## Farm Bureau Report



Parmer County Farm Bureau workers will begin an intensive farm to farm canvass February 17 to sign up new members, it was announced this week by Carl Schlenker, county membership chairman.

Quota for the spring membership drive is 550. Schlenker said. The membership total for Parmer County now stands at 527. About thirty other Farm Bureau organizations over the state are also conducting the spring membership campaigns.

The importance of the coming drive in this county was stressed by Bruce Parr, county president of the organization. "It is becoming increasingly important and necessary for farmers

and ranchers to band together," Parr said. "Prices that the farmer receives for his produce are going down all the time, yet prices that he must pay for the goods and machinery he buys are on the increase. It's the old familiar squeeze."

"This is an age of organization, and the farmer cannot afford the luxury of being independent forever. He must sell his produce to organized processors; he must buy from organized groups. Labor and industry are organized, and the farmer has the choice of organizing or watching his margin of profit disappear."

### WASHINGTON AND "Small Business"

More and more events are proving the need for a revamping of the system for enforcement of the nation's anti-trust laws.

In two major cases, the oil case and the Dupont case progress has been deliberately slowed down to give the new Administration an opportunity to review the cases and decide what it wishes to do in the matters.

This is especially confusing in the oil company case which is a C. W. Harder criminal action. Five major oil companies are charged with conspiring to create and maintain a worldwide petroleum cartel.

The situation is similar to that which would prevail if all criminal cases pending in state courts would be delayed until a new governor had a chance to look them over.

Thus, for some peculiar reason, the traditional American principle of impartial justice, impartially administered, is suspended in anti-trust violation cases.

It also appears that even Federal judges resent the unorthodox procedure that crops up.

Judge James Kirkland has set March 16 as the last date that the oil companies have to produce documents pertaining to their foreign operations or adequate reasons why they cannot produce them, or face contempt charges. The time was extended, the court said to give the new Administration time to make a decision on the case. This came after the National Security Council held that disclosure of the foreign dealings of the American

oil companies might be harmful to the national interests.

However, Judge Kirkland has expressed doubt of any danger to national security in disclosure of the documents.

Earlier in the Dupont case, the statement was made in Federal court that a possibility existed that the new Administration might want to stop the case.

But it is interesting to realize that these cases are prepared laboriously by career attorneys in the Department of Justice.

Yet a politically appointed Attorney General, who in turn appoints the Assistant Attorney Generals including the one in charge of the anti-trust division, can without the public having any recourse, throw out a case that has taken years to prepare.

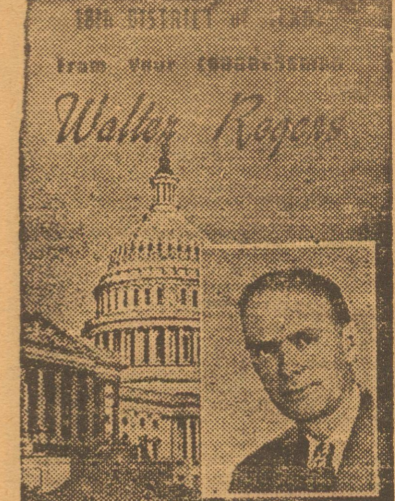
This in turn results in a two edged weapon that can be used as a political weapon. Cases which should be tried can be dropped, or cases can be instituted against firms for purposes of harassment where the foundation for a case does not exist.

American legal procedure is supposed to be impersonal.

That is why independent businessmen all over the nation are asking Congress to make it impossible for the prosecution of anti-trust cases to be affected by political changes. Even though political factors are not introduced in present pending cases, an unhealthy condition exists when the law makes it possible for many people to believe that a change of administration will have an effect. It is hoped that the position of heading the anti-trust division of the Department of Justice will be made a permanent one, filled by a competent career attorney.

The "Report to the People" policy has really caught on with the congressmen and representatives serving this area, and the Star is being deluged with letters weekly from a number of these representatives. We appreciate these reports when containing real information rather than propaganda intended to further their own popularity, and as space and time permit, we will publish excerpts from these reports.

In turn we would urge that you write you write these representatives - letting them know first hand what WE are thinking - and we'll all benefit.



