

BANDITS GET AWAY AFTER NIGHT ATTACK ON SOLDIERS

TRENCH WARFARE METHODS EMPLOYED BY AMERICAN TROOPS

OIL WELL CASING IS ALSO USED FOR PROTECTION—MEXICANS MAKE THEIR ESCAPE AND HAVEN'T BEEN LOCATED

INFANTRYMAN'S WOUND FATAL

Private Who Was Shot in Abdomen Not Expected to Live. Attackers Believed to Be Still on Texas Side of River

By Associated Press. Brownsville, Tex., Oct. 25.—Bandits who attacked an entrenched United States infantry camp within six miles of Brownsville last night, escaped capture by more than a thousand troops, rangers and deputies who started in pursuit of them in half an hour after the fight. Daylight revealed that there were possibly thirty or forty men in the two attacking parties which attempted to ambush the soldiers.

Civil authorities here said today they believe some members of these bands were Mexicans from Brownsville. All roads entering Brownsville during the night were guarded by both civil and military details in the belief that some of the bandits would try to hide in this city. Today's report showed no indication that any of the bandits tried to cross the Rio Grande into Mexico last night. Some of them, however, seem to have gone north eleven miles, after the attack, into the Frenos district, a tract of land covered with brush so thick that it has afforded almost perfect cover for the bandits throughout almost the entire period of the raids.

So far as is known no bandits were killed or wounded.

SOLDIER MAY DIE

Private Herman E. Moore, Fourth Infantry, of French Lick Springs, Ind., who was wounded in the abdomen and arm, was not expected today to live. No other soldiers were hit.

The soldiers were on the alert for attack last night, having become suspicious about four o'clock in the afternoon when the negro cook reported that he heard whistling in the brush nearby. Search failed to locate the whistler. The infantry camp was within 200 yards of the scene of the train robbery and murder of three Americans a week ago tonight. The camp site was an oil derrick's location. The soldiers had built three trenches to afford protection, and during the fight they used for cover also some oil well casing left by the well drillers. The latter were unable to give any assistance during the battle, having only one shotgun with a few shells and one pistol.

U. S. CAMP EASY TARGET

The soldier camp was in the open, where it was visible some distance away. The attacking band opened fire from the dark cover afforded by the brush, about seventy-five yards from the trenches. From this distance the attackers could distinguish the outline of the trenches, but the soldiers could see nothing in the brush except rifle flashes which seemed to cover a front of several hundred feet wide.

Another band of men, from cover of the railroad embankment about 125 yards away, in another direction from the camp, appears to have taken a small part in the fight. The bullet which struck Private Moore came from the direction of this second firing party as he was shooting into the brush from behind some well casing. The wound in his abdomen was made by a soft-nosed bullet.

A detachment of the Sixth United States cavalry, stationed near the Mercedes canal, about forty miles up the Rio Grande from here, was fired on from the Mexican side of the river on Saturday night about 11 o'clock from a point noted as a mesquite joint. The Mexicans fired twenty-five shots. The fire was returned by the American troops, when the Mexican firing ceased.

Captain Hassan said a Mexican raider was killed near the Mercedes canal head gates at 10:15 o'clock Saturday night. The cavalry patrol saw two men attempting to swim the river on horses from the American to the Mexican shore. One of the men was killed by the American bullets while the other was heard to reach the Mexican bank and made his escape under fire from the American troopers.

The other firing was on another of Captain Hassan's outposts. The Mexicans are supposed to have been Saturday night celebrators.

Reports were current that General Eugenio Lopez, the 24 year old commander of the garrison at Matamoros, on the Mexican side of the river who replaced General Nafarrate had disarmed all troops in Matamoros in an effort to ascertain if any of his men were participating in raids to American territory. The reports were

denied, however, by Carranza Consul Juan Z. Garza. That First Chief Venustiano Carranza, now touring northern Mexican states, would make a personal inquiry into border troubles at his expected visit in Matamoros October 28, was indicated by Consul Garza. It is said that the first chief is making his visit to Matamoros principally for that reason.

