CL This week comments on the national political-military situation, believing that it touches our everyday life of today and our hopes of tomorrow, even more than we realize.

What I need to do—what you must consider—and what the dots in Washington now find expedient is to stand on our own two feet, keeping abreast of the times, and assuming personal responsibility in protecting this heritage of a free, Christian America. And there will be a

Public Meet Called For Water Study

W. L. Edelman, chairman of the Parmer County Water Conservation has called a meeting of all Parmer County taxpayers for this Friday night on the Bovina school gymnasium; the subject demanding immediate attention is the course this county will take in a proposed Underground Water Conservation district including Parmer County.

Not only is this meet of prime interest to the irrigation farmer but also to every taxpayer as there is provision in the law for taxation of up to 50 cents per \$100 valuation to support the water district.

Should a water district be organized by a majority vote of the people concerned, then the district would have the right to set out regulations so as to get the greatest possible good out of the water. However, it will not have the right to limit the amount of water a man can draw from his well except under certain conditions, such as drawing salt water into the reservoirs.

Warning Issued By Dr. Wills Before Friona Lions Club

Cites Instances Of Communistic Advances In National Government

Friona Lions club members Thursday night heard Dr. R. R. Wills of Hereford present a down-to-earth talk regarding the infiltration of communistic practices in our national government and the means of combating this threat to democracy.

Dr. Wills spoke from his experience in metropolitan New York where he took special care to observe communistic influences in both government circles and among the business and laboring class.

Wills emphasized that one did not need his name on a communist card to be an ally of Russian desires; one need only to associate with the communistic crowd and think as they do to be a real threat to our own democratic heritage.

"It's up to you and me to correct the situation," Dr. Wills concluded. "It might be hard to outline or indicate the exact course to take, but the least we can do, and must do, is to take personal, individual responsibility in our government, writing our congressmen, voicing our desires, calling our representatives' hands on their bungling or shortsightedness."

More Reserve Officers Called to Active Duty With or Without Consent

Officers of the Army Officers Reserve Corps, not assigned to organized troop units, will be ordered to extended active duty for a period of 21 months, or such other period as may be authorized by law, with or without their consent, according to an announcement by the Department of the Army, Col. Oscar E. Abbott, chief of the Texas Military district stated in Austin this week.

In the combat and service branches only company grade officers that is, lieutenants and captains, will be called under this authority. All grades to include lieutenant colonels are subject to orders to active duty in the medical and dental services.

Officers selected will be ordered to duty from both the active and inactive reserve elements. These assigned to Organized Reserve corps troop basis units will not be called under this authority.

Processing of physical examinations will be expedited so that one-third of the officers will be able to report to their stations by September 22, another third by September 29 and the remainder not later than October 6. Officers selected for the call will be ordered to the nearest army installation for physical examination, return to their homes and await final orders and will be granted a minimum of 21 days from the date of receipt of active duty orders to the date of reporting to their stations.

Although the Volunteer program for officers previously announced has been superseded by this call, it is still desired that applications from company grade officers for recall be extended active duty be forwarded to Headquarters Texas Military district. Officers ordered to active duty pursuant to their own request will reduce the number required to be called into service without their consent.

The 4th Army area, which includes Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, has been given a quota of 182 captains and 612 lieutenants as follows:

Combat arms: armored, 15 captains, 75 lieutenants; Field artillery, 16 captains, 65 lieutenants; infantry, 81 captains, 273 lieutenants; corps of engineers, 23 captains, 47 lieutenants; coast artillery, 3 captains, 9 lieutenants. Services: 64 captains and 143 lieutenants.

The quota for all medical branches is 195. Of these, 25 are for medical officers above the rank of captain and 744 captains and lieutenants. The quotas calls for 4 dentists above the rank of captain and 20 captains and lieutenants. Other medical services will furnish 2 field grade officers and 70 captains and lieutenants. State quotas were not announced.