### J. M. OSBORN:-

Representative Osborn calls our attention to the following bill, H. B. No. 54 by M. O. Bell to be entitled:

An Act amending Article 1175 of Title 28 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Paragraph 35, which will grant to cities the exclusive control of the drilling of water wells, of the operation thereof and of the production therefrom within the corporate limits and within one mile of the corporate limits for the purpose of preventing waste of the underground waters underlying said corporate limits ETC.

The President of the United States is entitled to the full support if both parties in carrying into effect his campaign promises which were approved by the voters:

The National Capital is aliv with gossip and rumors as to the meaning of some of the early actions in Congress. Actually, very little has been accomplished in the Congress outside of organizational work. I had hoped that operations would get into full swing immediately after the 20th of January. However, it seems that there has been additional delay awaiting the President's message to the Congress, which will be delivered on the Monday following the writing of this letter, which will be before many of you have occasion to read it. The reason for this added delay seems to be the strife between the factions inside the Republican Party. Much of it is due to differences between the factions concerning the dispensing of patronage. It has already reared its ugly head in several of the House and Senate committees. President Eisenhower is obviously doing his best to reconcile these differences and to bring about a spirit of cooperation that will expedite the fulfillment of his campaign promises to the American people. Certainly both parties owe it to this country to cooperate with him and his administration to honor and carry out the wishes of the American people. The two major flare-ups that have occurred and have caused the greatest disturbance are:

### GOVERNOR SHIVERS:-

Governor Shivers writes the following letter:

One of the most pressing problems before the 53rd Legislature is that of properly financing our public school program.

The fact that our teachers need a cost-of-living pay increase, and the further fact that we do no now have the money to pay for it, have created a dilemma. I think the teachers must have a raise. I have proposed a program that I believe would give them a substantial raise without a state tax increase. There are other proposals in the legislative hopper. This subject will be in the news for weeks and months.

As background information and for publication if desired, I am preparing a short series of articles to present the facts as I see them in regard to sound public school financing.

### ANDY ROGERS:-

Senator Andy Rogers sends releases revealing the following:

He has been appointed to high committee posts: Chairman of the Senate committee on Stock and Stock Raising, and member of committees of Water Rights, Irrigation and Drainage; Military and Veterans' Affairs; Internal Improvements; Public Printing; and as vice-chairman of the Agriculture and Education committees.

Two bills already have been co-authored by Rogers, dealing with water and with election of delegates to national conventions.

The first bill is designed to strengthen the legal status of Subdivision No. 1 of the High Plains Water Reservoir; and the second would provide for a Presidential primary in Texas with delegates from Texas to the national convention being elected by popular vote in the primary.

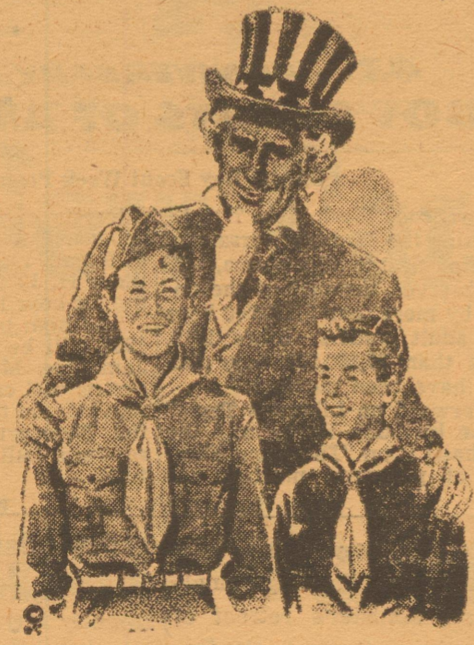

### Safeguarding Our Milk Supply

One animal disease, mastitis, takes \$100,000,000 out of the American farmers' pocket each year. The loss to dairy farmers is reflected nation-wide in a shorter milk supply and higher prices on all dairy products.  
Milk is a basic food, and a short milk supply is an extremely critical problem in view of our mounting population. To keep the American youngsters of 1975 as well fed as they are now, it is estimated, we'll need another 10 billion quarts of milk at that time.  
Conquering mastitis would do much to solve this problem. Teatube-Neomycin, a new treatment for mastitis, is the most promising drug yet devised to fight this costly disease.  
Mastitis, an inflammation of the cow's udder, results from infection by one of four main groups of bacteria. The new treatment, it is said, controls all four forms without irritating the udder.  
Developed by The Upjohn Company, Teatube-Neomycin, has been tested by veterinary schools and practicing veterinarians throughout the country. One of these vets, Dr. A. R. Drury, School of Veterinary Medicine, Michigan State College, reported that Teatube-Neomycin ointment cured an average of more than 90 per cent of the animals of mastitis in a 3 1/2-year field study.

