# Floydada Looks Tough For District Opener

The Chieftains will have to approach their district opener against Floydada with more seriousness than they might have expected a month ago.

The Whirlwinds come to Chieftain Field unbeaten with a 4-0 record, quite an improvement over their 2000 season, when they finished 1-9 and 0-6 in district play.

True, Floydada's schedule may not compare to Friona's to this point, where the 'Winds have met the likes of Tahoka, Ralls, Seagraves and Springlake-Earth, but they're still undefeated.

Coach Mike Scott is warning his troops to take Floydada seriously.

"They have some large off-

ensive linemen. They can hurt you a number of ways, and especially on special teams. They have returned a punt for a touchdown, and are good on kickoff returns," Coach Scott said.

The Whirlwinds have 20 lettermen, twice the number Friona has, along with nine offensive and 10 defensive starters from 2000.

As they will be most of the season, Friona is outweighed, as Floydada comes with six players over 200 pounds, including senior lineman Frank Hernandez at 275 pounds. Hernandez worked in the off season with a wheat harvesting crew.

Floydada is led by junior

runningback Dustin Covington. The 5-10, 180-pound junior is leading his team in rushing with 273 yards, and in scoring with 30 points.

The Whirlwinds have passed a tad more than Friona has. Their quarterback, Tyler Helms, has completed 13 of 28 passes for 318 yards, ranking him sixth in the area.

Friona's QB, Brock Field, has completed 10 of 20 passes for 173 yards, in his three games under the center.

The Chieftain offense is led by Nathan Haile's 480 yards rushing, which ranks him second in the area by only one yard to a Tahoka player. Adam Bandy has gained 257 yards in a backup role. Bandy got 147 of those yards last week at Muleshoe.

Haile's 39 points ranks him second in the area, and Bandy's 30 points have him tied for fifth place.

It sounds as though the Chiefs and Whirlwinds might create a second straight scoring duel for Friona. It should be an interesting game. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.

Mills (18); Alesia Tucker (18); Joy Morton (21); and Claire Brown (21).

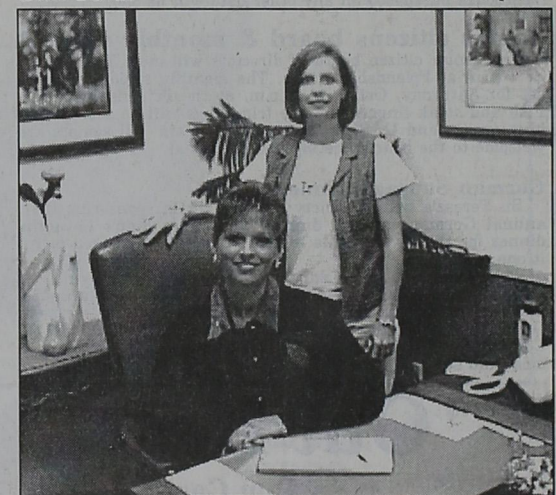
Ten players managed 12 correct and the rest of you were somewhere back in the pack.

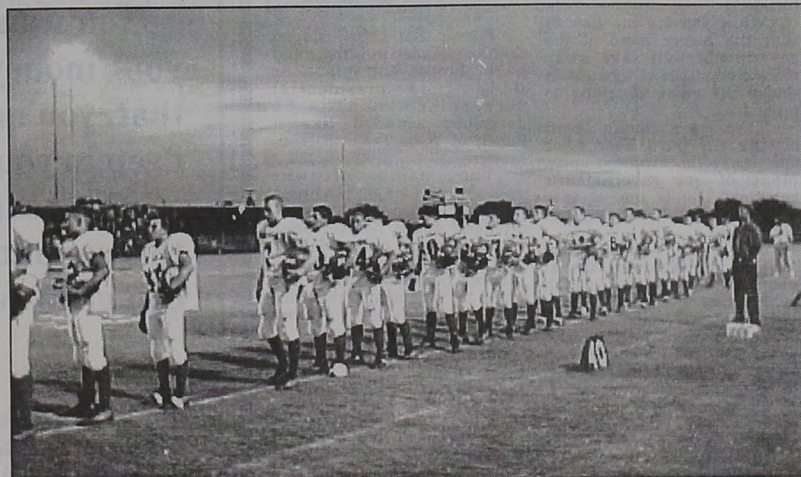
**NEW SALESMAN**...Carol Boyd, seated has joined Holly Campbell at Property Associates. Carol has recently earned her realtor salesman's licence.

