Apply a complete fertilizer with 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at the rate f two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area, says E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist. This is the quan-tity of nitrogen in 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 10-10-10, or in 25 pounds of 8-8-88-8-8

To assure even distribution, the specialist recommends dividing the fertilizer into two equal lots. Broadcast one and then spread the emaining portion in a second aplication, but at right angles to the

"Grass can't use fertilizer without water," Trew adds. In most areas yards will need a "good soak ing" after the plant food has been added. Soak the soil to a depth of six inches or more. This allows the fertilizer to go into solution and become available for plant use. To bring out need for timely application, he says plant food should added one month prior to the first expected hard freeze. the summer grasses are pushed into lush growth by late treatment, some may be lost because of freez-