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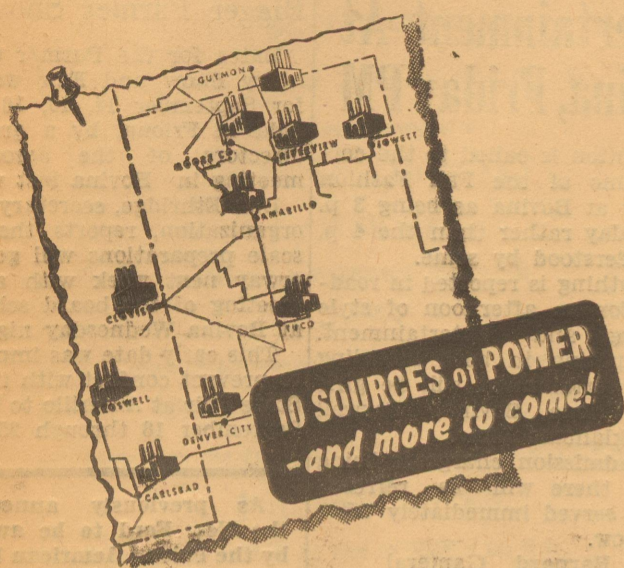

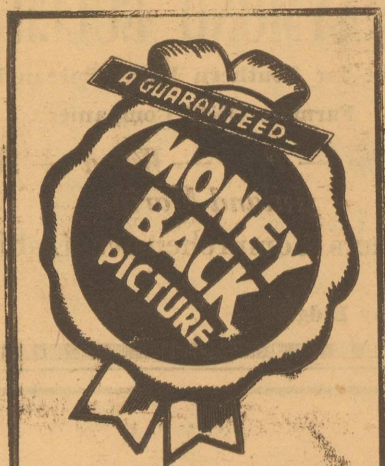

Draft Act Applicable Only to Those Registering Since 1948; Others Not Obligated to Keep Contact With Boards

Some men registered under the World War II draft act, now past 40 and 50 years of age, are attempting to advise old local boards of changes of address and status, although these draft boards have been out of existence for years.

As a result, these cards and letters are flooding present local boards and Selective Service headquarters.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, advised today that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obligated to keep local boards advised are those registered under the Selective Service act of 1948, which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed out.

"Any man who has registered with Selective Service in 1948, 1949 or 1950 is obligated to advise his local board of address

and status change," General Wakefield said. "Any man who registered with any local board prior to those years is not required by law to do so."

The state director said that every man should ask himself the question, "Should I be registered under the Selective Service act of 1948?"

The answer, says General Wakefield, is simple. If the man was born on August 30, 1922 or

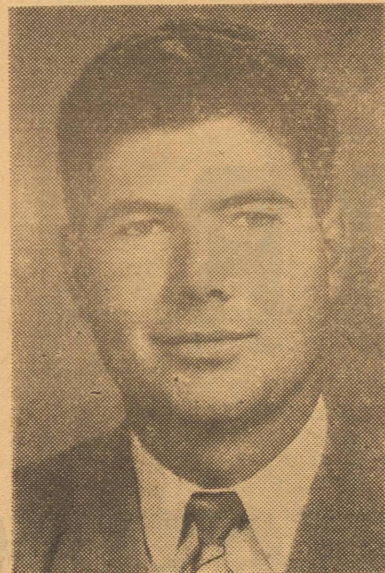

EDITORIAL

Fire Trucks Basically Are Designed For Extinguishing Fires; and Are Not Functionally Built to Withstand The Rigors of Rain, Sleet, Snow Along Friona Main Street

MAYBE WE'RE HINTING FOR A FIRE STATION!

This editor, along with some other good Friona citizens, I hope, is justly proud of the nearly new fire truck that can be seen parked along Main street or by the park grounds.

But we won't be so keen about SEEING that truck openly displayed come winter snows, sleet and ice. And I suppose the July rains also did little to increase the value of this fire wagon.

Yessir, everyone knows Friona has a fire truck . . . they've seen it! But I believe the principal function of such a vehicle is its utility—its readiness at all times to extinguish fires, and not as a show piece to be left out in the open at the mercy of the weather.

This new truck was delivered last December at a cost of some \$8,000.00 to the fire boys and to the City of Friona. About 1200 feet of hose is used with it—hose valued at a minimum of \$1.60 per foot.

Maybe the fire boys and their diligent chief, Charlie Bainum, and their marshal, Roy Wilson, don't merit the consideration of housing for their truck—all these boys do is to time after time save our businesses or our homes from the ravages of fire, a small matter no doubt, and of course their presence reduces our fire insurance key rate somewhat, so we can give them the brush-off, it seems, on a minor item like protect-

ing their investment in a truck.

But wait . . . it's our investment, too! In hard dollars and cents, you and I will be the losers when that hose rots from exposure to the weather; you and I will suffer if some winterish day that truck just can't give its usual prompt service. So, since it involves US, let's do something about it!