### America, The Good Neighbor



This, from a Canadian newspaper, is worth sharing. Thanks to those who called it our attention. The piece is entitled: "America: The Good Neighbor."

Widespread but only partial news coverage was given recently to a remarkable editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator. What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the Congressional Record:

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth. Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts.

None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States. When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. When the World Trade Center was destroyed, Americans came from all over to help out their New York neighbors. The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane. Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tri-Star, or the Douglas DC10?

If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the International lines except Russia fly American planes? Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon - not once, but several times - and safely home again.

You talk about scandals, and the Americans put theirs right in the store window for everybody to look at. Even their draft-dodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets, and most of them, unless they are breaking Canadian laws, are getting American dollars from ma and pa at home to spend here. When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and the New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke.

I can name you 5000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Francisco earthquake.

Our neighbors have faced it alone, and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those.





# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

## 70 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 2, 1931

For the past several weeks, the city water well has been losing interest in its job of supplying water to people of the city, until an inspection of the pump by water works superintendent, L.G. Sympton, revealed that the bearings in the rotary pump were so badly worn that it was necessary to send it to Amarillo for repairs.

## 65 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 2, 1936

Mr. and Mrs. A.D. Smith announce that they will move to Farwell on or about the first of October for permanent residence. Mr. Smith will be elected as County Attorney on November 3. The duties of his office will require him to live at Farwell, so they have found a suitable place to live in the county seat.

## 60 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 2, 1941

Announcement was made this week that the Lion's Club will sponsor a Boy Scout troop and a Cub Scout pack in Friona. An organizing committee, composed of Tiny Magness, Pete Buske, R.J. McReynolds, Glenn Reeve and Frank Spring is making plans for getting Scout work started. The organizing group has named Frank Trout as Scoutmaster, with Ed Williams, assistant. Jo Wilson is leader of the Cub pack and Virgil Elms is his assistant.

## 55 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 4, 1946

The Friona Chieftains won their first game of the season at Lockney last Friday, when they beat the Lockney Longhorns by the score of 12-6. The Chiefs

showed much improvement over their previous games. Miller did the scoring for Friona.

## 50 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 4, 1951

Friona's new public school addition should be ready for occupancy by November 15, according to contractor G. Williams, who attributed the delay in completing construction to the difficulty in obtaining many necessary materials.

Elevator men, amazed at the influx of harvested grain so early in the season, pointed out this week that more grain had been brought into Friona elevators by October 1, of this year, than at this early date on any other year they could remember.

## 40 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 5, 1961

The Friona City Council read five applications for the city manager position Monday and interviewed two applicants Tuesday in successive meetings. No final decision was made as to who will be selected for the office soon to be vacated by Albert Field. Council members chose to delay final action for a few days pending a possible reply from an advertisement in a professional publication.

## 30 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 7, 1971

Quite a specimen of a turtle was found near Black last week, and brought to Friona High School by Alan Hamilton. The reptile was about 24 inches long from head to tail and weighed somewhere around 30 pounds.

Ed Clark brought the first bale of cotton to a Friona gin, a bale ginned last Saturday by Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. The cotton was grown at Black, and was among the crops in the area that sustained hail damage during September.

## 25 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 3, 1976

Open House for Prairie Acres, Friona's nursing home facility that opened August 3, was held at the facility with a flag-raising ceremony beginning the activities. Next will come a recognition of special guests, a history of the project, a dedication ceremony and a graduation ceremony for the home's nurse aides.

