

GERMAN ATTACK ON DURAZZO BELIEVED TO BE IN PROSPECT

MAY TRY TO FORESTALL ITALIANS—REPORT OF CLASH BETWEEN GREEKS AND BULGARIANS RECEIVED

CALAIS AS GERMAN OBJECTIVE?

Paris Believes Next Attack Will Be Delivered There and Towards Egypt—Dardanelles Move Arouses Much Interest

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 21.—The Albanian port of Durazzo is said to be the latest objective of the Teutonic-Bulgarian campaign in the Balkans. Strong forces are believed to be marching across Albania in an effort to forestall Italian occupation of the coast. In the meantime there is no indication of the development by the central powers of an objective against the allies in Macedonia. On the contrary it is reported the Bulgarians are entrenching themselves along the Serbo-Greek border. The concrete evidence of friction between Greece and Bulgaria comes from Epirus where Bulgarian bands and Greek forces, according to press dispatches, have come into conflict. If an offensive movement towards Saloniki is undertaken it is hardly likely Greece will interfere as she must grant the same facilities to the central powers as she accorded the entente allies if the present policy of neutrality prevails. While the Germans, Austrians, Bulgarians and Turks are concentrating troops along the front of Greece's Macedonian border the entente powers are debarking men and munitions at Saloniki. Several months will be necessary, however before they can hope to undertake an offensive movement on a scale which could possibly succeed.

Paris reports Germany is preparing two gigantic strokes, namely, one against Calais and one towards Egypt. In the hopes of ending the war by smashing blows at these strategic points, German guns are busy along the eastern front but no further evidence of an offensive there has been received. In an attempt to prevent British aerial reconnaissances, according to British official reports, the Germans sent up squadrons of aeroplanes, resulting in forty-four conflicts in the air with the loss of two aeroplanes by the Germans and one by the British. Along the west front an incessant fire against the Germans is being kept up.

The British public is awaiting with intense interest details of the withdrawal of the army from the Sulva Bay and Anzac district of Gallipoli peninsula. Confidence is increasing here that the fortunes of the allies in the near East having reached the lowest point, will begin to rise.

SPREAD OF TYPHOID PROMPTS STATE ACTION

Austin, Texas, Dec. 21.—The state health department has decided to cooperate in every way possible with local health officers in the different cities and counties of the state in an effort to check and ultimately stamp out typhoid fever. This malady appears quite prevalent now. It is pointed out by the department that by an average of all cases during a four year period there are annually in Texas 13,559 cases of typhoid fever. The number of deaths in these cases is 1535 annually. Of these 149 are buried by municipalities at \$7.50 each. Thirteen hundred and six who are not paupers cost an average of \$69.83 each for burial, bringing the total cost for burial of persons dying from this disease in Texas up to \$185,445 a year. In case each case cost the family \$50 the people of Texas lose each year \$697,950 in sick room expenses and \$185,445 for burial, making a grand total of \$883,395 for typhoid fever annually.

