While investigation has not fully established the origin of the fire. Acting Chief Neal of the state police today announced that he had found no one criminally responsible.

"The law requires," he said, "that the state and local building inspec-tors shall determine the proper means of egress from all buildings, and if they are not sufficient to or-der fire escapes installed on the outside of the building. The St. John's Parochial school building was carefully examined and by computing the width of the exits, it was found that they were sufficient to take care of 680 children. Within the last few days the entire school, in regular fire drill, was emptied in 90 sec-

"The real fault in the building was the fact that all the stairs led toward the center of the building and toward the exits. I am convinced that the inspectors did their duty. The investigation, so far as the state is concerned is over."

Tokio, Oct. 29.- The output war munitions for Russia resulting from the recent agreement Japan and the allies is already show-ing a great increase. Russian orders include railroad cars, a large quantity of rails, sleepers, locomotives, as well as gure, rifles, ammunition, boots and general leather equipment

and cloth. Ope consequence of the enlarged demand has been a rise of steel bars on the Toklo market from \$32.50 per ton to \$37.00 with upward tendency continuing. Various shoe factories in Toklo and other cities received orders from Russia a few days ago for a million pairs of

boots. A contract has been signed be tween the representative of a Rus sian commercial house at Vladivostok and a merchant of Osaka for the supply of munitions of war valued at 17,000,000 yen or \$8,500,000, the orders to be completed by April or May next.

It is understood that a portion of the payment for supply by Japan of war munitions will be made by treasury bills of the Russian government. The principal banks of Tokio and Osaka will form a syndicate with the support of the Bank of Japan to facilitate the issue of the bills which it is believed will be accepted without any form of security or guarantee by a third party as was at first thought necessary. The period of redemption is expected to be no shorter than two months and not lenger than two years.

Commissioners will be appointed by the Russian government to arrange with the bankers here at each issue respecting the rate of interest and the term of redemption. It is also understood that at least twenty per cent of each payment by Russia will be made in cash, gold specie being forwarded by way of Serbia.

London, October 27.—The desperate plight of the Serbians, which has been described ever since the beginning of the Austro-German and Bulgarian invasion as an affair of "national life or death" is no longer a rhetorical phrase but a literal truth. London's optimism regarding the outcome of the Balkan conflict which has been colored by reports of the determined Serbian risistance and the difficulties the invaders are meeting, has yielded to the conviction that it will take something in the nature of a miracle to avert a disaster for Serbia.

Lord Lansdowne's exposition of the Macedonia campaign in the House of Lords yesterday is regarded as an indication that the assistance that the allies have been able to offer Serbia is not sufficient to meet her needs. The



MANY JUMP FROM WINDOWS

Flames Cut Off Escape and Rescues Are Effected With Difficulty-Eight Are Injured-Firemen Search the Ruins for Bodies.

Pittsburg, Oct. 25.—Fire this afternoon in a feed store on the north side spread to a box factory where a number of girls were employed. As the flames rushed upward through the flimsy building, frightened girls began jumping to the street. In a short time the whole structure was in flames and gathering crowds heard the screams of those unable to reach windows. Seven women were quickly gathered from the sidewalk and hyrried to a hospital nearby

wehere one soon died. The factory was operated by the Union Paper Box Company, and othcers said 26 girls and six men were at work when the fire broke out Seven of them jumped and three were taken out by firemen before the building collapsed, leaving. 22

unaccounted for. Twelve persons are known to be dead, eight girls are known to be injured and a number of others are missing. Firemen searching the ruins of the three story building discovered the bodies and are continuing their search in the smoke.

Joseph L. Bash, salesman for a stove company on the second floor, saw the flames shooting up the ele-vator shaft. He ran to a window and gave the alarm. He noticed a number of girls from the box factory cut of an upper window. He lowered eight to the ground. A. J. gall, another stove salesman did the same thing at another window and aided a number to safety while Henry Shrader of Cleveland drove a wagon to the rear window and caught others as they jumped. A number of girls jumped to the street. Henry K. Schafer, manager of the box actory said 26 girls and six men were at work when the fire broke out. The bodies thus far recovered are unrecognizable