Sharla Bengé was crowned at Friona's Maize Queen Pageant Thursday night at Friona High School. The 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.S. Bengé, Sharla is a junior at Friona High School. First runner-up in the contest was Diane Westbrook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Westbrook. Second runner-up was Faith Mays, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harrell Mays.

## 20 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 4, 1981

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland has received a citation from the international City Management Association in recognition of his 20 years as city manager. Outland will have been city manager at Friona 20 years on October 15, 1981.

At the last meeting of the Friona City Council, the council approved a \$10,000 donation to the Friends of the Library, for the group's building fund for a new library in Friona. City Manager A.L. Outland explained that the funds would come from Revenue Sharing Funds, and would not involve local tax money.

## 15 Yrs. Ago-Oct. 4, 1986

Tom B. Jarboe, superintendent of schools at Friona, was one of the five finalists in the state's "Superintendent of the Year" award, which was presented last weekend at San Antonio.

(He is ineligible to run for a third term and New York City primary elections were held this week. Rudy will meet with the candidates and offer to extend his term "if

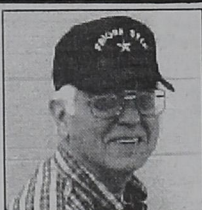
the folks in New York want him to.")

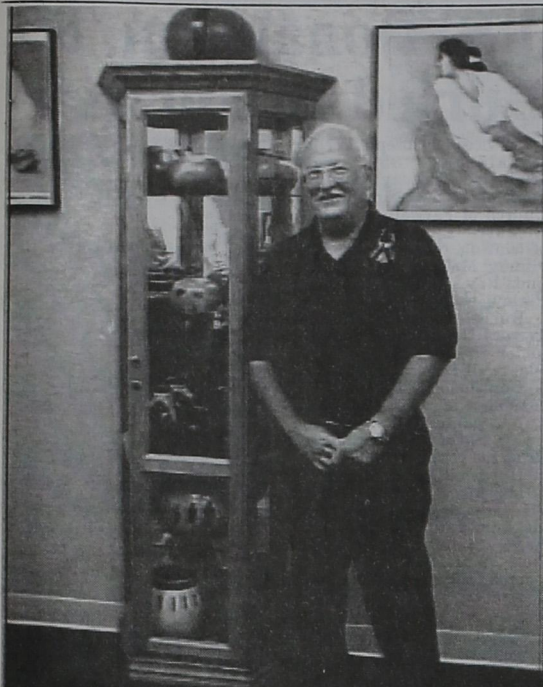

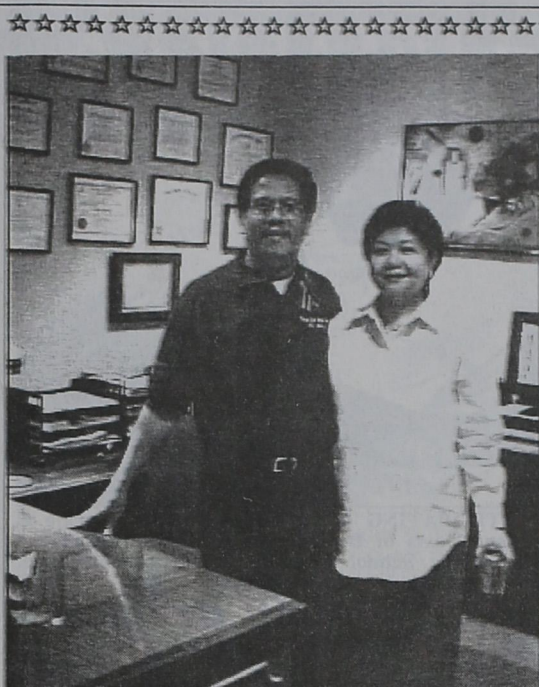


These represent less than half the flags on homes in Friona. There is not enough space to show them all.

