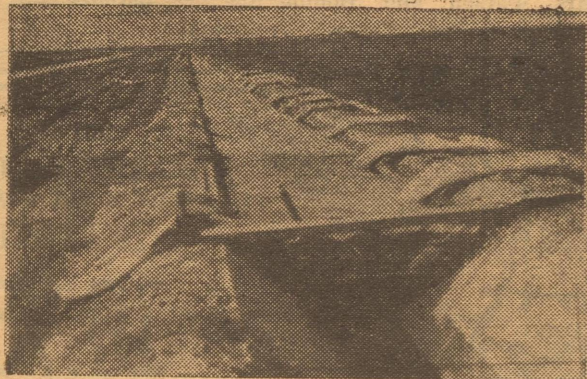




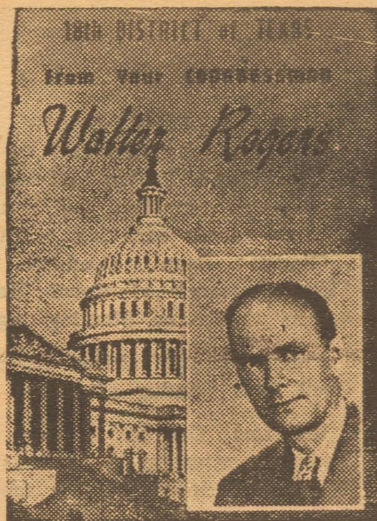

**The Closing Days of The Session**  
The drive for adjournment got under full steam during the last week of June and the first few days of July. This meant extra long sessions in both Houses of Congress and in all committees. This is especially true in the conference committees between the House and the Senate. When a legislative matter passes both Houses but is amended in either House, the legislation is sub-

mitted to a conference committee between the House and Senate to adjust differences between the Houses. Since the House and Senate have differed on most of the major bills this year, the conferees have had some tough and exhaustive battles. The GI bill for veterans of the Korean War hit this snag on one major explosive issue and several minor ones. The explosive issue was whether or not the benefits should go directly to the veterans and thereby permit him to make his own arrangements and attend to his own business in obtaining the educational benefits. A select committee of the House known as the Teague Committee made a detailed investigation of the program created under the World War II GI Bill. This committee uncovered some of the most unconscionable raids on the public treasury by educational institutions that could be imagined. These raids were not confined to fly by night schools, although these schools contributed a substantial portion of these vicious practices. Many of the leading educational institutions in this country were permitting practices that were unbelievable. The victim was the American taxpayer. He was not only victimized through unnecessary and useless administrative expenses, but he was also victimized by institutions obtaining funds from the public treasury through various practices not anticipated by the Congress when the legislation was passed. These practices amounted to a federal subsidy of both State and private schools under what was intended as a program to benefit the veterans. Needless to say, many veterans were also injured by these practices. The Veterans Committee, working in cooperation with the Teague Committee, undertook to close these leaks in the treasury. An attempt was made in the Senate to revive the old practice of paying money to the schools rather than to the veterans. This proposal would have created an almost impossible administrative problem that would have required thousands upon thousands of dollars for administrative expense and federal employees and untold red tape both to the Veterans Administration and to the veteran. The House was able to prevent this. It is the opinion of most of the members of the House and most of the members of the Senate that the bill agreed upon will be a major step forward in cutting out red tape and measurably reducing administrative expense and federal employees in this program. There was one particular amendment that I insisted upon being in the bill. This was concerning GI home loans to veterans. My amendment provided that a world war II veteran who was recalled to service in the Korean War would not lose his entitlements to get a home loan under the Korean bill, merely because he had used his entitlements under the World War II bill. Many of these boys who have been called back in had just got started in civilian life and had a small equity in their homes. When they were called back in, they had to sell those homes and use that equity to pay up their bills and take care of their families. Had we

failed to get this amendment in, a great injustice would have been done these boys who have been subjected to double service. Galley two Walter Rogers...  
**Public Housing**  
You will remember that the House of Representatives reduced the number of public housing units authorized in the original committee bill from 50,000 to 5,000. This was contained in an appropriation bill. When this bill reached the Senate, the number of public housing units was increased to 45,000. Since there was disagreement a conference committee went in the matter and finally agreed on 35,000 units. When this bill came back to the House for approval, a motion was made to send it back to the committee for further reduction in the housing units. However, as I have pointed out in previous letters, the coalition that was able to reduce the original number from 50,000 to 5,000 failed to coalesce and the result was that the bloc of Southern Democrats were left holding the bag, and the House approved the 35,000 units. It was just another case of what happened on the controls bill. The House had done away with many of the controls on goods not in short supply. However, when the matter got to the conference committee, most of these controls were put back on for the ten months period, and the matter came back to the House and was accepted by the House simply because of changed votes.

He taught band and chorus for one year in the Friona schools.