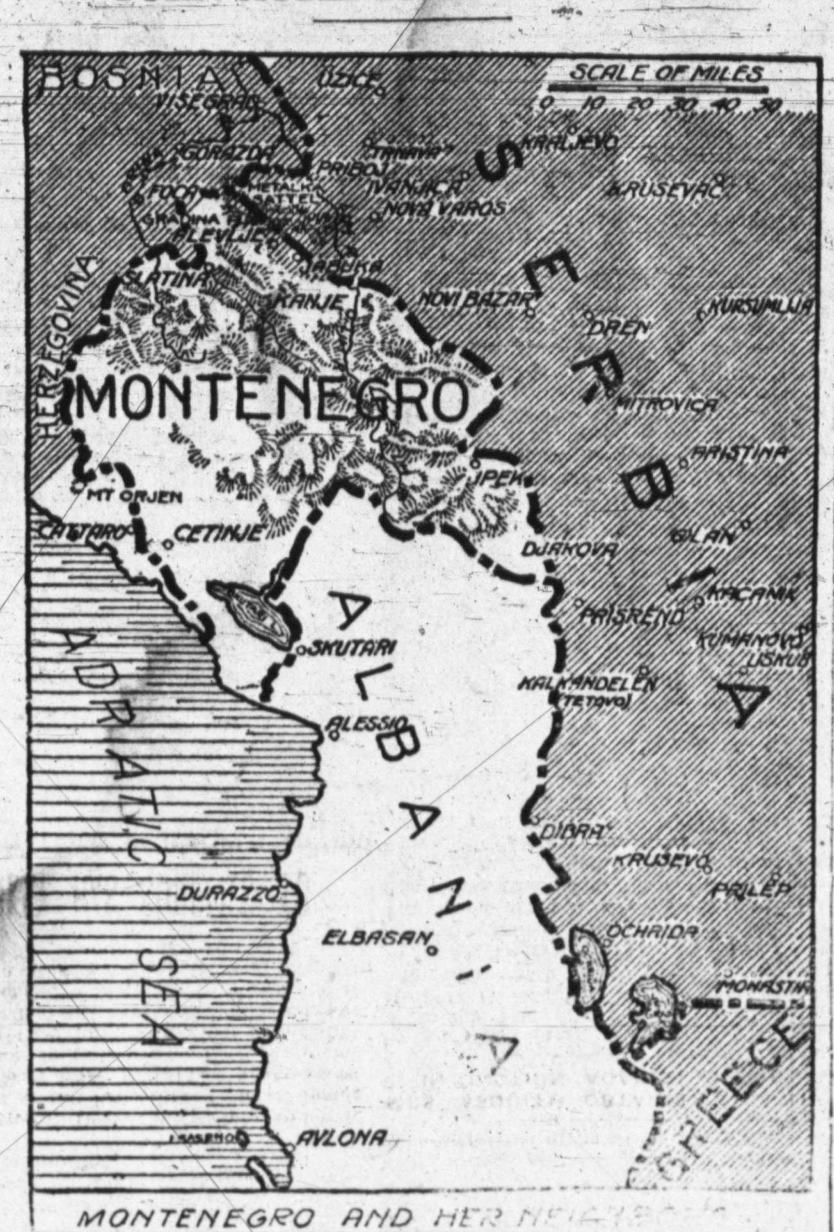
SUIT FOR \$1000 DAMAGES FOLLOWS AUTO ACCIDENT

WITHDRAWAL OF BRITISH EFFECTED WITHOUT LOSS

London, Dec. 21.—When the British forces withdrew from the positions at Sulva Bay and Anzac on the western slopes of the Gallipoli peninsula their total casualties were three men wounded according to an official announcement made this afternoon. Six guns which were destroyed were left when the British withdrew from the Sulva position, it was added.

SERVIA ALL OCCUPIED, TEUTON ARMIES TURN ATTENTION TO MONTENEGRO



Montenegro, the only country of southeastern Europe which successfully resisted the great wave of the Turkish invasion in the middle ages and which, since the fall of the Roman empire, has acknowledged no alien master, is now menaced by invasion from the conquered territory of Serbia. Since the beginning of the war Montenegro, "the country of the black mountain," has stood faithfully by the side of its neighbor, Serbia, a kindred Slavic nation. King Nicholas of Montenegro is the father-in-law of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, and throughout Italy the greatest sympathy is felt for Montenegro.

SOUTH AFRICANS CONVICTED OF TREASON ARE RELEASED

General Christian DeWet and 118 Other Prisoners Given Conditional Liberty

London, Dec. 21.—General Christian DeWet, one of the leaders of the South African rebellion against the British government in 1914 and who was convicted of treason last June at Bloemfontein, Union of South Africa, has been released from prison, as have 118 other high treason prisoners, according to a Reuter dispatch from Johannesburg. The prisoners were allowed to go on payment of their fines and on condition they abstain from participation in politics, that they neither attend nor take part in public meetings and that they do not leave their districts without permission.