Is there a location for erection of a fire station? Someone please tell me if arrangements could be made to place it on a corner of the county park within our city limits. It would be right on the pavement (should we never do anything about more paving!) and even would add to the city's appearance as a municipality giving SERVICE to its businesses and citizens, to say nothing of protecting the \$10,000.00 investment.

I believe, without apologies, that money must be raised in some manner to provide housing for the fire equipment at an early date. I want some comments on this situation, because I'm afraid I'll just keep mentioning it until I am satisfied on one of two counts . . . (1) that proper steps have been taken to erect a covering for the fire equipment, or (2) that the investment in present equipment isn't worth protecting—and wasn't worth its initial outlay.

Any Town's Foremost Public Relations Worker Is That Service Station Employee or Cafe Waitress Who Greets Most Every Visitor Long Before the Mayor or Banker!

Truism! The visitor's first impression of Friona or any town seldom is influenced by the cash in the city's till, the publicity the town has enjoyed, etc., but rather by the reception first given him by that filling station attendant or that cafe waitress along the highway. That's right, these workers are the foremost emissaries of goodwill, the real publicity committee of our town.

How often have you entered a strange town, making your first contact with its life through a station attendant or cafe waitress? And how often have you remembered that town kindly if that person's service was extraordinary or his courteous manner impressive, making you at once feel welcome. And how often have you avoided stopping at the town where a less cordial reception was given by some clock-watcher or short-sighted public servant?

In commenting on this important role of our "public relations representatives" along the highways, I want to commend our own attendants along Highway 60 who are very worthy as our ambassadors of good will. They are tops. Try it as I have—stop at just any of the service stations or the cafes in Friona and see if you don't agree that the service is superlative, the atmosphere most "homey" and welcome.

More and more the wide-awake employer is recognizing that courteous attention of all employees is a very concrete and integral factor in his business success, his financial remuneration. And the smart employer who has tried to put forth that extra effort has without fail found his job more interesting, and oftentimes more lucrative. And think of the personal satisfaction incurred!

I say we don't deserve these trying times because our nation was founded by staunch men who were tired and sickened of the very way of government and graft and petty politics and religious bigotry that now is threatening the Western World.

While I'm at it, I'll add one more thought. As I've never believed in criticism without a counter proposal, I will add to the thousands of cures already suggested with a point or two of my own.

(1) We must see that never again do we elect any leader "two small for the job." And believe me, there still are men BIG enough, INTELLIGENT enough, AMERICAN enough to wield a stick the Joe Stalins and fellow travelers will respect. More men are needed like Warren Austin, Bernard Baruch and others we can name.

(2) We must back these leaders in holding aloft the ideals of our Christian America, forming no despicable alliances with the gutter-snipes who would infiltrate and tear down the American way of life.