The disposition of infantry along the border as ordered by the southern department headquarters at Fort Sam Houston contemplates making headquarters for the Twenty-sixth Infantry and a machine gun company at Harlingen, one battalion at San Benito and one battalion at Mercedes. Regimental headquarters of the Twenty-eighth Infantry will be at Mission, where one battalion and one machine gun company will be stationed while an additional battalion will be stationed at Pharr and one at Donna. From these various battalion headquarters, all companies of infantry will be sent to posts along the Rio Grande, relieving many detachments of cavalry and permitting them to give their entire attention to patrol duty, supported by infantry.

The territory to be covered by the Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth regiments of infantry has been divided into two sectors. The Twenty-sixth in command of Col. R. L. Hallard will be stationed between Villa Nueva and Progreso, thirty-five miles from here, while the Twenty-eighth will cover the territory from Progreso to La Grulla. The Fourth Infantry will make headquarters at Fort Brown. Three companies of this regiment now stationed at Lyford, San Benito and Mercedes, may be returned to Fort Brown and replaced by newly arrived troops.

American soldiers late Sunday night fired on a party of twenty American young men and women who were riding horses in the vicinity of Combes station, about thirty-three miles north of here, mistaking them for bandits. An officer of the infantry detachment near Combes received a report that a party of twenty-five or thirty bandits was about to attack Combes. He rushed in an automobile to Harlingen at a ninety mile speed for reinforcements. When the infantry company arrived they deployed with 200 yards of the bandits and found them to be American girls and boys, having jollification in Mexican fashion. All rode horses and were armed.

TREATMENT OF ARMENIANS IS DESCRIBED BY WITNESS

Women Have To Choose Between Islam and Death—Girls Treated as Chattels

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 25.—A long account by an eye witness of Armenian atrocities is telegraphed by the Reuters correspondent with the Bardamian fleet. The correspondent explains that the statement was given to the British staff by an Armenian living in the Turkish army, who was taken prisoner.

The account describes how women were tied to the tails of ox-carts and exposed to hunger and rough weather until they accepted conversion to Islam or death, how mothers were bayoneted before the eyes of their children, how Armenian girls were distributed as chattels among civil and military officials.

