



by our national government. This number of subsidies does not in-clude special benefits received from contracts with the different departments of government, as mailing permits, river and harbor maintenane for shipping, control of freight rates to prevent competition beween carriers and special franchises to utilities. A high level of prices for all farm commodities must be maintained if the cost of production continues to rise. This can best be done by governmentsupported prices in the form of loans which will provide an orderly marketing of farm products rather than "dumping" at harvest time.