(3) And I suppose that without undue hesitation we should be prepared and willing to forcibly defend our heritage with armed might right to the heart of the Kremlin! Enough of this dilly-dallying around with satellites and stooges of the Red move while Joseph, et al, maneuvers in the protection of Kremlin walls. 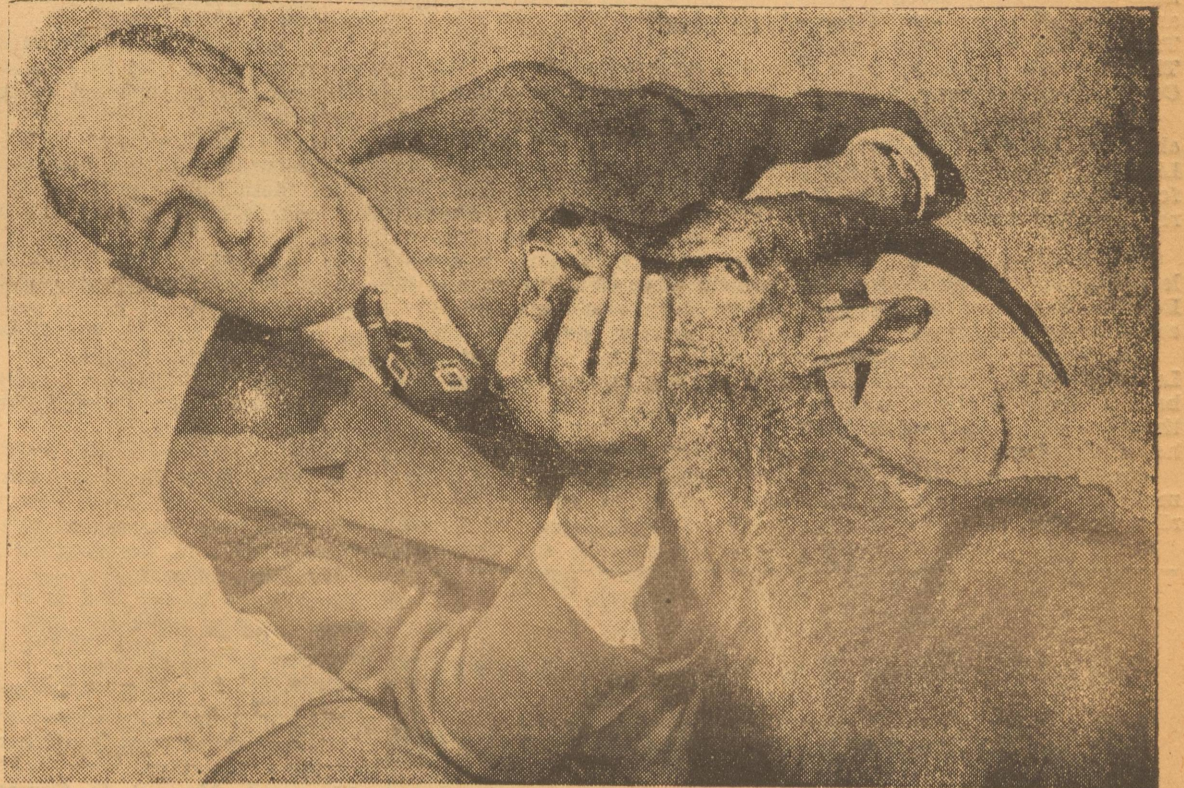

