

A lot of people are "down" on Syngman Rhee, the South Korean president, for his independent action that no doubt has seriously hampered the present truce negotiations (as if they could be in worse

Unification in purpose and in action must surely be imperative for decisive winning of wars or the signing of pledges between naions; but we cannot see that Rhee is any more out of line than has been some of our other allies, even England.

A lot of countries like the handouts from Uncle, depending on him for their very existence above the waterline of economic chaos, yet it has been an evident United States policy for a number of years to embrace these nations, letting them veritably dictate to us in many instances. Hasn't the Churchillian voice of England thundered time and again when the U.S. acted without consulting them to their satisfaction? Then, where has England or ourselves or anyone a logical right to score the little but rugged Mr. Rhee for similar attitude? We're not upholding him, but we have seen parallel incidents sanctioned. And the cost has been heavy.

Personally, we thought at one time that we entered the Korean fracas to win; maybe Mr. Rhee feels likewise. But the whole action has evolved into a circumstance where "negotiations" were thought by our government to be acceptable. We do not question the wisdom of this turn-about in policy; in the frst place, we don't pretend to know; in the second place, we still are good citizens going along with the majority wishes in the foreign policy of our own government: but with Mr. Rhee merely sticking to the original purpose of the war, we cannot be too angry at his motives . . future developments will be worth watching, at any rate. He replied that if it was any place except the Panhandle of Texas, a lot of the people would have already moved out. I think this is one of the highest compliments that could be paid to the people there who have fought the elements through the years and have built one of the finest stock of Americans in the United States

Just the other day I expressed to the Congress my thoughts on the subject and gave them two petitions that have been forwarded to my office concerning this tragedy. 