## Summer Travel Hints Offered For Carefree, Economical Vacation Fun

Certain travel tricks make vacation time a happy experience. Minnie Bell, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers a few of these tricks as suggestions to vacation-bound travelers.

Don't take more items than needed. This advice is heard over and over again but still the luggage is over loaded with unnecessary cosmetics, clothes and other items. Plan the articles to take by making a list of the places to be visited and the clothes needed. Clothes that

travel best are dark prints, soft finished wools, new crease resistant cottons, linens and rayons. Choose accessories that will go with several costumes and cut the shoe and bag problem to a minimum.

A make-up kit is almost a must unless there is a fitted overnight bag. Using small plastic bottles and jars eliminates breakage and stick-perfume never spills. Miss Bell says the purse size whisk broom which is no larger than a lip stick often comes in handy. And a travelling iron with a handle that folds over takes up very little space.

A hanger with a few clothes pins is useful for drying hose and other small pieces of clothing. One or two plastic or rubber lined envelopes should be included for wet wash rags and soap and a small roll of scotch tape may save the day. . . use it for a quick mend.

In the bottom of the suitcase pack the heavy and bulky articles, such as the iron, shoes and jewelry case. The specialist advises using plenty of tissue paper between articles and in corners. Fill up the depressions with lingerie, she adds.

If these suggestions are followed, Miss Bell says the vacationer will leave with a light heart as well as a light suitcase and have a carefree time while gone.

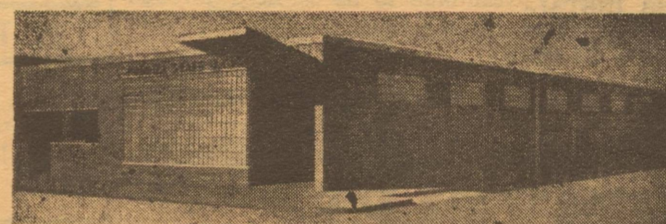

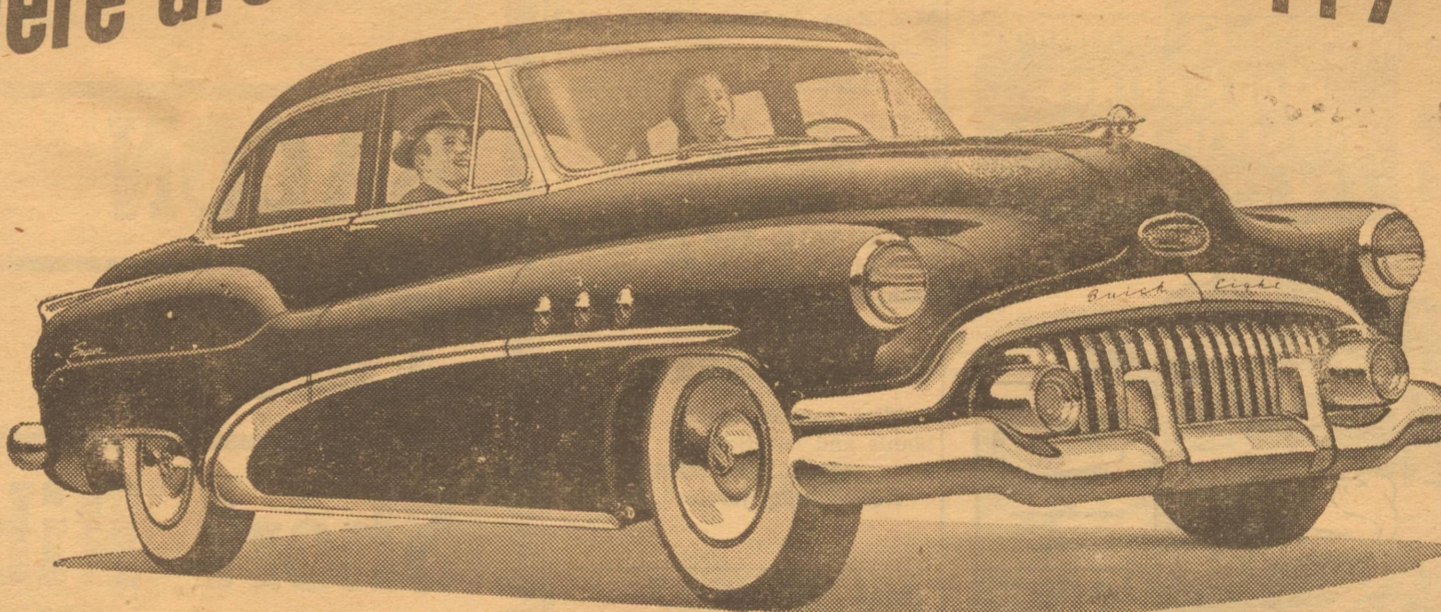

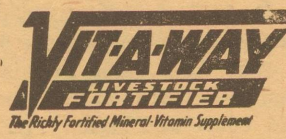