ESCAPED PRISONER WEEDS ROMANCE SOON SHATTERED

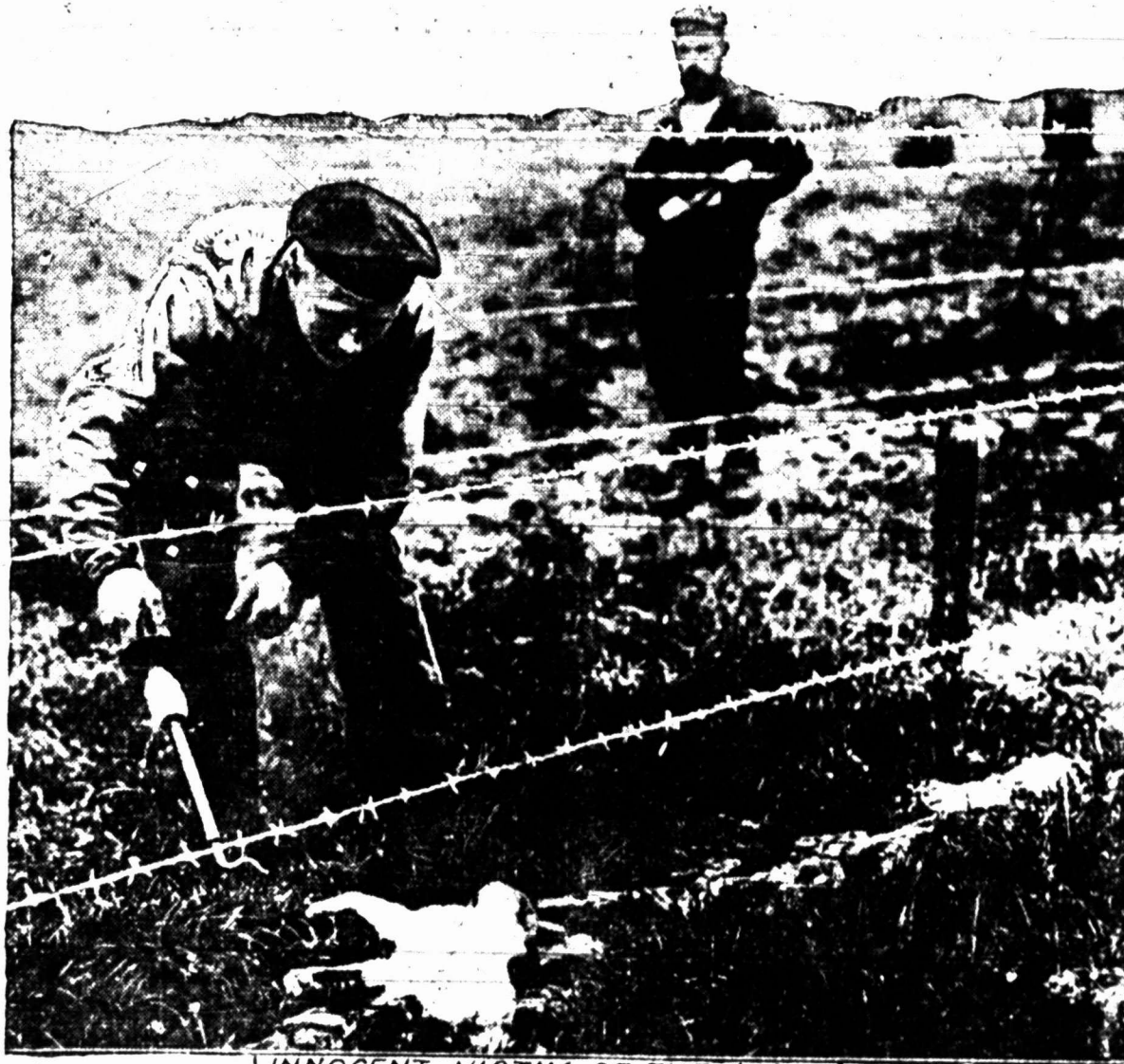
Note Signed "Jealousy" Puts Police on Trail—Returns to Serve Life Sentence

SERBIA'S POSITION NOW STILL MORE PRECARIOUS

BELIEVED ALLIES TO LAND IMMENSE FORCE AT SALONIKI

WOULD SERVE DOUBLE PURPOSE OF AIDING SERBIANS AND INFLUENCING GREEKS TO TAKE PART IN CONFLICT

INVADERS MAY EFFECT UNION

Bulgarians and Austro-Germans Now Within 35 Miles of Each Other. Heavy Fighting is Reported on Riga-Dvinsk Front

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 25.—Each succeeding telegram from the Balkans tells of the increasing gravity of Serbia's position. To the north the Bulgarian and Austro-German forces are within 35 miles of joining hands. To the south half of Serbian Macedonia is in possession of the Bulgarians, if the report of their capture of Uskup is correct. This would mean that the invaders have in their hands nearly all the means of communication.

The only favorable news from the standpoint of the entente powers is found in the optimistic reports concerning the Franco-Serbian offensive near Kriivolak where the Bulgarians are said to be giving way before a vigorous flank attack. If the British forces have left Saloniki, no news of their movement has been disclosed. Reports from various sources say the entente powers have revived their original plan and now propose to land a tremendous contingent at Saloniki. This would serve the double purpose of meeting the demand of Greece and of giving effective assistance to Serbia.

Athens reports that the Greek crown prince has gone to Saloniki where he will view the impeding stream of British and French fighting men. It is thought here that the length of the forces ultimately landed may decide whether Greece will throw her lot with the allies.

