COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of

I frequently think, and sometimes say, that I will have nothing more to do with politics, and I sometimes think pretty much the same way about religion, then I run up against the fact that if one does not talk or write about either of these much abused subjects, he finds he has very little to talk or write about.

There is not much one can do about religion, but to give the matter his most serious consideration and arrive at his own conclusion and be forever after guided thereby, and allow the same privilege to his fellowman, or at least that is the way it occurs to me, with perhaps one little quirk, and that is that the other fellow's religion shall command him to try to force his view of religion upon me. Barring that, I cannot see that there is anything more that can be done about it. Although morality and religion may appear to be very much akin, there is a difference.

In regard to politics, it occurs to me that there is something that can be done about it, but the only weapon the individual has with which to defend his political rights is his vote, and again it is up to the individual. He should give the matter in question his most serious consideration, make his own decision and cast his vote accordingly, in compliance with the results arrived at by his own serious consideration.

The voter who does not vote according to his own personal and honest convictions in regard to any political question is fair, neither to himself, his government nor to his fellow citizen. Our newspapers, magazines and radio seems pretty well filled with remarks about Communism, Socialism, totalitarianism, and other political freedom and free enterprise.

I admit that I am not fully competent to pass judgment on either of these isms, but I do have my personal opinions concerning each of them. And these opinions are decidedly opposed to the first three named above and staunchly in favor of the latter three. I admit that I could be wrong decidedly. But right or wrong, my only weapon with which I may defend the right, as I see it, and defeat the wrong, is my vote. In our plan of government that "The Majority shall rule," and so it has been, whether that majority be right or wrong.

We have, today, in the White House, a man who was elected by a majority vote of the people, but he is not a majority of the popular vote, but at least by a majority of the electoral vote, and therefore he and his supporters are supposed to rule in the directing of our governmental affairs, and I state again, that the only way those opposed to such a rule can do so is by the proper use of their ballots. Then allowing that the majority shall rule, the only thing left for those of us who oppose such ruling is to bear our chagrin and swallow our medicine and bide our time until our next election day.

It is in this matter, pretty much as Mark Twain is quoted as saying in regard to the weather: "A lot of people are talking about the weather, but no one seems to be doing anything about it." There is lots of talk about the evils of the present political and economic condition of our country, but there is little they can or will do about it, other than vote.

I could fill the remainder of my allotted space with quotations from editors of Southern newspapers, which are strongly defending the opinions I feebly tried to express here. I do not know these editors personally, but I do know what the papers which they edit and which contain the editorials to which I have referred are among the most popular papers of our Southland, and are therefore, read by thousands of our good Southern people. I am lenient enough in my views to believe

that most, if not all these good editors will cast their votes for what they believe to be the right thing to do for our country, but will any considerable number of their readers heed their warnings and advice and cast their votes accordingly?

It has been many years since I last read any Northern newspapers, but my guess is that these surmises I am making will apply as well to Northland as to the Southland. Well, come November 7th, as my good friend, Clyde Warwick, is sometimes prone to express the sentiment: "We shall see what we shall see." But I still contend that, regardless of all the oratory of the broadcasters and the soul-stirring appeal of the columnists, Mr. Truman and his left wing supporters will make ravish gains in both houses of Congress, to the extent that Mr. Truman will take it as a much stronger mandate from the people to push his Civil Rights and FEPC programs through Congress and establish their provisions upon our people, and with the gains he has made in the new congress, this will be a mere matter of moonshine.

I mentioned above the matter of the editorial quotations that I could secure from many of the newspapers of the Southland, and while I have not the time nor the space to quote many of them here, I am tempted to quote just one from my good friend, Clyde Warwick, of the Canyon News, partly because this is a Panhandle paper, but mostly because I know Clyde to be a deep and sound thinker and arriver at his conclusions through his own thinking and further, because I know he has the courage of his convictions, and I feel sure that Clyde will take no offense from me quoting him here. I shall quote only a portion of the editorial as follows:

(Quote)—"Frankly it seems to me that the President thinks that he can't get along without the support of Southern Democrats, which in many elections have been about the only loyal followers of the party. The President follows the footsteps of FDR in gathering up minority groups and appealing to them for support, thus making it possible to win in spite of Southern opposition. The Fair Practice Act is the worst type of administrative appeal to the prejudice of the voters in the industrial North. As a matter of fact, race discrimination is not only practiced in the South, but in many sections where the President has been obtaining his strongest support. A coalition of Southern Democrats and Northern Republicans defeated the purpose of the administration to saddle the Fair Practice act upon the nation. In spite of the ever increasing number of vital issues confronting the nation, the President ought to continue in office by appealing to the prejudices of minorities throughout the nation, which were located in vital spots." (End Quote)

It is hard on my blood-pressure, and just a few words along the line of charity and morals, that should be more soothing and consoling: The last stanza of an old, old song: Don't give way to foolish sorrows, Let this keep you in good cheer Brighter days may come tomorrow. If you try and persevere, Darkest nights will have a morning. Though the sky be overcast, Longest lanes will have a turning. So the tide will turn at last. —Author unknown.