Extension was requested and was advocated by ex-president Hoover, who as you know headed the Hoover Commission and made many recommendations toward the simplification of the sprawling federal system. It did not occur to many of us that any controversy would arise concerning this. The bill was introduced and promptly taken up by the proper committees in the House, and the Senate for early action so that the new administration could get under way with the least possible delay.

The new budget director, Mr. Dodge, appeared before the House committee and stated his position clearly and concisely, and I might say ably. He sought a two-year extension of the present law with no changes. The testimony before the committee included the letter from Herbert Hoover insisting that such powers be continued in the President. However, when the smoke had cleared, the committee had voted an amendment to the law which measurably cut down the presidential powers. This amendment provided that a presidential reorganization could be defeated on the floor of either House by the vote of a simple majority. This simply means that should the matter come before either House a time when only a few members were on the floor, a presidential reform or reorganization of a department or agency which could save the taxpayers of this nation many dollars, could be defeated and sent back to the White House. Every member on the Democratic side of the House, committee voted to sustain Eisenhower and carry out his wishes in the matter. Every member on the Republican side, with the exception of one, who voted present, voted against the expressed wishes of President committee by the Director of the Budget, Mr. Dodge. Every one who knows anything about parliamentary procedure knows that one of the oldest tricks employed by a small bloc or minority is the trick of bringing up legislation while only those favoring the legislation, or opposed to it, as the case may be, are present. What the overall results of this parliamentary maneuvering will be is difficult to foresee at the present time, but there is one thing for sure: President Eisenhower will receive almost unanimous support from the Southern democrats in Congress and many other democrats in reorganizing and reforming the boards, bureaus and departments of this Government if such reorganization will result in better efficiency, less federal jobs and less cost to the taxpayer. Such proposal should have the unanimous support of the Congress in both houses.

The tax reduction proposal that has caused much concern is the proposal by Representative Reed, of New York, to cut off the last tax increase at an

early date. This would mean a tax reduction of around 5 1-2 per cent in 1953 and an overall tax reduction in later years of approximately 11 per cent. There is no doubt but that Eisenhower promised the American people that he would work diligently toward tax reduction and the balancing of the budget. The concern on Capitol Hill centers around the question of which is to come first -- the chicken or the egg? Rep. Reed takes the position that the tax reduction is in order and that balancing of the budget will follow in due course. He is the Chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee and cannot be brushed aside. Other leaders in the Re-

publican Party take the position that a great deal of work must be done on the budget toward a reduction thereof before any tax reductions can be thought of. I do not hesitate to tell you that I expect to support Mr. Reed's position for the tax reduction, if for no other reason than to be consistent. This was the tax increase that I voted against, and I have not changed my position. It is my thought that the budget will be balanced much quicker if we take some action on reducing taxes, than will be the case if we spend a year or two discussing what we might possibly do without in the way of federal expenditures. A nation is no different from an individual. As long as the money is provided to be spent, the chances are it will be disposed of. Although I would prefer to make the initial tax reductions by increasing personal exemptions, I certainly intend to go along with Mr. Reed if we can get some relief.

**Green Manure Helps to Maintain Soil Fertility**

Nature does a good job in maintaining soil fertility without help from man, especially in protecting the soil from erosion and restoring organic matter.

The use of cover or green-manure crops in combination with cultivated crops is an effort to profit from nature's lessons.

If agriculture is to be permanent, soils must be managed so as to maintain productivity and stay in place where they can be utilized instead of being washed into streams and for all time.

The practice of using cover crops for green manure by turning them under while green is almost as old as agriculture itself. But only recently have we come to a fuller understanding of the manifold benefits of the practice (1) in adding organic matter to the soil, (2) reducing soil erosion, (3) in helping maintain soil fertility through addition of organic matter and nitrogen, and retention of mineral elements, (4) in improvement of the mechanical condition of the soil, and (5) in furnishing a better medium for beneficial soil organisms.

