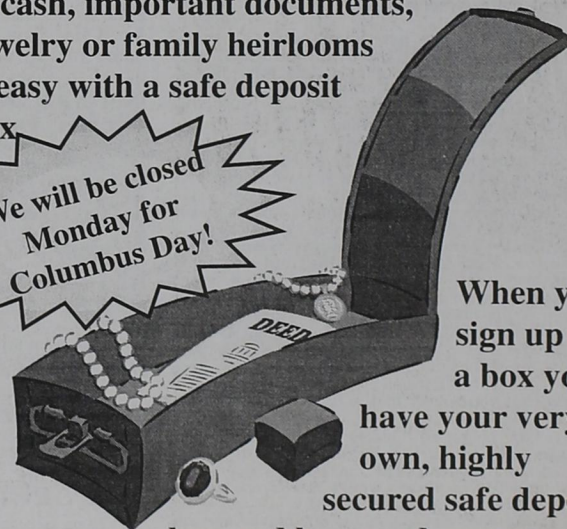

Defense Rescues FHS In District Opener, 6-0

When the Chieftains gave up their most points (42) than they had in a regular season game since 1994 at Muleshoe, and the most yards, 511, in about the same time frame, coaches and fans thought Friona's defense might be a little "suspect."

Either that, or Muleshoe must have a super-duper offensive team this season. Maybe it was a little of both.

Last Friday, the Chieftain offense sputtered more than it had all season, and finally managed to score one touchdown against visiting Floydada. Then, the Friona defense rose to the occasion to deny the Whirlwinds a touchdown when they had first and goal at Friona's four yard line late in the game, to preserve a 6-0 win in the teams' district opener at Chieftain Field.

A pair of sterling defensive plays by Dario Hernandez helped put the game in the "W" column for Friona.

Floydada had come in averaging 30.5 points-per-game, and over 300 yards on offense. Friona held the 'Winds to just 155 total yards and no points.

The Chiefs had been very frustrated in the first half, when they had drives to the Floydada 17, 9 and 22, having one touchdown called back by a penalty, losing the ball on a fumble, and then having a field goal attempt ruled wide by about a foot.

On Friona's second possession, the team drove from its own 32 to the Floydada 17. Adam Bandy gave Friona three first downs, gaining 31 yards on five plays.

Quarterback Brock Field gave Friona a first down to the Floydada 34 on a tough run up the middle. Bandy gave Friona a first down to the 18. Field rolled out right and hit the flag for what would have been a touchdown. But the Chiefs were hit with a holding penalty, nullifying the score.

A reverse play lost yardage, and Field's fourth down pass went incomplete.

Early in the second quarter the Chieftains forced a Floydada punt, and Andy Carthel fumbled trying to field the ball, setting the Whirlwinds up at the Friona 14.

The Chieftain defense asserted itself. Dustin Covington was tackled for a yard loss and a no gain sandwiched around an incomplete pass, and the 'Winds decided to go for a field goal on fourth down. The 32-yard attempt went wide, and Friona had dodged their first bullet.

Bandy zig-zagged for 14 yards, but on the next series, the Chiefs faced a punting situation from their 29. Bandy had trouble handling the snap, and tried to run with the ball.

Although Bandy was tackled for a loss, Friona caught a break when Floydada was flagged for a face-mask penalty and the Chieftains kept the ball.

Nathan Haile gave Friona a first down with a 13 yard gain, Bandy gained 12 and ten in consecutive plays, as Friona moved to the Floydada nine yard line.

Field mis-fired on a pitchout, and Covington recovered. Friona's 67-yard drive had again ended without any points.

However, two plays later, Carthel made an outstanding interception, outjumping the intended receiver, giving the ball back to Friona at the Floydada 35.

Field hooked up with Haile for a 14-yard gain, but once again a holding penalty stymied the drive. On fourth down from the Floydada 23,

Brian Wiseman came out to try a 40-yard field goal.

The wind, which had somewhat favored the northbound team, had more of a southeasterly flow, and Wiseman's kick, which had plenty of length, was just wide by an eyelash.

The half ended with Friona having 10 first downs and 154 yards to Floydada's one first down and 68 yards.

Forty-seven of those yards came when Covington caught the Chieftains napping as time was expiring in the half.

The 180-pound fullback seemed about to score when defensive back Heath Gammon made a dive and caught one of Covington's feet, stopping him at the Friona 23.