TURKEY HAS SUPPLIES TO SATISFY GEOMANN'S NEEDS

Question of Transportation is Principal One, According to Turkish Official

Berlin, Dec. 21.—Turkey has an abundance of foods and other materials of all kinds which she can supply to Germany if Germany needs them," said Dr. Nazim Bey, secretary of the Young Turks committee and one of Turkey's most prominent men, in a statement today to the Associated Press correspondent on his arrival in Berlin. "It is only a question of transportation which seems to be in a fair way of solution. There is no lack of anything in Turkey. For example we have 30,000,000 kilograms of cotton which Germany can have the moment she solves the transportation problem, not to speak of 10,000,000 kilograms of reserve supplies in the shape of mattresses and other articles in Turkish homes. The same is true of copper."

PROMINENT CITIZEN OF MARLIN SUICIDES TODAY

By Associated Press. Marlin, Texas, Dec. 21.—The body of B. C. Clark, a wealthy banker and Confederate veteran today was found in his back yard, shot in the left side of the chest and a gun lying by his side. A verdict of suicide was rendered by the coroner. Mr. Clark's suicide is believed to be due solely to ill health. His financial affairs are said to be in good condition. He was 75 years old.

STUDENTS' LOAN FUND MAY REACH \$50,000

Austin, Texas, Dec. 21.—Considerable interest is being shown by the Elks of Texas in the Big Brother loan fund movement which is designed to create a fund for lending deserving students of the University of Texas and the A. & M. College money for college expenses, according to Senator H. L. Darwin of Delta, Texas, author of the plan. It is hoped soon to raise a fund of \$50,000. A charter for the organization was taken out recently and shares of stock are being sold to the 25,000 Elks of the state.

DELAY SETTLEMENT OF LUSITANIA CASE

GERMAN PUBLIC OPINION SUCH AS TO MAKE SETTLEMENT WISE

REPARATION NEAR RECENTLY

Dismissal of Attaches and Demands on Austria-Hungary Result in Delaying Action

Washington, Dec. 21.—Full settlement of the Lusitania case, including reparation for the lives of the American victims, which it became known today, recently was near, has been postponed by the dismissal of the German naval and military attaches and the American demand on Austria-Hungary as a result of the sinking of the Ancona.

Consideration of the state of public opinion, because of these two acts of the American government, according to reliable information received here, has caused officials in Berlin to decide that such a settlement as might be satisfactory to the United States would not now be practical in Germany.

An agreement, it is said, was practically reached soon after the American note to Great Britain protesting against interference with neutral trade had been published in Germany. The note, it is said, created a remarkable pro-American sentiment in Berlin as well as throughout Germany. At that time, it is said, public opinion would have approved re-echoing a bland making a settlement of the controversy possible. Negotiations between Secretary Lansing and Count Von Bernstorff were progressing when the United States demanded the withdrawal of Captain Boy-Ed and Captain Von Pape.

That act, according to advices here caused German opinion to swing back to resentment of the actions of the United States because the belief prevails that the attaches have done nothing to warrant their removal.

The demand upon Austria and the vigorous terms in which the first note was couched next attracted criticism in Germany and the settlement followed by the request for the recall, is described as having increased materially.

MAY INDICT DOCTOR WHO LET BABY DIE

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF ILLINOIS WANTS GRAND JURY TO TAKE ACTION

TAKES "OLD-FASHIONED" VIEW

Says Child Was Entitled to Live and Scores Dr. Haiselden For Such "Experiments"

By Associated Press. Springfield, Ill., Dec. 21.—Attorney General Lucy in a letter to Maclay Henry, state's attorney for Cook county, asks that Dr. Harry J. Haiselden who recently allowed the Bollinger infant to die in the German-American hospital in Chicago, be brought before the grand jury for investigation and indicted if he is amenable to the criminal laws of the state.

"I am old fashioned enough to think the power which decreed life to the infant" the letter states, "might have some destiny in view which Dr. Haiselden's finite mind could not foresee, and this child was entitled as a matter of absolute right to its opportunity to live." In concluding the letter says: "I believe in making Illinois an unprofitable field for that character of experimentation wherein human life is at stake and the ideas of Dr. Haiselden and his school may be exploited with impunity."