Green manure crops are grown more often in fall and winter than in summer when most cash crops must be grown. Summer green manure crops, however, are often practical and profitable in a sound rotation program. Among the most useful are such legumes as red clover, soybeans, cowpeas,

sweetclover, lespedeza, and cro-talaria.

Winter green manure crops which survive temperatures of 60° to 15°F or lower and make some growth during this period, are commonly used in the Cotton Belt. The winter legumes most commonly used are hairy and smooth vetch, Austrian winter pea, crimson clover, bur-clover, sourclover, Willamette vetch and blue lupine.

Non-legumes such as Sudan-grass, pearl millet, winter rye, ryegrass and buckwheat may also be used as green manure crops. Sometimes they fit into the crop system better than legumes.

There are many ways that cover or green manure crops can be used. The principal points to consider are (1) to keep the ground covered with vegetation or mulch as nearly as possible all the time, (2) add as much organic matter to the soil as possible and (3) still take a sufficient amount of produce from the land to make the practice profitable.

Since there are so many crops suitable for green manure from which to choose, the farmer can give consideration to all factors in making his selection. He should confer with his county agent as to the best practice and his seed supplier as to price and availability of seed. He can then determine which would be the most suitable and economical of the kinds available to use.

All is not lost if a "diamond" falls out of your favorite costume jewelry. Crush a bit of aluminum foil to fit the cavity, paste it in and until you replace the stone few if any will be the wiser.

After drying it thoroughly, apply a good wax-liquid or paste polish if its leather. Suedes need to be dried thoroughly, brushed, then polished with a suede dressing. Let dry. Brush. Steam over a boiling tea kettle to further raise nap.

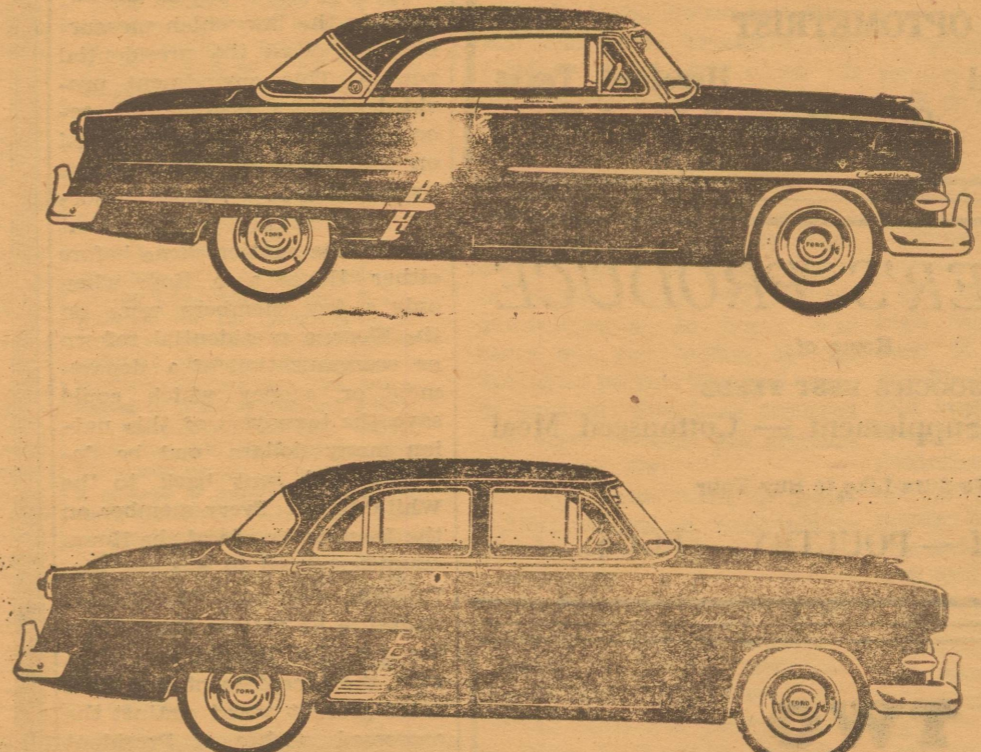
