ever be available for fighting fires."

The popular accusation of many water consumers is "too high bills." Maybe in an isolated case this could be true. But, fellow citizens, in practically every case, instead of "too high" we would be more correct in saying "higher than they used to be." Why? Friona used to be known far and wide for its wells pumping sand. This was true when the first meters were installed. As late as one year ago, meters were being clogged with sand IMPATRING THEIR EFFICIENCY, and 90% OF THEM WOULD FUNCTION ONLY 5 to 10 DAYS BEFORE THEY STOPPED REGISTERING! And consequently, as firms and individuals were charged only for meter readings, many, many consumers paid a neglible bill for even excessive amounts of water used in their business or home. And there are some who still expect to get by on this ridiculous assessment.

The sand-clogging has been corrected. The city storage tank adequately solved that situation. Now the meters are functioning, and the few that are "irregular" register less water than is actually consumed, the meters are guaranteed by the manufacturer not to register excessively, as it is a mechanical impossibilitly of their construction.
