He lived at Sherbrook for 14 years, or until he was 15 years of age, when the family moved to Bethlehem, in the White Mountain region of New Hampshire, where they remained one year, moving from there to West Newbury, Mass. Leaving there after a lapse of four years, when he was 20 years old, he migrated westward and located as Cresco, After spending 35 years at Cresco, he again moved, this time to Friona, Texas, where he is still living, having been at this place the past 25 years.

During his boyhood days, which were spent-in the forest region of Canada, Uncle Andy had many novel and pleasant experiences. His father cleared the land by means of what was called a "slash". That is, he would blaze out a strip of timber across his land and go through with an ax, chopping in on the same side of all trees in the strip until they were just about ready to fall, then he would cut the last few trees until they fell, and as they fell against the others they would cause the trees in front to fall until the entire strip had been felled in long windrow, or rather a "slash" as they called it. These trees would lay thus during the the dry summer and in the fall a fire would be kindled in one end of the slash and the entire row of trees would be consumed, leaving a clean strip of new ground. This strip would then be planted to turnips, or rather rutabagas, and before freezing weather arrived they would be pulled, great oodles of them, and stored away for use during the long, cold winter.
