In its regular meeting on Monday, September 10, the Friona City Council passed an ordinance setting the tax rate for the city for fiscal 2001 at .727 cents per \$100 valuation. The old rate had been .74 per \$100 valuation. The motion passed by a 5-0 vote. The council then considered the approval of an Economic Development Commission grant to Big Ticket Video in the amount of \$5,000. After motion for approval was made by alderman Jim Atwell, it passed by a 4-0 vote, with alderman Osborn abstaning.

The Commissioners received a bid from Donald Copley to buy a John Deere bucket and a truck bed. He bid \$25.10 and \$251.77, respectively. His bids were accepted. Both items were from Frye's precinct. Discussions began on dealing with jail im-

provements. Money will be set aside in the new budget. A major decision will be whether to expand the jail, or make the necessary federally-mandated changes within the current facility. The exact site for foreclosure sales was changed from the Courthouse's west door to the south door. The west door is no longer used due to elevator being built.

Steve Raymond Rites Held September 15







He gained 53 of the 64 yards, the big gainer being a 40-yarder with a pitchout from QB Brock Field. Two plays later, Haile virtually walked into the end zone. Brian Wiseman nailed his first of what became six point-after kicks, and Friona owned the scoreboard 7-0 with only 2:54 elapsed in the game.

Wiseman's kick made it 14-7. There was still 3:57 left in the opening quarter. The Chieftains recov-ered the ball on the kickoff, getting it at the Dinmitt 43. Had Friona made it "three for three," they might have put the Bobcats away early. But penalties stalled this drive, and the Chieftains punted. Adam Bandy's seeing-eye kick rolled to the Bobcat five. Dimmitt drove to the Friona 18 before being







Out Here

Ron Carr is away this week. He and his mother Hannah Lookingbill are in Lufkin at the bedside of his younger sister Kathy who is gravely ill. We don't think Ron will mind if we fill his space with the following piece written by a young fellow who is a 1996 graduate of West Point Military Academy. He is a friend of one of Bill's many cousins. He gave permission to reprint his article about his day of volunteer work following the bombing of the World Trade Center Towers in NYC.

Pete Engle: A Volunteer at Ground Zero I was at work in midtown Manhattan (I'm a trader at a hedge fund) watching the events unfold on CNBC. Upon hearing that trading was to be suspended for the day, my firm emptied out. I decided to head downtown to see if I could volunteer my help. help

A huge plume of smoke loomed in the distance as hordes of people briskly made

At one point as we waited At one point as we waited for transportation into ground zero, the wind shifted and a strong gust of the smoke plume came through #2 Lafayette Square. Everyone, myself included, was wearing their mask around their necks. Far more than a plume of brown cigarette-style smoke or even the nasty stench of an oil fire, this smoke was noxious. My eves welled up oil fire, this smoke was noxious. My eyes welled up with tears and clamped shut. After that, even though the smoke thankfully didn't come through the volunteer area again, everyone kept their masks on.

masks on. The ex-military group, 100+ of us by my hasty count, got on the buses to go into the devastated financial district, at about 3:00 p.m. The leaders of our group, among whom were some police, etc., laid down some ground rules. "If you can't take it, get back on the bus. It's not a test or competition. Do not tell any survivors of the details or casualty estimates. Do not photograph the dead. etc."

Street in the financial district and for a period of time on Broad Street, two blocks from the WTC, since 1996, and so I was almost paralyzed with shock at seeing the alien landscape. In fact, I'd come through the WTC on my way uptown in switching from the PATH train to the 1/9 Uptown subway at 7:00 a.m. that very morning. Now, the street, sidewalks and vehicles were covered with pulverized concrete, ash, and papers, Excel spread-sheets, brokerage research reports, hand-scribbled Post-It notes, and most heart-rending to me, the occasional photo of wives, husbands, or children that had been taped to someone's computer monitor or sat on their desk for wears. r sat on their desk for reeks, months, maybe even years

years. The ash, dust, and concrete ranged from about one inch deep, four or five blocks away, to what must have been over two feet deep in places. There were bits of office furniture, wheels to rolling chairs, paper catches from printers, etc., scattered around the streets. Flattened vehicles, all four tires flat and with windows devoid of any glass whatsoever, lined the

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

Proposition 1 would amend the constitu-tion to relinquish the state's claim to cer-tain disputed land in Bastrop County. The amendment would confirm legal title to that land, excluding any mineral inter-ests, to the individuals who hold a dis-puted title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

(SJR 37) Proposition 2 would amend the constitu-tion to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obli-gation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve or a conomically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services. These projects could include the con-truction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the con-struction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Governor, would be authorized to deter-prine what constitutes a border colonia forgiest that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to coun-ties for roadway projects to serve border colorise."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitu-tion to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to

exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in

PROPOSITION 4

Proposition 4 would amend the constitu-tion by setting the term of the fire fight-ers' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pen-

streets. Large chunks of concrete, steel, and shards of glass were also scattered through-out what I can only describe as now an entirely un-familiar, unidentifiable land-scape.

as now an entrifiable land-scape. We came to stop at the corner of Greenwich and Jay Street, where we were relegated to a courtyard and told to prepare both mentally and physically. We were hydrating and resting in the shade as firefighters, cops, U.S. Marshals, FBI, ATF, National Guard, Marine Corps, etc., were feverishly preparing for renewed attempts to search the rubble for survivors, herding the occasional stunned or hiding straggler into the Red Cross area, and towing destroyed vehicles out of the area.