Although the Serbians have not admitted the loss of Uskup, the English press accepts it as a fact, as it does the announcement that the Germans have crossed the Danube at Orava. This means that with the Bulgarians holding Prahovo, union of their forces with the Austrians and Germans in this quarter is not far off. Unless the Serbians and their allies can strike a sudden blow, the first link in the chain from Berlin to Constantinople will be forged. Fighting on the Riga-Dvinsk front

CLAIM BULGARIANS DEFEATED BY ALLIES

REPORT FROM SERBIA SAYS NISH-SALONIKI LINE IS NO LONGER MENACED

ANGLO-FRENCH TROOPS ACTIVE

Said to Have Made Profound Impression on Greeks—Easily Repulse Bulgarians.

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 25.—The double attempt of the Bulgarians to cut the railway at Veles and in the Volandovo sector has been completely defeated. Yesterday (Friday) the attack on Veles was given up and the entire available Bulgarian strength was directed south from Istip, along the Gradskar river, spreading out over a five-mile front with its objective a short stretch where the railway running along the east bank of the Vardar river between two bridges is most pregnable.

The attack, although furious, immediately developed the inferiority of the Bulgarians in contact with the experienced troops of France and England. Heavy losses are reported along the entire line. The Bulgarians are withdrawing to the Gradskar Valley, leaving the French in victorious possession of the railway from Saloniki to Nigolite, beyond which point the line is not threatened.

5,713,347 IS TOTAL IN GINNING REPORT

STATISTICS ON CROP UP TO OCTOBER 18TH, ISSUED THIS MORNING.

TWO MILLION BALES IN TEXAS

Georgia Ranks Second—Only 66,000 Bales Reported From Oklahoma So Far This Season.

By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 25.—Cotton ginning prior to October 18 amounted to 5,713,347 bales, the census bureau announced today. Round bales included totalled 54,422. Sea Island cotton ginnings were 10,257 bales. The ginning by states was: Alabama—2,022,272; Arkansas—281,190; Florida—32,102; Georgia—1,153,398; Louisiana—223,894; Mississippi—421,688; North Carolina—264,665; Oklahoma—65,985; South Carolina—581,978; Tennessee—79,247; Texas—2,007,211; All other States—20,677.

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The French losses were slight. General Serrail, the French commander in chief, in a statement to the Associated Press, characterized the Bulgarian reports of their advances as fantastic. Nowhere, he said, have they advanced beyond a few unattended points of no military value close to the frontier.

An offensive movement by the allies seems imminent. The Greeks seem to be profoundly impressed by the rapidity and successes of the French movement.

NEARLY ALL RURAL SCHOOLS NOW OPEN IN THIS COUNTY

Only Two Not Running and These Are Expected to Start at an Early Date.

All the rural schools in Wichita county excepting two—the Cooper and the Pleasant Valley schools—have been running for several weeks. These two schools are expected to open within the next two weeks. A few days ago Superintendent Johnson received a letter from the superintendent in a neighboring county asking how he managed to get the country schools opened so early and saying that not a single country school in his county had yet opened.

UNCOVER PLOT TO BLOW UP SHIPS CARRYING ARMS

GERMAN OFFICER ADMITS GUILT IN EXPLOSION PLOT

THREE ARRESTS MADE BY NEW YORK POLICE AFTER LONG VIGIL IN WOODS OF NEW JERSEY—MEN ARE ARRAIGNED

LIEUTENANT IN KAISER'S ARMY

Men Taken into Custody While Making Tests of Explosives—Are Held Without Bail and Charges of Conspiracy Filed.

New York, Oct. 25.—Two men suspected of having been engaged in a conspiracy to blow up war munitions factories in this country and to destroy vessels carrying war supplies to Europe were under arrest today in Weehawken, New Jersey, charged with having explosives in their possession. One who gave his name as Robert Fay, was suspected by the police of being the director of their activities. The other prisoner was Walter Scholz, who said he was Fay's brother-in-law and had been in this country for two years.