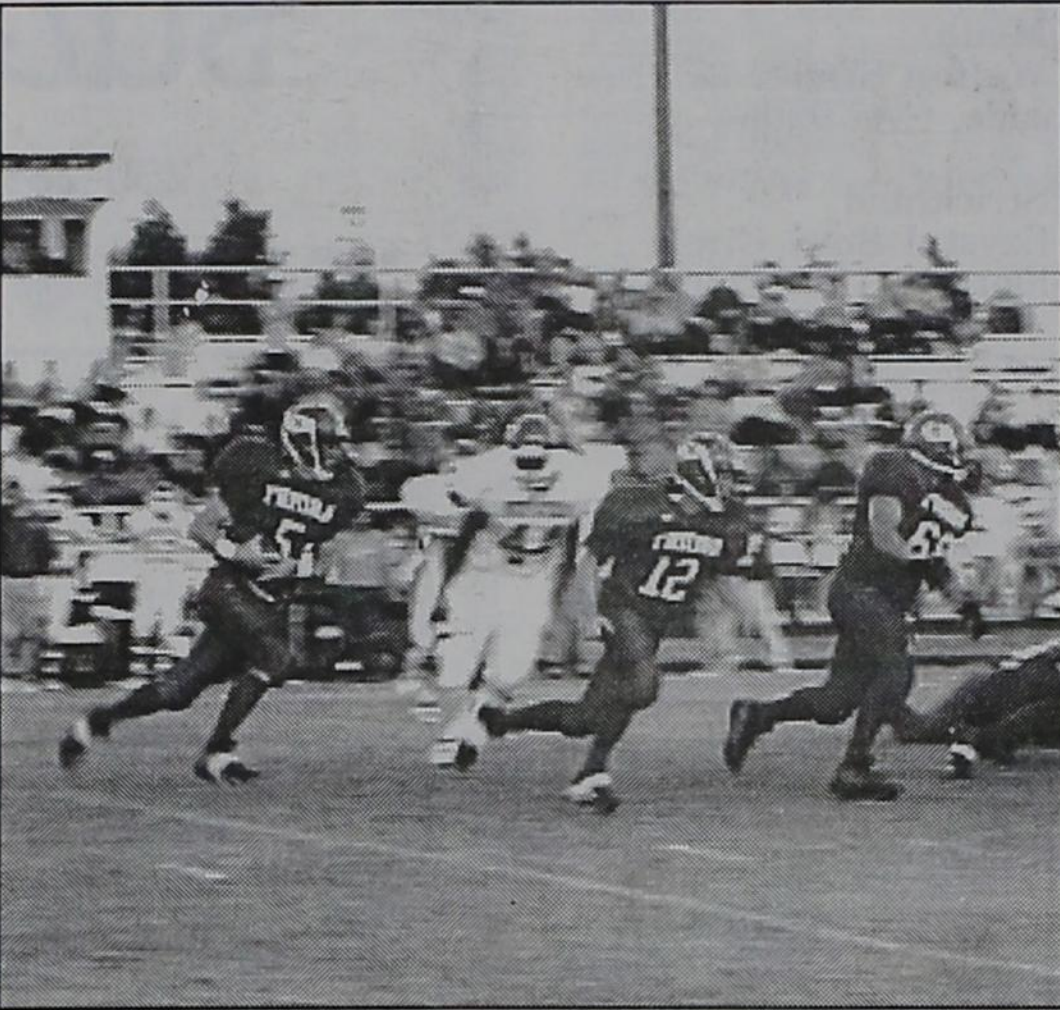

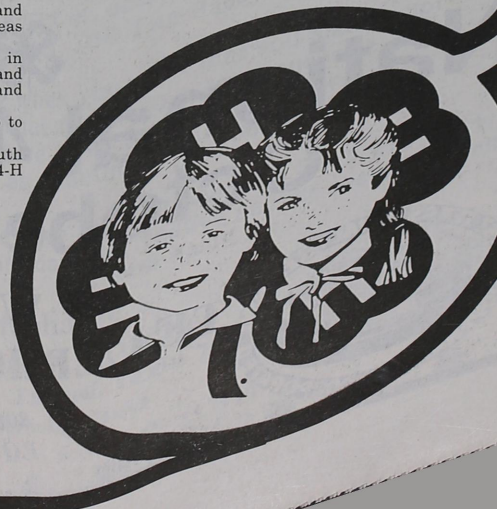

"Life Is Not Always Fair"

Thanks to all who have asked about my sister Kathy.

Over the past couple of weeks, my mother and I have made two trips down to Lufkin, Texas, where Kathy's life is slipping away as she fights a nasty battle with cancer.

It is 1,200 miles roundtrip to Lufkin. There is no easy way to drive there. And there is no easy way to watch life slip away.

Kathy is my youngest sister. She turned 50 in July. I am the oldest. My sister Gena is next, then Kathy, then our brother Rick.

Back in the 1970s, Kathy lived here in Friona for several years. Her name then was Kathy Hardin. She worked at Friona State Bank and also Hi-Pro.

She has two children, April Hardin, 25, and Josh Hardin, 20, and a grandson, 5-year-old Wesley.

Doctors have told us that Kathy has only days or weeks to live. She rests at home, conscious and lucid only part of the time as drugs try to keep the pain away.