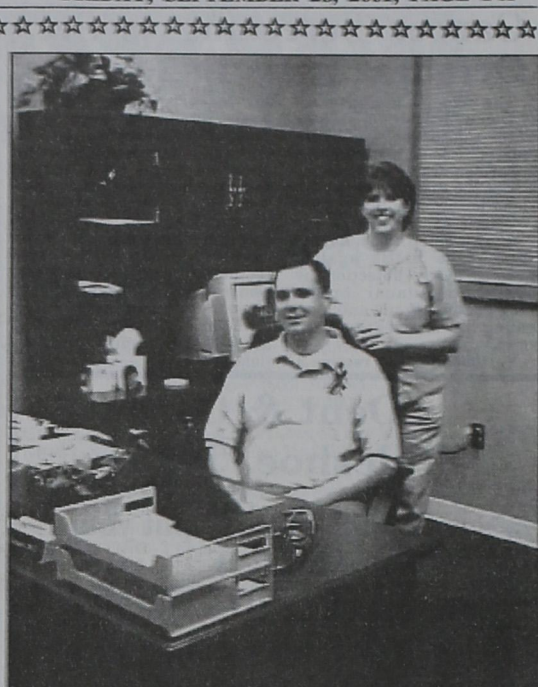

Please feel free to support your Conservation District by stopping by and casting your vote on October 3.

The following are eligibility rules for voting and candidacy:

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and Water Conservation District director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter

must be eighteen years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be eighteen years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation directors serve four year terms of office. Zone 5 includes all land in the Lazbuddie School District.

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District are M.C. Osborn, chairman; Mike Beauchamp, vice chairman; Kevin Welch, secretary; Todd Christian, member; and Mike Miller, member.

The purpose of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District with headquarters in Farwell is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations. The district has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the S.W.C.D.'s programs.

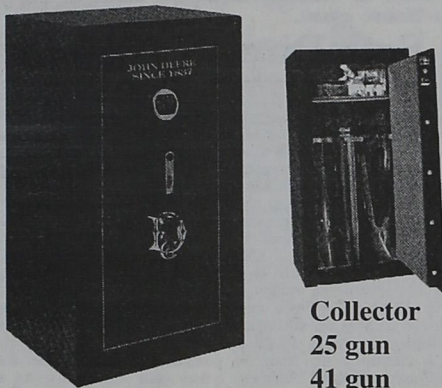

He was a charter member of the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church, which later merged into the First Baptist Church of Farwell, where he served as a deacon.

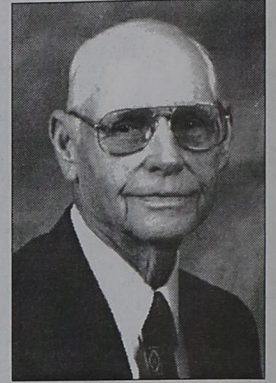

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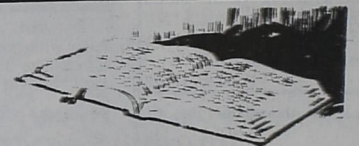
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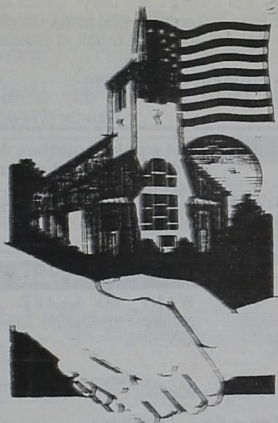

### Coach Scott's Comments:

"That was a very different game from any I've ever coached. Usually when Friona and Muleshoe plays, it's more of a defensive game. We felt pretty good about the game, especially the play of our offense. Our offense executed as well as it has this year.

"We hurt them in a lot of areas, and did some things that we can build on. I was a little disappointed that we didn't tackle better, but Muleshoe's backs are big and tough to tackle. I thought we'd score on our drive when the game was stopped. We could have gone for two points, and then it would've been a ten-point game.

"There were several places where the kids could have hung their heads and let them put us away, but we kept coming back, and up to the time they stopped the game, the players thought we still had a chance to win. I was proud of them for that.