The two men had been watched by New York detective staff for two months. They were seen to pay frequent visits to an isolated spot in the woods of Brentwood, New Jersey on the Palisades near Weehawken. Last Saturday detectives hidden in a tree top watched the scene of their activities for eleven hours. They say they saw two men come there late at night and test an explosive by blowing up a tree. Again yesterday the police watched in the woods and saw Fay and Scholz burning powder and testing explosives.

Robert Fay and his brother-in-law, Walter Scholz, arrested yesterday while testing explosives near Brentwood, New Jersey, were arraigned today on a charge of conspiracy and held without bail for examination tomorrow. Their arraignment disclosed the fact that the third man, Hans Knoche, had been arrested early today at his home in Jersey City. He also was held without bail.

Detectives said they expected Knoche to prove a valuable witness, as he had already given them much important information. He said he was 34 years old, that he came to this country in 1912 and was a graduate of Cologne University.

Announcement was made at police headquarters here today by Commissioner Woods that Fay had made a confession. For more than twelve hours, it was said, Fay stuck to his original story that he was not connected with the German government. At 2:30 this morning, according to the commissioner, he broke down and admitted he was a lieutenant in the German army and came to this country two or three months ago for the specific purpose of experimenting with a machine containing high explosives.

BRYAN IS TAKING PART IN OHIO PROHIBITION CAMPAIGN

Will Deliver Several Speeches in Effort to Swing State into Dry Column

Columbus, O., Oct. 25.—With William J. Bryan, former secretary of state, as the principal speaker, leaders in the fight for statewide prohibition in Ohio have prepared for a whirlwind campaign that is to be led by Mr. Bryan during the next four days and is to be kept up by others until the close of the campaign on the night before the election, November 2.

Mr. Bryan will tour the state in a special train. While prohibition was defeated in Ohio at the election last November by a majority of 84,152, the dry leaders assert that they have an excellent chance to win in the coming election.

BELGIANS ARE WARNED NOT TO POSSESS ARMS

Amsterdam, Oct. 25.—A dispatch from Brussels to the Telegraph, says that General Sauberzweig, reminded the population that a proclamation on January 1 ordered that all arms and ammunition be delivered to the German authorities. The general adds that persons who are found in possession of arms and ammunition after October 25 will be liable to the death imprisonment at hard labor for at least ten years.

HOLD SECRET SERVICE MAN OF GERMANY

By Associated Press. New York, Oct. 25.—Robert Fay, a lieutenant of the Sixteenth Saxony Infantry, admitted today he came here last through an arrangement with the German secret service men to blow up or delay steamers sailing from this country with arms or ammunition for allies.

Fay declared, however, that he had acted independently of the German embassy or any other German agency here. He admitted, however, that he had told Captain Von Pappen, military attache and Captain Boy Ed, naval attache of the German embassy, of his plans, but said both men told him not to interfere with steamers sailing from American ports or American munitions plants.

PITTSBURG FIRE CAUSES 12 DEATHS, VICTIMS ARE GIRLS

OTHER BODIES ARE THOUGHT TO BE IN RUINS—TOTAL OF 22 ARE STILL UNACCOUNTED FOR AND MAY BE DEAD.

MANY JUMP FROM WINDOWS

Flames Cut Off Escape and Rescue Are Effected With Difficulty—Eight Are Injured—Firemen Search the Ruins for Bodies.

By Associated Press. Pittsburgh, Oct. 25.—Fire this afternoon in a feed store on the north side spread to a box factory where a number of girls were employed. As the flames rushed upward through the flimsy building, frightened girls began jumping to the street. In a short time the whole structure was in flames and gathering crowds heard the screams of those unable to reach windows. Seven women were quickly gathered from the sidewalk and hurried to a hospital nearby where one soon died.

The factory was operated by the Union Paper Box Company and officers said 26 girls and six men were at work when the fire broke out. Seven of them jumped and three were taken out by firemen before the building collapsed, leaving 22 unaccounted for.