RIOTERS IN JUAREZ ATTACK AMERICANS; STREET CAR STONED

HAIG, NEW HEAD OF BRITONS IN FRANCE PROMINENT SINCE THE WAR BEGAN



General Sir Douglas Haig

General Sir Douglas Haig, successor of Field Marshal Sir John French in command of the British forces in France, has played a prominent part in most of the chief operations of the British army in the present war. In the retreat from Mons, on the Aisne, at Ypres and at Nuevo Chapelle. On each occasion he received most generous praise in the official reports of Sir John French. At Mons General Haig commanded the First corps, which constituted the right wing of the British army. In his report on the rear guard action after Mons, the commander, in chief gave special credit to Sir Douglas Haig for saving his corps when it was in a dangerous predicament on the night of Sept. 25. General Haig began his military career with the Seventh Hussars in 1885 and served in Sudan. As Major Haig he was chief of staff to Colonel French in a brilliant series of minor operations around Colesberg, in South Africa. He has had experience at the war office, where he was director of military training and in India where he was chief of the general staff to General Kitchener's successor. Before the war Sir Douglas Haig had never commanded in action a larger body than a regiment. Sir Douglas Haig was born fifty-four years ago. He is the youngest son of John Haig, justice of the peace of Cameronbridge, in Scotland.

GREEK KING YIELDED WHEN FRENCH MADE BOLD BLUFF

Story of How Entente Powers Secured Settlement of Demands Has Come to Light

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 21.—The Athens correspondent of the Daily Mail under the date of Thursday described how the negotiations between the Greek government and the entente allies were hanging fire and nothing seemed to come of the meeting at Salonki with Colonel Bakulis of the Greek army, urgent orders came from Paris on Dec. 16 as a result of which the French minister took a bold step. He went straight to King Constantine with firm but courteous demand for an instant settlement for the entente demands. The king thereupon summoned the cabinet, says the correspondent and informed the members the allies would present a joint note requiring an immediate answer, and acceptance being forthcoming immediately the blockade was raised the next day. The whole of Athens rejoiced continued the correspondent, and the king himself said that he was inconceivably relieved to be rid of the anxiety.

GASOLINE STILL SELLING FOR NINETEEN CENTS HERE

Nineteen cents per gallon is still the ruling price for gasoline here, four out of the five agencies in this city selling for that figure, although one agency advanced to 21 cents several days ago. It was expected that the others would follow suit but so far they have not done so. Gasoline is selling for 21 cents in several Texas cities, following the recent advance in crude oil and there is every reason to believe that the advance will come here within a short time.

REPORT RUSSIANS ARE ATTEMPTING TO INVADE BULGARIA

ATHENS DISPATCH SAYS VARNA PORT ON BLACK SEA BEING BOMBARDED BY WARSHIPS CONVEYING TRANSPORTS

IS LONG EXPECTED MOVEMENT

Previous Reports Have Indicated That Russians Were Concentrating Forces Preparatory to Making an Attack on Bulgaria

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 21.—Arrival of a Russian expedition off the Bulgarian coast is reported by the Athens correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company. The dispatch says: "A Russian cruiser and two destroyers which are conveying the steam transports of troops have arrived off the Bulgarian coast and are bombarding Varna vigorously." The Bulgarian port of Varna is on the Black Sea a few miles south of the Romanian border. It is a railroad terminus. This city and Burgas, 50 miles farther south are the principal Bulgarian Black Sea ports.

On several occasions since the beginning of the Teuton drive through Serbia it has been reported that the Russians would attempt an invasion of Bulgaria from the sea and it had been said forces were being concentrated for this purpose at Odessa. Previous dispatches reporting Russian naval demonstrations before Varna of Bulgaria preparatory to an effort to land troops were not borne out subsequently.

WANT COTTON BAGGING USED FOR WRAPPING BALES

Austin, Texas, Dec. 21.—While the state warehouse managers under the permanent warehouse law will recommend to the farmers and ginners of Texas the use of cotton instead of jute bagging for wrapping cotton bales the recommendation will be such as will give those ginners and farmers who have a supply of jute or other kind of wrapping on hand to dispose of it.