Just as we were starting the grisly task, at about 5:12 p.m., we heard a loud crunch two or three blocks away from us, as Seven World Trade Center (the building across the street from the towers) collapsed as a result of the heavy damage it had sustained earlier in the day. PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32)

Proposition 5 would amend the constitu-tion to allow a municipality to donate-outdated or surplus equipment, supplies, or other materials used in fighting fires to underdeveloped country. Current

an underdeveloped country. Currer state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its politi cal subdivisions to be donated to another patient.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped countries."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

were blocked. Huge clouds of dust kicked up and immediately engineers sought to re-open several routes to the WTC area. PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 47)

Proposition 9 would amend the constitu-tion to authorize the legislature to pro-vide for filling vacancies in the legisla-ture without an election if only one per-son is a qualified candidate in the elec-tion to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an election. If a candidate is running unop-posed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10

Proposition 10 would amend the consti-tution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal proper-ty from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufac-tured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treat-ment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible per-sonal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manu-facturing, processing, or other commer-cial purposes."

PROPOSITION 11

Proposition 11 would amend the consti-tution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school admin-istrator who serves as a member of a gov-erning body of a school district, city, town, or other local exercmental distown, or other local governmental dis-trict, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a gov-eming body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensat-ed directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow current and retired public school teachers and retired public public school teachers and retired public school administrators to receive compen-sation for serving on the governing bod-ies of school districts, cities, towhs, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12

Proposition 12 would amend, repeal, or relocate several sections of the current

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the consti-tution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowour the later have been pade of the allow-ing the state to settle title disputes with-out a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the consti-tution to authorize the legislature to cre-ate a program to consolidate and stan-dardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a pro-gram, any new fees imposed by the legis-lature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remit-ting of civil and criminal fees."


PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the consti-tution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 bil-lion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control proj-ects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in a sensure to a preaed \$2 billion." ount not to exceed \$2 billion

(HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitu-tion to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 mil-lion of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mort-gage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve vet-erans' cemeteries.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an inde-pendent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical sig-nificance in order to preserve the proper-to:"

PROPOSITION 14

(HJR 44)

Proposition 14 would amend the consti-tution to allow the legislature to author-ize a taxing unit, other than a school dis-trict, to exempt travel trailers from prop-erty taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of income.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem tax-ation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

(SIR 16) Proposition 15 would amend the consti-tution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state high-ways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state rev-enue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruc-tion, acquisition, operation, and expan-sion of state highways, tumpikes, toll reads, toll bridges, and other mobility revinet."

PROPOSITION 16

Proposition 16 would amend the consti-tution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a con-tract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. what must be done." And I thought about the issues being raised especially hard because I am from Afghanistan, and even though I've lived here for 35 years I've never lost track of what to tell anyone who will listen how it looks from where I'm standing. I speak as one who hates the Taliban and Osama Bin Laden. There is no doubt in my mind that these people ware responsible for the atrocity in New York. I agree that something must be done about those monsters. But the Taliban and Ben Laden are not Afghanistan. They're not even the government of Afghanistan. The Taliban are a cult of gover Afghanistan in 1997. Bin Laden is a political ryou think Taliban, think Nacis. When you think Bin Laden, think Hitler. And when you think "the people of Afghanistan" think "the Jews in the concentration camps." Jews in the concentration amps."

Jews in the concentration camps." It's not only that the Afghan people had nothing to do with this atrocity. They were the first victims of the perpetrators. They would exult if someone would come in there, take out the Taliban and clear out the Taliban and clear out the Taliban and clear out the trats nest of international thugs holed up in their country. Some say, why don't the Afghans rise up and overthrow the Taliban? The answer is, they've starved, e x ha ust ed , hurt, incapacitated, suffering. A few years ago, the United Nations estimated that there are 500,000 disabled orphans in Afghanistan-a country with no economy, no food. There are millions of widows. And the Taliban has been burying these widows alive in mass graves. The soil is littered with

burying these widows alive in mass graves. The soil is littered with land mines, the farms were all destroyed by the Soviets. These are a few of the reasons why the Afghan people have not overthrown the Taliban.

world war between Islam and the West. And guess what: that's is Laden's program. That's exactly what he wants. That's why he did this. Read his speeches and statements. It's all right there. He really believes Islam would beat the West. It might seem ridiculous, would be the figures if he can polarize the world into Islam and the West, he's got a billion soldiers. If the West wreaks a holocaust in those lands, that's a billion people with nothing left to lose, hat's even better from Bin Laden's point of view. He's probably wrong--Im the end, the West would win, whatever that would mean, but the war would last for years, and millions would die, not just theirs, but ours. Who has the bely for that'? 


Please feel free to support your Conservation District by stopping by and casting your vote on October 3. The following are eligibility rules for voting and candidacy: State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and Water Conservation District director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be eighteen years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be eighteen years of age or older nfarming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation directors serve four year terms of office. 