She was blessed with a beautiful voice. She sang in church choirs most of her life and in a female quartet that recorded a tape of gospel music.

She and my sister Gena sang together at many weddings and other church gatherings. Last week, in a period of remembering, she told Gena that she wanted them to sing together again someday. Gena listened, then she left the room and cried.

As is always the case, we feel now that with no hope to cling to, it would be a blessing for my sister Kathy to go to sleep and die peacefully.

It is hard to say that but life is not always fair and

death is often merciful. Because of our unexpected and sudden trips to Lufkin, I have missed the last two Chieftain football games.

Last Friday I had planned to take pictures at the Bovina homecoming game, then catch the Friona-Floydada game too. But a phone call came and mother and I left town in a rush Friday afternoon.

My personal thanks to Ron Smiley for taking game pictures for us. Ron has become a fine digital photographer (picture taker). He bought his wife Melba the digital camera for Christmas but I doubt if she has ever laid a hand on it.

Ron and Melba have a whole bunch of grandkids coming along to participate in Friona athletics. Grandson Brock Field has been doing some pretty good quarterbacking this year. He is only a sophomore.

Watch for granddaughters Ashley Smiley and Kristin Butman as they become Squaw basketball stars. Ashley is a sophomore and Kristin is a freshman.

Many of Ron's photos are in the Friona Star today. Thanks, Ron. We appreciate you.

It was on the way to Lufkin last Saturday morning early that I heard about Dustin Campbell's death. We were near Gatesville when Martha Hamilton called on the cell phone to tell us the news.

Holly Campbell is one of my favorite people in the world. She and Danny own the apartments where I live. It is a pleasure to have them as a landlord.

Holly and I work together almost every Friday. She and her mom, Laura Hart, have been addressing and mailing the Friona Star and Bovina

Blade newspapers for more than 30 years.

When I heard about Dustin's accident, my first thought was how unfair it was to the family to lose a second child so soon and in such sudden, tragic way.

Last football season I tried to take a few pictures of Dustin in action to help Holly fill a scrapbook for him. Dustin was a lineman. It is not easy to get good pictures of linemen. They are always under a pile.

It wasn't a good year for Holly and Danny. Their daughter Sarah died in June last year. She was 20. It was extremely hard on Dustin and his younger brother Stephen.

But the family moved on. Holly bought a real estate business, Property Associates, from B. K. Buske. In last Friday's paper there were pictures of Holly and her new associate Carol Boyd.

We finished the paper on a happy note a little after noon. Life was pretty good. We could not have imagined the tragic events that would occur only a few hours later.

The tragic accident took Dustin's life around midnight only a few miles from San Marcos. His funeral was at 2:30 p.m. Monday.

On Wednesday, Danny and Holly were in Lubbock packing up Dustin's belongings from his dorm room at Texas Tech.

The loss of two children just over a year apart is a horrible circumstance. During the tragic events and decisions of this past

I met Ray during one of his visits to Indiana to see his relatives in the Decatur area. We were married July 30, 1949 at Friedheim Lutheran Church.

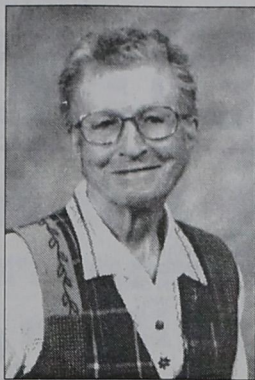

Gerles said officers confiscated 28 grams of cocaine and 18 grams of methamphetamine plus a large sum of cash from the residences.

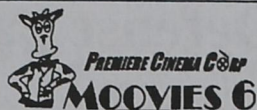
The charges against the two are second degree felonies. They are both free on \$25,000 bonds awaiting action by the grand jury.

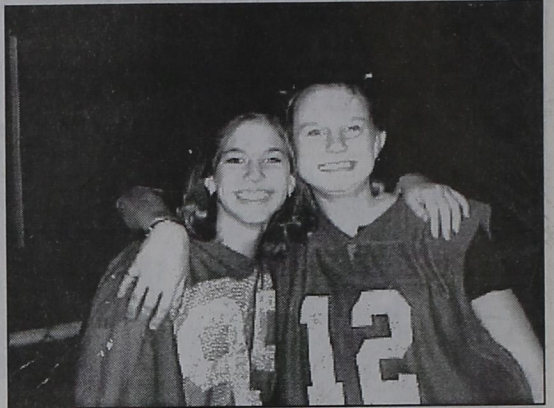
A 56-yard Floydada punt backed Friona up to their nine, and the Chiefs were in bad field position the rest of the way.

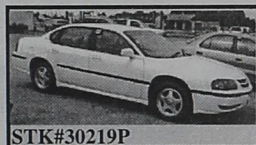