This recommendation is to be enforced until the next season as 95 per cent of the present crop has been gathered and ginned. The use of cotton bagging was decided upon as the result of a recent tour in the north and east by D. M. Cameron, state warehouse expert, who visited the large factories of St. Louis, Fall River, New York, Baltimore, Augusta, Atlanta and New Orleans. It was found that jute is a scarce article owing to its extensive use in the European war and that cotton was better for the purposes of the Texas farmer.

COL. E. M. HOUSE WILL VISIT AUSTIN SHORTLY

Howard Andrey who will leave early in January for his new post as vice president of the National Bank of Commerce, New York, was given last night by the Chamber of Commerce and Manufacturers' Association. Andrey for years has been identified with the City National Bank here as vice president and cashier. Arrangements were in the hands of a special committee.

GERMAN REICHSTAG VOTES IMMENSE NEW WAR CREDIT

Ten Billion Marks is Amount Authorized With Socialists Opposing It

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 21.—The Reichstag today adopted the credit of ten billion marks asked by the government at Berlin. The Socialist minority opposed the credit, according to a Berlin dispatch forwarded by Reuters' correspondent at Amsterdam. The Socialist spokesman, Friedrich August Carl Dyer, according to the dispatch, declared that all endeavor for peace had failed because of the annexation aims of both sides.

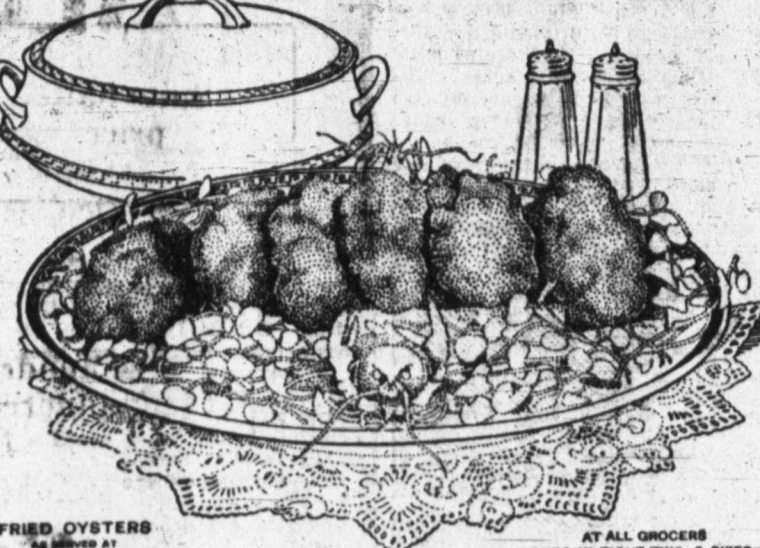

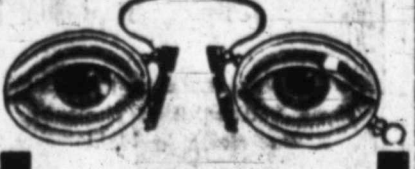

BROOM CORN VALUED AT \$7000 DAMAGED

FACTORY IS SCENE OF DESTRUCTIVE FIRE EARLY MONDAY NIGHT

FIREMEN AT WORK MANY HOURS

Origin of Fire is Mysterious, Large Quantity of Pecans is Also Destroyed

Sixty tons of broom corn valued at \$125 a ton was either burned or so badly damaged by water as to be made practically worthless as the result of a fire last night in a warehouse owned by T. H. Noble and located just south of the Wichita Mill on the Wichita Valley tracks. The fire was first discovered at about 9:30 o'clock and firemen kept three streams of water on the burning straw for many hours. A number of bales were rolled out of the shed and the fire in them was put out with little damage. That which remained in the shed however, was either badly damaged by flames or is so badly water-soaked that it is doubtful whether it can be used. The fire department was out all last night and this morning one line of hose was still in use.

Six thousand pounds of pecans were also stored with the broom straw. Some of the pecans were burned but it is not believed the damage to them has been heavy. The building was a frame structure and wooden platform runs along the railroad side. Grass and weeds which grew up to this platform and straw dropped in unloading the bales from freight cars furnished material which a match or spark might easily have ignited, although it is not known how the fire started. Six thousand dollars insurance was carried on the broom straw, which it is believed will cover the loss.

