Extradition is the surrender by some country which does not have do not have extratdition treaties

> As to extradition between the States of the United States, each state may pass its own laws governing the conditions under which it will return persons to other states.

Basically the procedure, both international and between the States is that the governmental authority requesting the return of a person, forwards to the head of the nation or the governor of the State a formal request along with documentary evidence of the nature of the offense with which the person is charged, and supporting evidence concerning his guilt of the offense. It is within the discretion of the governor of the state or head of the nation, whether or not, after a hearing before him, he will order the individual returned to the requesting authority. The governor, or head of a nation, may, if he deems that the best interests of justice will be served by not returning the individual to the requesting authority, deny the request for the individual, and grant him the ight to stay where is then found. The train will leave at 12:35 p.m. on its return to Amarillo.


