## Well Permits Are Continuing Pace

Since the first of the year, 240 rrigation well permits have been issued to Parmer County residents reports Raymond Euler, Farm Bu reau Service representative. This is an increase of abou 20 over last year's recorded permits. In one week alone, 13 permits were issued. However, the average is ap proximately 20 permits per month. He also estimated the number of wells in Parmer County as being near 1500.

An interesting but discouraging fact concerns the number of com plete well failures. Nearly 100 wells have been replaced, and 50 per cent of that number had no been in production over two year That amount is all that have bee recorded up to the present tirr but it is suspected that several ad ditional well failures have neve







Q-I am a Korean veteran with a ervice-connected disability serious enough to prevent me from getting commercial life insurance. Will my lisability also stop me from obaining GI permanent insurance available to disabled Korean veter-

A-No. No matter how severe it s, your service-connected disability will not bar you from permanent-plan GI insurance. But you could not get it if you had a non-service disability that would prevent you disability that would prevent you disability that would prevent you rom meeting the good-health requirements of the GI insurance

Q-I understand I can pay off my GI loan in advance, without pen-

hey can't go? -There is a minimum amount. t is the amount of one regular monthly payment or \$100, which-

ever is less.

Q—I'm planning to add the total lisability income provision to my GI insurance policy. I pay my insurance premiums once a year. Could I pay the extra amount for he disability provision on a month-

A-No. You must make your disability income payments in the doso. surance payments. If you pay your premiums yearly, you must the extra amount for disability overage yearly, too.

Q-I am a Korean veteran, and got out of service in July, 1952. What is my cut-off date for startng Korean GI Bill training?

A-You-and all Korean veterans separated before August 20, 952—must begin training under the Korean GI Bill by August 20, 1954. Veterans separated after August 20, 1952, have two years from separation in which to begin.