Chicago, Dec. 21.—Traders in wheat made a general rush to the buying side today and carried prices strongly up grade. Liverpool reports of growing scarcity of supplies gave impetus to the advance. Opening prices which ranged from 1.4 to one cent higher with December at 1.22 and May at 1.22 3/4 to 1.23 1/2 were followed by a high reaction and then substantial gains all around. Corn eased off despite the strength in wheat. After opening a shade off to 1.8 higher the market underwent a moderate sag. Oats held back with corn. Profit taking in wheat was on a broad scale but was offset by large export sales. The close was buoyant, 1/4 to three cents net higher with December at 1.24 and May at 1.24 7/8 to 1.25.

Wichita Falls, Tex., Dec. 21, 1915



With the price of gasoline soaring and the prospect that a war tax will be placed on automobiles, according to their horse power, the purchases of new automobiles is not likely to be as great during the year 1916 as was the case in this year 1915, when all the automobile manufacturing plants are behind with orders.

S. P. Brooks, president of Baylor University, has resigned his position with that educational institution for the purpose of making the race for the United States Senate. Therefore, we suppose if there was ever a doubt that he would not run through to the end, that doubt has now been removed. He is burning all bridges behind him, regardless of what the eliminators may do. This gives to Waco two full fledged candidates for the senatorship, the other being Congressman R. L. Henry. Both are strong and enthusiastic supporters of President Wilson and his administration; but on the question of prohibition they differ widely. Dr. Brooks being a strong pro, while Henry is an anti.

The press dispatches tell us that Villa's generals have advised that he give up the struggle against the Carranza government, and that he has taken their advice, and will cross over into the United States, if permitted to do so. Advices from Washington are to the effect that Villa will be permitted to cross over and be given asylum usually accorded political refugees. That there is something to these reports is evidenced by the fact that many of Villa's general have already surrendered to the Carranza forces, and that his family together with his household effects have been moved across the border to El Paso. This begins to look a little more like that the Mexican troubles will soon come to a close. Zapata, however, and perhaps a half dozen other warring factions that are giving the Carranza government no end of trouble, have yet to be dealt with, and it may be several months yet before this can be successfully accomplished.

Property owners on Lamar avenue from 10th to 17th streets, by January 15th will have expended between \$15,000 and \$16,000 to have the street repaved. It will be money well spent, and so far as the Times is aware not a single property paying citizen regrets making the investment, for such it is, and about as good as could have been made. This fact, however, should not cause the tax assessor or board of equalization to raise taxable values along that street for at least a year or so. Many of the owners of property have already taxed their resources to the limit in order to have the street paved, and the board of equalizers should take this into consideration when equalizing taxable values.

Senator Tillman of South Carolina seems just as radical in his views today as he was when he won fame as "the pitchfork senator." He says that one million dollars is enough for any one man to have and that when the fortune of a man reaches that figure the general government should have authority to levy a tax sufficient to keep it from growing any larger. One million dollars is a whole lot of money—more, in fact that any one man really needs, but as to whether it is too much money for any one man to have depends altogether on the man, how he has accumulated the same, and the manner he has of spending. If he uses

his money for corrupting the government—to defeat legislation endorsed and demanded by the people, then, in that case, one million dollars is too much money for a man of that disposition to have and control as his very own. But there are lots of men who have built great fortunes, and done it legitimately and justly, and such men are a credit to any country. But what's the use of considering seriously the remark of Senator Tillman. The chances are that he did not mean what he said, and even if it was entirely within his power to enact and then enforce such a law he would decline. Millionaires are not all bad men.

The mayor of Chicago, who is a Republican, in a recent interview said: "I know the police department is absolutely rotten. It is combined with grafters. I know criminals, holdup men, murderers and pick-pockets known to the police are walking the streets every day, and are not arrested. I would not be surprised to learn that in the department are men who have planned murder." That kind of talk sounds good, but when he attempts to put his plans into execution he will find opposition unlooked for in sufficient strength to defeat him for re-election. Granting all that he says of Chicago to be true, the people of that city want just that kind of conditions to exist. It is the same way in most large cities, and the smaller cities are patterning after the larger ones. A rotten city government affords opportunities galore for the grafters, and the grafters have been controlling Chicago's city government for a long time. Our prediction is they will continue to do so.