"I think that playing a team like Muleshoe will help us. Even though we lost, you can grow as a team by playing a good team as well as we did. Our team has been resilient, and I think we'll bounce back. Muleshoe is an important game, but we try not to blow it up like we would if they were a district opponent."

"We came out of the game without any injuries, which was great. Our kids work hard and start out in good shape, and this has a lot to do with injury prevention," the coach concluded.

# Chiefs, M'shoe Put On Big Offensive Display

Could the Chieftains and their fans take out lightning insurance?

If so, at least they could be re-imbursed for the inconvenience of playing at Muleshoe's Benny Douglass Stadium.

For the second time in a row (when the teams met there) lightning stopped the game in the third quarter.

In 1998, the game was concluded the following day. This time, the game was terminated with 3:50 left in the third quarter, with the Mules leading 42-24, but having the Chieftains about to make it 42-31.

Coaches and officials agreed to withdraw the teams when lightning approached from New Mexico. They announced there would be a 15-minute break in the game.

About 55 minutes later, with lightning still doing its thing, and the players nowhere near ready for resuming, it was decided to halt the game. This came at 11:05 p.m.

Up until that time, fans on both sides of the field had been treated to an impressive offensive display that rivaled the electrical display that followed.

Having barely played two-thirds of a regular game, the teams would have scored at least 100 points between them, and amassed over 1200 yards, had the game been played to its conclusion.

Example: At the half, the teams had scored 60 points, and gained 626 yards between them.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and surprisingly covered 67 yards in five snaps of the football, to draw first blood in the contest. Adam Bandy sparked the drive, running 24 yards and then 13 yards on the last two plays, to make it into the end zone.

Brian Wiseman kicked the point and Friona led 7-0 with just 1:22 elapsed on the game clock.

Muleshoe answered quickly. The Mules' all-state QB, Lincoln Riley kept the ball after taking the snap in "shotgun formation," and rambled 45 yards on his team's fifth offensive play. The Mules passed for two points for an 8-7 lead. This came with 3:35 gone in the game.

Nathan Haile fumbled the kickoff, and when he tried to grab the ball and run, he never controlled the pigskin. Muleshoe recovered at the Friona nine.

It took the Mules just two plays to convert the break, with halfback A.J. Flores running it in. The kick gave Muleshoe a 15-7 lead with 7:30 left in the quarter.

After forcing a Friona punt, the Mules' offensive machine ground out 72 yards in nine plays. That was the longest drive for either team all night. Riley hit Jesus Tovar with a pass in the end zone for his team's third touchdown.

The kick made it a 22-7 Muleshoe lead, with 1:04 still remaining in the first quarter.

Haile made up for his earlier boo-boo with a 53-yard kickoff return to the Muleshoe 32. Bandy raced 22 yards around left end to give Friona a first down at the Mules' 12.

Three plays gained seven yards, and on fourth down Wiseman came on to boot a 22-yard field goal to trim the lead to 22-10.

Muleshoe lost a bid to hike the lead when Flores fumbled the ball through the end zone for a touchback. The Mules held Friona to only one first down, and regained possession at their 40.

Nine plays later, Riley hit Flores over the middle. The speedy back caught the ball in full stride, and sprinted 47 yards for the TD. The PAT kick was good, and the Mules led, 29-10, 4:24 before halftime.

Friona answered, as Bandy circled end on the west sideline and gained 44 yards to the Muleshoe 19. Four plays later, Haile smashed in from two yards out. Wiseman's kick made it a 29-17 game.

Lincoln connected with Daniel Campolo on a 46-yard gain, then six yards for a

touchdown, as the active scoreboard read Home 36, Visitors 17 with just 46 seconds left in the second quarter.

Friona's sophomore quarterback Brock Field drove the Chieftains 70 yards in just four plays, to keep Friona in the running.

Bandy got loose for a 31-yard gain to the Muleshoe 39, and Field connected with Haile for a 24-yard gain to the Mules' 14 with 29 seconds on the clock.