Twelve persons are known to be dead, eight girls are known to be injured and a number of others are missing. "Firemen searching" the ruins of the three story building discovered the bodies and are continuing their search in the smoke.

Joseph L. Bash, salesman for a stove company on the second floor, saw the flames shooting up the elevator shaft. He ran to a window and gave the alarm. He noticed a number of girls from the box factory cut of an upper window. He lowered eight to the ground. A J. Sezell, another stove salesman did the same thing at another window and aided a number to safety while Henry Shradar of Cleveland drove a wagon to the rear window and caught others as they jumped. A number of girls jumped to the street.

Henry K. Schafer, manager of the box factory said 26 girls and six men were at work when the fire broke out. The bodies thus far recovered are unrecognizable.

There were fourteen cases in all on the city court docket. Six were charged with intoxication and one was charged with riding a bicycle on the sidewalk. All plead guilty.

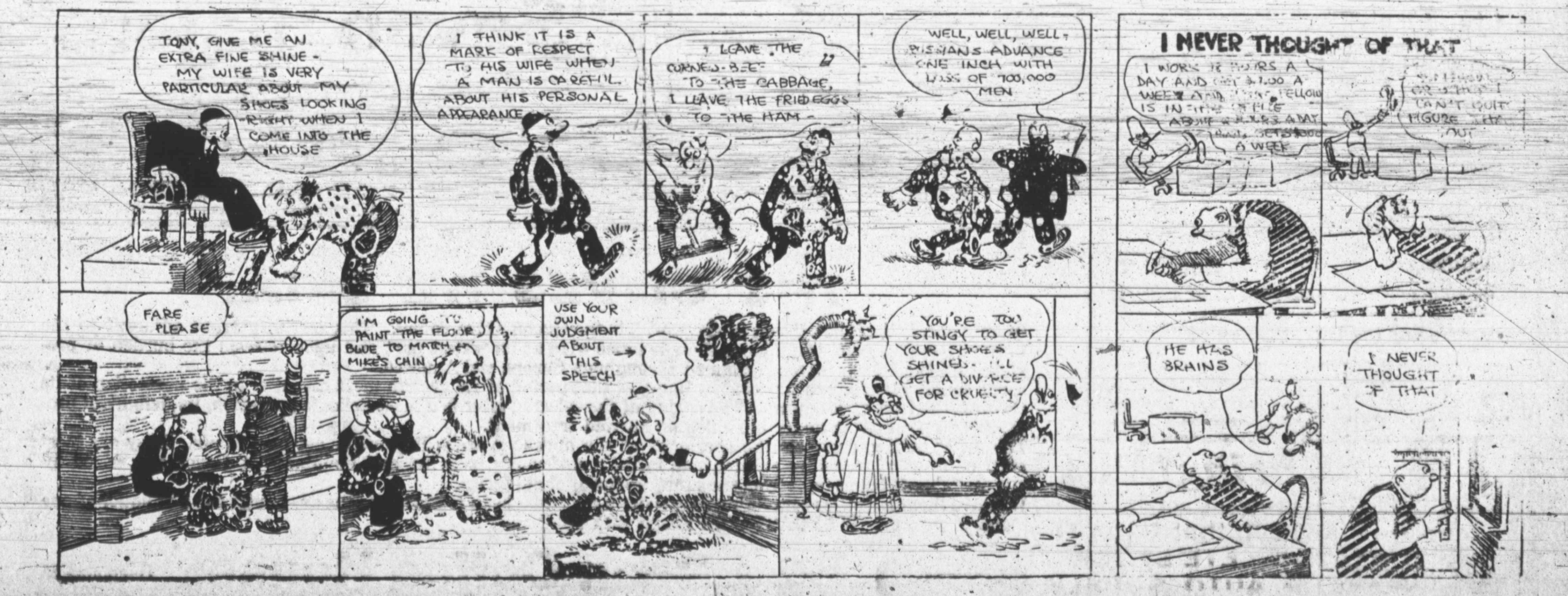