RED CROSS SEALS ON SALE, WICHITANS ASKED TO BUY

As has been the custom for several years past the Wichita Falls people will be asked to contribute their quota to the Red Cross fund for the relief of the victims of the Christmas seals. These seals are now on sale at all drug stores. The seals are most attractive in design and add fully as much to gift packages as the conventional holly seals and other Christmas designs. They sell at one cent each and the money goes to the fund for the prevention and cure of tuberculosis. The druggists of the town have been kind enough to attend to the sale of these seals and the committee in charge asks that the public do their share towards contributing to the fund. Only a small amount, purchased by a great many, will help along the fight against the Great White Plague.

QUIET TODAY IN COURTS, FEW CASES ARE READY

In decided contrast with his strenuous work of previous sessions Judge Akin who has tendered his resignation as judge in the 30th judicial district effective January 1, is having little to do in the closing days of his tenure of office. He called the appearance docket in his court this morning, but the lawyers were not ready to go to trial and only two cases were set. These were the cases of J. M. Roberson vs. Ball Bros., and L. P. Hammond vs. the Unity Oil Co. Both were set for January 20. All other cases on the appearance docket were passed, and if anything is tried this month it will be only divorce cases or non-jury cases of small importance. No cases were tried today in the 28th district court and there seems a general disposition by the attorneys to pass all cases over until the new year.

MAN SUSTAINS BRUISES WHEN AUTO HITS HIM

C. R. Rogers of Kosse, Texas, was struck by an automobile driven by Miss Imogene Brown this afternoon at the corner of Ohio avenue and Eighth street. He was knocked to the pavement and was bruised on the face and arm. He was taken to a doctor's office following the accident. Rogers was stepping onto the sidewalk when hit. Miss Brown's car was turning the corner at the time.

At The Theaters

The Gem.
Marc McDermott and Lillian Herbert are featured in "The Mystery of Room 13" a four part Edison on the Gem Tuesday program.

Thirteen has ever been the number of the Fates. To some it is a symbol of luck and happiness. To others, the Count Giuseppe Rizzo, presided by his creditor, marries June Baxter, heiress. After a while, hard pressed by his creditors, and a heavy loser at gambling, the Count agrees to grant her a divorce. June will make a settlement upon him. The Count's demands upon June are staggering, and she refuses to comply with them. The Count is enraged and June saves herself only by her presence of mind. Adventure and complication follow each other in quick succession. Thirteen, the number on the door of the Count's room in the hotel, has begun to cast its spell about. That night, the Count is murdered. Suspicion falls upon Clay, and he is arrested for the murder. Yet, as the numerous complications begin to untangle themselves, we find that the Count was killed—not by June, because of her fear of his hatred for him—not by Phillipa, because he had blighted her life—not by Antonio, her father, who had sworn to take vengeance—but by one, urged on merely by the sight of the Count's winnings that night—unable to escape the talons of number thirteen.

The Majestic.
"Carmen" the big Fox picture is today's attraction at the Majestic. Wonder follows wonder in the William Fox production of "Carmen." Edward Velasquez, noted Spanish artist, was brought from Seville to supervise the technical and architectural details of the Spanish cities which Mr. Fox created at his studios.

Walsh gives overwhelming proof of his unapproachable directing genius.

The Empress.
"Buck Parvin and the Movies," a three reel dramatization of the story by the same name which ran in the Saturday Evening Post is on today's picture bill, also "The Vindication," a two-part Centaur with John Coker and Mabel Van Buren featured. A synopsis is given.