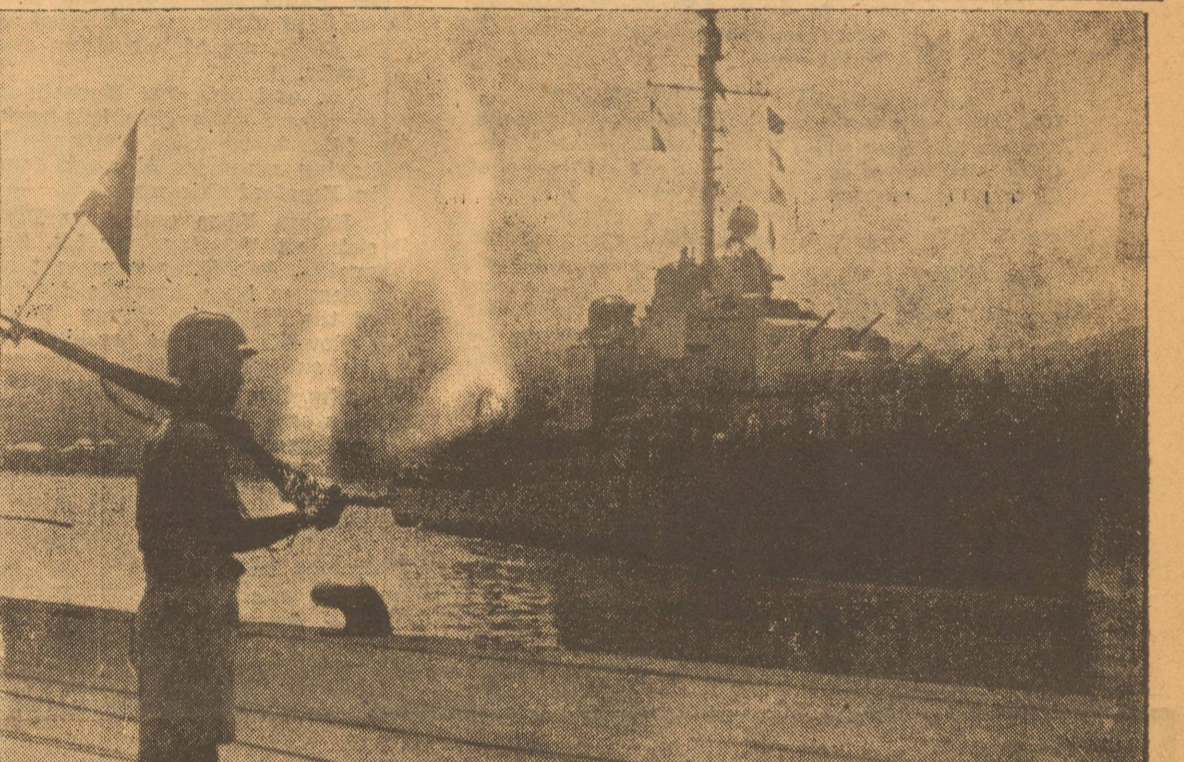

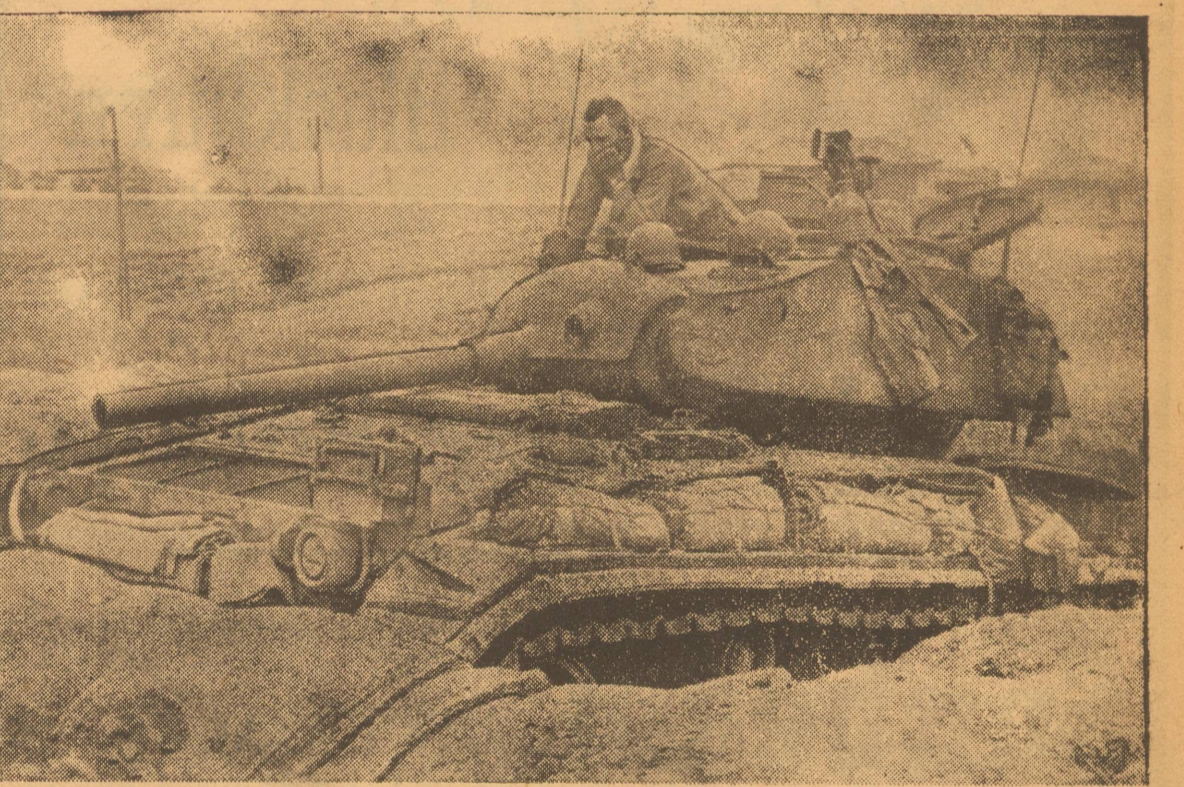
World Events In Pictures



LOOKING A GIFT GOAT IN THE MOUTH . . . A unique gift arrived in the United States recently for President Truman from the island of Crete. It was sent as an expression of gratitude for American aid, from Efftkos Protopapadakis, a Cretan mountaineer, on behalf of his people. The gift is a mountain goat called Kri-Kri, and it represents the donor's most prized and valuable possession. Dr. Robert Courter, Richmond, Va., veterinarian with the ECA in Greece, checks Kri-Kri's mouth before he was put aboard plane for the U.S. Kri-Kri's ancestors were common on Cretan mountains 3,000 years ago.