With two receivers running a post pattern into the end zone, the Mules' defense was spread out. Field, the 130-pound field general, saw an open path and darted the 14 yards into the end zone. Wiseman's kick with 16 seconds remaining in the half.

Friona had outscored the potent Mules, 17-14 in the quarter, making the halftime score favoring the home team, 36-24.

The Chieftain held Muleshoe for the only time in the Mules' first possession of the second half.

Tovar ran 29 yards and Riley sprinted 38 yards, as Muleshoe reached the Friona 12. But three plays found the

Mules at the Friona nine, and when Muleshoe opted for a field goal, Andy Carthel blocked the kick.

The goal-line heroics couldn't hold up, as Friona was three and out and forced to punt. Flores broke through the middle, and must have been coated with butter, as three tacklers couldn't get the job done. The Mule star got his third TD on a 55-yard run. Friona also blocked the PAT kick, but the home team had upped its lead to 42-24.

Friona was poised to answer. QB Field hit Andy Carthel over the middle on a third down play. Carthel's nice catch for a 28-yard gain moved the ball to the Muleshoe 27.

On fourth and 12, Bandy took the pitch as Field headed upfield. Bandy lofted the ball to Field, who caught it at the Muleshoe 14.

At this point, the lightning became a concern for officials, who huddled with the coaches and halted the proceedings.

A 42-31 score would have looked a lot better on Friona's season ledger. Oh well, there's always next year.

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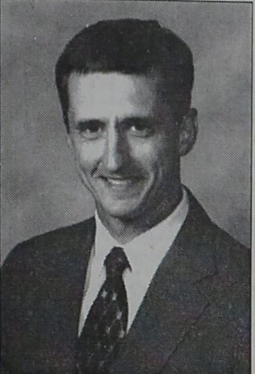
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# Matt, Penny Hudson Join Large Missionary Board

Matt and Penni (Weatherly) Hudson have joined almost 5,000 Southern Baptist International Mission Board workers sharing Christ in 155 countries and among 1,015 ethnic people groups.

The Hudsons were among 35 people appointed September 6 by the International Mission Board during a service at First Baptist Church in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma.

The new missionaries will fill diverse job assignments that range from starting churches to using sports, education and music as tools of ministry.

In 2000, International Mission Board missionaries helped lead 451,301 people to faith in Jesus Christ. They and their overseas partners started 6,525 churches and reported more than 5.6 million members in 60,988 churches overseas.

The Hudsons will serve in Portugal developing strategies for facilitating a church-planting movement there. Hudson will mobilize prayer support and volunteer groups from the United States, Europe and Brazil. Mrs. Hudson will participate in evangelism and discip-

ship. Since 1992, Hudson has served as pastor of Greenwood Baptist Church in Weatherford, Texas, where the family lives. Other churches the family considers influential are First Baptist Church in Jackson, Tennessee and First Baptist Church of Friona.

He was born in Columbia, Missouri to Estel and Dorothy Hudson of Jackson, Tennessee. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Union University in Jackson and the master of divinity and doctorate degrees from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

She was born in Friona to Philip and Phila Weatherly, now of Crested Butte, Colorado. She received her bachelor of science degree from West Texas State University in Canyon and attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He lived a well-traveled childhood. His father's work moved them to India, West Africa and finally to Tennessee. As a teenager, he felt God leading him to preach. The following summer he attended international

missions week where he sensed God calling him to preach overseas. This desire was confirmed by his mother who told him God had told her years earlier that Hudson would be called into mission service.

She developed an interest in missions while attending Girls in Action and Acteens, two mission programs for young girls sponsored by Woman's Missionary Union. Her desire to participate in missions led her to a mission trip to Brazil.

"Once again my heart was drawn to mission work," she said.