William Burnes is murdered at night in the office building where he is employed. The guilt falls upon John Carter, through circumstantial evidence produced next morning by the janitor, and through the well known fact that Burnes and Carter have lately been on bad terms. At the trial, however, Carter's alibi is so strong that he is acquitted. He goes back, free so far as the law is concerned, but still bearing the stigma of guilt in the minds of his old associates. The head of the firm refuses to reemploy him in his old position, and he wanders for weeks in a hopeless search for work. At last, in desperation, Carter prevails upon the animal trainers at an amusement park to give him a job cleaning the beast cages. He is severely wounded by a lion and carried home on a stretcher. Meanwhile, Mary, Carter's wife, resolved to prove her husband's innocence, has obtained a position as scrub-woman in the office where he was formerly employed. Behind a heavy letter file Mary discovers a ruler, bloodstained and bearing ink fingerprints. Already her suspicions have been roused against the janitor. He tries to force her to take a drink from a whiskey bottle, on which are greasy marks of his fingers. Pretending to coincide with his wishes, she studies the fingerprints and calls the police and the head of the firm. They arrive just in time to save Mary from the brutal advances of the janitor. The evidence against him is so strong that he breaks down and confesses to the murder of Burnes. Burnes had entered the office that night to rob the bill, and the janitor, in trying to force the thief to divide up the loot and the head of the firm had killed him with the metal-edged ruler. Mrs. Carter reaches her husband barely in time to save him from taking his own life.

The Lydia Margaret.
An Animated Weekly, a comedy reel and a two part drama, "The White Feather Volunteers" are the pictures which are being shown today at the Lydia Margaret. Rupert Julian and Elsie Jane Wilson are featured in the latter picture which is a tale of England in war times and has its inspiration in the custom of shaming men into enlisting

by representing them with a white feather.

England is seriously considering conscription. Like the United States the tight little isle depended for safety on a small regular army and the territorialists, the latter body corresponding to our state militia. Numerous calls have been made for volunteers and the clerk and the stock broker the nut and the mechanic, the farmer and the county squire, the earl and the coxey—all have responded to their country's need. More than 3,000,000 Englishmen and colonials from all parts of the empire are now in the field. But still the cry goes up for more men. The wastage at the front is estimated at 2,000 men a day and nearly 15,000 British officers have been lost since the war began. Various means this side of conscription have been used to encourage recruiting.

One method which has now been abandoned, was picturesque in the extreme. Women, travelled in the tubes and tramways of London and when they saw a well set up young man in mufti whom they thought should be at the front they plucked a white feather from a reticule and presented it to the shame faced youth; in this way it was hoped to shame the laggards into enlisting for the war.

"SEVEN KEYS TO BALDPATE" PLEASES AUDIENCE HERE

Mystery, comedy, adventure and melodrama were pleasingly combined in the production "Seven Keys to Baldpate" which appeared at the Wichita Theatre last night, the performance being attended by a large audience. The play is a most unconventional one and is of absorbing interest, with not a dull moment from beginning to end. It deals with a young author, who nets \$5,000 that he can complete a 10,000 word manuscript of a story within 24 hours. Baldpate Inn, a summer resort on top of Baldpate mountain being selected for the experiment. The inn is deserted, it being winter, and the key which the owner gives the author is declared to be the only one in existence. The writer takes up his station in the lonely end and begins his story. The story which he writes is the story of the play unfolded with one thrilling stunt after another, and the result is a peculiar but fascinating production.

The story, faithful as it is, is not without some foundation in fact, being based upon the exposure of balloons in a southern city several years ago, in which a summer resort hotel on top of a mountain played a prominent part.

The play was notable not on account of its stars, but from the fact that there were none. The company was an excellent one, making the most of the production but so even-tempered that the action distributed that none of the parts stood out with any prominence, and consequently there was no head liner among the performers. The play is notable also for its cleanliness, for while cuss words were employed extensively they were all nice cuss words. Two

of philosophy adorn the mixture of adventure and mystery, one being the rather plaintive assertion of the hotel care taker—"I never broke my word in my life, I guess that's why I'm a poor man" and the other the crooked mayor's accusation of the crooked traction magnate—"It's such as you that makes us crooks."

Chris Allworth as Lou Max, Ann Bert as Myra Thornhill and Frank Martins as Peters were the most apt members of the excellent cast which had no weak spots. The production is one that will be most pleasantly remembered here.