U.S. DESTROYER IN KEELUNG HARBOR . . . This United States destroyer, flagship of Vice Admiral Arthur Strubel, enters Keelung harbor, Formosa, after Seventh fleet was ordered to Formosa waters to protect the Chinese Nationalist island from Chinese attack and invasion. The Seventh fleet was also ordered to prevent Chinese Nationalists from making any attack on the mainland of China. The American fleet has been in action. Recently, an American cruiser and a British cruiser destroyed the east Korean coast town of Yongdok, held by the Korean Reds. The two cruisers bombarded the town all one evening and night.



TANK DUG IN ALONG KUM RIVER LINE . . . A soldier spends more time waiting than fighting, it has often been said. This tank commander seems to agree as he sits atop his monster, dug into position along the south bank of the Kum river in South Korea, waiting for the word that his fire support is needed by American defenders of the Kum river line. This was before the North Koreans breached this strong defense line of the Americans and South Koreans and advanced below the river to take Taejon from the outnumbered defenders. The river, considered by some a natural barrier to tanks, did not halt the Reds.



TANK SOLDIER MURDERED IN KOREA . . . Here, somewhere in Korea, is the body of one of four soldiers of the 21st infantry regiment, 24th division, found midway between a forward observation post and the front lines. According to the signal corps cameraman's caption, the men were probably captured during the night and then shot. This chap was shot through the head while his hands were tied behind him. The United Nations has issued requests to both sides in the Korean fighting that they observe all the rules of civilized warfare and refrain from torturing and killing prisoners. The North Koreans so far have not responded to the U.N. request.

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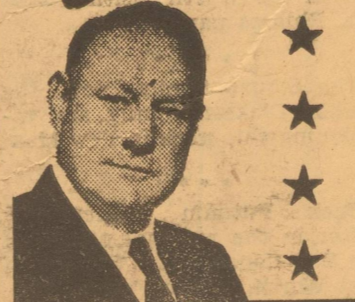
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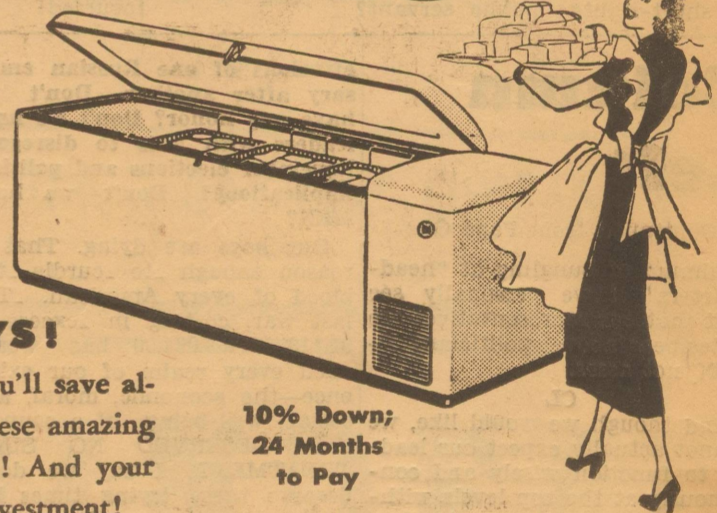

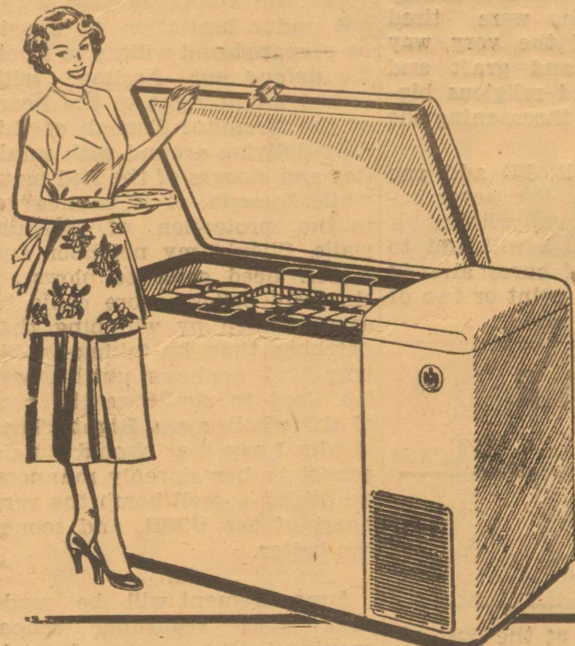
