A Case Close to Home....

We would like to say that the Parmer County courtnouse was designed for use by county offices alone, but on second thought we cannot present a case on paper that would meet the approval of even the federal government itself!

Now we know that we are right, but there have been so many infringements upon tht designated functions of government on every level that the local case would mertly be a drop in the bucket. We do not believe the PMA, with all its benefits, should be housed in a county-owned building; let the Federal Bureaus keep their own

But such clear-cut division is not in keeping with present trends. We even have the old fashioned understanding that tax-collectors should collect taxes, and merchants should sell merchandise. But now the merchants must hire help to collect the taxes from his employees! (And if he commits the sin of error, he is fully

reprimanded and fined for making a mistake on a job that by rights is a function of the government! and the government is in the business of buying and selling, oftentimes in compectaion with private investment.

Case after case of such inconsistencies could be inumerated. They are smiled upon in high

We just want to know if you think this is aboveboard and even morally right? If it is to be accepted, then we will just list ourselves with the ora-rogies but if there is something amiss here, we urge you and you and you as good citizens to begin applying the brakes somewhere. Mayne the specific incident would be of relative little consequence; but in this fastmoving era we must take stock of all the implications and look ahead to future consequences. If we accept double talk and loose dealings, we have no one to blame but ourselves.



I appeared before a Senate appropriations committee a few apppropriation for research to ings. fight the wheat and other cereal grain infestations. This is a serious problem, especially in our section of the country, and we must have research to protect our food supplies. Here is a portion of a committee report which I think expresses and explains the need for this research:

"Science saves our cereals: Stem rust and other diseases an enormous toll until varieties developed through coagricultural experiment stat ions came into general use When scientists learned that the rust organism spent part of its life on certain varieties of barberries, a large-scale campaign was organized to get rid of these plants. This proved to be a herculean task and is still going on

Our temporary conquest of stem rust has not come easily It was one of the earliest diseases to demand attention of cereal breeder, Scientists were puzzled to see a variety that had stood up for several years suddenly succumb. New varieties often met the same fate after a few years of successful resistance.