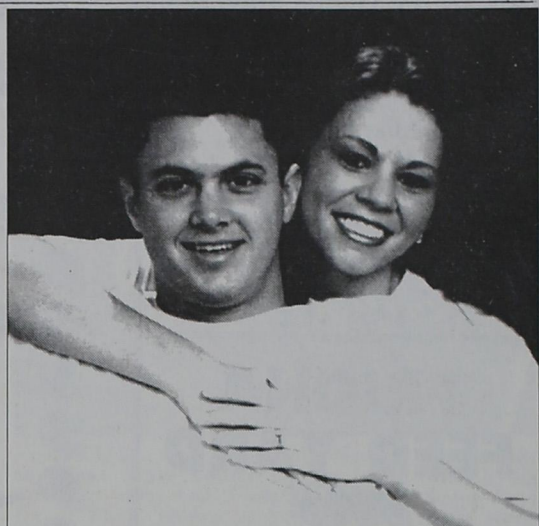
Through multiple revival services and conferences, God continued to lead her toward a career in overseas missions.

"My mission experiences and mission education along with my deep desire to be involved in evangelism and discipleship all combine to make this calling seem like a natural fit for my life," she said.

The Hudsons have two children: Matthew Holden, born in 1993, and Haden Joy, born in 1996.

The family will go to the International Mission Board training center in Rockville, Virginia for orientation in January before going to Portugal.

With nearly 16 million members, the Southern Baptist Convention is the largest evangelical denomination in the United States. Its International Mission Board is the largest evangelical missionary-sending agency.

She is a 1998 graduate of Friona High School.

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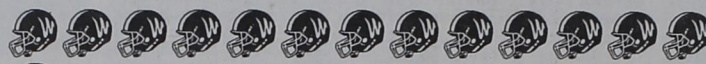

Frances' daughter and son-in-law, Minda (Gonzales) and Matthew Doyle of Jacksonville, Florida also had a scare concerning the attacks.

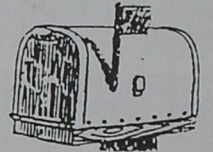
Matthew has two brothers who live near the World Trade Center, but both have contacted their family and are safe.

# YOUR EYES

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Must we go around all day eating carrots like a rabbit to guarantee that we have good eyesight? Vitamin A, for example, prevents night-blindness. Also, if you don't correct the vitamin A deficiency that causes night blindness, you may get xerophthalmia, characterized by dryness in the eyes, corneal ulcers and swollen eyelids. Untreated, xerophthalmia can lead to blindness. Vitamin A also prevents cataracts from forming and may play a part in preventing blindness caused by macular degeneration, a disorder that damages a specific area of the retina.

There are a lot of other sources of vitamin A besides carrots. Some foods high in vitamin A include: cod liver oil, beef and chicken liver, sweet potato, kale, butternut squash, red pepper, romaine lettuce, mango and papaya. Ask your eye care specialist for more information on this and other vitamins for good vision.

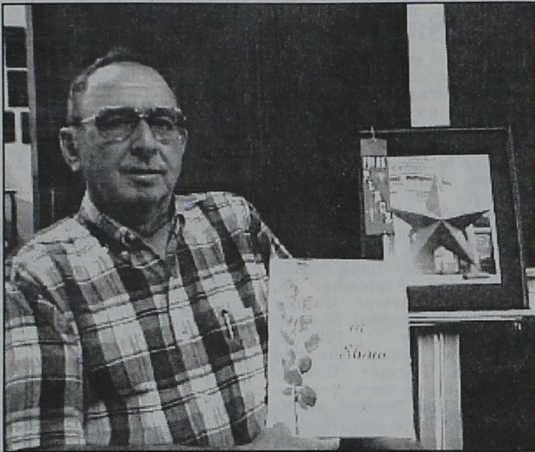

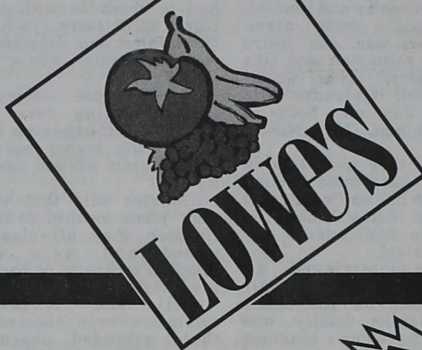
